Appoint School Study Committee

The Board of Education of Cass City Public Schools appointed a school study committee at its regular meeting Monday night at the school.

The board was formed in compliance with a request by school electors who attended an open meeting in the spring to discuss school problems. At that time they requested that a committee be formed to anticipate the needs of the school for the next 10 years.

At the same meeting, the board presented its plan for the addition of the elementary school that was approved at a later election.

Looking into the future needs of the district will be 10 area residents. President pro-tem of the group is Eli D. Holes. Others to serve are Arlington Hoffman, Cecil Barriger, Kenneth Maharg, Iris McEachern, Mrs. Lucy Starman, Mrs. Horace Bulen, Dr. James Ballard, Victor Guernsey and Jim Champion.

The committee is to meet with the board of education Aug. 8. All members of the school board will have been named for new terms at this time.

Dump Ground Problem Still Perplexes Council

The Cass City Village Council wrestled with the problem of the village dump for nearly an hour Tuesday night at the Municipal Building without coming to a satisfactory solution.

The dump is rapidly becoming full and unmanageable . . . costing several hundreds of dollars annually to push back debris so that more junk can be hauled in.

Complicating the problem is the question of who owns the dump . . . Elkland township or the village. It was suggested that a gate be erected and dumping allowed only two afternoons a week on a supervised basis. However, until ownership is established this plan has been tabled.

Other members of the council feel the best solution is an entirely new location. Trustees will again try and find a suitable location. Previous attempts have proved futile because of the requirements of the location. It must be within a reasonable distance from Cass City and at a price that the village can afford.

New Greenleaf Pastor to Retire From Ministry

Rev. G. A. Guiliat, pastor of the New Greenleaf United Missionary church, will retire at the end of this week after 41 years in the ministry. He will give his farewell sermon Sunday.

Rev. Guiliat has been at the New Greenleaf church for six years, serving prior to that in Lansing. He has also had congregations at Elkton, Bad Axe, Marlette, Mizzap-Riverside, La Motte, Battle Creek, Detroit, Petoskey and Mancelona.

Rev. and Mrs. Guiliat, who have been married 38 years, will make their home at Roseburg near Yale, where he was born. They have two daughters, Arlene, the wife of Rev. R. J. Mattison of Elkton, and Onalee, the wife of Herbert Langolf of Port Huron.

The New Greenleaf church will be served by Rev. Richard R. Kurtz, pastor of the Bad Axe United Missionary church, as part of a church circuit.



Martha Osburn, County's Oldest Resident, Dies

Funeral services were held Saturday for Tuscola County's oldest resident, Mrs. Martha Osburn, who died June 22 at the age of 104.

Mrs. Osburn, who had lived in the county for 80 years, was believed to be the oldest survivor of the great forest fire that swept the Thumb September 6, 1881.

Her son, James, now living in Deford, was born eight days before the fire.

Mrs. Osburn was buried in Novesta Cemetery. The Rev. Lloyd A. Wilson, pastor of the Church of the Nazarene, officiated.

She died in Stevens Nursing Home where she was a patient for six years.

Mrs. Osburn was born March 5, 1856, near Strathroy, Ontario. She and Andrew Osburn were married in Ontario, October 26, 1879.

Mr. Osburn came alone to Michigan and purchased 49 acres of land in Kingston township where the family has lived since.

Mrs. Osburn is survived by three sons, William of Perry; Lloyd of Marlette, and James of Deford, and many grandchildren, great-grandchildren and great-great-grandchildren.

\$14,000 Program Starts in July

Concrete Surface for Seeger-Doerr Road

The village council okayed expenditures of nearly \$14,000 for the blacktopping of two Cass City streets Tuesday night as trustees met in a lengthy session at the Cass City Municipal Building.

Scheduled to be completed in July is the resurfacing of North Seeger Street from Main to the village limits. The surfacing will be from curb to curb and cost has been estimated to be just under \$9,000.

Also to be surfaced is Doerr

Road from Garfield to Main Street. The roads will receive coats of bituminous concrete, the material used to resurface Main Street several years ago and the type used on state highways.

The concrete will be secured from a contractor on M-19 who has offered to defer payment for a year of any share of the cost over \$5,000 that the village is unable to pay this year.

Zoning Upheld
Two of Cass City's new ordinances were invoked as trustees

denied a building permit and tabled a request for approval of a final subdivision plat.

Arthur Kettlewell's request for a 22-foot garage to be placed on the corner of Sixth and West Streets was tabled. Zoning requires that there must be 10 feet between building and the street.

The Striffler North Lane subdivision final plat was not accepted by the council because adequate roads and drainage have not yet been completed.

A request for a building permit for a clinic on the corner of Huron and Dale streets by Cliff Croft was referred to the planning commission for approval before action is taken by the council.

Council Adopts New Wage Scale

The Cass City Village Council ended three months of study and discussion Tuesday night when they adopted a new wage schedule for employees.

Hourly employees were granted a five cents per hour increase retroactive to May 1. The employees had asked for 10 cents but the trustees felt that the village budget would not stand the boost at this time.

Also adjusted were the wages of two salary employees. Police Chief Bill Wood will receive \$100 for 60 hours of work on a six-day work week. No additional money will be paid for overtime emergency work.

Bill Schram, village engineer, will receive a yearly bonus of \$150 for his job responsibility and because he is on 24-hour call.

Discuss Pool

The council felt that in the interest of safety and the overcrowded conditions that the present regulations for charges would be left intact. They said that all of the pools in the Thumb area have admission charges.

The question of pool cleanliness was discussed. It was decided to take a sample of the water in the pool for a check by the state and to have the wading pool water changed three times weekly.

Repairs Okayed On Schwegler Rd.

One mile of hard-topping and one mile of grading in preparation for hard-topping next year on Schwegler road were approved by the Elkland Township Board Monday night, according to Supervisor Ed Golding Sr.

The miles to be improved are between the Daus and Bay City—Forestville roads and between the Milligan and Reed roads.

The estimated cost to Elkland township will be \$8,000, Golding said. The work will be done by the Tuscola County Road Commission.

At the Monday night meeting the board also set up a schedule of monthly meetings every fourth Monday.

The board tabled a discussion on changing from a caucus to a primary system until the next meeting.

Cass City Shows 55 Pupil Increase

Cass City's number of school age children (five to 19 years old) has increased by 55, according to the recently-completed school census released by William A. Scott, county superintendent of schools.

This is mainly because of the annexation April 13 of 100 parcels of land in the Cedar Run and Bingham school districts, according to Cass City School Superintendent Willis Campbell.

"We expect to have a slight increase this year particularly in the grades also because of new families moving into Cass City.

Countywide, an increase of 457 has been reported by Scott, with Millington and Unionville showing the largest gains.

List More Trailers In Tuscola County

Of the 323,995 trailers registered in Michigan, 4,093 are listed as being in Tuscola County, according to records of the Michigan Department of State.

James M. Hare, Secretary of State, pointed out that registrations of both light and heavy trailers are increasing at a much greater rate than are passenger vehicles.

"There are a good deal more than twice as many trailers on the road today as there were 20 years ago," Hare said. "In the case of heavy trailers this may be an indication of the increased use of motor transport over rail by many shippers and in the growing popularity among many motorists of using light trailers for hauling camping, cottage and suburban supplies."

Trailer registration fees collected through the first four months of 1960 were almost a half million dollars above those of the same period in 1959. Hare predicted that the use of personal trailers would continue to rise during the next decade. "Many of Michigan's hundreds of thousands of new watercraft owners are going to tire of exploring their own lake and get the urge to put their boats on trailers in search of new adventures in other Michigan waters," Hare said. "The growing number of boat launching sites on our Great Lakes and on our smaller lakes seems to make this trend inevitable."

Safety in Pool Primary Reason for Charges This Year

Not too long ago there were quite a few accidents on the Gageton corners north of Cass City. It wasn't until some deaths occurred that a four cornered stop was erected. A little foresight might have saved a life.

Should we then wait in the Cass City Swimming Pool, to have a death or serious injury occur before doing something about the overcrowded conditions? Conditions that would certainly lead to such a disaster. This was the major concern in the opening of the pool this year and the decision for the charge for swimming at all times. If the children have to pay for the privilege of swimming they can be better controlled. They will think twice before doing something to be ejected. Also, Mr. Carroll and the lifeguard are in the pool confines to further the safety in the pool. All these precautions may save a life or injury. Some of these precautions were suggested by the former pool attendant, Mr. Holmberg, who had to put up with the former conditions.

For the uninformed there is a free swimming period which is organized with the safety factor in mind. Its main purpose is to teach swimming in a controlled situation. I refer to the periods conducted by Mr. Holes, Mrs. Yedinak and Fred Leeson in their playground activities. Each Tues-

day and Thursday from 9-12 a. m. they teach swimming to the beginners and the children who want to learn a little advanced swimming. This is entirely free to any Cass City child.

In addition the Village Council would like to realize a little less loss financially for the operation of the pool. However, this was the secondary purpose for the elimination of the free period. Certainly, we are not so hard hearted as to turn away a little tyke who really can't afford to pay to swim. If there are those who are so hard pressed that they can't afford to pay, let us know, some kind of arrangement will be worked out.



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

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

Agent's Corner Frances T. Clark County Home Demonstration Agent

Few of us can resist the urge to eat outdoors on a beautiful summer day. This "outdoor living season" is made easier by good charcoal. The burning story for outdoor grills may be summed up in the one word—charcoal. The growth of charcoal production for the consumer market matches the popularity of outdoor cooking. Seven years ago, only 5 plants in the United States produced charcoal for the backyard grill. Today there are at least 50 of these plants. The State of Michigan boasts two of the largest, one at Marquette and the other one at Iron Mountain. Between these two Michigan plants, they produce one-third of the hardwood charcoal in the United States.

What is charcoal? According to the dictionary, charcoal is a "dark or black porous form of carbon, prepared from vegetable or animal substances, as by charring wood in a kiln from which air is excluded". We mostly think of charcoal as a wood product only, but it is not necessarily so. Charcoals are made from hardwoods, softwood, fruit pits, corncobs and lignite. Of the above, hardwood is the most important to Michigan. Hardwood and only hardwood is used in the making of charcoal in the plants in Upper Michigan. Dense, heavy northern hardwoods such as beech, birch and maple are considered ideal for making charcoal. These hard, heavy woods give a good yield because the more dense the wood, the more pounds of charcoal per cubic foot.

"There is more than meets the grill" to the charcoal industry. Hardwood distillation utilizes waste and cull timber that would otherwise be left to rot in the woods, and become both unsightly and a fire hazard.

The raw material comes to the plant by rail car and by truck. The logs are sawed into blocks about 12 inches long and 6 inches cross-section. The wood is dried by heat where 95 per cent of the moisture is removed. The dry wood is then placed in an airtight retort and heat of 900 to 1000 degrees is turned on. The carbonization process takes 16 to 20 hours. During this carbonization process, the wood really loses nothing but gaseous compounds.

Now the carbonized wood is ready for conditioning which is a process of cooling the charcoal. If lump charcoal is to be the end product, the charcoal is now ready to be "screened" for domestic or commercial use. Domestic size charcoal is that which goes through a 2 1/4-inch screen, but not a 1 1/2-inch screen. Commercial size charcoal includes that which will not pass through a 2 1/4-inch screen. The domestic use of lump charcoal is the barbecue grill. The commercial use is mainly the chemical companies.

The advantage of lump charcoal is that it catches fire quickly, making a quick, hot fire. It burns out quickly also; therefore, when a quick-cooking food is on the grill, it may be helpful to use a charcoal that burns to nothing, quickly.

Original cost of lump charcoal is less than that of briquets. If briquets are to be made, the charcoal is pulverized. To make briquets, the pulverized charcoal is mixed with a cooked starch and a water binder; then pressed into briquets under extremely high pressure. Then the briquets are cooled and dried. The drying of the briquets takes expensive equipment and the conditions of drying must be "just right" to give a good product. After cooling and drying, briquets are bagged and shipped to market.

The domestic market for briquets is for both indoor and outdoor grills. The commercial uses are the foundries, railroad dining cars and the trucking industry.

The advantages of briquets are that they produce intense, even heat and if the cooking process is a long one, briquets can be the product which helps avoid constant "firing up." Although original cost of briquets is greater than that of lump charcoal, the cost is reduced by the fact that it is usually practical to use fewer briquets.

Civil Service Studies Job Security for Key Employees

By Elmer E. White Michigan Press Association Job security in the upper reaches of state government is a question that bothers some of the heads of state departments. Elected officials, of course, expect to take their chances every time their name goes before voters at the polls. But many of the men holding top administrative jobs are appointed. The Civil Service Commission has decided to make a study to find out if there is a need to put some—or all—of these appointive jobs under the classified service.

Present regulations call for keeping the top jobs unclassified and not covered by Civil Service. The philosophy behind this is that men holding these positions would want to do so strictly on the strength of their own ability to perform required duties adequately. Perhaps more importantly, the Civil Service Commission has assumed that appointing authorities—the Governor, state commissions or boards and the top administrators themselves—would want to hold the power to replace an administrator at will.

A gentle chiding to certain county officials was administered recently by Attorney General Paul L. Adams. Adams said lawyers and District Attorneys in California had contacted him recently about failure of the Michigan officials to act in some cases involving the Uniform Reciprocal Enforcement of Support Law. The statute has to do with payment of alimony and other domestic money matters. The Michigan Attorney General urged the county officials to take prompt action to process requests filed through the California courts—and courts in other states with which Michigan has reciprocity agreements—to avoid creating a "disadvantageous situation."

The Civil Service provision in the state Constitution reads as follows: "The state civil service shall consist of all positions in the state service except those filled by popular election, heads of departments, members of boards and commissions, employees of courts of record, of the Legislature, of the higher educational institutions recognized by the state Constitution, all persons in the military and naval forces of the state, and not to exceed two other exempt positions for each elected administrative officer, each department, board and commission." But several men holding these positions, and groups with authority over them, have requested that they be classified in recent years.

If and when the Civil Service Commission decides to classify top positions, a competitive examination would be scheduled for each one. The incumbents would have to pass the exams and be among the top three contenders in order to be eligible for appointment. Four positions for which classification requests were received, and which triggered the Commission decision to study the situation were Mental Health Director, now held by Charles F. Wagg; Deputy Mental Health Director, where the incumbent is Dr. Vernon A. Stehman; State Aeronautics Director, now held by James D. Ramsey, and Secretary-Manager of the Upper Peninsula State Fair, presently occupied by Ray LaPorte.

Required Military Training will have a new look at Michigan State University this fall. A recent controversy, which waxed hot and heavy at times, resulted in a shift to more academic subjects in the Reserve Officers Training Corps (ROTC) program. In both the Army and Air Force programs, male students in the first two years of college will be allowed to substitute special courses in other departments, mainly military history, for the old "hardware" courses. These refer to subjects which deal with the weapons and other equipment used by the military forces. The advanced program, which will remain voluntary, was unchanged except for substitution of certain courses in geography and political science for present weapons courses. All changes in the program were worked out through combined efforts of military authorities and the academic staff. In addition, a committee of faculty and military representatives was set up to carry out a continuing study of the program and make periodic reports to the MSU Board of Trustees.
