

8 New Teachers To Join Faculty

"We have replaced four teachers and added four additional ones to bring the faculty of Cass City Schools up to 48 members," Superintendent Willis Campbell said this week.

Vacancies left yet are a half-day art session, half-day English and biology and junior high science.

Michael Eckhart, who taught biology and junior science, resigned July 14 to take a position with the Flint Public Schools.

New to the Cass City faculty are Donald J. Mance, Anne Mance, Donald R. Gillette, Dale V. Sherman, Marvin Hauck, Fulton McLain, Nancy Jean Cockerill and Betty Murphy.

Donald J. Mance is a graduate of Michigan State University. He majored in mathematics, which he will teach here, and has minors in physical education and general science. He is a 1955 graduate of Iron Mountain High School and has one year of experience teaching.

Anne Mance, one of the additional teachers hired, will teach physical education for girls. She is a 1959 graduate of MSU.

Donald Gillette comes from California where he has been stationed at the United States Navy Officers School. Mr. Gillette has a Bachelor of Music degree from MSU. He is married and has one small child. He was band instructor in Owosso where his band received an excellent rating, according to Supt. Campbell. Gillette replaces Ron Phillips as band director.

Dale V. Sherman graduated from Akron High School in May, 1951, and from Central Michigan University, June, 1960. He replaces Charles Whiteley who taught government and sociology. He is married.

Marvin Hauck is a CMU graduate. This will be his first year of teaching. He will teach public speaking, English, and will have charge of forensic activities.

Fulton McLain, an Air Force veteran, graduated from Adrian College with a major in physical science and a minor in mathematics. He is married and has one child. The past year he has been teaching at Hudson. He will have charge of chemistry, physics and mathematics. He will relieve some of the teaching responsibilities of Principal Arthur Holmberg, who will be able to spend more time with administrative duties, Campbell said.

Nancy Jean Cockerill received a B. A. degree from CMU this year where she was active in church and student organizations. She majored in early elementary education and will be a full-time kindergarten teacher. Miss Cockerill graduated from Caro High School.

Betty Murphy will replace Mrs. Mary Ryan as second grade teacher. She taught at the Evergreen school for several years. At the present time she is attending Central Michigan University and will complete her work for a bachelor's degree by the end of the first semester.

Wheat Support Set At \$1.78 Bushel

The U. S. Department of Agriculture announced July 5 an "advance" minimum national average support price of \$1.78 per bushel for 1961-crop wheat, if wheat marketing quotas are approved by producers in the July 21 referendum.

The advance support price reflects 75 per cent of the estimated parity price for wheat as of the beginning of the 1961-62 marketing year July 1, 1961.

Mrs. Foster Hickey spoke on behalf of the bean bake-off which is scheduled to be held at the Cass City Home-coming Aug. 4.

The only requirement is that the entry contain beans and that the recipe accompany it.

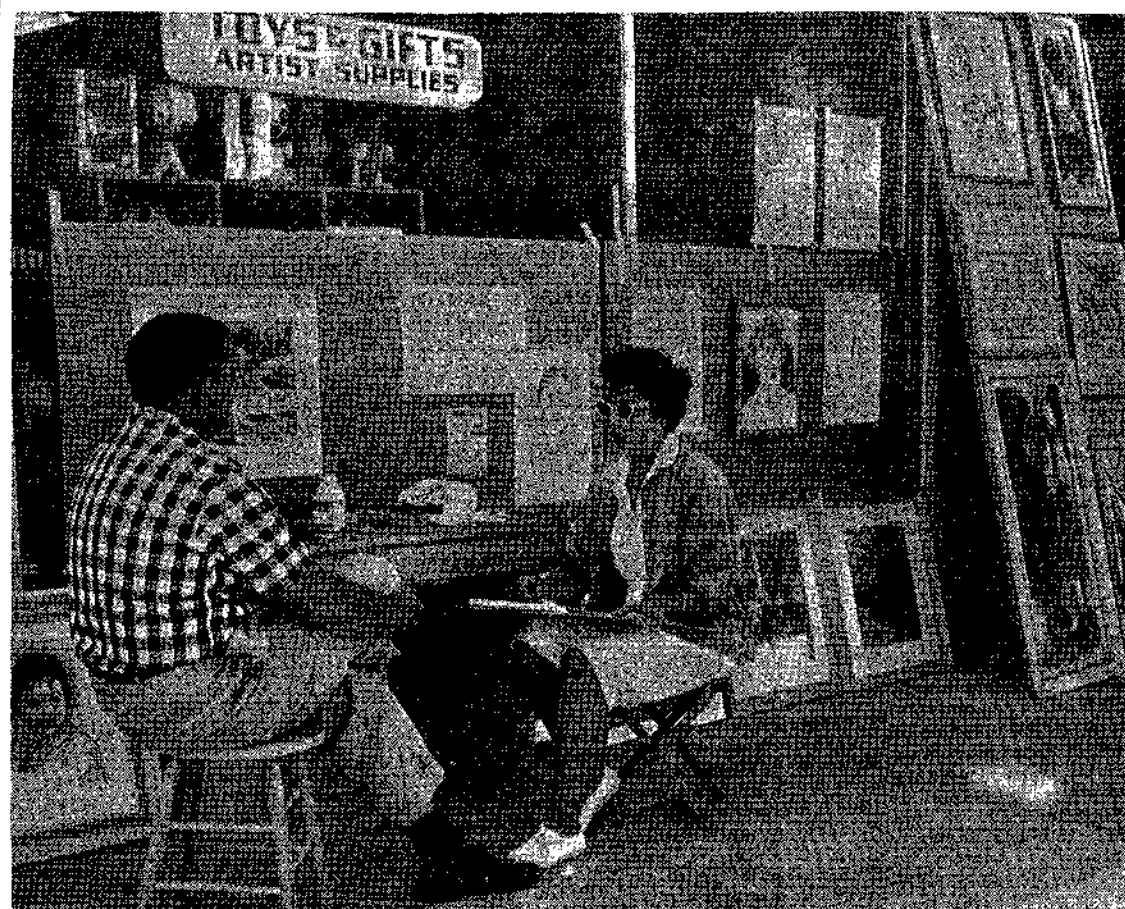
Certainly not new to 4-H work is Tuscola County's summer agent this year, Mary Ann Hobart of Gagetown.

Rog Karr led Cass City hitters with four for five. Marty Yednak had two for two and Dennis Rienstra also collected two hits.

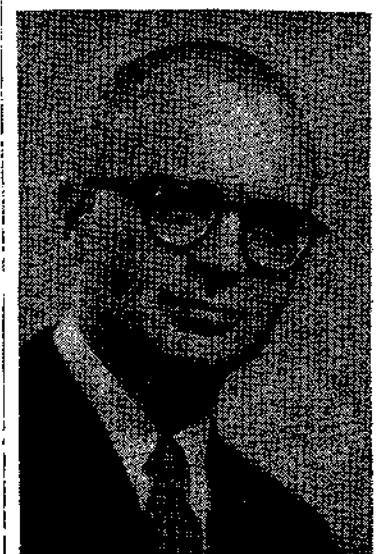
Cass City plays another Sebewaing team Thursday. The team coming to town is a different squad than the one that Cass City trounced. It is regarded as much better.

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Quick Brothers Herd Tops in County DHIA

The registered Holstein herd owned by Quick Brothers leads the list of 45 herds which produced 30 pounds or more butterfat with an average production of 52 pounds fat. In second place stands the registered Holstein herd of Clarence Merchant, Cass City, with 50 pounds butterfat. Tying for third place are the registered Holstein herds owned by Roy Brown, Fostoria, and V. J. and Clare Carpenter of Cass City, with a herd average of 49 pounds fat each. Other dairymen whose herds produced an average of 40 pounds fat or more were Dolan Sweeney, Uby; Don Koepf, Cass City; Ben Loeffler, Reese; Ronald Opperman, Vassar; Jackson Brothers, Caro; Charles Crittenden, Kingston; George Foster, Fostoria; Blaylock and Ruppert, Vassar; Kenneth Parish and Foster Hickey, both of Fairgrove; Maynard McConkey, Cass City; Arthur and Tillie Willis, Caro, and Charles Seddon, Kingston.

In the 305-day records class a grade Holstein cow owned by Jensen and Weinzierl of Millington took first place with a record of 720 pounds butterfat for the month of June, according to Alfred Ballweg, county extension director. In second place stands a registered Holstein cow owned by Foster Hickey of Fairgrove which produced 658 pounds fat in this class. Other herd owners having cows which produced over 500 pounds fat were Dan Lukasavitz, Cass City; Clayton Rohlf and Sons, Fairgrove; Ronald Opperman, Vassar; Don Stilson, Cass City; George Foster, Fostoria; Maynard McConkey, Cass City.

Clayton Rohlf and Sons are the owners of a registered Holstein cow, Pietje, age 8 years, which produced 114 pounds of butterfat during June, leading the list of 98 cows producing over 60 pounds butterfat. In second place is a registered Holstein cow, Pearl Bess, age 6 years, which produced 112 pounds, owned by Ronald Hampshire, Deford, and in third place a registered Holstein cow, Fannie, age 4 years, owned by Clayton Rohlf and Sons, which produced 110 pounds. Tied for fourth place are two Holstein cows owned by Ronald Opperman, Vassar, each producing 98 pounds fat.
