Capable Staff is Ready for Hills and Dales Opening

Jointly these five persons form the backbone of the administrative personnel at Hills and Dales General Hospital.

The main responsibility of administering Cass City's million-dollar hospital falls on the capable shoulders of 42-year-old Oran Hudson.

Before coming to Cass City in July of last year, Hudson taught biochemistry at Keesler Air Force Base in Mississippi.

Hudson has held several important positions during his career. For three years he directed the government laboratory at Jackson, Mississippi, and for two years the Veterans' Administration and laboratory at Alameda General Hospital.

His first position in this area was administrator of the Marlette Community Hospital for five years. During this time he organized the Yale Community Hospital.

Hudson started his career by attending government schools. He studied serology, the preparation, use and results of serums, at Staten Island, New York.

He is one of the select few who have been granted membership into the American Chemical

Society without having a degree. Hudson, who was born in New Hampshire, is also included in Who's Who.

He is married and has two sons. Mrs. Lois Pringle of Decker will be the first Director of Nurses at Hills and Dales General Hospital.

Mrs. Pringle is a 1945 graduate of Grace Hospital School of Nursing in Detroit. She worked at the Ingham County Tuberculosis Sanatorium and also at St. Lawrence Hospital in Lansing.

In 1947 she started working at the Cass City Hospital on night duty. She held the position for three years. After that she went to Marlette Community Hospital for five years, where she served as superintendent of nurses for four years.

Since then she has been employed in a doctor's office and also has made cottage calls for a year and a half at Caro State Hospital.

Mrs. Pringle has four children. In charge of purchasing the almost 10,000 items that will be

needed at the hospital is Carl Maxam. The duties of the purchasing agent have become a vital and necessary skill in the management and functioning of today's hospital.



Oran Hudson

Maxam was born in Clifford

and attended Brown City High School.

He comes to Hills and Dales with 10 years' experience gained as purchasing agent at the Marlette Community Hospital.

Maxam is married and has a daughter.

Mrs. Irene Freeman of Cass City, owner of the Pleasant Home Hospital, will assume the duties of surgical supervisor when Hills and Dales opens.

She will be in charge of the operating room, central supply and the emergency room, seeing that they are always in readiness.

Mrs. Freeman is a 1934 graduate of Bay City Nursing School.

John Bayley, 42, who has operated a bookkeeping service in Cass City for eight years, has been named hospital accountant.

He has previously worked six months for an automobile dealership in Kalamazoo and for three months was employed by an accounting firm in Plainwell.

His training includes 18 months at the Michigan Veterans' Vocational School at Pine Lake. He was born and raised in Cass City.

"Chick"—Donor, Clerk-of-Works

E. B. "Chick" Schwaderer has a long record of service to the Cass City community and Tuscola County. None of his previous achievements can match his ef-

forts as clerk of the works at Hills and Dales General Hospital.

That's the opinion of the hospital's board of directors and all others close to the construction work for the new facility.

For his 18 months of full-time, continuous effort, Mr. Schwaderer kept none of the salary authorized for the position, donating the money to the hospital fund which was in turn matched by money from the Hill-Burton Act.

Mr. Schwaderer was constantly on the job protecting the interests of the hundreds of residents who helped provide money for the facility by insisting that nothing but the best, as specified in the contract, went into the hospital.

As a clerk of the works, Mr. Schwaderer was responsible for seeing that the architect's instructions were carried out and that the building was erected according to plan.

It was his diligent efforts that were responsible for the opening of the hospital several months before it was thought possible even as late as the spring of this year.

Many Local Businesses, 17 Families Among Room-Size Contributors

Much of the financial load of the new Hills and Dales General Hospital was taken care of by public spirited present and former Cass City area residents who were in position to make room-sized donations to the hospital.

These donations ranged from \$5,000 to more than \$30,000 and included 17 donations by individuals and 16 donations by businesses and civic groups.

The donations by individuals will be commemorated with plaques placed on the doors of rooms in the new facility. The business and civic groups will be commemorated on a large 3-foot by 4-foot plaque listing all the names that will be hung in the lobby.

Several of the business donations have no immediately apparent connection with Cass City. The Kresge Foundation donated \$25,000 to the hospital in "the name of Jesus Christ."

Although Kresge has never been in business in Cass City the donation was given on the

basis of Cass City's need as determined by the philanthropic organization.

The Office of Hospital Survey and Construction is the governmental office in charge of distributing governmental hospital funds. The office authorized 55 per cent of the cost of construction to the hospital.

Industry Grants

Two local industries made room sized donations. Anrod Screen Cylinder Co. and Walbro were generous contributors to the construction of the hospital.

Civic organizations which donated \$5,000 or more are also listed on the plaque. They include all three of the men's civic clubs . . . Lions, Rotary and Gavel clubs and the hospital auxiliary.

Businesses represented on the plaque for their donations are: Auten Motor Sales, Cass City Oil & Gas Company, Detroit Edison Company, Farm Products Company, Frutchey Bean Company, The Cass City State Bank and The Pinney State Bank.

The remaining name on the list is E. B. Schwaderer who received special commendation for his work as clerk of the works . . . an 18 months job in which his salary was turned over to the hospital fund.

A short history of the families of the large individual donors are described here.

The Ricker Gift

The final drive for funds that enabled the Hills and Dales General Hospital to become a reality was sparked by the generous donation of Mrs. A. A. Ricker. Plaques in memory of her father, son and husband can be found in the hospital.

Mrs. Ricker is the daughter of Jacob H. Striffler. She married the late Arthur A. Ricker. Mr. Ricker was born in Grant Township. After attending business school he came to Cass City in 1914. He ran a meat market in Cass City for many years. Starting in partnership with Louis Krahling, he later went into business for himself.

The Rickers' only son, James S., died May 16, 1922, when nine and a half years old. Mr. Ricker died Nov. 8, 1955.

Mrs. Ricker was born in Cass City and is a life-long resident of the community.

MacKenzie Family

Roy MacKenzie, who made a room-sized donation in memory of his parents, left Cass City many years ago, but retains pleasant memories of the community.

His parents were William and Eliza Jane MacKenzie. Mr. MacKenzie was a carpenter in the village. Highly respected, they were active members of the Baptist Church in Cass City. Their children are Stanley, Roy and Bertha MacKenzie.

Roy MacKenzie is a 1904 graduate of Cass City High School. He now makes his home at South Bend, Ind. He is president of the Buffalo Press Steel workers. His company is one of the foremost manufacturers of mufflers.

He and his wife, the former Marian Nelson, have three children: Dianne Marie, 11; Craig Nelson, 9, and Joseph Porter, 2.

Dr. Miles graduated from the University of Illinois College of Medicine in 1951. Prior to that he did undergraduate study at the universities of Wisconsin and Arizona.

From 1942 to 1945 he served in the Navy.

Dr. Miles is a member of the Caro Exchange Club, the Mt. Moriah Lodge and the VFW. He is director of the Caro Chamber of Commerce and past-president of the Tuscola Medical Society.

Hunting, fishing and photography are his hobbies.

Dr. Herbert L. Nigg was born in Detroit March 23, 1914. He graduated from Birmingham High School and attended Fishburne Military School. He received his A. B. degree from the University of Michigan in 1935 and his M. D. from there in 1939. He was an intern at Grace Hospital for two years and a surgical resident from 1940 to 1941.

He served in the Army during the war years: Medical Field Service School, 1941-1942; command and general staff, 1942; Walter Reed Hospital tropical medicine, 1942-1943; chief of surgery, 92nd Evacuation Hospital, New Guinea-Luzon, 1943-1944, and commanding officer of the former, 1944-1945.

He came to Cass City in 1946, but moved to Caro where he has been since.

Dr. Nigg married the former Emily Ruth Croxton of Angola, Indiana. They have five children: Herbert Nicholas, 19; John Croxton, 17; Marc Edward, 14; Steven Joseph, 8, and Mary Susan, 6.

Dr. Nigg is a member of the Rotary and Exchange clubs, the Mt. Moriah Lodge, and the Consistory. He is now president-elect of the Tuscola County Medical Society in which he has held many top positions.

In line with his after-hours interests, he is a member of the Saginaw Bay Yacht Club, the Bayview Yacht Club, the Harbour Island Yacht Club, the Saginaw Club, and the Otsego Ski Club.

Another of the dedication plaques that appear in the hospital is inscribed "in memory of Clara Folkert". The donation in her memory was made by the Folkert family.

Willard and Clara Folkert operated a retail store in Wheeler, Michigan until his death in 1923. Mrs. Folkert and her son, business in Cass City from 1923 to 1940 and in Bay City since moving from the community.

Glenn, continued in the retail Mrs. Folkert died June 18, 1957. She was born June 13, 1877, at Marine City and married Willard Folkert Jan. 1, 1900.

Glenn and his wife, Lois, have two children. Mrs. Gerald (Geraldine) Frieskora and Bob, both born in Cass City. Mrs. Preskorn presently lives in Cass City and Bob is in business with his father in Bay City.

Miles—Nigg Gift

Hills and Dales General Hospital received a room donation from two Caro doctors who will practice in it, Dr. Edward J. Miles and Dr. Herbert L. Nigg.

Capetown, South Africa, is the birthplace of 38-year-old Dr. Edward J. Miles, who is a donor to Hills and Dales General Hospital.

The Ballard's

Forty-three-year-old Dr. James Ballard was raised in West Dearborn. He attended Antioch College in Ohio for two years, and studied for two years at the University of Michigan where he received his A. B. degree. Four years later he received his M. D. degree from the University's Medical School.

Dr. Ballard did his internship at St. Luke's Hospital in Bethlehem, Pa. Following that, he was a captain in the Army and saw duty in England, France, Germany and Austria, until 1946 when he began his practice in Cass City.

He and the former Dorothy Luthi were married in June of 1941. They have seven children, four girls and three boys ranging in age from six months to 16 years.

Dr. Ballard's major interests are wilderness canoe trips and sailing.

He is a member of the American Forestry Association, Gavel Club and the Tuscola County Medical Society, among other clubs and associations.

Frank J. Ortman

One of the most unusual room-sized gifts to the hospital came from Frank J. Ortman of Birmingham. Mr. Ortman has no personal connection with Cass City.

His gift was made out of friendship to M. B. Auten. Originally his donation was not large enough to qualify for a room in the hospital, but shortly before the new facility opened, he toured the building and was so impressed with the efforts of the community that he increased his donation to room-sized proportions.

Mr. Ortman has held many offices and important positions. They include President of the University of Michigan Alumni Association; member of Michigan and American Bar Associations, and director of Westbrook Hotel, Fort Worth, Texas.

Their plaque will read Frank A. and Marcella Ortman.

The Sandhams

John A. Sandham is one of the more familiar figures to Cass City residents. For over 50 years he has been travelling Cass City area roads for the Lincoln National Life Insurance Co. and is still active with the company. His career dates back to May 28, 1908.

Mr. Sandham became a citizen of Cass City after he married the former Grace L. Striffler May 9, 1910. Mrs. Sandham operated a millinery store before her marriage. She was born in Sanilac county.



Our Hospital - - - Progress at a Glance

July, 1943

The idea of a new hospital for Cass City started as a post-war project for the Rotary Club. The Village Council appointed a committee to investigate needs of the community.

November, 1943

The committee reported the need for a 30-bed hospital which was to cost \$125,000.

April, 1944

The Village Council passed an ordinance creating the hospital, known then as Cass City Community Hospital, and its board of trustees.

April, 1957

The hospital board accepted a 7½ acre site in Hills and Dales Subdivision owned by M. B. Auten, C. R. Hunt, E. B. Schwaderer and Henry Cooklin.

April, 1957

Fred E. Wigen and Associates of Saginaw was named the architect for the community's proposed hospital.

April, 1959

Construction started on the hospital in the spring.

May, 1959

The hospital association, realizing the need for more beds, increased the number in the planned facility to 40.

August, 1959

Oran Hudson, former administrator of the Marlette Hospital, was appointed administrator of the hospital.

January, 1960

The Village Council rescinded its original ordinance to allow the existing board of trustees to form a legal, non-profit organization now called Hills and Dales General Hospital.

February, 1960

The board decided to utilize unassigned areas in the hospital for additional beds, bringing the total number up to 57.

August, 1960

Open house for the million-dollar facility is August 11 and 12, with the first patient to admitted August 15.

Auxiliary-Our Gal Friday at Hospital

Ladies of the Hills and Dales General Hospital Auxiliary will preside as hostesses at the opening Thursday and Friday. They will be on hand both days, conducting guided tours through the million-dollar facility and serving refreshments to the visitors.

The officers are president, Alice Donahue; president-elect, Marie Krueger; vice-president, Gladys Campbell; secretary Gloria Hartwick and treasurer, Lela Wright.

These ladies, however, were giving generously of their time several years before funds for the hospital were assured or even before plans were on the architect's drawing board.

On November 9, 1956, a meeting was planned by Mrs. James Champion to form the organization.

Mrs. Harold Conklin, president of the Michigan Association of Hospital Auxiliaries, was the speaker. A committee was appointed to write the bylaws and at another meeting, three days later, officers were elected.

They were president, Margaret Wallace; president-elect, Alice Donahue; vice-president, Marie Krueger; recording secretary Betty Paul; corresponding secretary, Dorothy Ballard, and treasurer, Lois Auten.

They served for two years. Less than a year after forming the organization, the Auxiliary pledged \$5,000 to the hospital building fund. To raise this sum, the members began a series of projects, all of which were successful.

They sponsored teen-age dances, an interior decorating show, vanishing brunches and a card party which filled the high school auditorium. Each year in November and December they sold fruit cakes and had a booth at the Home-coming festivities in August at which they sold "white elephants".

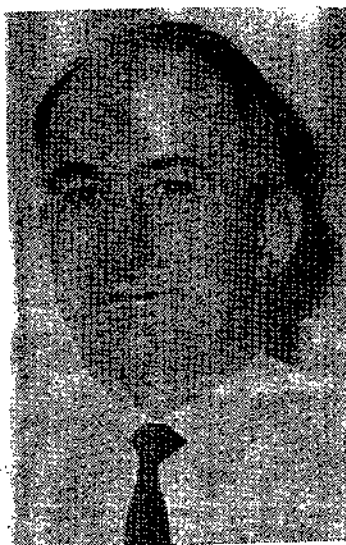
The fashion show in March of this year was outstanding, according to the ladies.

As a result of these activities the Auxiliary was able to pay its pledge of \$5,000 last year. In February, because additional funds were needed when it was decided to add more rooms to the

hospital, the women pledged \$2,000 more. One thousand dollars of this pledge has been paid already.

The Auxiliary, in cooperation with the Cass City Oil and Gas Company, will rent radios and television sets to patients. These will have special under-the-pillow speakers and will be the only sets permitted in the hospital.

The architect of the hospital requested that a committee from the hospital auxiliary be appointed to co-ordinate the interior color scheme of the building. Serving on that committee were Mrs. Margaret Wallace, Mrs. Dorothy Hunt, Mrs. Sherwood Rice and Mrs. Alice Donahue.

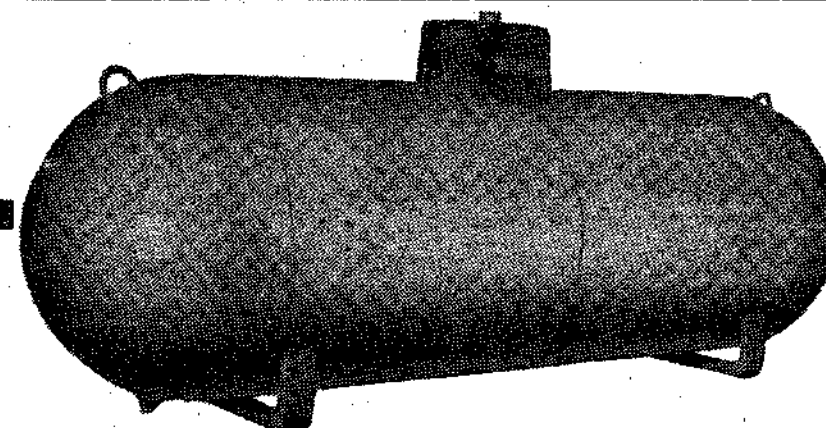

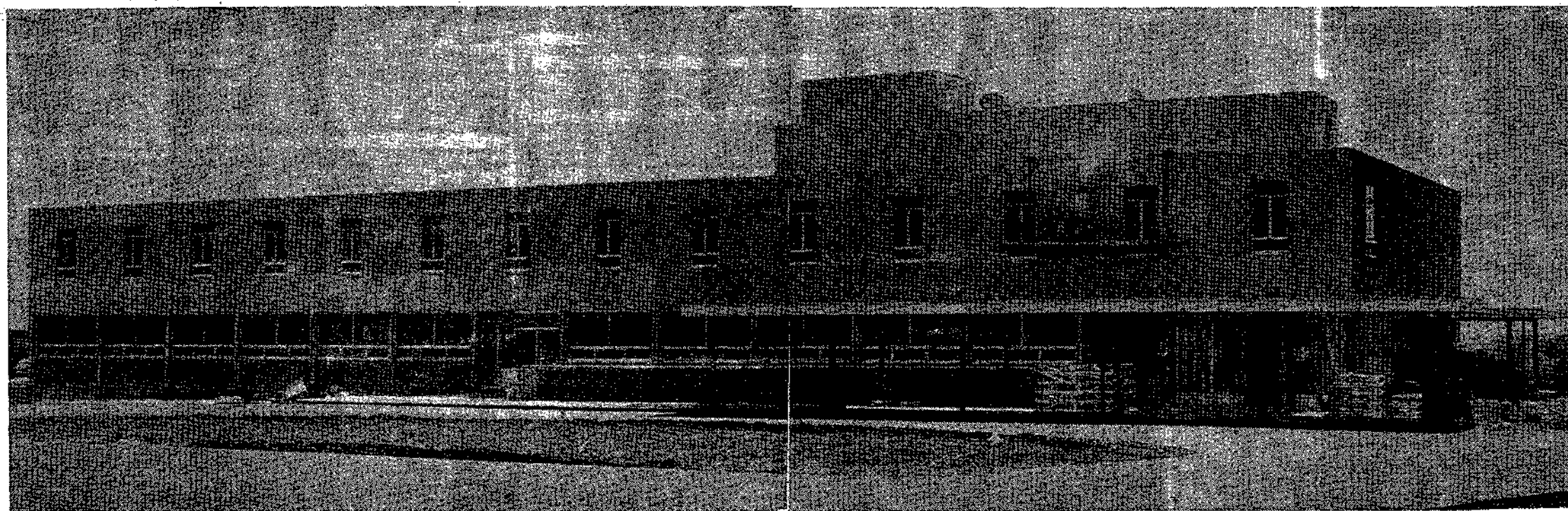

Oran Hudson, administrator, said, "It's also possible that all of the detail work won't be completed when we open to patients Monday, Aug. 15, but we can't delay any longer. "We open ready or not."

Doctors' Clinics Going up On Hill Street

Hill Street that runs in front of Hills and Dales General Hospital is changing and is scheduled to change much more.

The first of several clinics slated for the area is now under construction. It is large enough for two doctors and will first be occupied by Dr. H. T. Donahue. It is under construction by E. B. Schwaderer.

The village is also considering surfacing the road with bituminous concrete (the same surface that is on North Seeger.)

That the work will be done is relatively certain. The question facing councilmen is whether to do so this year or wait for another construction season.

The first baby born at Hills and Dales General Hospital will be well-provided for by the Ladies Hospital Auxiliary.

Landscape to Add To Hospital's Beauty

Visitors at the Hills and Dales General Hospital will not be able to see the true beauty of the site selected for the facility because the landscaping has not been completed.

Persons in charge of beautifying the grounds say that it will be 15 to 20 years before the hospital will look as planned.

Seeding will be done this fall and is included in the contract for the construction. All other work is the responsibility of the hospital and the community.

Plans call for landscaping to be completed in three steps. The first will be the faster growing shrubs. Following these will be the plants and shrubs that take five or more years to fully mature.

Finally, the work will be completed when the longer-growth plants have reached the height and thickness specified in the plans to beautify the property.

James Bauer, a member of the board of directors, is in charge and the plans were reviewed by Michigan State University before they were adopted.

Mrs. Oran Hudson, a member of the committee to secure the layette, said that in case of twins, the gifts would be duplicated.

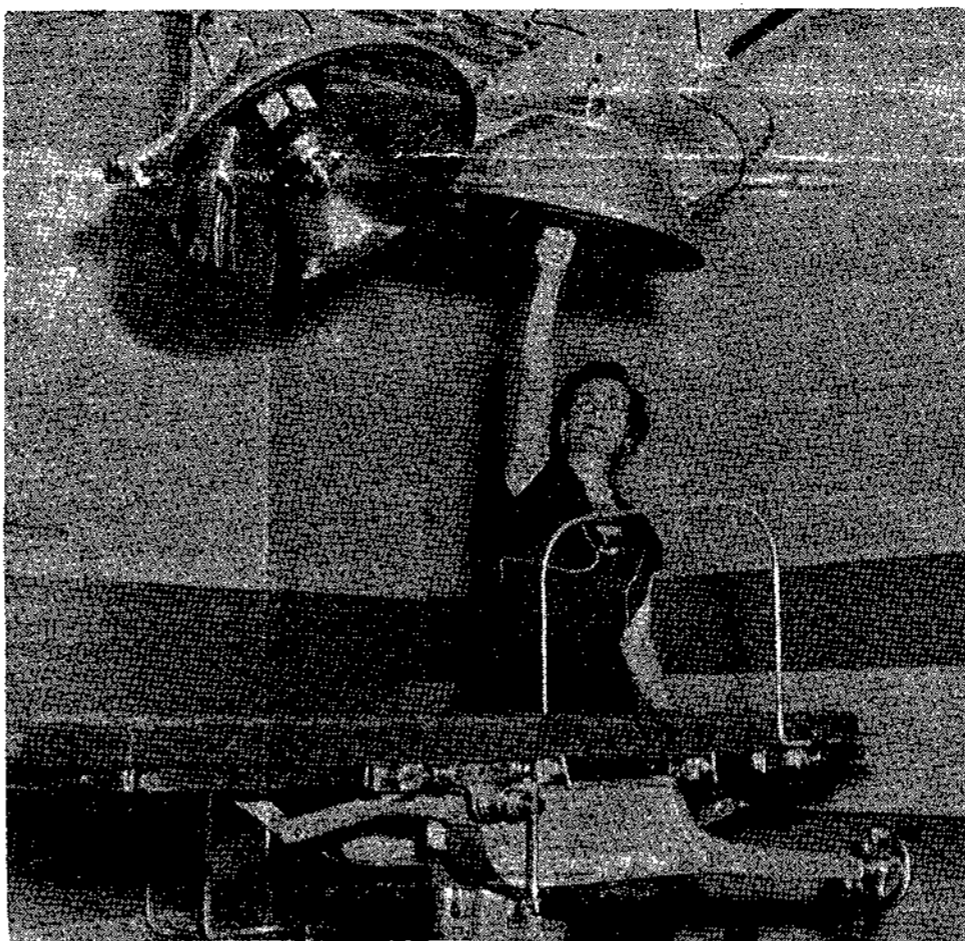
Funds to purchase the layette came from dollar donations of the Cass City merchants.

The certificate also bears the official seal of Hills and Dales General Hospital, as will all others given out by the hospital.

According to Oran Hudson, the certificates are printed by a special Litho-Graving process on the longest-lasting material known, diploma parchment, which is said to be as enduring as the parchment scrolls of ancient Egypt.

"Although centrally preserved birth records are now the recognized, official documents of birth, the certificates when signed by the doctor and hospital official, will provide a lasting memento of one of the great moments of family life," said Administrator Hudson.

Operating Areas Boast 3 Fine Hills and Dales

No longer will there be the need to rush patients to Marlette or Saginaw hospitals for emergency operations.

With the exception of the most delicate brain surgery, Hills and Dales General Hospital will be able to fulfill the operating functions of any major hospital, according to Administrator Oran Hudson.

Actually Hills and Dales will have two major operating rooms. This does not include the emergency room which is also set up for surgery.

One of the two operating rooms will be used as a recovery room for patients who are coming out from anesthesia after an operation. But when the need arises it can easily be converted into a second operating room.

The two rooms are separated by a wall of floor to ceiling cabinets with sliding doors on each side. Here is kept some of the equipment needed during surgery.

The major operating lights can be adjusted to any position for adequate lighting of the table at all times.

The windowless room is provided with the operating table, several movable tray-topped metal carts in which sterilized packs of instruments brought from central supply will be carried, and equipment for administering anesthesia to the patient.

The emergency room, down the hall from the operating room on the first floor, also has major operating facilities. It will be able to care for two persons at one time. The room has operating lights, tables and equipment stands. The room can be divided by cubicle curtains which hang on tracks from the ceiling.

This Board Directs Hospital

The policies of the Hills and Dales General Hospital are decided by a nine-member board of directors. This board is elected

by members of the Hills and Dales General Hospital Corporation at its annual meeting in the spring.

Persons accepted for membership include honorary members, anyone who has given a dollar or more to the hospital prior to its opening, and voting members who pay a dollar a year and must be approved by the board before receiving a membership card.

Members of the board who signed the articles of incorporation of the hospital are charter members and are entitled to all voting privileges.

The board meets regularly once a month and holds special meetings when the necessity arises.

The first board of directors of the Hills and Dales General Hospital is still in office. John Haire is the chairman and Mrs. Edwin Fritz, vice-chairman. M. B. Auten is the treasurer and Mrs. James Champion, secretary.

Trustees are James Bauer, Alex Ross, Mrs. Sherwood Rice Jr., Archie McLachlan and George Jacoby.

That the board members come from all parts of the area to be served by the hospital is no accident. Each of the men gives representation to various sections.

Mrs. Rice represents Gageton. Mr. Jacoby is from Deford and represents the Deford-Kingston area. Mr. McLachlan lives in Grant Township in Huron County and Mr. Ross farms northeast of Cass City.

The remainder of the board lives in Cass City.

Mr. Auten, Mrs. Fritz, Mr. Ross and Mr. McLachlan have served on the board for many years, while the other members are comparatively new, having been appointed within the last three years.

All Patients to Have Room with a View

57-bed Facility Has Up-to-date Features

2 Operating Rooms \$20,000 X-ray

Hills and Dales General Hospital, Cass City's million dollar facility, boasts a 57-bed capacity. There are 16 semi-private rooms, four four-bed wards, two private rooms and two three-crib rooms for children under 12 years of age.

The isolation room for people with contagious diseases will be used as a private room.

The hospital has a rectangular floor plan with two hallways running parallel the length of the building on both first and second floors.

Separating the hallways are "islands" of nurses stations, cleanup areas and storage rooms. There are two stairwells, one at each end of the halls and an elevator in the middle of the building.

Housed on the first floor is the surgical section, services department and the administrative offices.

The general office, a long partially partitioned room, contains the information, admitting and cashier desks and bookkeeping department.

It is adjoined by Administrator Hudson's office, the records room, and the staff lounge which can be directly entered from the outside through the staff entrance.

The first floor has two four-bed wards. There are two sets of semi-private and private rooms which share a bathroom and one semi-private room with its own.

The surgical section consists of two operating rooms, one of which will be used as a recovery room for persons coming out of anesthesia after an operation. When the need for two operating rooms is felt, the second room can easily be converted to the purpose as it has been wired for the necessary equipment.

Central supply is a large room where instruments and equipment for surgery are sterilized and kept. It is also the dispensary for many of the items needed during an operation.

"It is the most vital department of the hospital," Administrator Hudson said.

Central supply contains two large autoclaves which sterilize with steam super-heated under pressure and a large work area with sinks and cabinets.

The hospital will be able to distill its own water, according to Hudson.

The gases used during an operation will be stored in the anesthesia room off central supply. It is ventilated to prevent the possibility of an explosion, but if one should occur the room is so designed that a section of the wall (blow-out panel) will give before the door will go.

Adjoining the recovery room are the laboratory and the electrocardiograph and X-ray rooms.

The \$20,000 x-ray department also has a waiting room with dressing stalls and bathrooms. Behind this is the dark room for developing the film. There is a pass box between this room and the X-ray room where the exposed and unexposed films can be passed between the two rooms.

The emergency room is set up for major surgery, with its own waiting room and entrance.

Separate from the surgical and medical departments on the second floor is the maternity section of the hospital.

The nursery can care for 10 babies at one time, nine in cribs and one in an incubator. Adjacent to the nursery is the nurses' room. It opens into a semi-private room which has been designed for conversion into a second nursery when the need arises.

The nurses' room contains a wall card-file on the babies in the nursery and a refrigerator for keeping milk. It also serves as the examination room. Formulas are prepared in another room.

The maternity section has beds for 10 mothers, four semi-private rooms and the labor room, which can be converted into a second delivery room as the necessary fixtures have been provided.

The room off the delivery room is for the attending doctor to relax in. It has a bed, table lamp and chair.

In the "islands" between the two halls upstairs are substerile storage areas, and warming cabinets for blankets and solutions which are kept heated by circulating steam. The scrub area has three sinks with faucets that are turned on with the elbow.

Mrs. Pringle's office is on the second floor.

In addition to the maternity ward upstairs, there are two four-bed wards, nine semi-private rooms, two three-crib wards for children under 12 and the isolation room.

Many of the vital, but unseen functions of the hospital, are housed in the basement. There are the kitchen, laundry, boiler room, pharmacy and large storage room, in addition to the employees' cafeteria employees' lounges, conference room, electrical and telephone equipment rooms, transformer vault, maintenance room, the morgue and autopsy room and the emergency generator room.

A maximum of 300 persons, patients and employees can be served from this kitchen daily.

2 Boilers Ready To Run Hospital

The boiler room of Hills and Dales General Hospital is one of the most important rooms in the hospital as it supplies the heat for the facility.

In it are two boilers, one of which is capable of carrying the whole load of heating the building itself. The other will be used as a standby in case of an emergency.

Each boiler has 600 square feet of heating surface. The water

in each boiler is heated under 150 pounds of pressure.

Also found in the boiler room is a giant incinerator, a climate control for the building, hot water storage tank and a water softener.

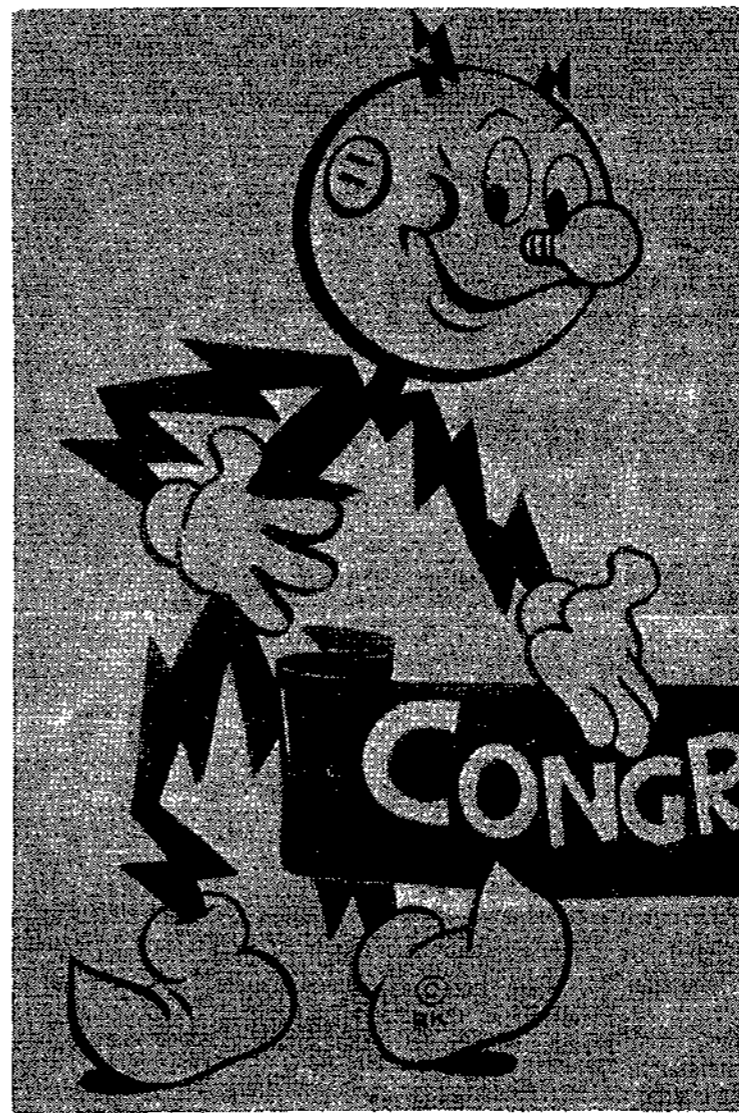

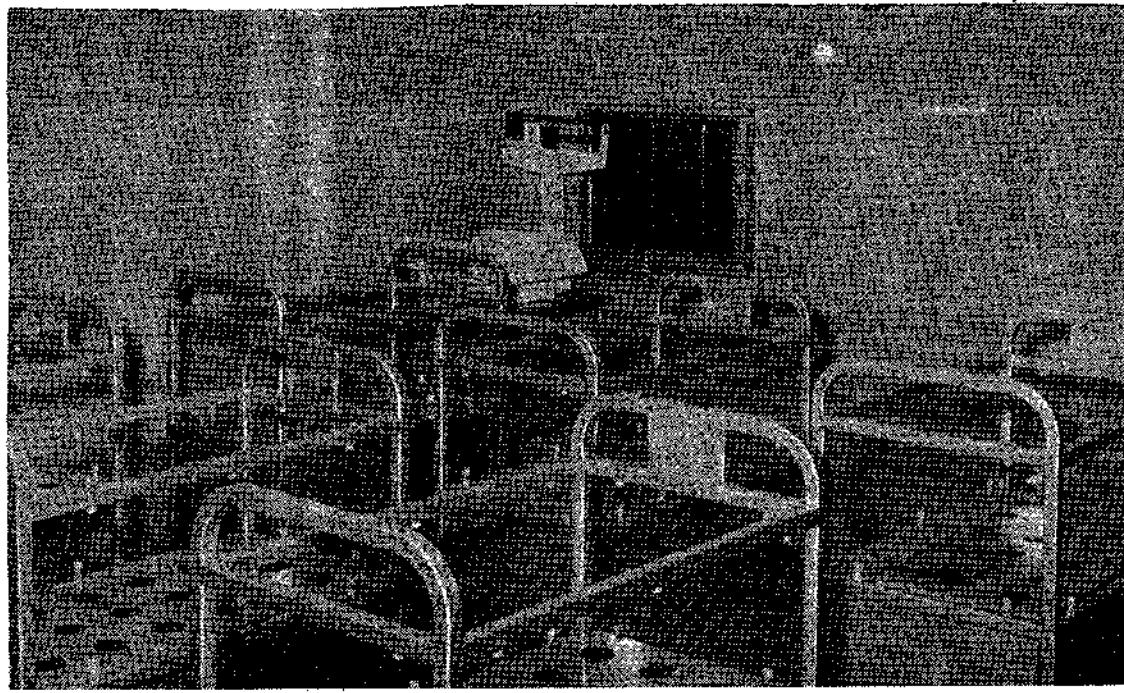

NURSERY—Ten babies can be cared for in the nursery of Hills and Dales General Hospital. Each of the nine cribs is a complete unit in itself with supplies of cotton balls, powder and individual thermometers. The nursery also has an incubator with heat and humidity controls. Even if a power failure should occur, the nursery will be kept at a constant temperature with radiant heat from glass panels around the room powered by the emergency generator. There is, of course, the observation window for the proud families of the infants. Doctors usually will not enter the nursery. Examination of the infants will take place in the adjoining room. At birth, the babies will be tagged with a bracelet bearing the mother's name and palm prints of the child will be taken.

Can Serve 300

**Million Dollar Hospital Boasts
\$21,000 All-electric Kitchen**

Three hundred persons, patients and employees is the maximum capacity that Hills and Dales General Hospital's modern all-electric kitchen can cook for, according to Administrator Oran Hudson.

The numerous pieces of equipment are valued at \$21,061.

There are two metal refrigerators in the kitchen for cold storage of quantities of milk, butter, vegetables, fruits and meats. In addition to these, there are two large walk-in refrigerators off the kitchen. One will be used as a freezing compartment.

The kitchen is complete with work counters and overhead racks on which pots, pans and utensils will hang.

There are portable bins for staples such as flour and sugar and a large mixing area with pull-out bins for spices and seasonings.

The stove has six burners with center section used as a griddle.

The huge oven, with three deep

shelves will keep Hills and Dales General Hospital supplied with baked dishes and goodies.

The hospital received as a donation an electric deepfat fryer.

For quick, tasty meals the hospital also purchased a steam cooker which cuts preparation time way down.

Utensils, used in any kitchen, are found on a giant scale at Hills and Dales: mixer, potato peeler, etc.

Along one wall are four sinks for washing pots and pans used in cooking, and a wash bowl for the employees in the kitchen.

Also off the kitchen is the pantry where dry and package goods will be stored.

Separated from the kitchen by waist-high steam and cold cafeteria counters is the employees dining room, which will hold nine tables.

Meals going to patients on the second floor will be carried in carts with hot and cold compartments. The food will then be dished out to the patients from

these carts. Patients on the first floor will receive their meals dished out on individual trays directly from the kitchen.

When the carts are returned to the kitchen, the food compartments will be washed out along with the dishes, left-overs will go in the garbage disposal and the kitchen will go into action for the next meal.

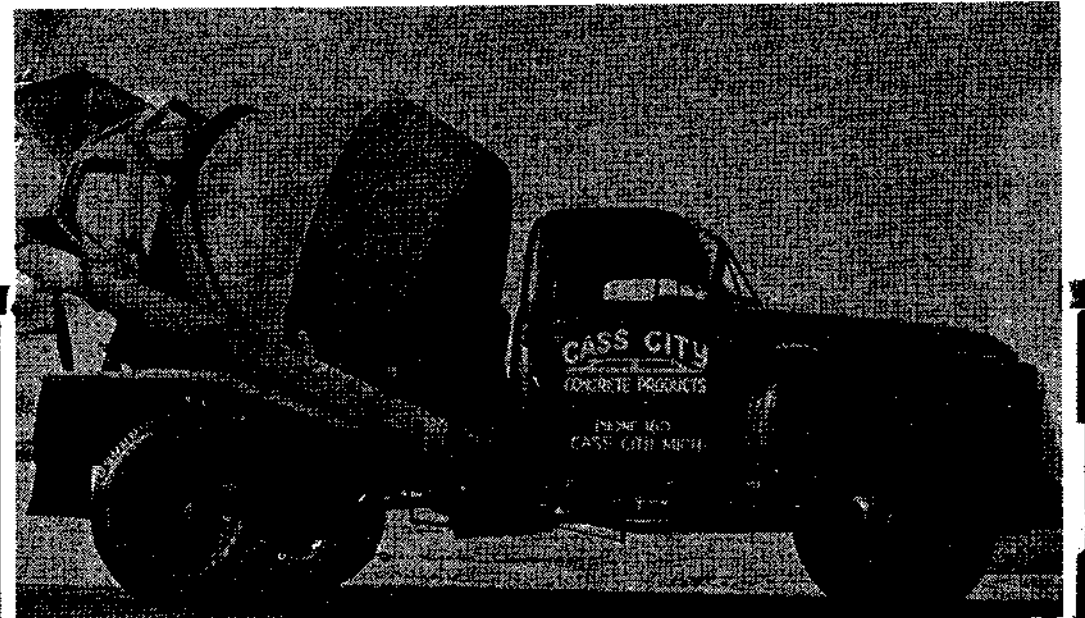

**Patient's Rooms
At Hills and Dales
Cheery, Modern**

The semi-private rooms, of which there are 16, are designed for comfort for the two patients who share them as are all patients' rooms.

Each bed is provided with a table top fastened to the sides of the beds for eating or writing or there are bed-side cabinets with flat trays which swing up and over the beds.

The rooms are wired for plug-in television and radios which can be rented from the Hospital Auxiliary.

Hills and Dales General Hospital also has a special feature which is used in the most up-to-date hospitals in the United States—liquid oxygen. The liquid oxygen is stored in a tank outside the building.

If a patient should suddenly need oxygen, all the nurse does is connect the oxygen regulator or tent valve to the pipe in the wall and oxygen in the gaseous state is readily available.

Each bed has its own cubical curtain which hangs from a ceiling track. When pulled it gives the patient complete privacy.

Also provided in the rooms are lockers for the patients' clothing and a large, deeply recessed shelf where plants and other belongings may be put.

The bathroom has a washbowl and toilet. Showers and baths are taken in facilities down the hall.

The rooms are done in cheery pastel colors such as peach, light blue, yellow and green.
