Falling Tree Kills 'Buckshot' Monday

Clarence "Buckshot" Armstrong died Monday morning in the Girls Injured woods where he has worked for the past 12 years.

He died instantly when the large tree he was cutting sudhitting him full-length.

The tree measured about two and a half feet in diameter, according to Virgil Peters of Cass City, owner of the saw mill where

Armstrong worked. The accident happened two miles east and a half mile south of Fostoria in Rich township, just inside the Lapeer county line.

Forty-seven-year-old strong was found almost immediately by his employer's son, LaVern Peters, 18, who was skidding trees nearby.

OIL CHANGES: HOW OFTEN?

There is no more controversial subject in the car business than Edward Schwartz and Mrs. Wilwhen you should change oil -- or more differing answers. Oil companies, perhaps to sell more oil, have always favored the once-everythousand-miles formula. Automotive engineers, who want to claim greater economy, have favored 5,000 mile changes.



making the oil companies richer, but who doesn't want to invite valve trouble and shorten his engine's life, has to figure it out for himself.

One manufacturer who advocated 4,000 mile held last week in Detroit, gave an changes found that lubrication oils held up well for that mileage. But additives (detergents) which prevent corrosion and suspend dirt broke down after 2,000. So they went back to 2,000. That's the figure generally accepted now.

Other studies showed that sludge and carbon increased rapidly after 2,000 miles. And acids, which accumulate from unburned fuel and can't be stopped by a filter, reach damaging strength after that mileage. They eat at your rings and cylinder walls.

There's one more point: that's the KIND of driving you do. If it's start and stop on a cold engine in Winter, then thousand-mile changes may not be often enough. Acids and water (from condensation) accumulate many times faster then. Dusty roads in Summer increase grit getting into your oil. If you're a salesman driving long distances over clean pavement, then 2,000 miles or more will be all

Best way is to feel oil on your dipstick occasionally. If it is unclean and gritty to rub between your fingers, then it is time to change it.

It's true that without the cooperation of all of the citizens of Cass City, present and past, the Hills and Dales General Hospital would never have been built but it's equally true that the 20-year hospital dream would not be realized now if it were not for the efforts of Meredith B. Auten.

We know that if M. B. realized we were writing this editorial, he would do everything in his power to keep it from print as he has turned down a testimonial dinner and other attempts of grateful residents to acknowledge his efforts.

Although most persons know that he has been active in the hospital, few know just how much time Meredith has devoted to the work.

For instance, we know that by a conservative estimate he made 25 trips to Detroit to confer with officials of the Kresge Foundation who donated \$25,000 to the hospital.

We have accompanied him on trips to dozens of communities within a 100-mile radius of Cass City on hos-

He has taken trips to the east coast, Chicago and other areas securing funds - - - all of the travel at his own expense,

He was the driving force that secured the then reluctant approval of the Office of Hospital Survey and Construction that resulted in the okay for Hill Burton funds that paid 55 per cent of original construction

It's a fair estimate that Meredith has spent 40 hours weekly for at least the last two years working at hospital business.

It's impossible to estimate how many hours he devoted to hospital work since he was appointed as a charter member of the board when the first hospital drive started before the war.





Our Hospital --- Progress at a Glance

The idea of a new hospital for Cass City started as a post-war project for the Rotary Club. The Village Council appointed a committee to investigate needs of the community.

November, 1943

The committee reported the need for a 30-bed hospital which was to cost

April, 1944

The Village Council passed an ordinance creating the hospital, known then as Cass City Community Hospital, and its board of trustees.

April, 1957 The hospital board accepted a 71/2 acre site in Hills and Dales Subdivision

owned by M. B. Auten, C. R. Hunt, E. B. Schwaderer and Henry Cooklin. April. 1957

Fred E. Wigen and Associates of Saginaw was named the architect for the community's proposed hospital.

April, 1959

Construction started on the hospital in the spring.

May, 1959

The hospital association, realizing the need for more beds, increased the number in the planned facility to 40.

Oran Hudson, former administrator of the Marlette Hospital, was appointed administrator of the hospital.

January, 1960

The Village Council recinded its original ordinance to allow the existing board of trustees to form a legal, non-profit organization now called Hills and Dales General Hospital.

February, 1960

The board decided to utilize unassigned areas in the hospital for additional beds, bringing the total number up to 57.

August, 1960

Open house for the million-dollar facility is August 11 and 12, with the first patient to admitted August 15.

The general office, a long partially partitioned room, contains the information, admitting and cashier desks and bookkeeping department.

It is adjoined by Administrator Hudson's office, the records room, and the staff lounge which can be directly entered from the outside through the staff en-

The first floor has two fourbed wards. There are two sets of semi-private and private rooms which share a bathroom and one semi-private room with its own.

The surgical section consists of two operating rooms, one of which will be used as a recovery room for persons coming out of anesthesia after an operation. When the need for two operating rooms is felt, the second room can easily be converted to the purpose as it has been wired for the necessary equipment.

Central supply is a large room where instruments and equipment for surgery are sterilized and kept. It is also the dispensary for many of the items needed during an operation.

"It is the most vital department of the hospital," Administrator Hudson said.

Central supply contains two large autoclaves which sterilize with steam super-heated under pressure and a large work area with sinks and cabinets.

The hospital will be able to distill its own water, according to The gases used during an oper-

ation will be stored in the anesthesia room off central supply. It is ventilated to prevent the possibility of an explosion, but if one should occur the room is so designed that a section of the wall (blow-out panel) will give before the door will go.

Adjoining the recovery room are the laboratory and the electrocardiograph and X-ray rooms. The \$20,000 x-ray department also has a waiting room with dressing stalls and bathrooms. Behind this is the dark room for developing the film. There is a pass box between this room and the X-ray room where the exposed and unexposed films can be

passed between the two rooms. The emergency room is set up for major surgery, with its own

waiting room and entrance. Separate from the surgical and medical departments on the second floor is the maternity section

of the hospital.

The nursery can care for 10 babies at one time, nine in cribs and one in an incubator. Adjacent to the nursery is the nurses' room. It opens into a semi-private room which has been designed for

when the need arises. .The nurses' room contains a wall card-file on the babies in the nursery and a refrigerator floor plan with two hallways for keeping milk. It also serves running parallel the length of as the examination room. Formulas are prepared in another

The maternity section has beds for 10 mothers, four semi-private rooms and the labor room, which can be converted into a second delivery room as the necessary fixtures have been provided.

The room off the delivery room is for the attending doctor to relax in. It has a bed, table lamp and chair.

In the "islands" between the two halls upstairs are substerile storage areas, and warming cabinets for blankets and solutions which are kept heated by circulating steam. The scrub area has three sinks with faucets that are turned on with the elbow.





Patient's Rooms At Hills and Dales Cheery, Modern

The semi-private rooms, of which there are 16, are designed for comfort for the two patients who share them as are all patients' rooms.

Each bed is provided with a table top fastened to the sides of the beds for eating or writing or there are bed-side cabinets with flat trays which swing up and over the beds.

The rooms are wired for plugin television and radios which can be rented from the Hospital Auxhalis and Dales General Hos-

pital also has a special feature which is used in the most up-todate hospitals in the United States--liquid oxygen. The liquid oxygen is stored in a tank outside the building. If a patient should suddenly
