think were a gourmet's dream, except that they're easily prepared, fun to serve and guaranteed to please during Lent or any other season Mushrooms, onions and green peppers team with succulent scallops to make this a notable treat:

Skewered Scallops (Serves 8) pound sea scallops (82) 16 small white onlong to 3 green peppers

pound large mushrooms (16) tablespoons lemon juice 1/4 cup melted butter Freshly ground pepper Gariie powder



Scallops are king on these

skewers with large mushrooms, green pepper pieces and small white onions paying homage to the delicious shellfish. Lemon butter is brushed over all before broiling to give delicate flavor to this speciality.

Rinse scallops. Peel onions; cut peppers into 1%-inch pieces (you'll need 24). Remove stems from mushrooms (use these for soup or serve with a cooked vegetable like green beans or peas). Cook onions in boiling salted water for 10 min-

available in quantity. Already a sensation in Europe where it was developed by a West German nurseryman, the new plant seems destined to take America by storm, too. It has many unique features, but the mere fact that it sends out 6 to 8 foot runners and bears delicious berries from the ground level to eye level puts real meaning into the phrase "conversation piece" as it applies to garden plants. Equally interesting to the home gardener is the plant's ability to lend itself to the making of artistic or ornamental garden designs. The climbing strawberry is patented in this country and is being introduced by a West Grove, Pa., nursery. It was available in various parts of the country last year, but this spring marks the first time that it has been available in quantity.
