## Work Started by School Study Group

## Reva Advocates Tax for Special **School Facilities**

"What Tuscola County needs is a full-time school with a full time staff devoted to the needs of students who need help," Dick Reva, speech correctionist at Cass City School and six other schools in Tuscola County, told members of the Cass City Rotary Club Tuesday noon.

"A half mill county-wide would raise \$50,000," he said, "and the state would put up \$150,000 for the work here.'

This money would not only help the estimated 10 per cent who need specialized training of one sort or another but would make it possible to teach other students at an accelerated pace cheaper to the taxpayer in the long run, Reva explained.

Mr. Reva went on to say that in the time it takes a teacher trying to teach one student needing special help, six others could be taught.

The need for a speech correctionist is increasing, he said. He now has 113 students on a regular basis, two times weekly. **Dramatic Improvement** 

Some of the pupils which Mr. Reva has handled have shown marked improvement. One case history he related was about a boy who had spent time in a refugee camp.

He was afflicted with such a speech block that at times he was unable to say a word for as much as five minutes.

After two years of training, this boy still stutters and probably always will . . . but he is so improved that he no longer has trouble expressing himself and can hold a job anywhere, Reva

Mr. Reva regards a full-time correctionist to aid pupils inevitable to all schools.

Supt. Willis Campbell said that Cass City School is considering hiring a full time man for this work next year.

## Beans 80 Per Cent Harvested in Tuscola County

According to the Michigan weekly weather crop bulletin dated Sept. 26, two-thirds of the bean acreage on a state-wide basis has been pulled with 10 per cent of this acreage yet to be combined. Damp weather is hurting the quality of the unharvested beans, according to Alfred Ballweg, county extension direc-

Huron county reports 65 per cent of beans harvested, highest yields 42 bushels, lowest eight bushels, with an average of 15 to 20 bushels per acre. Huron county's bean acreage for 1960 is 10,-000 acres above 1959.

Bay county has 85 per cent of harvest days during the past week. Average yield was 22 to 25 bushels with a top of 40 bush-

Saginaw county also reports about 85 per cent of acreage harvested with average yields of 22 to 23 bushels per acre.

Gratiot county reports about 80 per cent of acreage harvested with rainy weather slowing up

Tuscola county has about reached 80 per cent harvest completion with yields averaging

around 25 bushels. According to Maurice Doane of the Michigan Bean Shippers Association, white beans run in excessive supply in the west. The St. Lawrence Seaway is definitely helping the exporting of beans. They are moving out of Port Huron and Detroit.
