Agent's Corner

Frances T. Clark
County Home Demonstration Agent

The Yale Woolen Mills tour proved very popular with the home economics extension women. The first day over 60 women attended; the second day 90 women attended.

Now that the weather is getting chilly nights, it is sheer luxury to snuggle down in a warm comforter. But when you shop for a comforter, keep on the practical side.

Comforters have kept pace with the times and are boasting new fibers and fabrics. The old-time feathers, down, kapok, wool and cotton fillings are still around, but they are making way for synthetic fibers, such as Acrilan and Dacron.

Also, when you shop you should look beyond color and inspect the outside fabric quality. It should be closely woven so the filling cannot poke through. The top stitching gives the comforter an interesting pattern. But more important it holds the filling in place. When large areas of the comforter are without lines of stitching, the filling can shift and bunch in one place. It may be difficult to re-distribute the filling, especially after the comforter has been cleaned. Also look for fine, even top-stitching. Long stitches can catch and break easily, causing the thread to unravel and the filling to shift.

The fiber content of the filling is important, too. If the outside fabric requires steaming to remove wrinkles when it is cleaned, the filling should be able to take steaming without matting down permanently.

Listing unvaccinated calves on a blackboard in the barn or milkhouse is a good "memory jogger" for dairymen in guarding against brucellosis in their herds, states Alfred Ballweg, county extension director.

Dr. D. J. Ellis, of the ambulatory clinic at Michigan State University, explains that this simple method is one way of seeing that calves are vaccinated between four and eight months of age.

The veterinarian also points out that a system of vaccinating, dehorning and removing extra tests at the same time is another way of keeping up to date with vaccination. Any calves with horns are thus unvaccinated.

Still another method is to place a neck chain and number on a newborn calf. The neck chain is left on until the calf is vaccinated. It is removed to be replaced when the heifer is bred. In this way the herd owner can make a quick check for unvaccinated animals.

Veterinarians emphasize that vaccination for brucellosis is the cheapest insurance available against the disease. Vaccinated animals develop immunity that will protect them if exposed to brucellosis. Also, vaccinated animals consistently command higher prices in dairy cattle sales.

The battle against brucellosis in Michigan is not won. The disease has recently attacked several herds. Losses are heavy where lack of immunity allows the disease to run unabated through a herd.

Dairy leaders point out that there is no treatment for brucellosis after a cow has become infected. No vaccines are available for treatment after animals reach nine months of age. They strongly urge that heifers should be immunized between four and eight months of age, inclusive, to control outbreaks of Bang's disease. Vaccinates do not spread the disease and need not be separated from the rest of the herd.

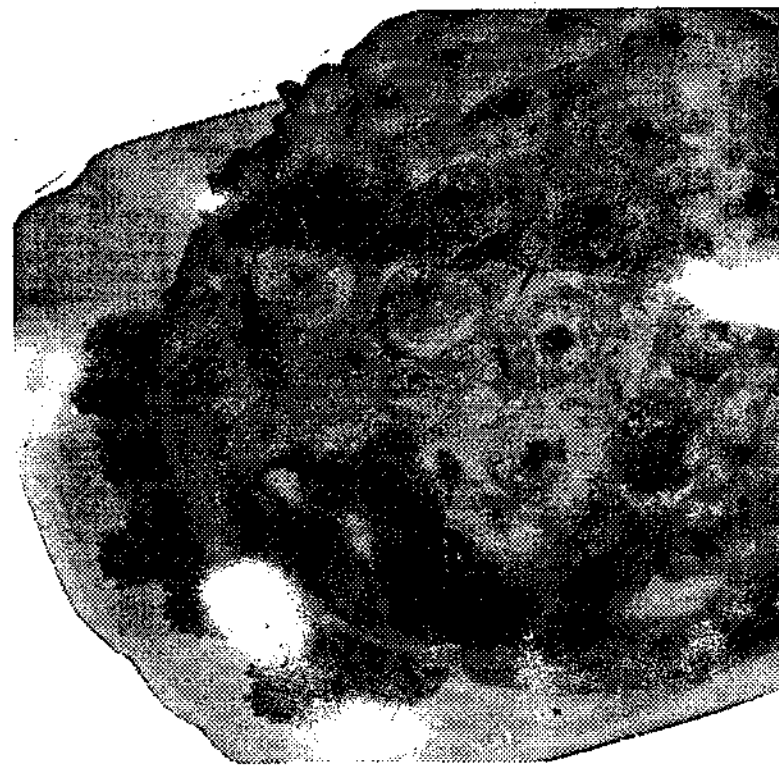

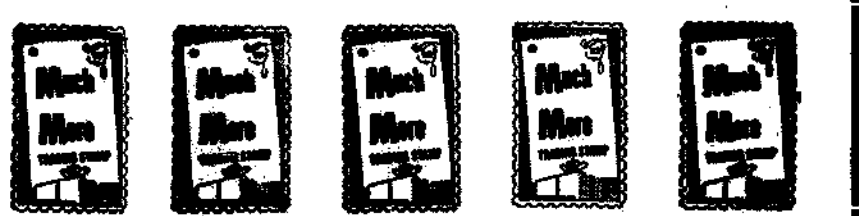
