Although the mill rate in Tuscola county was reduced from six to five and a half mills by the Tuscola County Board of Supervisors in their regular session, total taxes jumped again in the county.

The state's equalized valuation was jumped 13 per cent in the county and the total 1960 tax will be \$2,307,648.81, as compared

to \$1,887,331.27 in 1959, an increase of \$420,317.54. Total taxes in Elkland township increased from \$131,220.10 to \$169,283.46. In Novesta they rose from \$35,733.93 to \$47,993.-06, while Elmwood's jumped from \$61,031.68 to \$73,875.48. Ellington's taxes this year are \$32, 612.52 as compared to \$27,824.37 in 1959.

The Tuscola County Board of Supervisors approved a general increase in wages for all county employees and elected officials this week in their regular October session at the courthouse in Caro

The increases were not granted without a good deal of discussion and each of the salaries raised was individually appraised by the supervisors.

Supervisor Edward Golding Sr. of Elkland township had originally requested that county officers' salaries be boosted from \$4,800 to \$5,600. This motion was defeated 10 to 15. The supervisors later approved an increase to \$5,400 yearly. The young man was the son of one of the dealer's customers, started his first job, and was

buying his first car. He confided to his dad he wanted to shop a large city, 45 miles away, because "I think I'll save myself some money."

Well, he shopped and bought an "identical" car for \$130.00 less money. "Even the mileage is less," he boasted, (it had been turned back to a fraction of the true figure). He drove it for 27 days before a breakdown revealed a hole in a cylinder wall (temporarily plugged). Labor, plus a new engine block, plus what he still owed on finance totalled about DOUBLE the actual value of the car.


