Finally, as the two approached an old set of drags, Johnny asked this question, "Was the Civil War here?"

It's paradoxical—saving is a good habit, but it's the spending habit that always brings national prosperity.

Army Promotes Stanford R. Draher

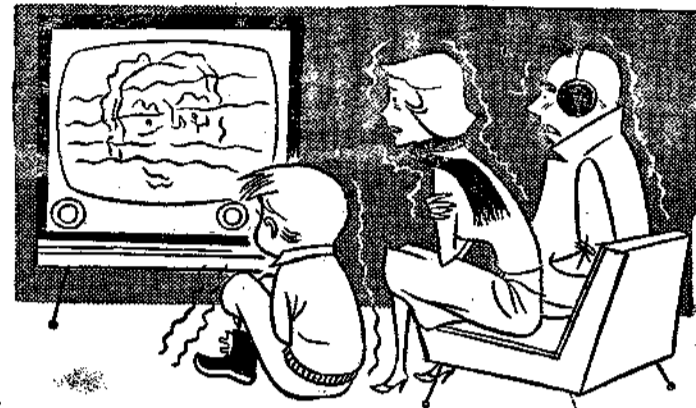
