

## Livestock Club at Detroit Junior Show

### From the Editor's Corner

Don Gillette, band director at Cass City High School, is pleased with the level of performance of local band members.

In last week's band concert, that featured 110 top students in the Thumb and Saginaw Valley, Bill Dobbs and Tom Jones each won second chairs competing with about nine other top musicians.

You'll have a chance to hear the local band at the annual Christmas concert scheduled shortly before Christmas.

An official advance report from the United States Department of Census indicates that Tuscola county has a population increase of about 10 per cent. Total number in the county is listed at 43,305.

And, if you think that's small consider this: Fifty-eight of Michigan's 83 counties have less population and 18 of them have less than 10,000 residents.

The county with the smallest population is Keweenaw with only 2,417 persons. (Just slightly larger than Cass City.) Next in line is Oscoda with 3,447 permanent residents.

We ran a feature about old cameras recently and since that time have heard of several that qualify as antiques that are taking good pictures. Latest belongs to Burt Elliott, who has one 59 years old.

It may be that Cass City is getting near the end of the line with its Christmas Town decorations. Sunday was unusually nice for the annual workday. Yet only about 25 volunteers were present to help with the Main street decorations.

If the community at large is tired of the work involved with the village's extravaganza at Christmas, (and we think it is) perhaps it's time to call a halt to the event as a Chamber of Commerce project for a few years and then start it again when interest can be revived.

In case you've noticed that one set of bells for Main street is missing, it's not because they were forgotten. They were erected Sunday. Monday the village crew attempted to raise them so it would clear truck traffic and the wire they were suspended on broke.

### Three Injured in Two-Car Crash

Three persons were injured in a two-car crash at the corner of Huron and Hanselman streets in Bad Axe Friday night at about 10 o'clock.

Sustaining cuts and bruises were Lyle Anken, 20, and Karen Schenk, 18, both of Cass City, and Larry Osentoski, 16, of Bad Axe.

Huron County Sheriff's Department reports indicated that the accident occurred when a car driven by Henry Jurgess, 70, of Harbor Beach failed to negotiate a turn from Hanselman street and rammed the side of a car driven by Gordon F. Kociba, 18. The injured persons were passengers in the Kociba car.

Damage to the Kociba car was estimated at \$900 and to the Jurgess car at \$300.

Jurgess pleaded guilty to reckless driving before Recorder Gordon Walker in Bad Axe Saturday and paid \$50 fine and costs.

Eleven members of the Cass City Livestock Club will be among 17 4-H'ers from Tuscola County who are exhibiting at the annual Detroit Junior Livestock Show this week.

The show opened Tuesday at the State Fairgrounds Coliseum and will end with the sale today (Thursday).

Hugh and Alan Milligan will show Angus steers at the show. Most of the entries are in the fat lamb division. Linda Severance has a pen of 10 Southdown lambs and Ruth Ann Severance a pen of four Southdown lambs. Larry Goodall and Wilma Goodall will each show a pen of four Cheviots.

Grant Goodall has a pen of three Corriedale-Southdown cross lambs and Linda Goodall has a pen of four of the same breed at the show. Dean Hutchinson is exhibiting a pen of four Shropshires.

Kathy and Janet Jickling of Kingston, members of the Cass City Club, will each show a pen of three Yorkshire hogs.

The Tuscola entries will compete with those of some 300 other 4-H youths from all parts of the state. Preliminary entry lists show 284 beef cattle, 144 market hogs and 400 sheep. The Cass City Club has won more championships than any other club at the show.

A special market lamb show and carcass event was to have been held. Tuesday the lambs were to be shown on foot, soon after they arrived. Thursday morning the carcasses of these lambs will be judged as exhibitors hear more about what makes a top market lamb.

The animals arrived on Tuesday, were judged on Wednesday and were to have been sold today.

A directed verdict of no cause for action was found in a damage suit brought by State Farm Mutual Insurance Co. against Henry Doerr of Mayville Monday in Tuscola County Circuit Court in Caro. The claim stemmed from an automobile accident near Mayville in October, 1959.

After the State Farm case had been presented, Judge T. C. Quinn gave a directed verdict of no cause for action and dismissed the jury.

Wednesday, Nov. 30, Judge Quinn sentenced Charles Virgil Swanigan of Detroit and Richard Flansburgh, 26, of Lapeer.

Swanigan was sent to prison at Jackson for one to 14 years with a recommendation for one year. On his release he will be turned over to the Federal Probation Department at Lexington, Ky.

Swanigan has been in and out of jail most of his adult life and was on probation when arrested in Tuscola county for forging a check.

Flansburgh had pleaded guilty of signing a bonus name to obtain feed while he had declared bankruptcy. Judge Quinn placed him on a one-year probation. He was already on probation on a similar charge in Lapeer county.

Flansburgh had made complete restitution of the money owed on the feed bill. He has been divorced and is now remarried. He supports five children, three through alimony payments to his first wife.

On hand for the breakfast at the New Gordon Hotel and the entire job was completed by about 30 men. In other years as many as 100 volunteers helped with the work.

Because of the advance work by the Chamber board, the work was concluded in the early afternoon despite the lack of help.

Both teams started the game by burning the meshes. Gary Hutchinson poured in eight points in the period and balanced scoring by the rest of the club kept the lead seasawing back and forth for the entire period. At the end of the first quarter, Cass City was in front 19-18.

The scoring pace slowed in the second period. Tim Anthes, who played an outstanding floor game, kept the Hawks in the lead as he netted 10 points in the quarter with a pair of field goals and six for six from the charity circle.

The hard running Hawks were in front at intermission 35-31. The Raiders went in front to stay in the third period. Using their height to advantage, they dominated both backboards and rambled for 21 points while Cass City hit a cold streak and was able to count only 10. At the end of three periods, it was Flushing 52 and Cass City 45.

The Raiders continued to hold their margin in the final quarter to chalk up the victory. Visiting coaches from Vassar and Bad Axe were among the spectators at the game. Judging from the performance of the Hawks Friday they will not be taking Cass City lightly in the title chase.

Hutchinson, Anthes and Randall all showed the results of their full season of varsity experience last year. Larry Robinson, teamed with Anthes, gives Cass City the best back court pair in the conference. Gordon Goodall showed well in his first varsity outing as a starter.

Flushing piled up an impressive 39 per cent shooting average from the field. Cass City shot 27 per cent. The Hawks hit 16 of 32 free throws and Flushing concluded on page ten.

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### State Equalizers Complete Job

## County to Learn of Tax Jump Friday

Tuscola county residents will learn how much the State will raise the equalized tax for the county Friday when the State Tax Commission reports to supervisors at a special session at the courthouse in Caro.

The commission has been working for about a year and a half in an attempt to equalize the county's valuation. A hefty increase in valuation is forecast.

A year ago the valuation jumped some 13 per cent and a bigger increase is expected to be recommended by the commission.

The board held its regular monthly meeting Monday. Principal action taken by the supervisors was the regular payment of bills and the authorization for another deputy for the county sheriff's department.

The action was taken so that the county will have police protection every night of the week. Previously, the county had no patrol three nights a week.

A request by Judge Henderson Graham for more help in the probate office was referred to a committee for recommendation.

Milton Bedore, Shuford Kirk, LaVerne Draper and Quentin Howell will represent the board at a short course in tax assessing at Michigan State University Dec. 12-13-14.

The course is sponsored by Michigan State Extension Service in cooperation with the Municipal Assessors Association of Michigan, Michigan Municipal League, International Association of Assessing Officers and State Tax Commission.

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## Lengthy Hospital Stay Due for Mrs. Linderman

The road to recovery for Mrs. Harvey Linderman will be long and slow.

Injured in an accident near Alpena Sunday, Nov. 20, in which her small daughter was killed, she is expected to be in the hospital for six to eight months.

She was badly mangled in the crash. Both hip sockets were broken. One leg was broken twice from the hip to the knee and the other broken four times between the knee and the ankle. In addition, she was literally scalped when her head hit the dome light of the car.

Although physicians are predicting a complete cure eventually, it will be more than a year, they say, before she will be able to walk.

She is in Alpena General Hospital, room 204. It is impossible to move her closer to home at the present time.

## Factory Closes With Overdraft in Kingston Bank

An attempt by Kingston businessmen to help establish an industry in the community has ended in failure and resulted in a \$77,000 overdraft at the Kingston State Bank.

The Marlette-Kingston Enterprises Corporation, manufacturer of Mar-King travel trailers, is bankrupt and has overdrafted checks extending back to December 1959. The overdraft has resulted in the discharge of Duane E. Gettel, 33, executive vice-president and cashier of the bank. Mr. Gettel was a director of the Marlette-Kingston Corporation.

The new factory came to Kingston with the aid of the Kingston Development Corporation which furnished a seven-acre site and 120x60 foot building on a five-year lease. Production started in April 1959.

The factory had at one time employed up to 30 persons and was operating at full production last summer.

Mr. Gettel is reported to have said that the corporation directors had promised him that the constantly mounting overdraft would be repaid. He said that the overdraft checks had been continually building up. Finally, if he had done anything the whole thing may have backfired on him, he said. "That's what happened anyway."

Most of the loss is covered by \$65,000 insurance that the bank carries and the bank has ample funds to care for the additional \$12,000 shortage, directors said.

Directors of the bank are John Barden, George Peter, Allison Green, Bruce Ruggles and Norman Ruggles.

The directors said that their attorneys have said it may be possible to recover the \$12,000 not covered by insurance from the responsible parties.

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## Special Postal Hours Set for Yule Season

Two area postmasters this week announced special open hours for the Christmas season.

Postmaster Lewis Bishop said that the Cass City Post Office will remain open on Saturday afternoon from Dec. 10 through Dec. 24.

Postmaster George Jacoby said the Deford postal hours beginning Saturday, Dec. 17, through Friday, Dec. 23, would be 8 a.m. till noon and from 1 to 5:30 p.m.

The postal department also reminded patrons that all greeting cards mailed to Canada or Mexico must carry first class (four cents) postage regardless of whether or not they are sealed.

Postal users are also asked to remember that the third class, three-cent rate allows only a handwritten signature and cannot be forwarded or returned.

Four-cent stamps or seven-cent air mail postage allows handwritten messages on cards and they will be forwarded or returned if necessary.

Mr. Bishop said that it is not only socially correct, but extremely helpful to both the post office and those on mailing lists to include the return name and address on every Christmas card envelope.

Make sure packages are wrapped securely, the postmaster cautioned. Sturdy corrugated mailing cartons, plenty of heavy brown wrapping paper and strong cord should be used.

Cartons with several packages should be stuffed with tissue or old papers to cushion contents. Another wise precaution against loss is to place a return address and the recipient's address on an extra label inside the carton or package before it is wrapped.

Place all Christmas stickers or seals on the back of envelopes, the postmaster concluded.

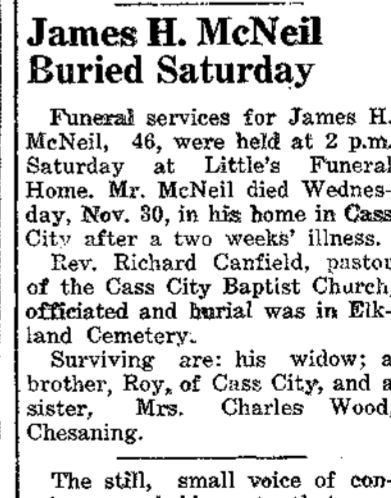

## Department of Public Instruction Plans Revision of Teacher Certification

Michigan teachers and anyone else who is interested now have a chance to help write the requirements for becoming and re-becoming a teacher.

The Department of Public Instruction plans a revision of the Teacher Certification Code. Action will be delayed in making the changes final until anyone with a stake in schooling, and that includes just about everybody, has had a chance to have his say.

Another series of meetings has been tentatively scheduled in late January or early February, officials said.

Dr. Lynn M. Bartlett, the state superintendent of public instruction, said he wanted to make sure that "all interested groups, organizations and individuals" could make suggestions, and these ideas would be considered by the department before any final action is taken.

He also invited written comments on the proposed changes before the final draft of the new code is submitted.

Six regional meetings were held between Nov. 8 and Nov. 22. Nearly 1,000 persons attended the meetings, the Department of Public Instruction said, and the breakdown on attendance was just about what could be expected: Fifty per cent of them were teachers and another 25 per cent were school administrators.

The remainder was made up of some 20 per cent college or university professors, representing both teacher education and the liberal arts, and five per cent interested parents and other citizens.

The document that finally comes out of the research and discussion should therefore reflect in proportionate degree the thinking of those most vitally concerned with teacher certification.

Furthermore, the high standards for teaching in Michigan

are certain to be continued.

People who make a career out of promoting Michigan's advantages never slow down. They would also like to see more citizens joining the move to boost the state's economic, cultural and natural advantages.

Don Weeks, director of the Economic Development Department, has appealed for a statewide and citizenry-wide drive to tell other people about the advantages of living and doing business in Michigan.

At the same time, plans for the annual Michigan Week -- the promotional high spot of the year -- are going ahead.

A scheme as widespread as Michigan Week, set for May 21-27 in 1961, takes a huge amount of organizing.

It is the job of the Organization Board to handle it. Woodward C. Smith, recently named chairman of the Organization Board, has the job of getting things ready to go.

A vice-president of Central Michigan University, Smith has served as a regional officer of Michigan Week in the past and it was his suggestion that resulted in more regions of fewer counties.

There are now 16 Michigan Week regions compared with nine previously.

The simpler organization makes it possible to have more effective programs because each regional chairman is responsible for less territory and consequently can keep a better check on local Michigan Week activities.

The Organization Board of Michigan Week is just one of five activity boards. The others are the Program Board, Cultural Activities Board, the School-College Activities Board and the Public Relations Board.

The Michigan Week Executive Council has supervision over the boards and also the various committees working in special areas and is responsible to the Board

of Directors of Greater Michigan Inc., which sponsors the celebration.

Michigan is getting some new cars, and half of them will be American compacts.

The state bought 50 compacts in 1960 and found them satisfactory and economical for certain specific uses. Therefore, when it was decided to buy 324 new vehicles for state use, the first major purchase of automobiles since 1957, by the way, some 162 compacts were included in the plans.

The other new cars to be obtained include 100 two-door, six cylinder automatic transmission models and 62 two-door, six-cylinder standard transmission models.

A variety of solid colors will be obtained in the current purchases instead of the standard black of the past.

Controller Ira Poltery said the

colors not only make the vehicles more attractive but also raise the resale value considerably.

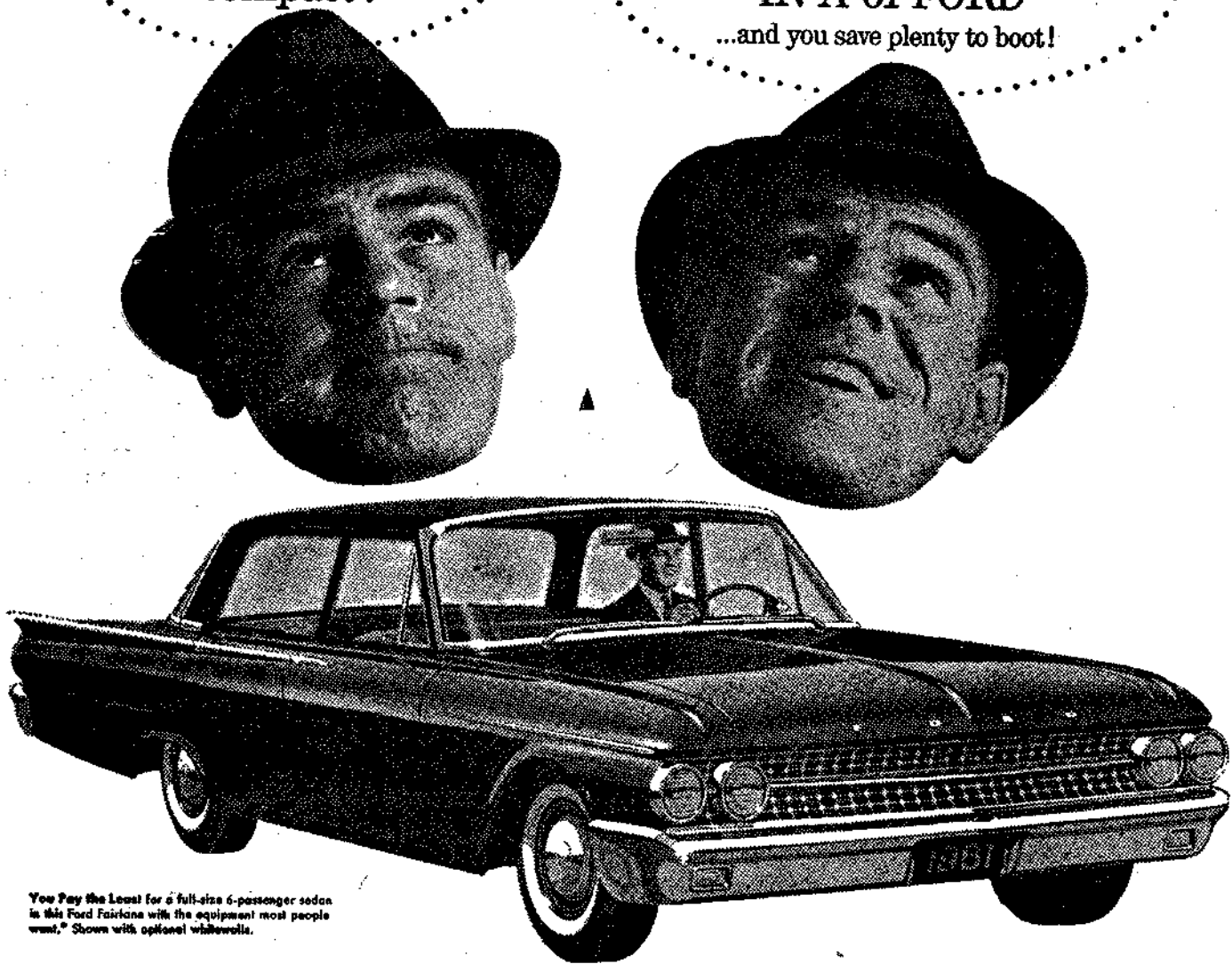

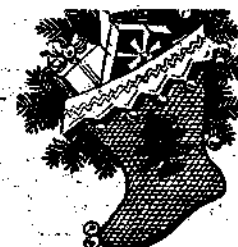

### Into Yule Gift Turn Sweat Shirt

Take one white sweat shirt and you have the beginnings of a Christmas gift for a teen-age girl or small boy. Mrs. Frances T. Clark, Tuscola county extension agent in home economics, says cotton sweat shirts are being turned into fancy jackets all over the country. Displaying a Tyrolean air, the easily-made jackets have caught the attention of fashion-conscious women and girls.

The transformation begins when the cuffs are cut from the sleeves and bottom of the shirt, and the front is opened with a slash up the center. Edges are then taped with bias or faced with seam binding.

From here, individual imagination and color preference takes over. Embroidered tape and rick-rack, both pre-shrunk and color-fast, are sewed in continuous rows around the neck, down the front and around the bottom of the shirt. These also trim the sleeve edges. A zipper up the front, or a single button and a loop at the neck, can be added, but most girls prefer to leave the jackets without a front closing. The jackets are worn over a blouse or sweater.

Converted sweat shirts have filtered down to the small fry, too. Mothers find the long-sleeve jackets serve well as lightweight wraps at school or at home. Gray is a popular color for small boys. Since the sweat shirt may shrink somewhat in washing, it may be washed before it is trimmed.

Did you know that cotton has received the popularity vote of mothers when they shop for children's clothing? The U. S. Department of Agriculture has drawn this conclusion after interviewing almost 25 hundred mothers who had children under 14 years old. The study showed that wool and nylon rated high for some garments.

Mothers preferred cotton for six clothing items. These were boys' sport shirts and school pants, girls' blouses, dress-up dresses, slips and skirts. Wool took top place as the fiber for outer jackets or short coats. Wool rated second for skirts. Nylon was a strong runner-up to cotton for dress-up dresses and slips. Cotton's ease of care and laundering properties, nice appearance and durability were cited as reasons for choosing it. Wool was selected for warmth, good appearance and durability. Nylon was purchased because of its attractiveness and easy care, especially the need for little ironing.

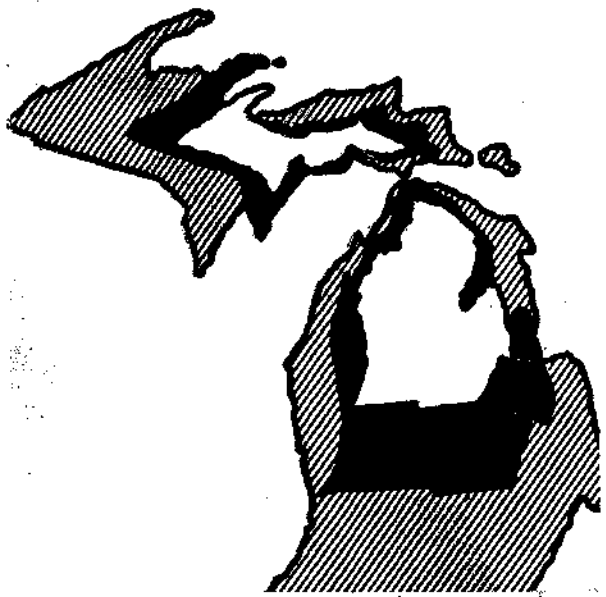

The smallest, inner map depicts the time-distance shrinkage which will result from Michigan's present freeway construction program and the one necessarily to follow. The freeways when completed, the Federation points out, will permit drivers to cut distances one-third to one-half, "time wise," over travel on conventional highways.

## Elect Lake Prexy of National Group

Glenn Lake, North Branch, Michigan dairy farmer and president of Michigan Milk Producers Association, achieved national prominence last week when he was elected president of the National Milk Producers Federation (NMPPF).

Lake's election, by a 4 to 1 majority, came during the closing session of NMPPF's annual convention in New Orleans November 27-30.

The Federation is the legislative representative in Washington for 800 dairy cooperatives and nearly 500,000 dairy farmers across the nation. It is the largest single commodity group in the country.

In accepting the position of

chief spokesman for NMPPF, Lake pledged an all-out effort to make the voice of dairy farmers heard more effectively than ever before in the nation's capital.

"I am both proud and humble of your selection of me as the head of what is certainly the most important dairy farmer organization in America," Lake told those at the meeting, "and will do all in my power to justify the confidence you have shown in me."

"We face an awesome challenge in the year ahead," he added, "not only in developing better legislative programs for dairy farmers, but also in getting other farm organizations to work with us to develop a unified approach to the solution of problems facing all of agriculture."

Lake called for a concentrated, aggressive effort to obtain sound legislative action to improve dairy farmers' income.

"We may be few in number, but with dedication and determination, the job can and must be done," he said.

The most discussed policy resolution at the NMPPF convention dealt with the study of marketing quota plans to bring supply and demand of milk and dairy products into balance. Delegates rejected a move to draft legislation to establish a quota law, on the basis that the whole matter of quotas required more discussion and study before it could be proposed to Congress.

Adding to Michigan prestige, Bill Van Frank of Montague was elected president of the Young Cooperators' group of NMPPF at the New Orleans Convention. Van Frank and his wife Beverly were named Michigan's Outstanding Young Dairy Couple in 1959.

## WANDERING WITH WARREN

### The Best Yule Gifts Don't Come Wrapped

Nicolosa Donlucas lives in the city of Los Angeles where she is employed as a janitress. A little over two years ago, she was able to visit her native Mexico. As a result, she became concerned about the poverty-stricken people

she had seen. Shortly after her return to Los Angeles, the Methodist minister in charge of the mission where she worked gave her fifty cents and told her that it was a talent; he continued to tell her the story of the wise steward who multiplied his talent. Nicolosa purchased cheese and tortillas, made enchiladas and sold them. Very soon she was able to give the minister seventeen dollars and fifty cents. She kept half the money earned to buy more cheese and tortillas. She continued to give half of all she made to the Methodist mission, but as Christmas approached, she wanted to do something more. Remembering her people in Mexico, Nicolosa decided to do something for them. Thirty-three was the number of years Christ lived, so Nicolosa chose that number of people to remember. She gave gifts to thirty-three orphans in two different cities in Mexico and she gave gifts to thirty-three elderly people who, had she not remembered them, would have had no gift of any kind. Nicolosa learned well a meaning of the parable of the talents.

Many of us have failed to comprehend the lessons to be gleaned from this illustration; as a result, we sometimes do very little with the great abundance that is ours. For regardless of how little we regard our possessions, they are likely more than Nicolosa possessed. While we may not always be able to assist others in a monetary way or give physical gifts, there are many other talents that we can share and multiply: a smile - a cheery manner - a sympathetic ear.

At this Christmas season, we would do well to consider carefully the kinds of gifts we are giving - and remember to give freely those many gifts that are not wrapped in pretty paper to be placed under the tree! The gifts of kindness, love, joy - gifts too numerous to list.

Speaking of Christmas (and who doesn't this time of year), I wonder how many parents will give their children too many presents and too advanced gifts. One year, a friend gave his little boy, who was just past the age of one, a pretty blue tricycle. The little boy could sit on the seat but his little legs dangled, his feet falling short of the pedals by two or three inches. I remarked the advanced of the gift and my friend replied, "Well, he's going to have all the things I didn't get when I was a kid!" And so, to satisfy his own unfulfilled longings, my friend is cheating his child out of a great pleasure: that of finally receiving something you've wanted for a long time.

I remember the Christmas that I was thirteen - and rather old for dolls, I thought, though I secretly wanted one. (During the preceding depression year, when I was younger, I had wanted a doll very much but somehow I didn't receive one... times were very hard.) That year it was my turn to pass out the gifts. Just before I started, my mother carried in a paper flour sack, the 25-lb. size, tied with a red ribbon. She tucked it behind the tree and whispered to me, "Leave this until last. There's a treat in it." Since my mother often made up little treats for everybody, I assumed this was another surprise for the whole family. Imagine my surprise when, after all the gifts had been given out, I opened the sack and found a treat, indeed! A treat for me. There was my doll. A pretty one wearing a white dress and bonnet trimmed with lace and with eyes that closed when I laid her down. I was so happy I wept a little - a common paradox!

But, I wonder, could I possibly have been that happy had I not wanted that doll so very much? Things mean so much more to us, if we've had time to want them.
