





**Factory Closes** With Overdraft in Kingston Bank

An attempt by Kingston busi-nessmen to help establish an industry in the community has ended in failure and resulted in a \$77,000 overdraft at the Kingston State Bank.

The new factory came to Kingwhich furnished a seven-acre site and 120x60 foot building on a five-year lease. started in April 1959. Production

The factory had at one time employed up to 30 persons and was operating at full production last summer.

Mr. Gettel is reported to have said that the corporation directors had promised him that the constantly mounting overdraft would be repaid. He said that the overdraft checks had been continually building up. Finally, if he had done anything the whole thing may have backfired on him. he said. "That's what happened anyway."

Most of the loss is covered by \$65,000 insurance that the bank carries and the bank has ample funds to care for the additional \$12 000 shortage, directors said. Directors of the bank are John Barden, George Peter, Allison Green, Bruce Ruggles and Norman Ruggles.

The directors said that their attorneys have said it may be possible to recover the \$12,000 not covered by insurance from the responsible parties.

cially the need for little ironing.


