#### **DHIA Report Shows** Lower Tests in **Herds This Year**

The butterfat production of DHIA cows in Tuscola county has dropped from 436.3 pounds to 429.6 pounds this year, according to the association's annual report. The 1960 test was 3.6 compared

with 3.67 last year. Milk production increased slightly from 11,870 pounds to 11,907 pounds.


DHIA now has 25 herds in the county with a total of 806 cows as compared with 22 herds and 638 cows in 1959. The increase follows a general pattern - increasing from 331 cows in 1956. four years ago.

The size of the herds are getting larger, the report shows. This year's average was 32.2 cows to a herd.

The general county average for butterfat was 441 pounds. Test results were 3.63. The 1,300 cows in the country's 39 herds averaged 12,176 pounds of milk.

The state average was much lower in butterfat production 420 pounds) and milk production (11,178 pounds). Statewide, cows were tested at 3.67. There are 56,164 animals in Michigan's 1,779 dairy herds.







#### Agent's Corner

Frances T. Clark County Home Demonstration

When you go to the grocery store to shop, have you ever tried to figure out how much of your food dollars goes to the farmer? Let's look at some breakdown on the food costs.

When you spend a dollar for food, the farmer gets about 38 cents. The rest of your food dollar goes to cover the cost of selling, storing, transportation, processing; in other words, the cost of getting food from the farm to you, in the form you want to buy

As a general rule, the more processing done to a food, the smaller the farmer's share of your dollar spent for that food. For instance, the wheat grower's share of a dollar spent for flour is 33 cents. But when the flour is made into bread, the wheat grower gets just 12 cents out of the dollar you spend for bread. The corn grower gets 18 cents of a dollar spent for corn meal and nine cents of a dollar spent for

If you buy choice grade beef the farmer gets 63 cents of the dollar you spend for a steak or roast; for lamb, he gets 53 cents; for pork 48 cents; fluid milk, 43 cents; ready to cook frying chicken, 53 cents; eggs, 63 cents.





#### It's Easy to **Double Recipes** For Yule Dishes

The cook who needs to double or triple a favorite dish to serve the whole clan on Christmas, might take a few pointers on recipe enlargement from Miss Margarite Burgoin, dietitian at The University of Michigan Medical Center.

In her compact, efficient test kitchen, Miss Burgoin scientifically translates new recipes into hundreds-servings size for inclusion in the new "selection menu," to be offered to University Hospital patients shortly after January 1.

Converting family-sized meals into institutional proportions is no mere matter of doubling, she; explains. For example, in gravies and sauces the rate of evaporation in large quantity is less, which necessitates increasing thickening agents and often seasonings. But she disclaims any "trick" to quantity cooking. "Many errors which crop up in preparing a favorite dish for a church supper are in multiplication", she quips.

Her job of recipe standardiza-tion, which developed from a die-tetic internship project last year, permits no "pinches" or "dashes". Ingredients are weighed if possible. Two cups of flour become eight ounces on Miss Burgoin's
