

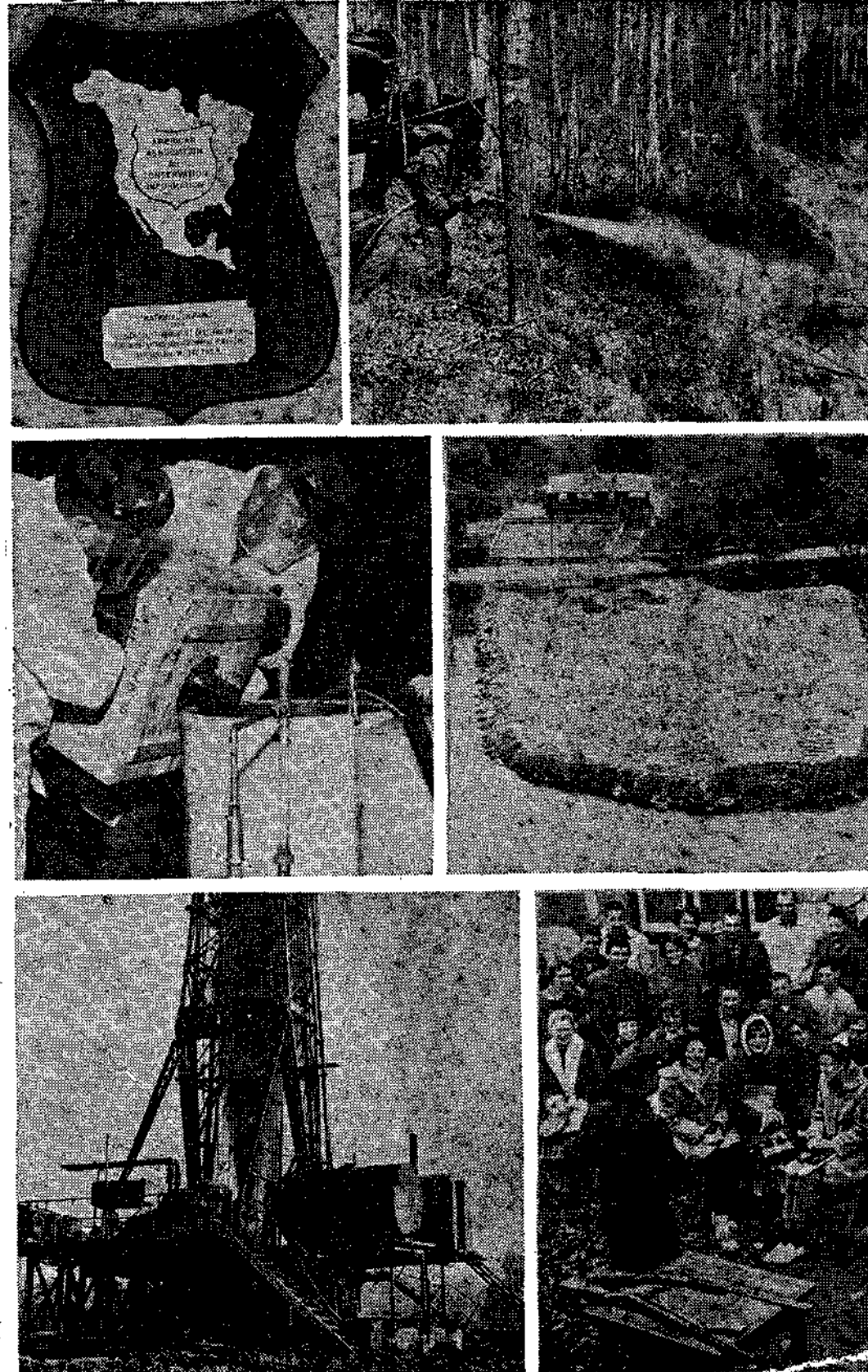

Oil and gas production continued to make a booming comeback...the first round ended in a chemical fight to poison out sea lamprey in Lake Superior streams and prospects were encouraging that man had won...Conservation Department publications and programs earned several state and national awards...forest fire control reached its zenith...the State's right to control filling of bottomlands and construction of docks, piers, and other structures in the Great Lakes was buttressed by Michigan's Supreme Court for the first time...Michigan's new voluntary hunter safety program for youngsters got off to a flying start. 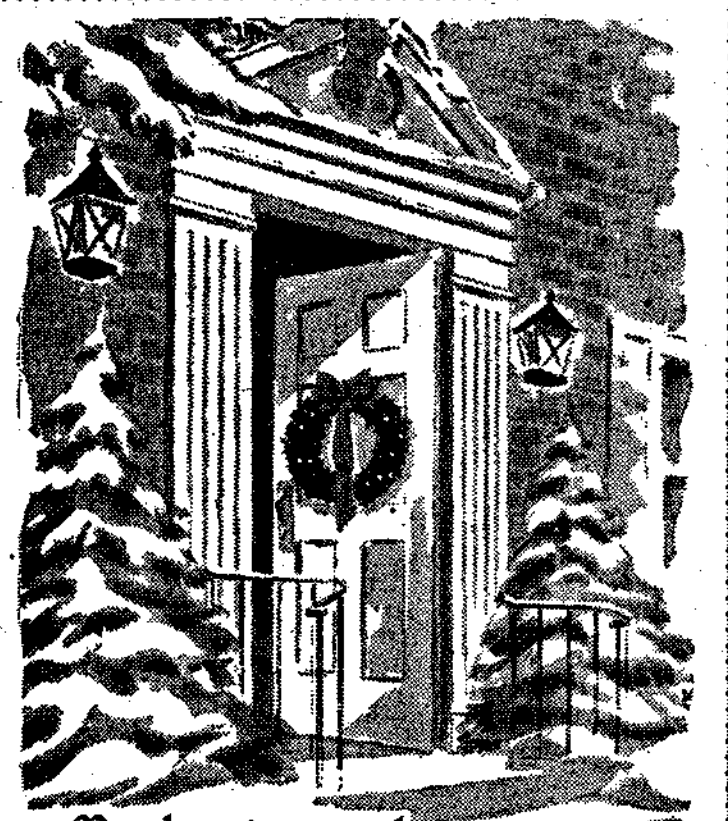

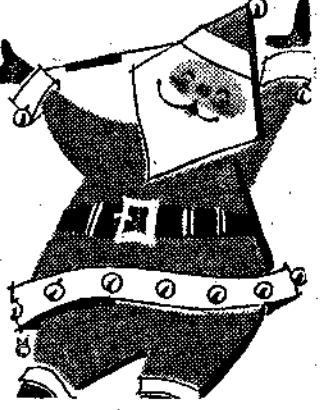
Santa Letters



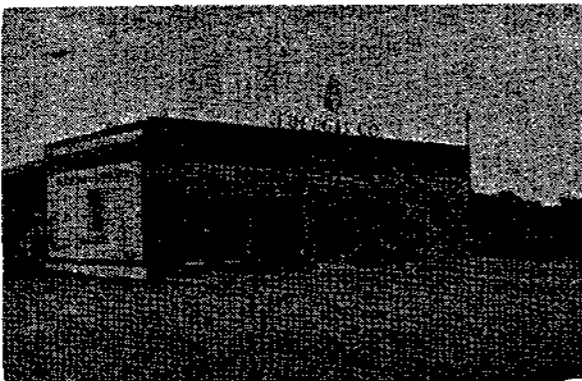

Dear Santa Claus:

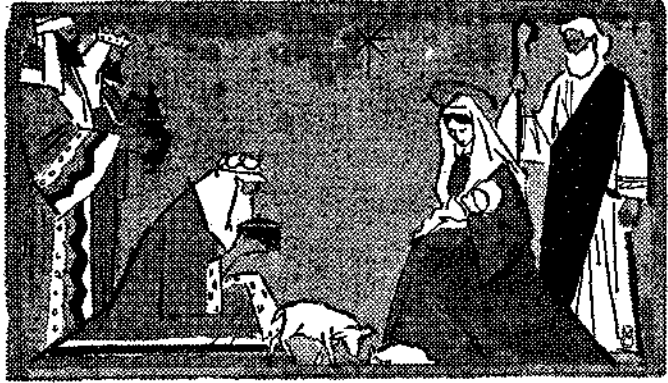

**Michigan Mirror**  
**New Governor Brings Personnel Shifts In Important State Political Posts**

Changes on the political scene are nothing new in the year of an election and the following spring. But Michigan may set some kind of a record for personnel shifts among party people, despite the fact that Democrats will be holding the executive office for the seventh straight term. Gov. G. Mennen Williams is stepping down after 12 years as top man of state government.

His successor, present Lt. Gov. John B. Swainson, naturally wants to place some of the people most helpful and friendly toward him during the primary and general election campaigns in positions of responsibility.

He would also like to retain some of the people from Williams' staff who have the know-how needed. Indications are Swainson will have a measure of both types of people.

Apparently Gov. Williams will take several of his present key aides with him to Washington where he has a new job as an assistant secretary of state for Africa in the administration of President-Elect John F. Kennedy.

Julie Lawlor, personal secretary to the Governor; executive secretary Sidney H. Woolner, and John S. Abernethy, an administrative aide, have been asked to make the trip to the nation's Capitol.

Others may find a place in Washington in a Democratic year. At any rate, Swainson will have to replace those who go by choice and those who must be expended to make room for those in favor.

No fanfare or civic celebration marks the departure of Michigan men for military service these days.

The local Blue Star Mothers or some such group quietly sees the inductees and enlists off at the bus. Sometimes there's a Gideon Bible or a sewing kit as a going away present.

But they continue to go—some 451,795 of them since 1948.

A typical month sees roughly 800 men ordered up by the State Selective Service through local draft boards for physical examinations to determine eligibility for induction.

About half that number, often less, sometimes more, are actually summoned for service each month.

Others, of course, volunteer. Some enlist in one of the branches of the service for varying periods, and others ask to be drafted.

Currently the age of the inductees is averaging about 22.

State Selective Service headquarters, located in Lansing, says approximately one million people have registered with local boards in the last 12 years.

Since less than half that number have actually been called to serve, chances for a deferment seem reasonably good.

Sewage treatment plant operators must be licensed to serve in Michigan. Some 350 engineers have been so certified to date by the State Health Department.

Examinations are held periodically and may be taken in a series until a person becomes qualified to operate any or all of the four classes of sewage treatment plants currently in use in Michigan.

The classification system is based on size of the plant, type of treatment and location.

Besides qualified personnel to run municipal sewage treatment facilities and the plants at such state-owned units as mental hospitals, prisons and the like, many industrial concerns have their own treatment plants.

The reason behind the state certification is simply this: There is a danger of pollution to lakes and streams, contamination of widespread areas and epidemics of disease unless waste is properly handled.

More than 95 per cent of the state's sewage treatment plants are now supervised by certified operators, and qualified personnel reportedly are being sought by the remainder.

To produce one pound of honey, one bee would have to work eight years, and fly some 70,000 miles, under normal conditions.

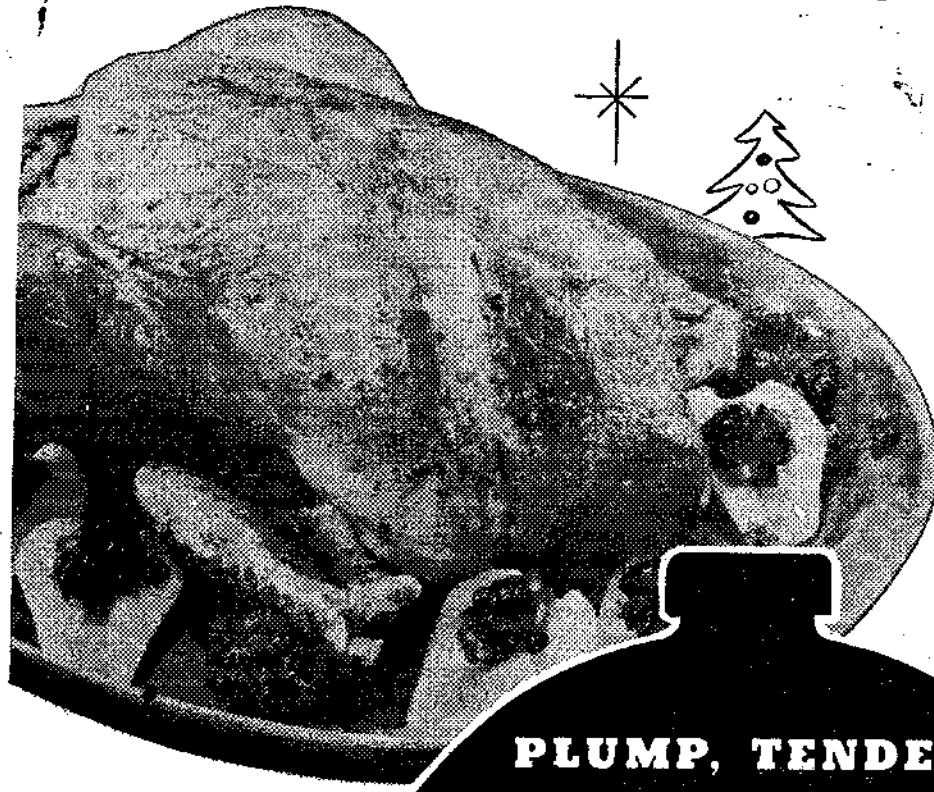

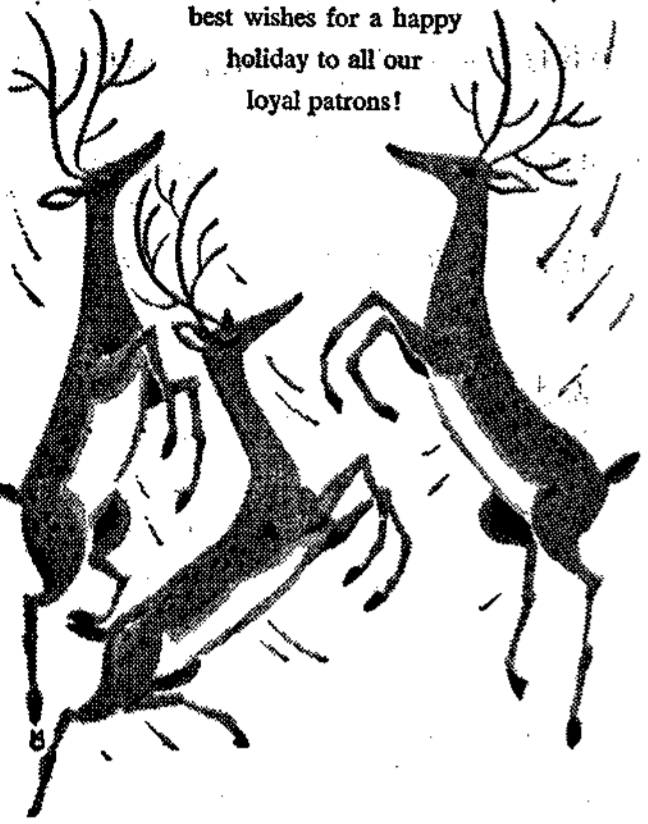

### It's Easy to Double Recipes For Yule Dishes

The cook who needs to double or triple a favorite dish to serve the whole clan on Christmas, might take a few pointers on recipe enlargement from Miss Margarite Burgoin, dietitian at The University of Michigan Medical Center.

In her compact, efficient test kitchen, Miss Burgoin scientifically translates new recipes into hundreds-of-servings size for inclusion in the new "selection menu," to be offered to University Hospital patients shortly after January 1.

Converting family-sized meals into institutional proportions is no mere matter of doubling, she explains. For example, in gravies and sauces the rate of evaporation in large quantity is less, which necessitates increasing thickening agents and often seasonings. But she disclaims any "trick" to quantity cooking. "Many errors which crop up in preparing a favorite dish for a church supper are in multiplication," she quips.

Her job of recipe standardization, which developed from a dietetic internship project last year, permits no "pinches" or "dashes". Ingredients are weighed if possible. Two cups of flour become eight ounces on Miss Burgoin's recipe form.

First step in her meticulous approach to quantity cooking is selecting a recipe from a reliable small-quantity cookbook by such chefs as Escoffier or Diat. Quality of the product, ease of preparation, availability of ingredients and cost are important criteria for selection. She makes up the recipe according to the directions, usually 4 to 10 servings.

A note pad next to her mixing spoon bears jottings of weight measurement of ingredients, procedure, yield and percentage lost in cooking. Opinions on the product's flavor, appearance and general appeal are garnered from dietitians, food service supervisors and kitchen personnel lucky enough to be nearby when the fragrant item emerges.

Recommendations of the "taste panel" on changes in ingredients or procedure are employed in successive small-batch trials until the product is satisfactory. By this time, volume has been increased to 25 servings.

Third step is quantity preparation using large equipment and utensils which will produce the recipe regularly. At this point, Miss Burgoin looks for variations in yield. She explains that cooking times and temperatures are more variable in quantity cooking, with great influence on cooking loss. A precise yield figure avoids the wrath of a hungry last man in line.

Final step is recording the recipe on a standard format in the most usable yields to avoid day-to-day calculation. (For example, all soup recipes are written for 5, 10, 15 and 30 gallons.) It is then catalogued in the "cycle menu" which rotates every four weeks.

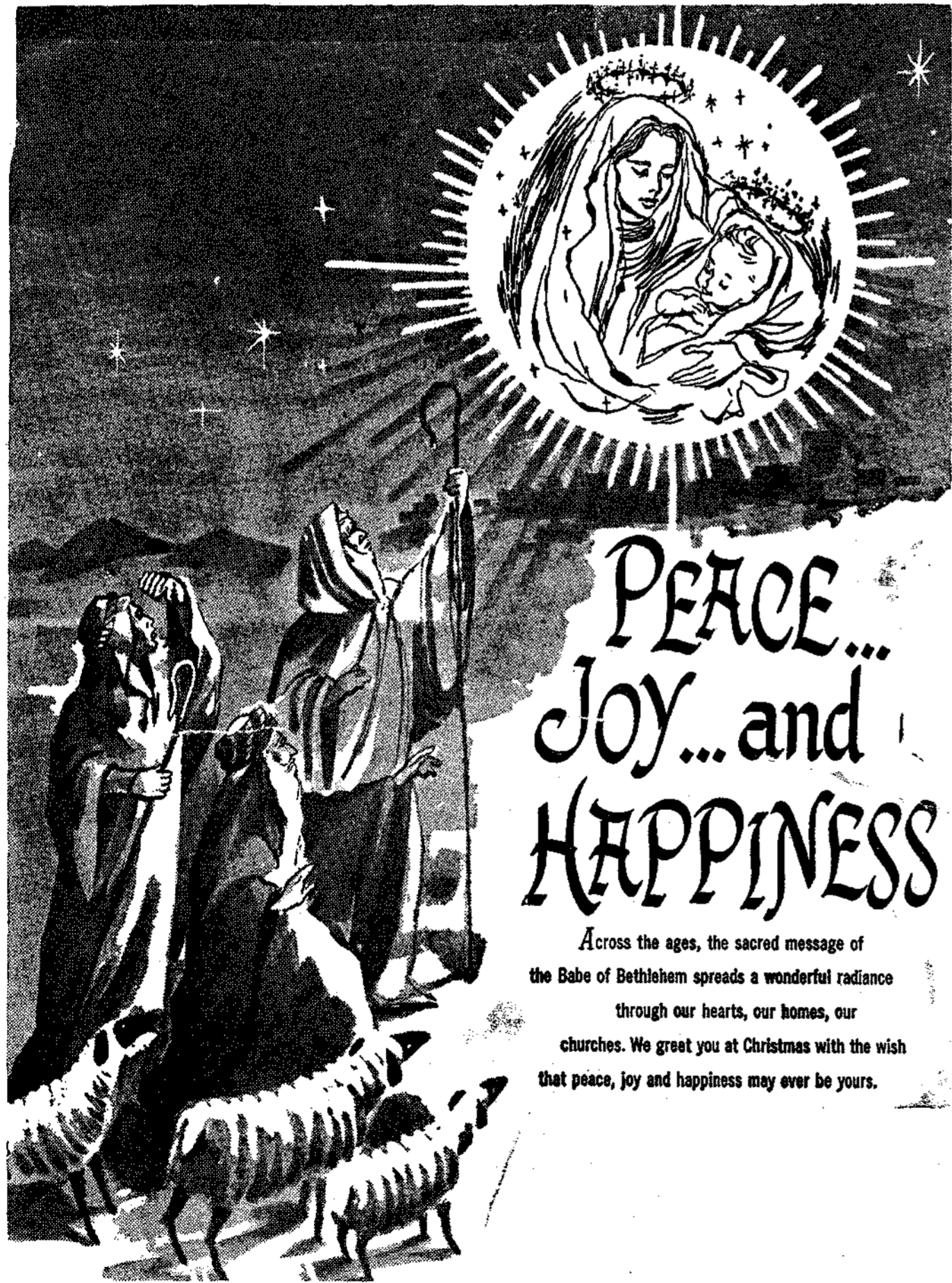

### It's Thrilling to See Panorama of Stars

Last Thursday evening, I traveled to Bethlehem and to Persia. Not only did I go to these faraway places but I did some time traveling, too, and found myself in these distant lands nearly two thousand years ago. The simple solution to this miracle: we visited the Robert T. Longway Planetarium in Flint and saw the production, "A Star in the East".

It was thrilling to watch the panorama of the stars as they swept overhead and to find ourselves transported to a different latitude and an older time. The story of Christmas as told by the stars was very interesting and it was enhanced by the projection of slides as the scriptural references were read.
