#### Homes Galore Slated in Sixties

Nearly 14 million new homes vill be built in America during the 'Sixties, a University of Michgan expert estimates.

James C. T. Mao (PhD), associate professor of finance, tells why in "Residential Mortgage Financing: A Long-Range Projection (40 pp., \$2.50), just published by the U-M Bureau of Business Research.

Overall, Mao estimates, construction expenditures on new homes and home improvement will total \$234 billion this decade. nearly one and one-half times the sum spent for this purpose during the 'Fifties (\$158 billion).

Reflecting a rise in the standard of living, Americans will spend 16 per cent more for their homes in 1969 than they did last year. Average construction cost per home will increase from \$13.-240 to \$15,358.
