The cost of county government will increase sharply next year if the budget as adopted by the Tuscola County Board of Supervisors in their January session last week is followed.

The budget calls for expenditures of \$624,602.99 from the general fund as compared to expenditures of \$534,422.54 in 1960 ... a hefty increase of \$90,-The increase in spending will

years. Estimated revenues for the year are \$576,200.00, so the county will spend \$48,402.99 more than it receives in 1961. The deficit spending will re-

Some of the increase in the budget is due to higher wages authorized for members of the board of supervisors, county employees and elected county officials. A new appropriation to the Tuscola County Retarded Children's Association for \$1,000 was a new addition to the cost of county government.
Sheriff's Report

Sheriff William Tomlinson's report to the board indicated that police protection cost the county \$55,065.73. As usual the departmeht answered many calls (6,550) including 1,561 criminal offenses. A total of 266 arrests was made and county police cars logged 156,529 miles during the

The license bureau department issued a total of 8,890 licenses

during the year. Probate Court Judge Henderson Graham's report to the supervisors indicated that it cost \$19,344.74 to run his department for the year. Receipts for services performed by the probate office totaled \$7,-

140.63.The cost to the county of running the probate office is expected to increase only slightly in 1961. There has been \$20,200 budgeted for the county's share of the cost of the office.

Corporations Hassle Over Gas

Michigan Press Association Michigan is caught in the middle of a hassle between giant corporations over natural gas. Conceivably, higher bills to in-

dividual customers could result from the struggle, though no move is now under way to obtain permission for a gas rate hike by any party in the dispute. Involved in the fight, which is

in the federal courts and before federal and state agencies which have the power to regulate utiliare Panhandle Eastern ties, cating we print our paper money Pipeline Co., a supplier of natural gas, and American Natural Gas Co. The latter's subsidiary, Michigan Consolidated Gas Co., is well-known to southeastern Michigan residents and to people in other areas as well.

The extremely complex questions at issue between the two systems include how much, if nearest thing to war a feller can any, gas Panhandle should sell to the Michigan utility.

The profit motive is, of course, at work.

But to say that either side lacks conviction that its position is ultimately the one which will enable the best and cheapest service to both the homeowner and the huge industrial user would

The Federal Power Commission and the Michigan Public Service Commission are governmental agencies set up to regulate utilities because questions of the public good are inherent in their operations.

Protecting the consumer and making sure the utilities receive a fair price for their service are part of the duties of the FPC and

Appeal from the decisions of the regulatory agencies can be made to the courts if a company coming under them thinks a decision should be modified. That happened in the Panhandle-American Natural case.

The struggle over natural gas is an example of how everyday business activity affects each individual consumer.

Corporations of a quasi-public nature, such as the utilities, must carry on their high-level maneuvering and business agreements and disagreements under the public eye.

Purely commercial firms can cloak their competitive rows in secrecy under the heading, "private business matters."

Ultimately, however, the cost of these maneuvers come home to roost on the consumer's pocketbook. And that includes the cost of long lawsuits and repeated appearances \mathbf{before} regulatory agencies.

dangerously close. But it's also against the law to walk on the right side unless it's impossible to keep to the left.

point up for once and all: Not only is it good practice to walk on the left, it's mandatory under the law. For those who want to see for themselves what the law says. Adams refers them to the Michigan Vehicle Code, Section 655.





In an analysis of the Michigan soft wheat market, John Ferris, Michigan State University agricultural economist, says that it might be a good policy for farmers to hold if prices are less than 10 cents above the "effective" support rate and to consider selling if they are more than 10 cents above the rate.

The effective support rate is the government loan rate-about \$1.80 in Central Michigan--minus the commercial storage costs of about 11/2 cents a bushel a month. The commercial storage costs between mid-January and March 31 will be about 4 cents making the effective rate \$1.76 in Central Michigan.

Early January prices on soft wheats averaged about \$1.90 --14 cents above the effective rate, Ferris notes.

In recent years, with large stocks of wheat in the CCC prices have seldom reached levels higher than 10 to 15 cents above the effective support price. The only time this happened for any sustained period was during the Suez crisis in the 1956-57 crop year.

Three of the important factors that affect wheat prices are production, domestic utilization and export.

The 1960 U.S. wheat crop was up substantially from a year ago. White wheat production in the Pacific Northwest was off, and in the East it was about the same as a year ago. Soft red production was up 20 per cent. Hard red was up by 25 per cent.

Since domestic consumption does not change much from year much will be exported.

Webbed Feet of The North







The history of man's existence in northern, deep-snow regions of the world is essentially based on snowshoes. His expansion into northern inland areas can be traced to the first webbed snowshoe, the bearpaw type (upper left), which dates back some 2-3000 years. Scores of other styles have since been developed, stemming from the five basic frames above. Different as these styles are, they were all designed to give northern man the same mobility long enjoyed by the varying hare whose nickname, snowshoe, comes from his large hind feet. Snowshoes are just as important now as they were thousands of years ago to northern hunting groups who survive by means of daily game kills. Here in Michigan they are invaluable to trappers and hunters as well as foresters, game men, and conservation officers who survey and patrol the state's woodland areas.
