## Relief Costs Up In Tuscola County

### To Air Valuation Of Detroit Edison At Special Meet

A special meeting of the Tuscola County Board of Supervisors has been scheduled for Monday, Feb. 27, for a discussion of the overvaluation of property in the county owned by Detroit Edison Co.

Based on the recent state evaluation of property, Edison claims that their property is overvalued by \$831,917 as compared to the remainder of the property in the county.

Supervisors will meet to decide what to do about the situation.

### No Increase—No Decrease in Motor Vehicles in County

Of all of Michigan's 83 counties, Tuscola was the only one in which motor vehicle owners registered the same number of motorized equipment in 1960 as they did in 1959. However, in a report issued this week by Secretary of State James M. Hare, the collections on weight taxes increased by \$251,78.

"A year ago Tuscola County residents paid \$390,207.31 to register 24,410 vehicles, and in 1960 the fees increased to \$390,469.09 on an identical number of units," Hare said. "This is an unusual coincidence which has never happened before to my knowledge."

In releasing the Tuscola County figures, Hare pointed out that total weight tax collections in Michigan had increased \$685,644.36.

### Send Sandmann To Prison for 2 to 5 Years

Edwin R. Sandmann, 20, of East Dayton was sentenced to two years minimum and five years maximum at Southern Michigan Prison at Jackson for unlawfully driving away a car from Vassar.

The sentence was issued Monday in Tuscola County Circuit Court by Judge T. C. Quinn.

Stealing cars has been a habit with Sandmann, even though he is not yet of voting age.

After taking the car in Vassar, he picked up a hitchhiker and went to Flint where he turned the car over to his new friend, who later wrecked it.

Sandmann then made his way to Pontiac where he stole another car. He went to Lapeer where he was finally caught trying to steal a car.

As a minor, Sandmann had been sent to Pontiac State Hospital by the probate court for driving away a car. He had left the hospital on a three-day pass a year ago and never came back. Evidently, because of crowded conditions, the hospital made no exception.

Net cost to Tuscola County taxpayers of direct relief, including the Tuscola County Nursing Home, was \$90,725.52, up \$8,614.23 over 1959, Iri Baguley, director, told members of the board of supervisors Monday in their regular session.

Cost to the county per patient dropped from \$1.68 per day in 1959 to \$1.55 in 1960, even though the cost of caring for patients rose from an average of \$5.93 to \$5.96 per day. The increased total cost is due to a greatly increased patient load.

The jump in average cost per patient was borne by the Federal and State governments. The daily rate includes all costs of caring for patients, including rooms, meals, medicine, clothing and doctor's services.

Due to the start of the new Federal Medical Assistance to the Aged program, facilities at the Tuscola County Nursing Home were taxed to the limit. The home cared for a daily average of 118 patients during 1960 as compared to 97 in 1959.

In December the daily average rose to 119 and a waiting list was established of patients who could not be admitted.

A total of \$243,300 was needed to operate the Nursing Home in 1960. The county received \$180,536 and was required to pay the remaining \$66,794.

The cost to the county was more than anticipated due to the switching of 42 patients from the Old Age Assistance program to the Medical Assistance to the Aged program which caused a delay of two months' receipts (\$12,000) from Federal-State sources which will not be recorded until 1961.

Since the Federal-State grants will pay 90 per cent of the cost of all patients under the new Medical Assistance to the Aged program, Mr. Baguley said, the county will eventually save money on the 42 patients transferred.

New equipment, not purchased when the nursing home was built, cost the welfare department \$2,873. Old equipment is replaced on a year-to-year basis.

Surplus Food

Surplus foods were not distributed in nearly as great an amount in 1960 as they were in previous years. This trend was reversed in December as the case load increased. A much heavier surplus food distribution is anticipated in 1961, the director said.

Surplus food with a market value of \$16,121 was distributed in 1960 and this food cost the county \$2,451. The average value of the food per person was \$1.57 per month and the cost to the county 28 cents.

The department's cash on hand decreased from \$11,639 to \$2,245 during the year.

Interesting Statistics

Average cost of meals rose from 35¢ to 42¢. Total patient days in the nursing home reached a record 41,343. In 1959 the figure was 35,612. There were 209 home investigations of direct relief cases and six investigations for the Michigan Department of Revenue.

## Village Records in Capable Hands for Fourteen Years

In 1947, just 14 years ago, when Mrs. Wilma Fry became the capable clerk of Cass City, the job was only a part time position paying \$50 a month.

Today, Mrs. Fry's work as clerk-treasurer for the village is a full-time position paying \$60 weekly and requires added help at times when water bills must be sent to subscribers.

The increase in the job parallels the growth in the village and the added services now offered.

For instance, in 1948 a total of 500 water bills was mailed as compared to the 725 needed now... the amount of money handled has increased even more sharply. In '48 total water bills were \$6,000. Today they are \$24,000 as industry makes increased demands on the supply.

Mrs. Fry has been both clerk and treasurer of Cass City since 1950 when she assumed the treasurer's reins when Ernest Croft resigned.

When Mrs. Fry started, it wasn't hard to be elected clerk. In fact it was difficult to find a qualified person to take over the job. And despite the increased interest in local government, a measure of Mrs. Fry's work is that she has never faced competition at the polls in the 14 years she has been in office.

Varied Job

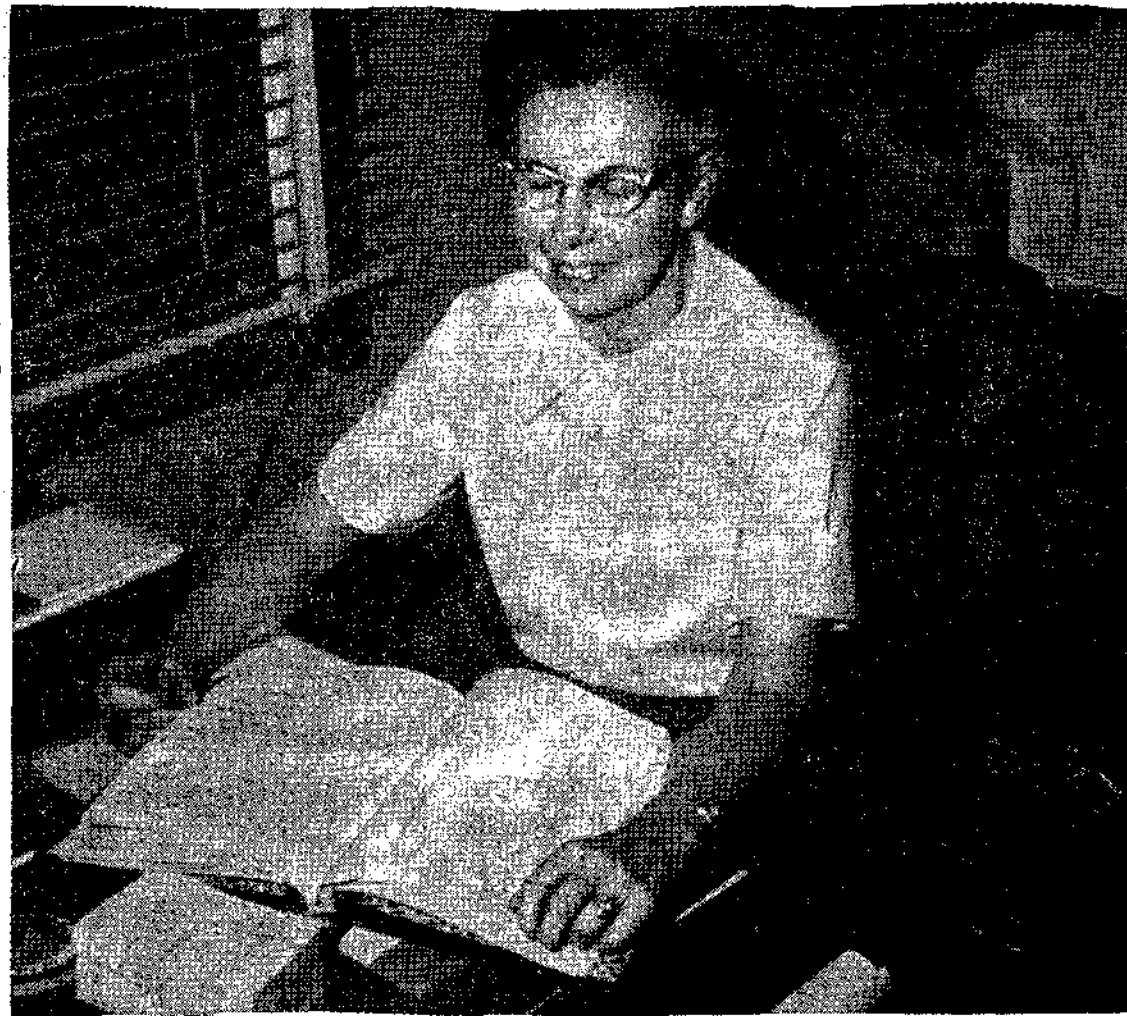
Persons who are not more than casually acquainted with the village's operation, may not know how varied the duties of the clerk-treasurer are.

For instance, the village runs a violation bureau which features predetermined fines for traffic violators. Handling this department, keeping the records and handling the money is Mrs. Fry's job.

So, too, is acting as registrar for vital records where she is responsible for recording every death and birth in the village.

When the council meets for its regular monthly meeting or for any special meeting, Mrs. Fry is present to record the minutes and later transcribe them into permanent records.

## Committee Explains Finances Area Schools Compared

The special school committee this week issued its conclusions about the financial condition of Cass City Public Schools, its debt and tax rate, showing the favorable condition of the school's finances.

For the existing buildings, taxpayers have okayed four bond issues. One (for the high school building) has been liquidated.

Details of present bond issues are:

Cass City Schools has been operating on a basis of small, but frequent additions. Money for these buildings has come from both local and state taxes; however, the overwhelming source of money for building comes from local taxpayers.

State money is received from State Aid, a payment of a set amount for each pupil going to school, and the primary school interest fund, which gets taxes from corporations in the state. These taxes pay 75 per cent of total school costs, but only a small amount for construction of new buildings.

Despite the fact that there have been three bond issues at Cass City Schools in the last 10 years, the school has the lowest tax rate of any high school district in Tuscola County or of schools examined in neighboring communities. Taxes for Cass City district residents are 10 1/2 mills or \$10.50 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation.

A glance at the table below shows how the school compares with others in the area:

The school nearest to Cass City taxes is Vassar which presently has a new high school and gymnasium under construction.

Valuation Increases

The school district's valuation has jumped from \$11 million to \$15 million this year after assessors for the state completed their work in the county.

The valuation jump will raise the tax bill 30 per cent if the mill rate remains the same. However, the increase in valuation forms a broad base for raising money for school purposes, if desired.

In the next article, the school committee will present its findings on space conditions when it answers the question, "Are we bulging at the seams or does it just seem that way?"

The Cass City Red Hawks took a firm grip on third place in the Thumb B Conference Friday night when they edged Caro 58-52 on the spacious Tiger floor in Caro.

The Hawks were forced to come from behind in the final period to pull the game out of the fire and halt a two-game losing streak.

Paced by Tim Anthes, who hit two buckets and five of five free throws in the opening period for nine points, Cass City moved into a narrow 17-16 lead in the opening quarter.

But the Tigers moved in front in the next quarter as the Hawks were able to net only 12 points while Caro netted 15 behind Gardner's seven markers. At intermission Caro led, 31-29.

Caro's ability to hit from the charity circle kept them in the lead in the third quarter. The Tigers converted six of seven as they counted 16 points while the best Cass City could do was 15 on seven buckets and a gift heave. Gordon Goodall kept Cass City in the game in the period as he netted all eight of his points in the third period.

The Hawks rallied to win the game in the final quarter when Caro's offense went to pieces and they scored only five points. Larry Robinson poured in six points to help the Hawks forge

into the lead that they never lost as they won going away, 58-52. Anthes led Cass City in the scoring column with 17. Robinson had 13 and Gary Hutchinson, 12. Jack Nigg led all scorers with 26 points on 10 field goals and six of eight free throws.

## List Benefits of Calf Vaccination

Livestock owners often ask, "What is an official calfhood vaccine?" Here's the explanation, according to Alfred Ballweg, county extension director.

An official calfhood vaccine is a calf vaccinated between four through eight months of age with Strain 19 vaccine. The vaccination must be performed by a licensed, accredited veterinarian and the animal must be tattooed in the right ear.

The veterinarian is then required to submit a record of this vaccination along with the identification numbers of the animal to the Michigan Department of Agriculture. You will then be sent a permanent certificate which identifies your animal as an official calfhood vaccinee. That's the legal terminology.

But now let's see what this means if you have an officially calfhood vaccinated animal. It means that this animal has a high degree of resistance to brucellosis in the future. If you've been around many cattle sales, you may know it also means increased value to the owner at sale time.

From 25 to 100 dollars premium is paid for breeding cattle that are official calfhood vaccinees.

Besides these two benefits, vaccination not only helps protect your cattle from brucellosis, but also provides health protection to your family. Brucellosis can only be contracted by man through infected animals. In short, you can think of calfhood vaccination as income insurance. Owners have suffered severe losses when their herds were attacked with brucellosis. A vaccination program is cheap insurance against such loss, said Ballweg.

## Michigan Mirror

# Slump in Economy Has Far Reaching Effects for Every Business in State

Echoes of unemployment in this state reverberate from legislative halls to relief lines and vice versa.

Since most goods and services in the state are consumed at a higher rate by working people than unemployed, nearly every body feels the effect of economic hardship caused by unemployment.

The year 1961 has started out as if it were going to turn into a less than satisfactory one from the employment standpoint.

Though some economists and politicians too, hopefully predict an upturn in the final half year of 1961, the fact is any period of poor economic conditions is felt for a long time after things improve.

Take two of Michigan's major, non-manufacturing industries, for example.

Farmers don't sell as much food when Michigan factory workers are out of jobs. While much farm produce is shipped out of the state, the biggest market is still at home.

Tourist and resort operations account for another big slice of Michigan business each year.

But out-of-town people alone don't bring prosperity to the owners of hotels, motels, stores,

gas stations and the hundreds of other businesses surrounding Michigan recreation areas.

Michigan is not alone, of course, as a state with recurring unemployment problems.

However, the problem here is with us time and again, and always produces a hitch in state operations as well as in the economy as a whole.

It's like an athlete who runs a continuous 100-yard dash, but falls into a hole every 25 yards.

Things race along between unemployment seizures, but every time the state falls into a hole, it must painfully crawl out and get back on its feet before it can start running again.

State fiscal officials take into consideration the trials and tribulations of the economy when they estimate revenue for a given year.

Lawmakers too would like to gather an intimate knowledge of the workings of the economy to help them in planning for expenditures and decide what can be done in what year.

Committees working on the program are in operation. More people will tackle the same issues from time to time and from different angles.

Whether government intervention, either state or federal, will ease the problems which unemployment creates in an economy like Michigan's is a question only trial and error will answer.

Argument over "guided economy" versus "laissez faire" will likely go on.

At the same time, government will likely continue to operate more and more programs aimed at bolstering sagging sectors of the economy.

Numerous federal programs are in the works. Some try to guarantee less drastic peaks and valleys in the employment picture.

Others would aid chronically distressed areas. Almost all would apply in some way or another to Michigan.

Gov. John B. Swainson, for one, has his eye on area redevelopment legislation before the federal Congress. He thinks we have fruitful training ground in Michigan for testing such a program.

Should truckers try to hoodwink the state on weight taxes, they would face a virtual army of investigators and observers.

Secretary of State James M. Hare said officers from his branch of the government, whose job it is to see that commercial vehicle registrations accurately reflect the size of the vehicle being registered, work closely with the weighmasters division of the Highway Department and the enforcement officers of the Public Service Commission.

The State Department officers carry a book with them showing each commercial registration by license number and size.

When an obvious discrepancy between actual weight and registered weight turns up, spotted by men of one or the other of the agencies concerned with these things, further investigation often leads to other violations.

In addition to follow-up checks on certain companies, the Department of State tries to cover every truck in the state every two or three years with spot checks for weight violations.

Last year, \$404,744 came into state coffers from this type activity, and more than three quarters of it was additional payments from people who paid insufficient weight taxes when they registered their vehicles.

Things Uncle Sam doesn't want can often be a boon to someone in Michigan government or education circles.

Federal surplus property ranging from buttons to bulldozers and from adding machines to airplanes is distributed to states under a complicated program run jointly by the U. S. government and the states.

In fiscal 1959-60, Michigan received some \$8 million worth of such property.

This year, the total could go even higher. Local units of government as well as school districts and state agencies are eligible, under specified conditions, to receive the bounty of the unwarmed federal property.

The property may be new or old, usable as is or in need of repair, but the qualified group that wants it gets it for just a nominal service charge.

Michigan farmers are testing nearly five times the number of soil samples at Michigan State University that they did ten years ago.

In Tuscola county alone the number of samples tested in the county laboratory has increased three-fold.

The primary purpose of these tests, relates Don Kebler, county extension agent in agriculture, is to achieve the most efficient and profitable use of fertilizer by farmers.

More than \$50 million is spent each year for fertilizer by Michigan farmers, and as this expenditure increases more farmers know the need for complete, accurate tests and recommendations.

Twenty counties including Tuscola have introduced a soil sampling and testing service in the last three years. This service is helping to improve the fertilizer recommendations to the applicants as a more detailed crop history is obtained.

Research has shown that other elements may be as important for high crop yields as the "big three" elements - nitrogen, phosphorus and potassium.

Beginning March 1, the central testing laboratory at Michigan State will include minor elements in the routine tests. The new tests will include tests for lime requirements, exchangeable potassium, calcium, magnesium and hydrogen.

Results will also indicate the exchange capacity of the soil, per cent base saturation and per cent saturation of the individual nutrient cations.

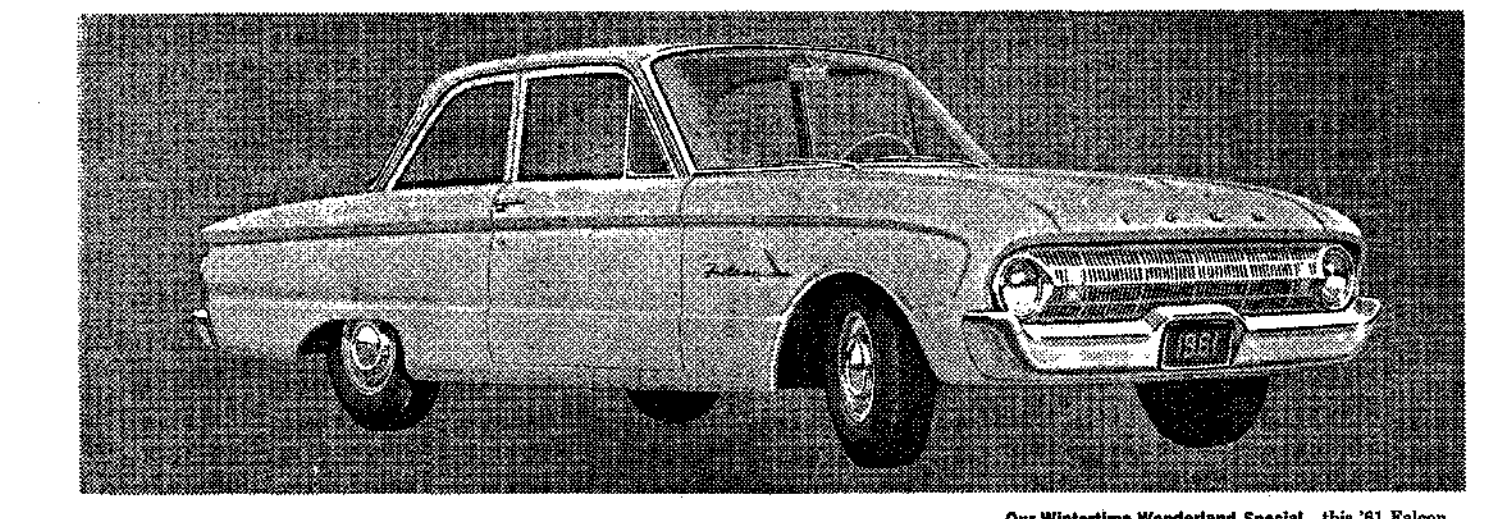

**Agent's Corner**

As fresh vegetables are becoming less abundant, I find that homemakers are faced with the problem of providing their families with the nutritional needs. This winter the supply (nationally) is running about 4 per cent under last year's. The carrot crop has plunged down one-third, and celery is now lagging 10 per cent. Tomatoes and snapbean supplies are, however, climbing up.

When we are considering fresh vegetables for our families, we must not overlook the good nutrition and economy to be found in a head of cabbage. These cabbage heads did not just happen. Through breeding and development have emerged our tender, succulent and nutritious varieties of cabbage which hold a highly respected place among our vegetables. We as a nation eat more cabbage than any other fresh vegetable except potatoes and lettuce.

Cabbage is an inexpensive supplement of ascorbic acid (Vitamin C) in the diet. One pound of raw cabbage will give you 4 cups or 8 servings while one pound will yield 2 cups of cooked cabbage. One-half cup of raw cabbage will provide you with about one-third of the recommended daily allowance of ascorbic acid for a normally active man. A one-half cup serving of cooked cabbage, cooked a short time in a small quantity of water will provide about one-third of the day's recommended allowance.

The green leaves of the cabbage contain more Vitamin C than the bleached leaves. Small heads tend to contain more Vitamin C than the larger heads.

Just another tip on "saving Vitamin C. Cabbage combined with mayonnaise or French dressing retains somewhat more Vitamin C than cabbage held without dressing.

To retain the best flavor, color and nutritive value, cook cabbage in an uncovered pan with just enough water to prevent burning, until tender. Overcooking causes strong odors and flavors and poor color, and this often accounts for objections to cabbage from members of our families.

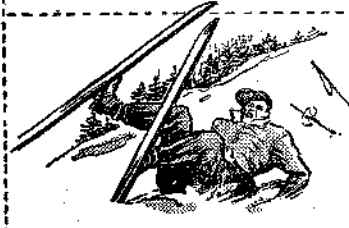

WANDERING WITH WARREN



It's Fun to See What History Offers

If I keep taking note of dates and their happenings, this column may evolve into Warren's Almanac unless I'm careful. But I do find it interesting to look up the date each Thursday to see what has happened in the past. For instance on February 9, "way back in 1870 - almost a hundred years ago - that indefatigable, but not infallible department, the U. S. Weather Service, was established. That oft-quoted saying, attributed to Mark Twain, "Everybody talks about the weather but nobody does anything about it," is no longer true. The once fantastic rainmaker is no longer an idle dream but has definite possibilities - whether good or bad remains to be seen. But the weather is a common topic; when people meet and they can't think of anything else to talk about, there's always the weather! My favorite quotation about the weather... and it's particularly appropriate with that 25-below weather we had last week... is the following by Philander Johnson:

Oh, what a blamed uncertain thing This pesky weather is; It blew and snow and then it thaw, And now by jine, it's friz.

I enjoyed Jason Kitchin's letter to the Editor in last week's Chronicle. I had been quite curious about Cass City's exporting pumpkin seeds some years ago and M. W. When told a little more about it. My mother used to plant pumpkins in the cornfield, too, but just a few for our own use. It seems to me that we used to dry the pumpkin seeds and then crack them and eat the tender little kernels inside... I used to love them when I was a kid. It was either pumpkin or squash seeds - can't remember which.

Recently a woman wrote to Mr. Bulen and in her letter she told him what she thought of his column and mine... which wasn't much! My immediate reaction was to sit down and write her a piece of my mind... but then, I realized I didn't have any to spare. Besides, a retaliatory letter would have been entirely out of order and had I written such an epistle, I most certainly would have been in error. Speaking of hearing things that we don't like to hear or receiving what we feel is unwarranted criticism, when my Aunt Melissa was around and someone had his feelings hurt or felt he'd been unjustly criticized, Aunt Melissa would say, "Well, if the shoe fits put it on." If I was around I'd quip back, "Yes, Tante, but if a shoe fits it doesn't hurt!"

My husband Ron is constantly reminding me that great men were born in February - and as I take roll call I agree with him: Men like Lincoln, Washington, Handel, Montcalm, Dickens, Edison, Lindbergh... Oh, it's a long list, even Buffalo Bill was born in February. But I think that mostly what Ron has in mind is that his birthday is in February, too! One man whose name I didn't mention, and whose birthday is February 27th, is one of my favorite American poets: Henry W. Longfellow. Many of his poems did I memorize when a little girl in school - some because I had to and some for the sheer delight of reciting the easy rhythms that told interesting stories. But sometimes we make the mistake of relegating Long-

fellow to his own "Children's Hour" - not that he would mind -- but we should recognize his more scholarly achievements - one of which was an excellent translation of Dante's "Divine Comedy." Another his "Outremer" a collection of travel sketches. But it is, after all, his wonderful poetry for which he is best known and best loved. Poetry that reflected the man he was: kindly, sensitive, innocent. James Russell Lowell said of him, "his choicest verse is harsher-toned than he." Just as a sideline we might recall a popular song - made famous by the Ink Spots - that was taken from a line of Longfellow's poetry: "Into each life some rain must fall."
