## New Census Costing Village \$2,000 Yearly

The first effects of Cass City's lag in population as compared to the remainder of the state has been felt by the village as fourth quarter sales tax revenues slumped \$500.

The sales tax money was adjusted to the 1960 census and Cass City received \$3,023.48, Treasurer Wilma Fry revealed this week.

For a similar period last year, tax money from the state totaled some \$3,500. For the year the loss would be some \$2,000.00.

It is possible that a little of the loss could have been through reduced sales, Mrs. Fry said.

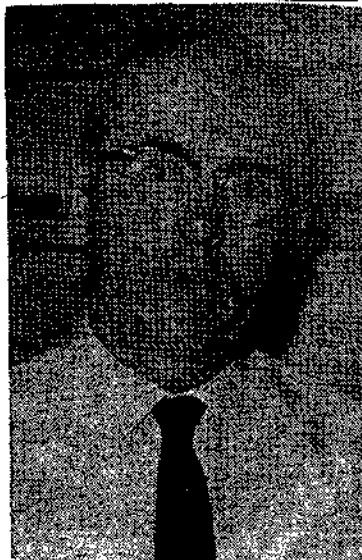

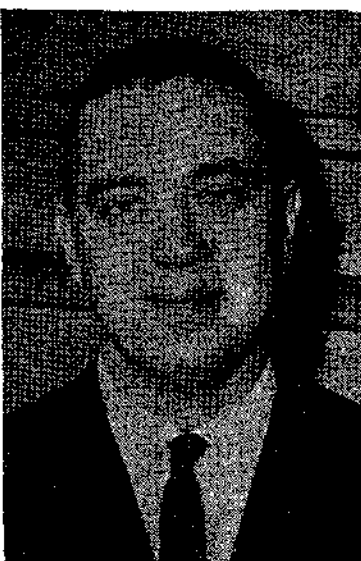

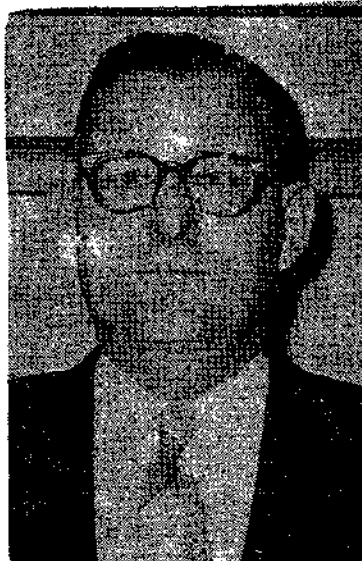

## Area Townships to Name Candidates

Townships will name candidates for offices at caucuses or primary elections Saturday and Monday and there is more competition for offices this year than any time in at least the last decade.

In most cases, winning the nomination is tantamount to election in the spring except in the comparatively rare instances when slip candidates run. There will be primary competition in Novesta, Grant and Kingston townships Monday, Feb. 20. Elkland township's GOP slate is without competition so there will be no primary election there.

**Novesta Primary**  
The GOP ticket in Novesta township lists three candidates for supervisor. Gail Parrott, incumbent, Adolph Woelfle and William C. O'Dell have all been waged spirited campaigns for the office.

Clerk Henry Rock is opposed by Charles Grant Pringle. The lone Democrat seeking nomination, Francis Smentek, is unopposed in his bid for clerk.

LeRoy Kilbourn has resigned as treasurer and Mrs. Elsie M. Hicks and Arthur Hartwick seek the nomination for his post. On the ballot without opposition are Fred Knoblet, for trustee; Rinerd Knoblet, justice; Keith Little, board of review, and A. Retherford, health officer.

**Grant Township**  
Only Gillies Brown, incumbent clerk, is without opposition in the GOP primary in Grant township.

For supervisor, Arnold Schweitzer, incumbent, faces Mike Hattas. Present treasurer Ephraim Knight is opposed by Bobby Davidson. Nick Alexander is serving on the board of review, and Charles Tschner seeks to upset him.

Incumbent trustee Howard Irwin is opposed by Kenneth Maharg. Rounding out the primary battle will be the contest for justice between incumbent Ray-

## Predict Big Primary Vote

One of the largest votes in recent years has been forecast for the Cass City village primary election Monday at the Municipal Building. Of primary interest is the race for seats on the council where six men are seeking the three available positions.

Incumbent councilmen seeking re-election are: Leo Ware and Lee Rabideau. Both men have completed their first two-year term in office. The third trustee post open was filled by Cliff Ryan who did not choose to run for re-election.

The four remaining candidates are new in local politics. All are natives of the area.

Gerald Prieskorn is the owner-operator of the Cass City Ben Franklin Store. Jerome Root Jr. is a local carpenter-contractor. Jim Champion runs S. Champion Outdoor Advertising Co. and Harold Guinther works for Wesley Milk Co.

**Other Officers**  
The race for the council seats provides most of the interest in the election. Other village posts are without opposition. C. R. Hunt is on the ballot for president. Mrs. Wilma Fry, 14-year veteran at the Municipal Building, seeks the clerk's and treasurer's posts and C. J. Striffler is the only candidate for the job of assessor.

## Clarify School Tax in Study

Figures compiled about Cass City School District's taxes by the special school study committee were misinterpreted by local residents because the article failed to tell that comparisons were based on the 1959-60 school year.

The committee used these figures because 1960-61 figures were not available. The story said that Cass City's taxes were 10 1/2 mills which was correct for 1959-60.

However, the current tax rate for Cass City is 8 1/2 mills for operating and a total of 4 1/2 mills. The total debt and operating tax is 12 3/4 mills. All school taxes are figured on the state's equalized valuation.

Although comparisons with other schools for the current year are not available, it is certain that Cass City again has the smallest millage for any high school district in the county.

Vassar, which was the next lowest in the study, is building a new high school and gymnasium.

## Hawks Tripped at Bad Axe

Cass City lost a pair of heart-breakers Friday when the Bad Axe Hatchets came behind in the final moments of both the JV and varsity basketball games to register narrow victories over the Hawks.

In both games, Cass City led throughout most of the play only to fade in the final moments. Paced by Larry Robinson, who poured in four baskets in the first period, Cass City jumped into an 18-10 lead.

The Hatchets started back in the second period and closed the margin to four points as D. Engle and P. Hearsch started to find the range. Cass City kept ahead by converting six of eight free throws and four buckets from the field.

Neither team scored well after the intermission. The Hatchets closed the gap to just two points, 42-40, as the clubs started the crucial final quarter.

Bad Axe looked as if they might win going away in the early moments of the final period. A pair of quick baskets placed them into the lead with only two minutes gone in the final canto.

But the Hawks came roaring back to forge into the lead again. With three minutes to go Cass City was in front by five points and tried to switch to a ball control type game to run out the clock.

It worked the first time it was tried as the Hatchets' defense was lured out from under the basket and Tim Anthes cashed in.

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But that was the last time it was successful. The Hatchets took possession of the ball three times and netted six points to pull within a single counter of the Hawks.

With about 20 seconds left to go the Hatchets were awarded a free throw and an opportunity to tie or win the game.

The gift toss bounced off the rim but was rebounded by Bad Axe. A moment later the Hawks fouled again and again the rebound was taken by Bad Axe.

This time failure to control the backboard was fatal. Mike DeChane's, the Hatchets' clever guard, took the ball near the board and scored from close in to give the Hatchets the lead and the game as time ran out.

Although the dramatics occurred in the final seconds, Cass City actually lost the game because they were unable to contain the Hatchets' rangy forward wall for the entire game. In the first half they held their own, but in the final two quarters of the game Bad Axe dominated the boards and it finally resulted in the victory.

Anthes had 16 points, Gary Hutchinson 15 and Art Randall 12 to lead Cass City's scoring.

Cass City dropped as wild a JV contest as local fans are apt to see. The junior Hawks were

nearly run off the floor in the first period as they trailed 21-9. In the next two quarters they showed an abrupt reversal of form to forge into the lead by as much as 10 points.

In the final period the tide swung the other way and the young Hatchets bombarded the bucket for 21 points while Cass City scored 18. Final score was 73-68.

Roger Parker picked up 26, Marv Irwin had 16 and Bill Hutchinson and Roger Karr, 16 each.

The following Ordinance was adopted by the Township Board of Evergreen Township, Sanilac County, on the 14th day of February 1961, and is hereby published in the Cass City Chronicle, a newspaper having general circulation in said Township, as required by Act 191 of the Public Acts of 1959, State of Michigan, as amended.

**PREAMBLE**  
An Ordinance to establish zoning districts and regulations governing the use of land in the Township of Evergreen, Sanilac County, Michigan, in accordance with the provisions of Act 184 of the Public Acts of 1945, as amended; To provide for building permits and the collection of fees therefor; To provide for a Board of Appeals and its duties and powers; To provide for the administration of this Ordinance including the official whose duty it shall be to enforce the provisions thereof; and To provide for penalties for the violation of this Ordinance.

**TOWNSHIP OF EVERGREEN ORDINANCES**

**ARTICLE I**

**TITLE AND PURPOSE**

**SECTION 1.1 Title.**

This Ordinance shall be known as the

**SECTION 1.2 Purpose.**

The fundamental purposes of this Ordinance are to:

1. Promote and improve the health, safety, morals and general welfare of the inhabitants of the Township;

2. Promote the use of lands and resources of the Township in accordance with the zoning map of the Township;

3. Provide for the orderly development of the Township;

4. Lessen congestion on the public streets and roads;

5. Provide for the interest of health and safety; minimum standards under which certain buildings and structures may be erected and used;

6. Facilitate the development of an adequate system of transportation, education, recreation, sewerage, water supply and other requirements;

7. Conserve life and property, and the expenditure of funds for public improvements and services to conform with the most advantageous use of the Township;

8. Sources and properties of the Township.

**ARTICLE II**

**DISTRICTS**

**SECTION 2.1 Kinds of Districts**

For the purpose of this Ordinance, all of the unincorporated area of Evergreen Township is hereby divided into the following Zoning Districts, the location of which are indicated on the zoning map of Evergreen Township, Sanilac County, Michigan:

(a) Agricultural and Residential Districts A-1, A-2.

(b) Commercial Districts C-1, C-2.

(c) Industrial Districts I-1, I-2.

**SECTION 2.2 Zoning Map of Evergreen Township.**

The Zoning Map of Evergreen Township, Sanilac County, Michigan and all information and showing thereon shall be a part of this Ordinance. Unless otherwise provided, the boundary lines of the Zoning Districts shall be interpreted as following along section lines or the centerline of highways; streets or the boundary lines of incorporated areas or property lines of legal record on the date of enactment of this Ordinance, or any extension of said lines.

**ARTICLE III**

**AGRICULTURAL AND RESIDENTIAL DISTRICTS**

**SECTION 3.1 Use.**

No land shall hereafter be used, and no buildings or structures hereafter erected, altered or moved upon any premises, except as provided in one or more of the following uses, except as otherwise provided in this Ordinance:

1. Farms and residential uses.

2. Dwelling houses, provided, however, all dwelling houses shall conform to the minimum standards of this Ordinance.

3. Mobile homes.

4. Utility buildings and public utility buildings.

5. Buildings for the processing and storage of agricultural products.

6. Boarding and lodging houses and tourist homes.

7. Parks and grounds for outdoor recreation.

8. Accessory buildings, structures and uses customarily incidental to the use of the above permitted use.

9. Home occupations, including handicrafts such as dressmaking and the sale of articles produced on the premises by such handicrafts; and the office of a physician, surgeon, chiropractor, osteopath, dentist, naturopath, artist and other professional occupations.

10. Churches, church camps, schools, libraries, clubs, playgrounds, hospitals, clinics, sanatoriums, convalescent homes, community center buildings and fur animal ranches; provided, however, that such use shall be deemed a home occupation, and shall conform to the minimum standards of this Ordinance.

11. Sale and servicing of agricultural machinery and equipment.

12. Sale of alcoholic beverages as provided by law.

13. Any other use similar in character to the above when approved by the Township Zoning Board and when in conformity with the provisions of this Ordinance.

14. Outdoor advertising signs, provided, however, that in the event of a sign erected on a building, the sign shall be removed within thirty (30) days of the date of the Township Zoning Board's decision.

15. Accessory uses, buildings and structures customarily incidental to the use of the above permitted or approved uses.

16. Any use authorized in Section 8.1.

No building hereafter erected, altered or moved upon any premises shall have less than five hundred seventy-five (575) square feet of floor area at the first floor level.

**SECTION 3.2 Yards.**

Every building hereafter erected, altered or moved upon any premises shall conform to the following minimum yard requirements:

1. Front yards: One hundred (100) feet.

2. Side yards: Ten (10) feet in width on each side, provided, however, that on each side of a building abutting on a street, the minimum yard shall be not less than ten (10) feet.

3. Rear yards: One hundred (100) feet.

4. Any other yard not specified in the above shall be not less than ten (10) feet.

5. No building hereafter erected, altered or moved upon any premises shall have less than five hundred seventy-five (575) square feet of floor area at the first floor level.

**SECTION 3.3 Height of Buildings.**

No building hereafter erected, altered or moved upon any premises shall exceed a height of forty (40) feet unless approved by the Township Zoning Board.

### Competition for Industry Very Keen

Probably there never was a time when more Michigan people were thinking and talking more about programs to create jobs than now. This includes both community and state levels. And probably there has never been a time when people of the state were as willing to work together in such programs.

Unemployment figures, business reports and recently the announcement that Norge will move its Muskegon Heights plant to Arkansas made it quite clear in everyone's mind that the economic climate in Michigan is in serious need of improvement — and now.

The Norge incident is dramatic evidence of a situation which has been in the news for many months. For a year the rumor had been rife that the plant would

be moved. Community leaders and representatives of the state Economic Development Department worked hard; even desperately to hold electric refrigerator production here. But it became apparent that the new, one million square foot plant near Fort Smith, Ark., could easily produce both gas and electric models. On Feb. 1, it was announced that the somewhat antiquated plant in Muskegon Heights would be closed.

Arkansas' Gov. Orval E. Faubus, incidentally, lost no time in claiming that the state's gain was largely the result of legislation adopted recently and designed to lure industry there. They have a law which permits municipalities to issue revenue bonds to build plants for industry. Greenwood, Ark., a suburb of Fort Smith, issued a \$7.5 million bond issue to build the Norge plant.

Michigan leaders must now decide what programs this state will adopt to help in its situation. The newly elected Governor, John B. Swainson, indicates that he will have several recommendations. One approach to receive serious consideration involves a way for the state to aid local groups financing construction of building for lease to industry. In the past this and similar programs have been considered too liberal by the Legislature. But other states, some of them with a reputation for being conservative, have adopted such programs. To many in this state, especially the hard working staff of the Economic Development Department, some new programs are weapons urgently needed for the fight to attract industry.

Conservative Maine has a sort of industrial FTA plan. So does Rhode Island. The state guarantees up to 90 per cent of a loan made by a bank in cooperation with a community industrial development group to build a plant for lease to industry. In both states the plan seems to be working well. In Maine the plan was delayed a year while it went to a vote of the people and then to the supreme court. Attorneys say that in Michigan too a constitutional amendment would be required and a supreme court test could be expected to follow. This would take important time.

Pennsylvania has advertised for several years that "100 per cent financing of industrial plants" is available. In fact, Pennsylvania has spent something more than a half a million dollars for this advertising alone. Five years ago the Pennsylvania legislature appropriated \$5 million for plant construction loans. From year to year additional sums have been appropriated, to a present total of \$18 million. For each plant construction project that qualifies the state loans a third of the cost, and a community industrial development corporation and a local bank divide the rest. Commitments from the state fund have reached more than \$16,000,000.

One job was created, Pennsylvania estimates, for every \$654 loaned by the state. Payrolls created are estimated at \$82 million a year. A standard assumption would show one per cent of this payroll paid by the recipients in direct and indirect taxes to the state and its local units of government, which would mean a million dollars coming back in taxes each year on \$16 million of

loans. Republican Governor Rockefeller recommended to New York legislators this winter a plan similar to the one in Pennsylvania. "I am convinced," said Gov. Rockefeller in his opening message, "that this proposal can provide us with a more basic approach to the problems . . . and with an important additional means of attracting private capital . . . Its efforts in surplus labor or areas would be remedial; in other areas, preventive. Its financial assistance should be made available through non-profit local development corporations composed of leading citizens concerned with the economic growth of their communities."

No opposition seems to exist to a proposal that a statewide meat inspection program be created. Leading the fight for enactment of such legislation is the Michigan Meat Packers and Frozen Food Lockers Association. The meat industry hopes to standardize inspection routines which now take place in a number of cities and communities at the expense of local government and place authority to inspect meat products in the hands of the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

Most obvious benefits are economic. It is simply more efficient to deal with one set of standard inspection requirements than with numerous and differing ordinances. The consumer gets a more complete protection and standardized labeling of meat products. The producer need secure only one license instead of one for each community where he wishes to operate. The new inspection method would permit earlier detection of obscure animal diseases, and permit the state to enforce regulations.

In short, Michigan packers, most of whom used to deal in only a few communities, find themselves hampered in their efforts to expand into other markets. The statewide inspection system would permit them to contact more consumers with less red tape.

State meat inspection programs have been successful in other states, and Michigan's new law will be patterned after them. Illinois and California have "Model" programs and Hawaii has had one since 1899.

Since then a third person with comparable symptoms also was told they were caused by tensions. So, if you're suffering with a stiff neck, sore shoulder muscles, a cramp or two in the tummy, just throw a few plates around and you'll feel lots better!

Do you find yourself easily annoyed while driving? I do . . . though it's a useless fretting that I'm trying to cease. One of the major annoyances to me has been this consistent driving down the middle of the country roads and near-middle of the highways that seems so prevalent. In England one is supposed to drive on the left side of the road; in the U. S. A., one is supposed to keep to the right side of the road; but around here, there's a marked tendency to stay in the middle of the road. If you don't think I'm right, just start noting the cars you meet or pass. On the country roads and highways, you'll see more driving close to the center line than those who keep to the right of the pavement. Of course, I'll grant there are circumstances at times that make it necessary to avoid as much as possible the muddy, slippery or snowy sides of the roads . . . but, generally speaking, the driver of an automobile should stay on his own side of the road . . . and not go wandering like Warren!

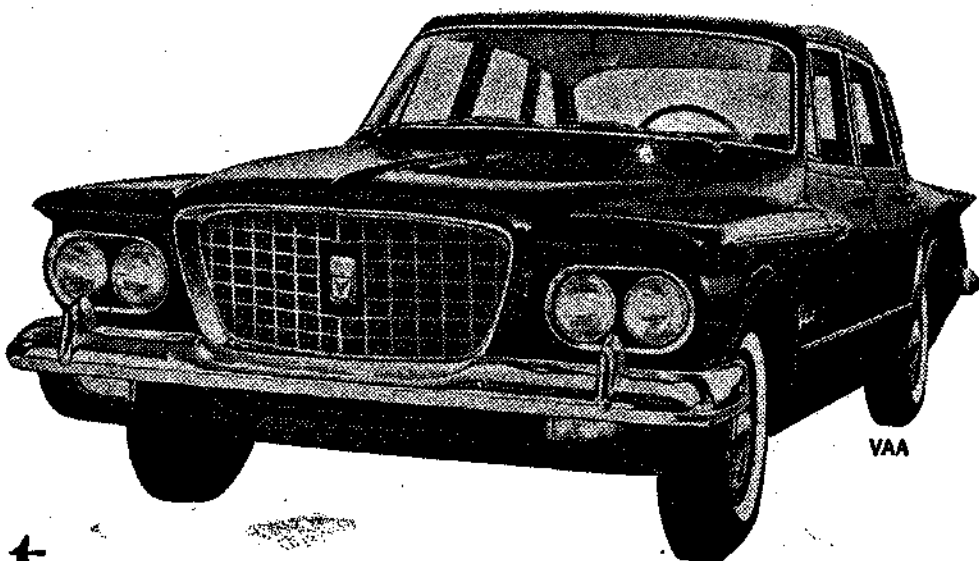

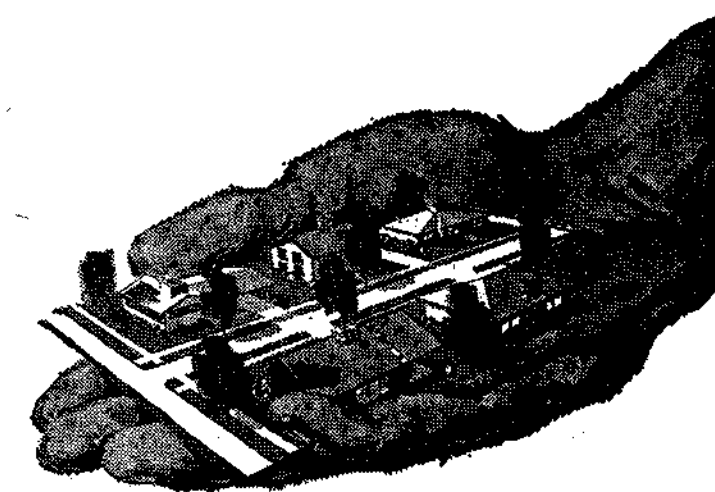

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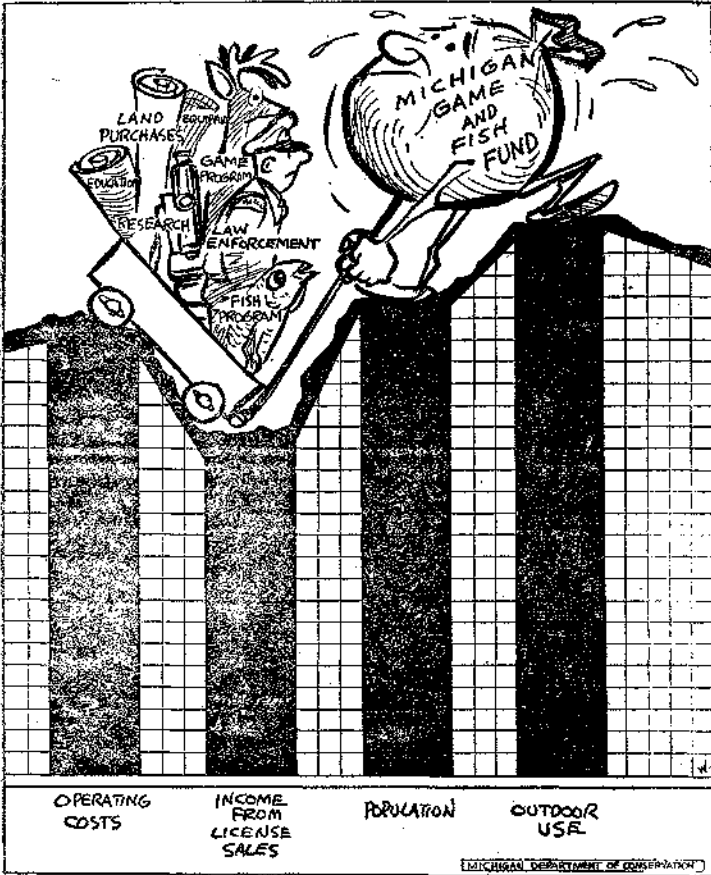

## Conservation Needs A Lift--Now!



Conservation faces an uphill journey in Michigan if it is to get back in step with the times. Boggled down by a continuing drop in hunting and fishing license revenue and flanked by zooming operating costs, many of the state's conservation programs are, at best, "spinning their wheels," unable to get back on the road to progress. Meanwhile, a growing population waits for these programs to deliver the goods for greater outdoor use. To meet this challenge, Michigan's Game and Fish Protection Fund (hunting and fishing license fees) needs more pull-power in terms of more revenue. The Conservation Commission is asking the Legislature to approve increases from \$2 to \$3 in resident fishing licenses and trout stamps and a general rod license for Great Lakes fishing to provide much of leverage needed. Without this help, conservation has only one way to go--downhill.
