## Abandon Hahn Site

# Try for New Dump Site

The Cass City Village Council abandoned plans for a dump at a site at the south village limits of Cass City and began negotiations for a new site at its regular meeting Tuesday night at the Municipal Building.

On a motion by B. A. Calka and seconded by A. N. Bigelow, trustees voted unanimously to halt all negotiations for the site on the Ed Hahn property.

Only one hope remains for a new dump for the village. The council has tentatively agreed to accept an offer to lease a plot of land owned by the children of C. R. Hunt and E. B. Schwaderer. It is an abandoned gravel pit southwest of Cass City at the railroad tracks.

The council is seeking an easement for a right-of-way through land owned by the Cass City Development Corporation to get to the property.

Any agreement reached with the Development Corporation and the landowners can be cancelled by either party at any time after sufficient notice is given, according to plans discussed at the meeting.

The council voted to abandon plans for the dump on the site owned by Ed Hahn because of the near unanimous objections of persons living in the southern section of the community.

Trustee Jerome Root Jr., who lives in the affected area, summed up the reasons for the change in plans when he said, "I don't believe a trench type dump properly operated would be a detriment in the location, but since we represent the people of Cass City and so many are against it, I feel it should be abandoned."

**Township Participation**  
Supervisor Ed Golding of Elkland Township attended the meeting. The township had agreed to pay part of the cost of maintaining the dump. Township board members favor a flat fee.

However, the council feels that the township should participate on a 50-50 basis in the cost of the dump and its operation. The new dump will be operated by covering about 10 feet of refuse with two feet of soil so that rubbish and waste are never exposed long enough to become objectionable.

## Plan Senior Activities

Primary plans for graduation plans for Cass City High School seniors have been completed.

The first of several events will be the annual trip. They leave for Deford, May 29 where they will board the SS South American for a cruise to Mackinac Island and Chicago.

They will be at the Palmer House Hotel in Chicago until Friday morning, June 2. A number of tours and special events are planned. The seniors return to Cass City by train and will be met at Inlay, Chicago.

The traditional swing-out program will be held Tuesday, June 6. The student council is arranging a program honoring the graduates at this time.

Baccalaureate services are slated at the high school auditorium Sunday evening, June 11. The Rev. Robert Searls, pastor of the Methodist Church of Cass City, will be the speaker. Music will be furnished by the band and choir.

Commencement exercises are slated Tuesday, June 13. Dr. Adolph A. Klautsch of General Motors Institute in Flint will speak.

Complete details of these events for the 95 graduating members of the class will be presented as they occur.

It is not at all certain that the proposed annexation of Deford to Cass City School District will be passed by electors in either district. There are electors in both districts who frown on the merging of the districts.

Various reasons are given for reluctance of these electors to accept the opinion of both boards of education that annexation will provide the best education at least cost for all the children in the area.

The facts are published in this issue of the Chronicle. We call attention to one that we believe to be the crux of the matter. No school can operate with less than 100 in every graduating class, according to a study made by Harvard educators.

If Deford students do not come to Cass City, our high school will fall below the accepted minimum. We urge a yes vote on all of the propositions when you go to the polls Monday. Remember, if one proposition fails to pass, the annexation is defeated.

It has been a long time since we've heard of anyone complaining about too many customers. But the Fraser Presbyterian Ladies Aid is doing just that. ## Dog Campaign To Start Again

## To Let Road Work In Tuscola County

Low bidders will be determined May 24 at Lansing for two miles of modernization, including grading and drainage structures, on Berens Road west from a point a mile west of Hemans.

Completion for the work is Sept. 1. The work is part of the biggest highway letting of 1961 which includes 46 projects in 30 counties totaling an estimated \$28 million, State Highway Commissioner John C. Mackie said.

## Hospital Chapel Completed by Local Churches

A new meditation chapel has been made available in Hills and Dales General Hospital by the churches of Cass City. Located on the ground floor, the chapel is easily accessible from the elevator and occupies a portion of presently unused space. The board of directors cooperated in making the space available and Oran Hudson, hospital administrator, provided active enthusiasm and cooperation.

Small and intimate, the chapel is designed for individual and family devotions rather than for public services of worship. Religious literature is made available for those who choose to use the chapel as a haven while a family member is undergoing surgery or at other times of crisis.

Total illumination comes from the back-lighted cross and a floor lamp. Included in the furnishings are two comfortable reading chairs, a floor lamp four straight chairs and a wall-hung literature rack. A suspended cross is back-lighted against the green drapery and a small birch altar is anchored to the wall. Two walls are of Philippine Mahogany veneering with one wall of red brick.

Cost of the project to date has been met by gifts of interested individuals. Further gifts are anticipated to provide background music when desired, as well as kneeling cushions and other aids to worship. Local firms provided all labor and materials, making large discounts in cost. Special services included: original plans, Jerome Root Jr.; crafting of the cross by Russ Leeson and wiring by Edward Baker. Mr. Root made the altar while Mary Leeson was decorating consultant and provided the drapes. M & M Plumbing and Heating created the air-handling system.

Supervising the project were Methodist minister Robert J. Searls and Presbyterian minister John Hall Fish.

It is believed that this is the only chapel in a hospital of this size in the area.

# Annexation Vote Monday

Voters will decide the fate of the annexation of the Deford School District to the Cass City District Monday in elections to be held at Novesta Town Hall and the Cass City High School Auditorium. The polls will be open from 7 a. m. to 8 p. m.

Facing the Deford voters will be three propositions, while Cass City electors will vote on two issues. A defeat of any of the measures by either district will void the annexation.

Deford electors will be asked to approve the annexation, approve a change in the tax limitation and assume the pro rata share of Cass City's bonded indebtedness.

Cass City voters will be asked to assume a pro rata share of Deford's bonded indebtedness and approve a change in the tax limitation.

All of the pros and cons of the proposed annexation were discussed at meetings called for the purpose.

Only 10 persons attended a panel discussion meeting concerning the proposed annexation of the Deford Community School District to the Cass City District Monday night at Cass City High School.

A similar meeting, held in Deford Wednesday evening, May 10, attracted an estimated 75 electors from the area.

In both meetings the questions were the same. How does the proposed annexation affect the two districts? A list of questions and the answers, as seen by the Cass City School Board, are listed in section two of today's Chronicle.

President of the Cass City School Board, Lester Ross, said Monday in a closing statement that the primary reason for the consolidation is to provide better education for children in both districts.

The questions and answers are published, board members said, to show interested electors what will happen if annexation is approved in both districts.

Board members point to impartial study that shows that any high school graduating less than 100 pupils is not efficient and that is the reason why the consolidation will be placed before voters Monday.

With 100 or over in each grade, they say, it is possible to offer such courses as advanced chemistry and mathematics, a language laboratory, two foreign languages and other courses of a similar nature that materially better any school curriculum.

### WANDERING WITH WARREN

## Space Travel Is Fascinating & Expensive

A favorite topic for conversation since last May 5 is the successful space flight of Astronaut Alan B. Shepard Jr. and what it portends. I was unable to watch this history-making event on television since I was at work; however, there was a radio in the office and I listened eagerly and prayerfully to the broadcast of the project.

When we feel like moaning and groaning about taxes (and who doesn't now and then?) we need to remember that despite the loopholes in government spending there are some extraordinary expenses of which we should be proud. For instance, that expense incurred for the flight of Astronaut Shepard that turned out to be needless since all was successful. I'm referring to all the precautionary measures enacted to take care of any mishap that might occur at any time prior to blast-off, during blast-off, and later particularly during the landing of the capsule after flight. Both men and equipment were on hand to take care of any possible emergency - and while the chance that any of the costly and complicated equipment would be needed was calculated to be something like one in a hundred, it is part of the United States military tradition (and a part, too, of our inherent beliefs) that a man in distress is worth the cost of any rescue.

It was this evaluation of a man's life that resulted in Shepard's being second to Gagarin... yet he was also first. For Gagarin, Russia's space hero who made an orbital flight, merely was a passenger while Astronaut Shepard actually controlled the capsule in which he made his "beautiful ride."

In a "few" years we may be able to make a trip to the moon.

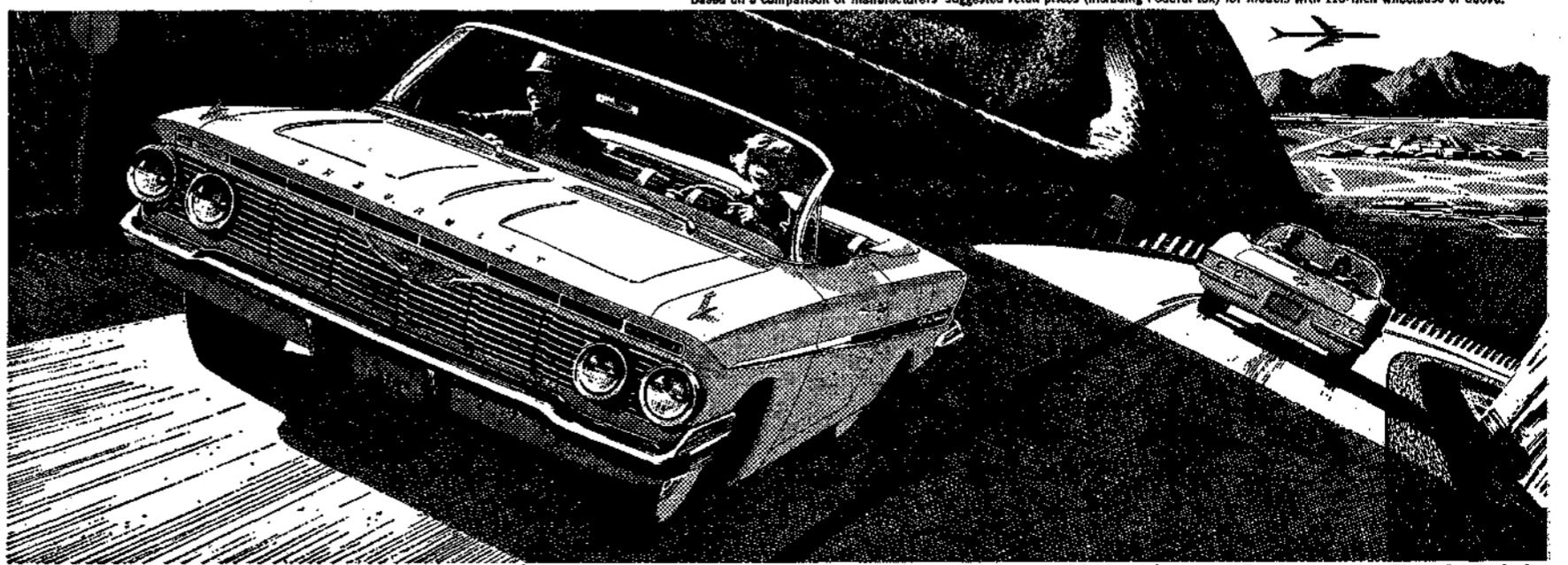

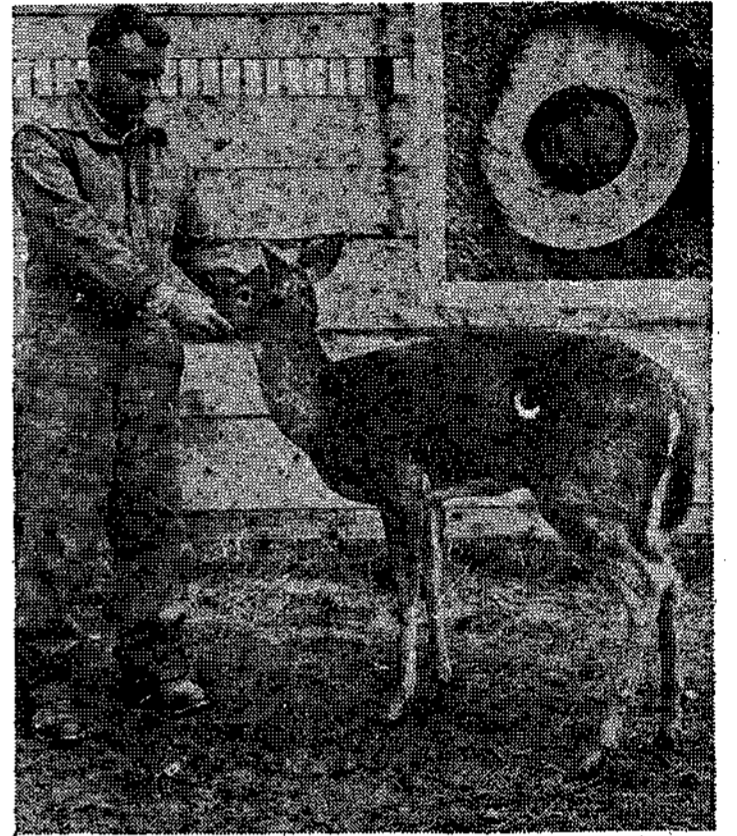

## New Look Into Deer Nutrition



Over the years, Conservation Department game men have learned a good deal about deer nutrition: what foods white-tails prefer; what combinations of feed will carry the animals through the winter; effects of malnutrition on growth and productivity. However, they still need to know about the timing of deer digestion on different foods during the winter; many deer starve although autopsies show their stomachs to be full. Recently, with the help of researchers from Michigan State University, the Department started a new study which allows biologists to literally "look into" the problem. Borrowing a technique—used on cows and other domestic animals, game men had a "window" placed in the stomach of this deer (above) to see how long it takes the animal to digest various foods at certain times of the winter. This "window" consists of a capped rubber tube (see insert) which extends from the body wall to the inside of the deer's stomach. It does not disturb the deer's normal bodily functions.— Mich. Dept. of Conservation.

A registered Holstein cow also owned by Dolan Sweeney topped the list of 113 cows which produced 65 pounds or more butterfat, with a production of 126

pounds fat (in 28 days). In second place in this class was a grade Holstein cow owned by Ben Loeffler of Reese which produced 109 pounds fat; and in third place is a registered Holstein cow owned by Clarence Merchant of Cass City which produced 108 pounds fat (in 29 days). 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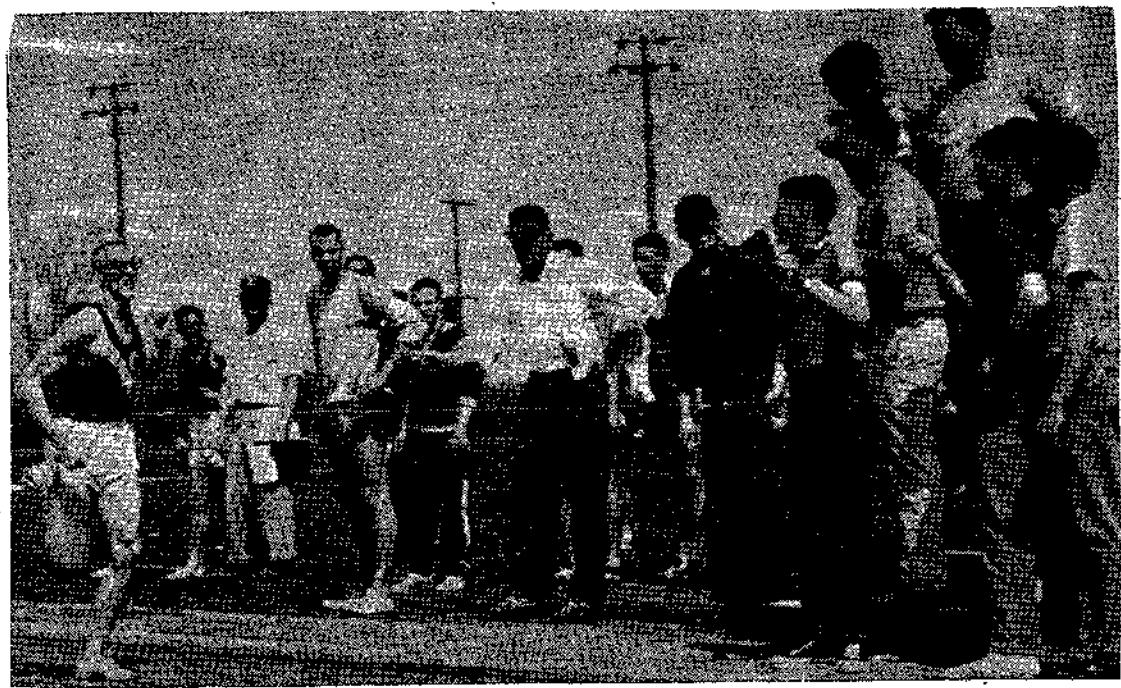

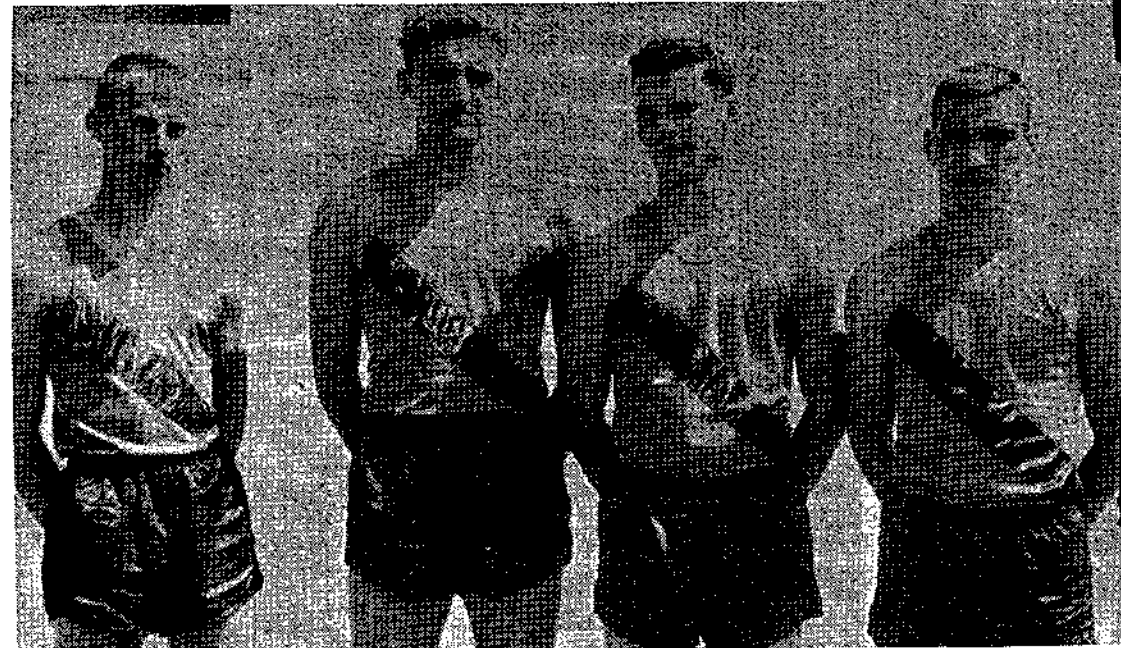

Going into the event the score was 35 1/2 all. Cass City received five points for winning the event and Pinconning four points for a second-place finish. 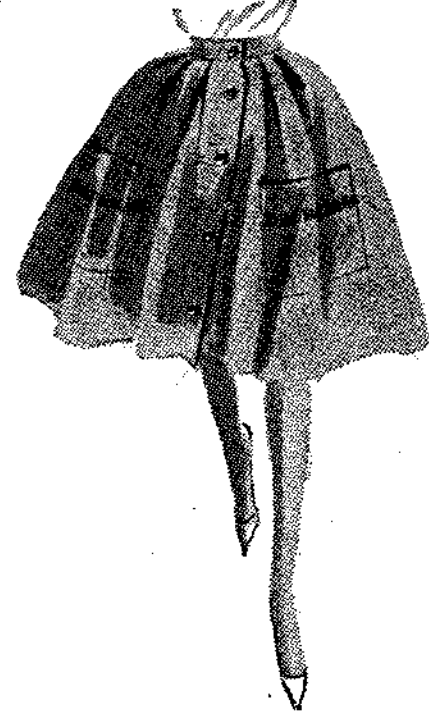

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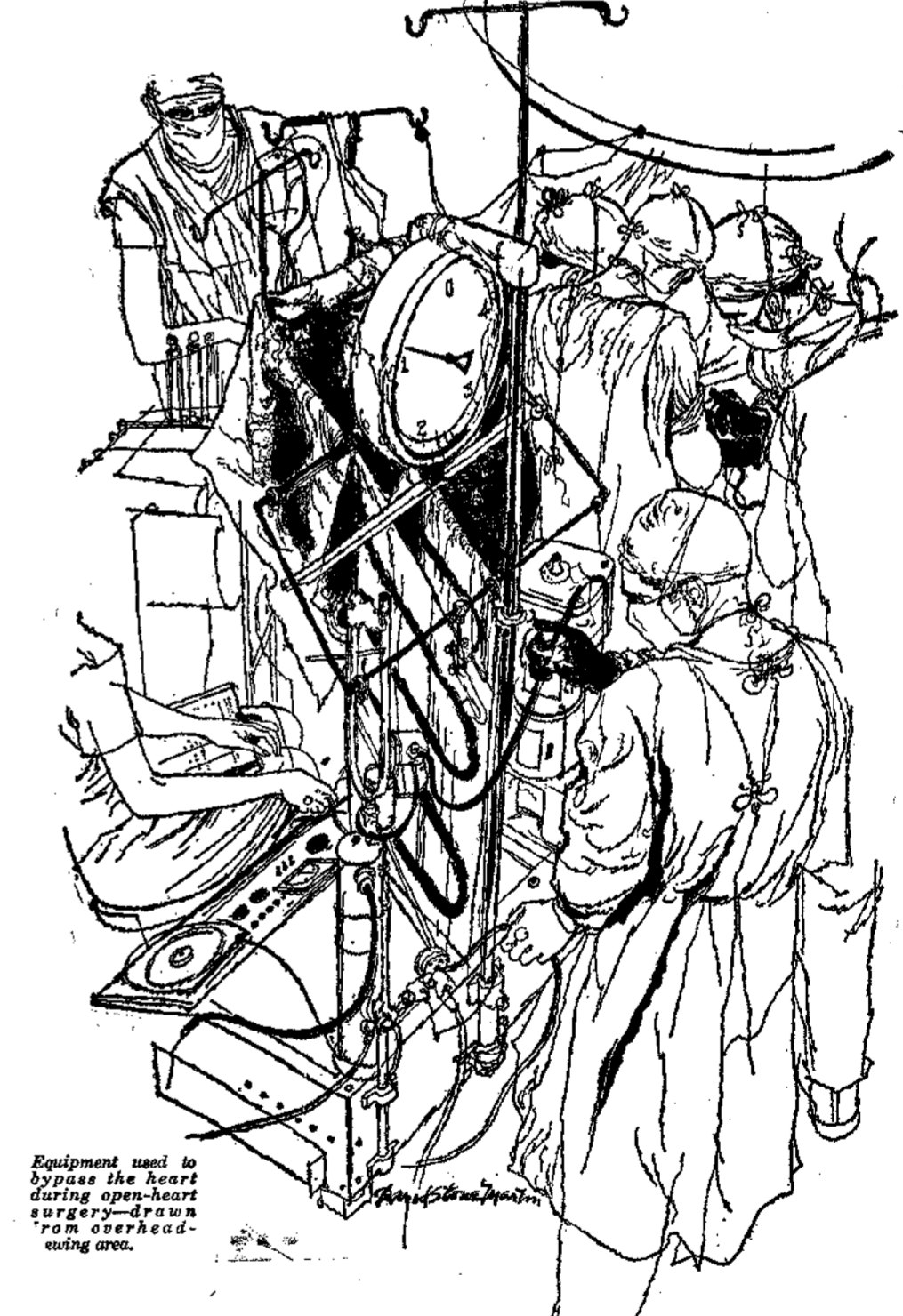

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## Face Fly Costly To County Farmers

Face flies are becoming more of a troublesome pest to Michigan dairy farmers each year. Last year we really began to notice them, states Don R. Kebler, county extension agent in agriculture.

The face fly looks like it will be the farmers' biggest fly headache this summer, according to the United States Department of Agriculture.

Face flies will usually start appearing in Michigan about June 1. They continue to be a problem until September.

Cows bothered by face flies lose weight and milk production drops.

It is believed the face fly carries the germs which cause pink eye in cattle.

The face fly resembles a large housefly. It bothers cattle by feeding on moisture around the eyes, from the lips, and in and around the nostrils. It also feeds from any open cuts on the animal.

As far as is known, the face fly breeds only in manure.

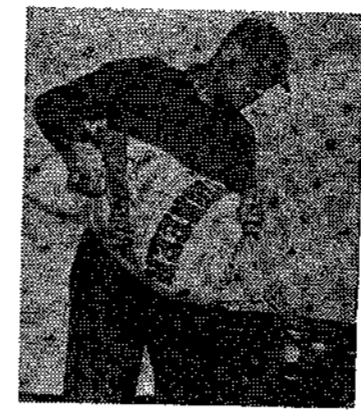
The USDA has recently approved the use of a 2 per cent DDVP syrup which is a corn sugar salve. Farmers should spread this salve on the animal's face for a period of 10 to 14 days. After that, continue treatment only as needed.

Also recommended for use is a mixture of 6/100 to 8/100 per cent pyrethrins plus 1 per cent piperonyl butoxide and 4/10 MGK repellent 326 in highly refined medicinal oil.

This mixture should be brushed or swabbed on the face of the animal daily.

Farmers should start treatment as soon as the flies begin to appear.

Farmers must be careful in using any of these mixtures. Make sure that the label is read before using the product. Care must be taken to see that milk does not come in contact with any chemicals which might contaminate it.

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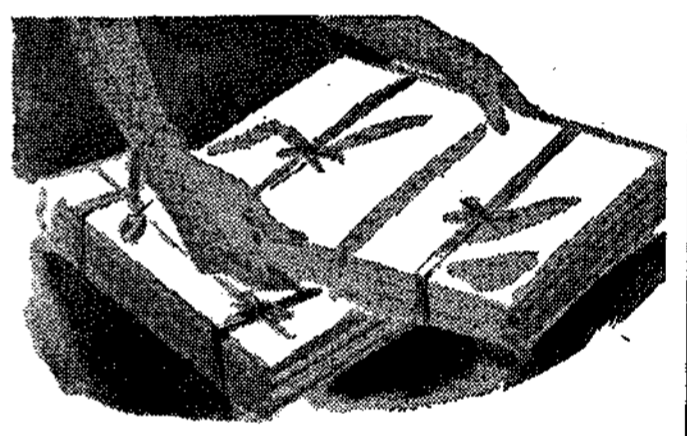

A. All students attending Kingston High School at the present time may continue there until graduation and the Cass City District will pay their tuition. 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## Feed Grain Program Deadline June 1

Farmers who have reasonably earned under the feed grain program should give the program some serious thought before passing it up, said Alfred Ballweg, county extension director.

To date approximately 500 corn growers in Tuscola county have signed up. Many of these farmers have made their decision on such facts as acreage payments compared to costs of producing an acre of corn. Figures available from farm account studies by Michigan State University reveal that costs per acre for seed - fertilizer tillage, chemicals, labor, machinery, etc., run in the neighborhood of \$40.00 per acre. These more or less fixed costs of producing an acre of corn should be weighed with the income opportunities under the program. It is an assured payment.

For a good number of farmers, per acre payments are low. For many of these they can do as well or better by staying out of the program. However, there are still a good number of farms not as yet signed up that have, generally speaking, good per acre payments.

In visiting with some farmers, according to Ballweg, he has found that they are against the program because they do not fully understand its application to their own farm.

Your County ASC Committee has approved a number of conservation land uses for the cropland removed from corn production. A good legume cover crop might be worth \$10.00 per acre for soil improvement, said Ballweg.

With favorable weather, many farmers will be busy getting their corn acreage planted but before making the final decision not to participate, be sure you have the complete picture of how the program will apply to your own farm. Once the sign-up date, June 1, is over, it will be too late.

## Agent's Corner

Spring has really come - asparagus is coming up - at least mine is. Fresh asparagus has a short season, but it is so good while it lasts. The first fresh asparagus in your stores arrives from California, then very shortly the Michigan home-grown asparagus is here.

Asparagus is harvested by snapping off the stalks, or cutting them off. When asparagus is snapped off, it "snaps" at a tender spot. This means when you buy "snapped asparagus", the whole stalk is tender. You have nothing to throw away. Snapped asparagus simply needs washing and cooking.

If asparagus is harvested by cutting, the stalks are usually cut close to the ground and cut asparagus stalks may have some white or light green color at the bottom. The white or light green part of the stalk is usually tough or woody and you will need to cut it off and throw it away. It is waste.

What does it add up to? Cost for a pound of snapped asparagus will, no doubt, be greater than the cost for a pound of cut asparagus. But when you compare the cost of an edible pound, you will probably find they are the same.

For tops in flavor choose plump, crisp, tender stalks with close compact tips. Long spindly stalks are apt to be tough and lacking in flavor. Look for a deep green or bluish-green color in the tips. Asparagus is very perishable and is best when used right away. Keep refrigerated until ready to use. Wash just before using for moist asparagus has a short life. Cook it quickly in a small amount of water and serve at once. It can be cooked in a bunch, tied loosely. Stand the bunch in a kettle with boiling water two-thirds of the length of the stalks. Salt, cover and cook quickly. Or, break tips from stalk and keep separate. Break remaining stalks in pieces and cook in boiling water about 10 minutes. Lay tips on stalks and cook until tender, about 5 minutes.

Asparagus is so good so many ways, fresh, cooked with butter and seasoning. On toast, smothered in scalded cream. Cold, in salads, in soups or served with sauces, such as cheese, hollandaise, vinaigrette, butter, mace or nutmeg.

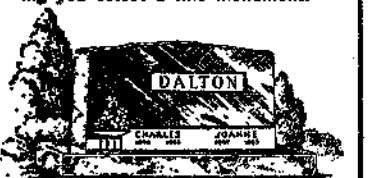

## New Campsites at Sleeper State Park

Campers, picnickers, bathers and others will find some welcome additions at a number of Michigan's heavily-used and newer state parks this year. Although construction work has not begun under the permit-bonding program pending legislative action, essential improvements have been made by the Conservation Department to accommodate more users with better facilities.

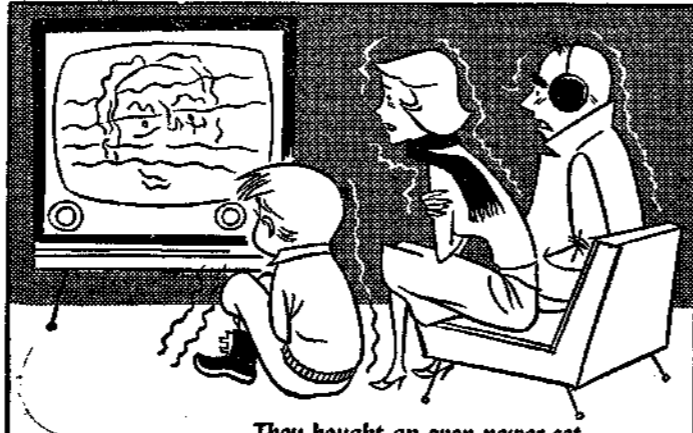
If you were among some 147,000 campers turned away in 1960 because of a lack of facilities, it should be cheering to learn that 765 new campsites are ready to serve approximately 140,000 additional visitors at these parks.

Upper Peninsula: Fayette, 60; Muskallonge Lake, 90; Porcupine Mountains, 2 (outpost); and

Van Riper, 32. Northern Lower Peninsula: Bay City, 50; Benzie, 25; Harrisville, 80; Higgins Lake, 25; Interlochen, 80; Muskegon, 50; Orchard Beach, 10; and Silver Lake, 20. Southern Lower Peninsula: Proud Lake, 45; Lakeport, 45; and Sleeper, 70.

At Holly recreation area, a new campground has been developed with 155 sites to replace the old temporary campground on Wildwood Lake which had 76 sites.

New or improved sewage systems have paved the way for these additions at Harrisville, Higgins Lake, Interlochen, Silver Lake and Lakeport parks. Campgrounds at Brimley, Wilderness and Gogebic Lake parks also have new sewage systems.

# Special Education Can Help the Blind

The American Foundation for the Blind estimates there are 820,000 blind persons in the United States. Of this number, 10 per cent are under twenty years of age and 50 per cent are over sixty-five. Blind and partially seeing children can be served by a qualified special teacher.

Partially seeing children have such marked visual difficulties that even after all medical and optical help has been provided, they are still unable to profit from many of the educational opportunities and experiences provided for children with normal vision. For classification purposes, these children have a visual acuity of 20/70 or less in the better eye after correction. They have some remaining sight so that they may use sight as their major channel of learning. The term 20/70 means that the person can recognize objects at 20 feet that a normal seeing person can recognize at 70 feet. Blind children, despite medical care and the best corrective measures, have such limited vision that they cannot use it as their major channel of learning. The legal definition of blindness is a visual acuity of 20/200 or less in the better eye after correction. In simpler terms, a person is said to have visual acuity of 20/200 if at a distance of 29 feet he can recognize symbols and objects which a person with normal vision can recognize at a distance of 200 feet.

Children with eye problems which necessitated referral for care, numbered about one in four in the elementary school group (approximately 8.5 million). Partially seeing children numbered about one in 500, both in the pre-school and school-age group (an estimated 68,000). Blind children numbered about one in 4,000 in the pre-school group (an estimated 5,800) and one in 5,000 in

the school-age group (an estimated 6,600).

Partially seeing children should be helped to use their remaining sight as the main channel of learning. Special materials, adjustments, procedures and equipment will be needed to help each one use the vision he has to his best advantage. Children classed as educationally blind require an approach to learning entirely different from that used by the partially seeing child. Blind children must learn to use new tools such as braille reading and writing and how to exploit the senses of hearing and touch. However, it is estimated that less than 15 per cent of the blind read braille well enough to make reading a pleasure.

Talking Books have been developed for the blind. The Talking Book opened up to the blind a new medium — reading by sound. These are books which have been recorded on phonograph records and are made available to the blind. The books to be recorded are selected by the Library of Congress with the advice of a

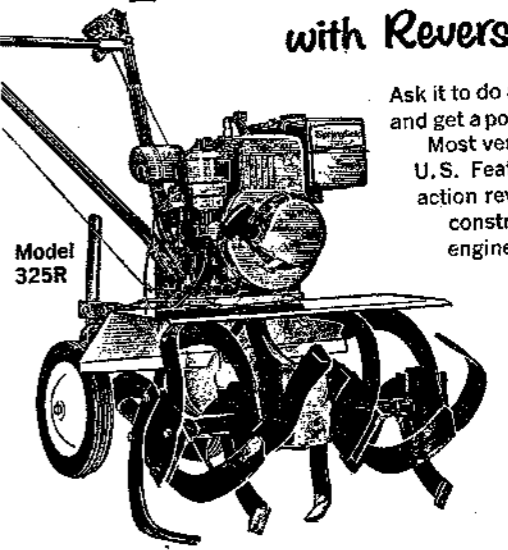
