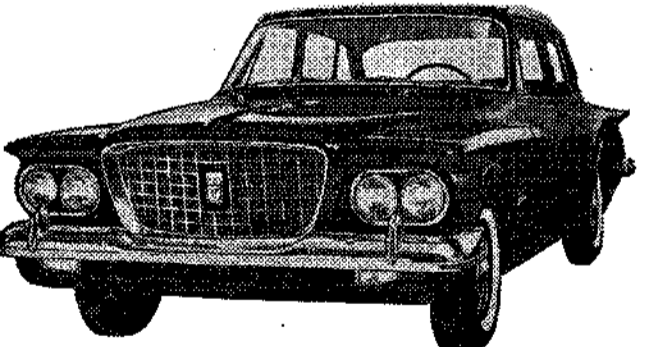

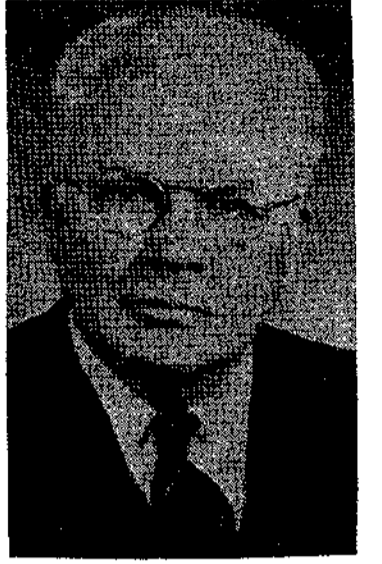

Loeffler Herd Leads DHIA Tests

The registered Holstein herd owned by Ben Loeffler of Reese produced an average of 62 pounds butterfat, leading all herds which produced 30 pounds or more butterfat for the month, according to Alfred Ballweg, county extension director. Placing second in this class was the registered Holstein herd of V. J. and Clare Carpenter of Cass City, in third place was the registered Holstein herd of Dolan Sweeney, Uby. Other dairymen whose herds produced an average of over 40 pounds for the month were: Harold Blaylock and Marvin Rupperecht, Vassar; Clarence Merchant, Cass City; Quibro Farm, Caro; Don Koepfen, Cass City; Bruce Ruggies and Sons, Kingston; Ronald Hampshire, Deford; Clayton Rohlfis and Sons, Fairgrove; Norman Baur and Son, Unionville; Howard Loomis and Sons, Gagetown; Donald Stilson, Cass City; Max Cooper, Cass City; Lawrence Bublitz, Fairgrove; Carl Bauer, Reese, and Henry Hohman, Vassar.

In the 65-pound cow class, a grade Holstein cow owned by Ronald Opperman of Vassar led the parade of 132 cows in this class, with a production of 108 pounds butterfat (in 29 days). 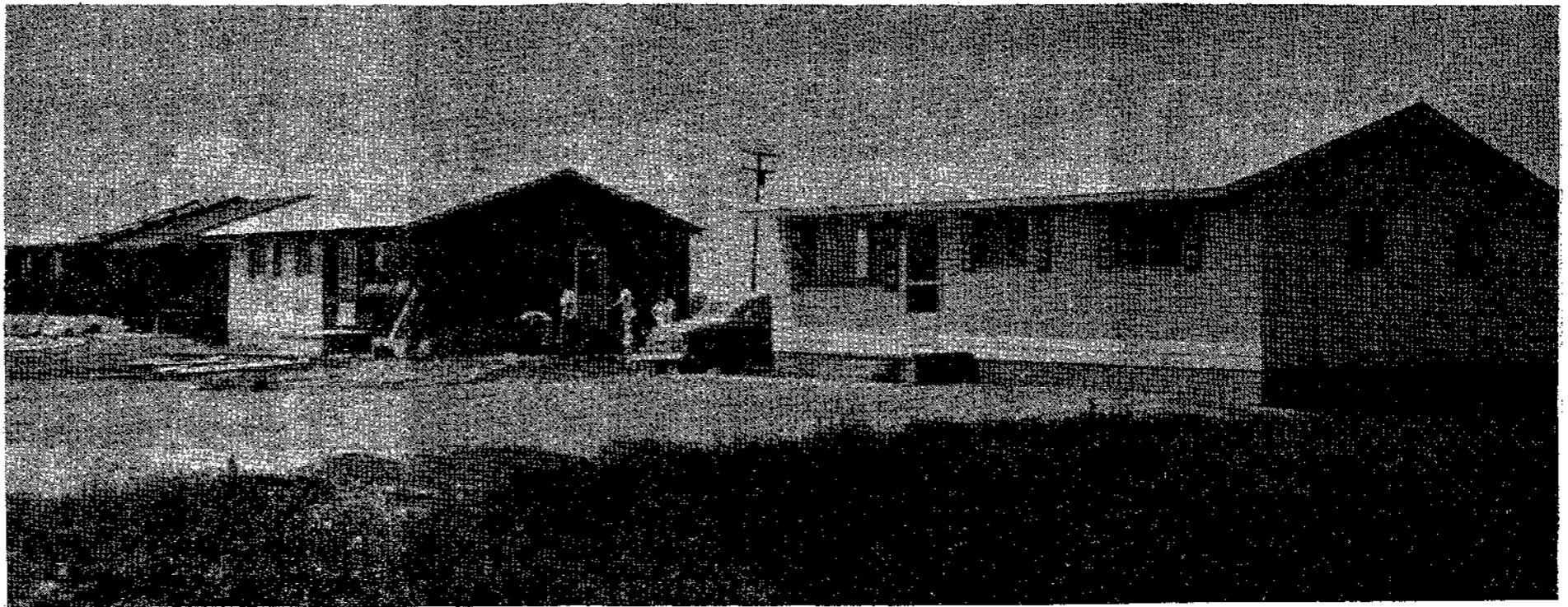

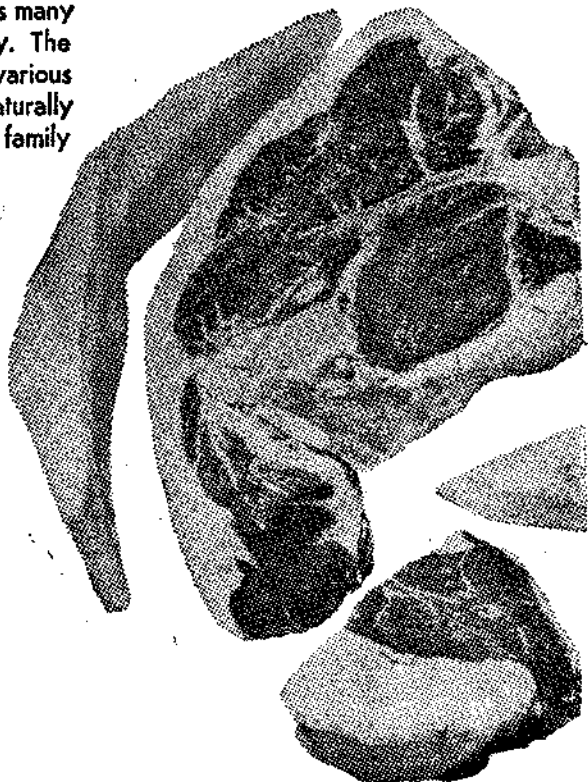

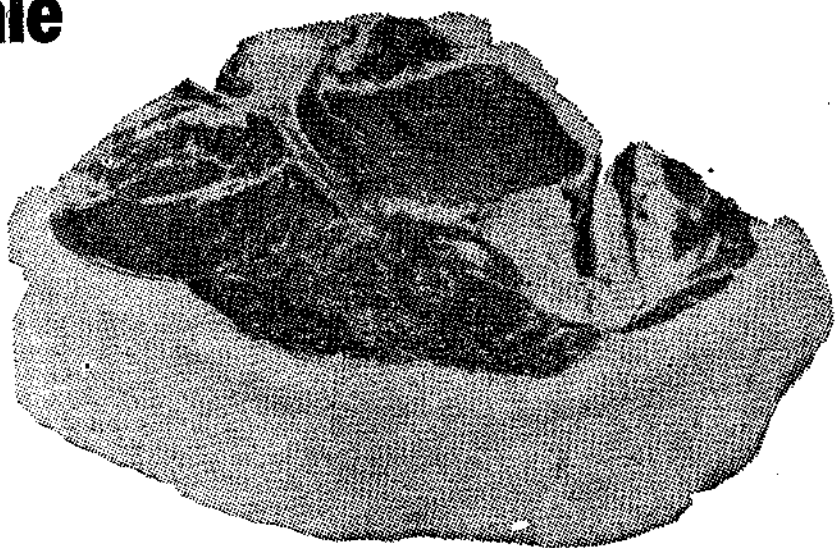

Tourist Business Will Grow In Michigan

"If you seek a pleasant peninsula, look about you."

So says the Michigan motto, in Latin, inscribed on the great seal of the state, on the state flag and many other places. This is more than a Michigan Week promotional phrase, and it could be the greatest key to what the Water Wonderland has to offer her citizens.

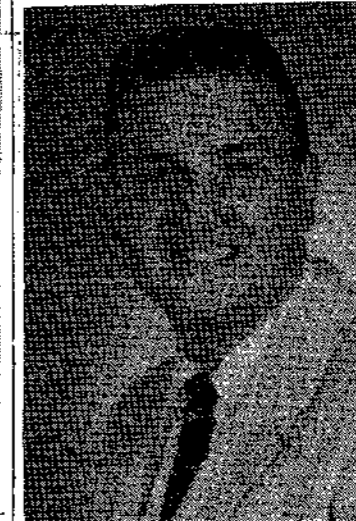
