According to Warren Wood. present owner of the building and operator of the Rexall dragstore, the hotel closed when Tuscola county and the state went dry, November 1916.

Mr. Wood's father and uncle, Dentist Dr. P. A. Schenck, bought the building in 1916 or 1917 and moved their drugstore and dentist office there in 1918.

After the hotel was sold the third floor was used as a lodge <sup>an</sup> hall for the local IOOF meetings. <sup>ne</sup> But there's nothing up there now except storage space and the carpenters who raise dust as they climb to the tower above. Mr. Wood says he hopes to have the tower down by the end of the summer.

#### Spotting Site

Built originally as an ornament, the tower was used during World War II as a site for spotting planes. Mrs. C. M. Wallace said she was requested to organize the s. spotters by Walter Mann but she did not know what government, state or federal, made the request.

The tower was staffed 24 hours at day, seven days a week. with Concluded on page six.

Now hear this, boaters: All hands on deck for a few simple, basic Rules of the Road in addition to those shown above. When overtaking another boat you must keep clear of the craft you're passing. Boats coming out of slips into open water, or leaving berths at piers and wharves, have no rights until they are entirely clear. Fishing boats have right of way whether they are anchored or underway with nets, lines or trawls out. Take it easy when passing a fishing party. Under Michigan law, water skiing, water or underway with nets, lines or trawls out. Take it easy when passing a fishing party. Under Michigan law, water skiing, water sledding, and surfboarding by boat are prohibited from one hour after suaset to one hour before sunrise. One last reminder before shoving off: Written rules give you certain rights, but don't insist upon them when it will lead to confusion or possibly an accident. Mr. Khrushchev knows that American agricultural efficiency is the cornerstone of our standard of living. He knows, too, that in the struggle between freedom and communism, food is ultimately more important than missiles. In spite of intensive efforts, however, critical food shortages still exist in Iron Curtain Countries; and Khrushchev himself admits that the Soviets lag far behind the United States in agricultural efficiency. American farmers represent only 9% of our population, yet they produce abundant food for all of us. In Russia, on the other hand, 45% of the population must work the land in order to grow barely enough food for the country's needs. What's more, thanks to farm efficiency, our food bill takes only  $\frac{1}{16}$  of our income. The average Russian worker must spend 1/2 his income just to feed his family. The difference in remaining income-what remains to be spent after food, clothing and shelter-makes the difference between our standard of living and Russia's.

American farmers are few in number but their contribution is great: to our standard of living and to our prestige in the eyes of the world.
