Committee Tells Why More Operating Funds Needed

EDITOR'S NOTE: This article tells the reasons why a group of citizens have banded together to try to secure an additional two mills for operating the school. It was written by Arthur Holmberg in conjunction with the Save Our School Committee.

The Save Our School Committee has had several requests that it spell out in greater detail just what it is trying to save. Many people feel it would be helpful to their own thinking concerning the school millage election if they had added information about the areas in which the committee feels that regrettable sacrifices are being made. In this article, the committee seeks to point up some of the services where it feels that the present financial pinch will produce particularly unfortunate curtailment.

One of these is counseling. The importance of adequate counseling service in today's schools is being increasingly recognized by both parents and educators. A high school of Cass City's enrollment should, by all accepted standards, have at least two full time counselors. Until last year it had none. Then a half time counselor was provided, with plans to increase this to a full time person this year. As a part of this improvement, a much needed counseling office was made available. Now, due to lack of funds, it will be necessary to return the counselor to a half day teaching program and to reduce the counseling time to the same inadequate level as before. A survey of schools of Cass City's size in this region reveals that many of them have had counseling service five years

or more and that most of them have at least a full time worker in this most vital field.

At present, Cass City High School has virtually no physical education program. Meager provisions for this service have long been criticized by the accrediting agencies. The difficulty stems partly from a lack of physical facilities, such as lockers, shower rooms and gym space. However, last year a modest beginning was made. A part time girls' physical education teacher was secured and a requirement of one year of physical education credit was set up for both boys and girls. By way of contrast, most schools require at least two years of such credit, many have a continuous program through both junior and senior high school. Here again retrenchment was necessary. The instructor was released and the new requirement will have to be lifted.

Many schools in the area offer an extensive Art program. One has two Art teachers. Another offers both Art and also work in related Crafts such as Ceramics. A few years ago, Cass City had one full time Art teacher, shared by the elementary and the high school. Last year this was cut to a half time teacher who devoted one hour each to the lower grades, the junior high and the senior high. This year there will likely be none. About 30 high school students with an interest in Art will be denied the opportunity to develop this interest. About the same number of junior high students were served each day as a part of a rotating activities program. This will also disappear with no present indication as to what will take its place.

Transportation is another vital area of school services which has felt the effect of diminishing funds. At present, of the entire fleet of school busses, no fewer than five are 1955 models or older One 10-year-old bus, needed for operation when school opens, needs such extensive repair that the board decided at its last meeting it would be folly to spend such a sum on a vehicle of that age. Since excessive repair bills go hand in hand with over-aged busses, many feel it would be wise to replace at least two busses yearly for some time. Instead, it is right now impossible even to buy one. Parents who commonly consider trading in the family car after two to three years of service can well appreciate the problems that arise when approximately half of the school busses are twice that age

Beyond these more crucial needs, school authorities point to a long list of items that would need additional funds. These include such things as stage equipment, band uniforms, an asphalt play space for the elementary school and many others. Additional teaching staff will likely remain wishful thinking even though several elementary rooms will crowd toward the 40 mark and the same will be true of many of the freshman high school classes. Special help in remedial work is needed at all grade levels

What is happening in Cass City is nothing unusual. Many communities are experiencing the same problem. Its causes are many. As in all areas, costs are increasing. A bulletin of the Department of Public Instruction shows that the cost per child has increased about \$20 a year during the past 13 years. Thus, while it cost an average of \$584 for the education of a child during the past year, the corresponding figures for 1955 and 1950 were \$443 and \$278.

As has been shown repeatedly, every attempt has been made in the past to keep the school tax rate in Cass City as low as possible. Many people do not realize that the Shop-Ag addition of some years ago was made possible by a building and site fund accummulated over several years from general funds, without recourse to bonded indebtedness.

The Cass City school district has enjoyed, and still continues to enjoy, a school tax rate of a comparatively low figure. While the total millage for school purposes in this district in 1960-61 was 2.75, many districts in our immediate area raised 15 to 20 mills. Millage in some school districts in the state rose as high as 25 to 30. These have not been assumed because people in these areas wanted higher taxes but because they were convinced that they were needed to provide an adequate educational program for their

The Save Our School Committee is confident that Cass City school district's parents and patrons will, after a fair consideration of the school's needs, agree that the modest two mill increase sought in the August 28 election is urgently needed.

Watch for Disease In Sanilac Beans

"What We Aren't Told About

Abnormal appearances of bean plants or pods often look like actual bean diseases. The usual diseases like white mold, bacterial blight, mosaic and anthracnose are easily identified, believes Don Kebler, county extension agent in

However, with the introduction of the Sanilac bean, a natural bronzing of the leaves is noticed and it looks something like the bean rust disease. This bronzing of the leaves on Sanilac beans loes not affect the growth, production, maturity or quality of the bean plant or seed

What causes this bronzing is easily explained, remarks Kebler. Once the pods are set and start to mature on the Sanilac bean plant, the plant starts to die back. This bronzing is just the gradual dying out of leaf tissue areas as the ripening process progresses In a way this dying back may be an advantage as the leaf canopy is reduced thus allowing pods to dry up quicker from the sun and wind. This certainly will reduce the chances of white mold accumulation which generally occurs on plants with rank foliage.

Sun scald is being observed on bean leaves and pods this year and at first glance it looks like blight especially on the pods. This scald does not appear to effect the seed in the pods like blight will do.

Positive identification of bean diseases can be made at the county extension agent's office, remarks Kebler.

Of the many summer vege tables, probably none is more popular than sweet com. Of course we get good corn throughout a large part of the year. However even as good as the shipped-in corn tastes in the fall, winter and spring months, it does not compare with the succulent goodness of the home-grown crop you wil find during mid-summer.

The local market gardener does not have any secrets not shared by distant growers, but he is nearby. The secret for serving the best corn is to cut the time from the garden to the kettle. As a child, you may remember your mother or grandmother having the water boiling before venturing out into the corn patch. Perhaps she did not know that natural corn sugar begins to change to starch within 20 minutes. Most of us do not live that close to a corn patch any more. However, during the local season, with so much of the sweet corn hydrocooled in the fields and iced in stores to reduce loss of eating quality, we are getting much nearer to a good taste-telling

sense of fresh picked corn. When you get the corn home, use as soon as possible. However, if you must store for awhile, put it in the of igerator. Leave the husks on and wrap in a damp cloth until rives to cook, if the corn is husked, wrap in moistureproof material to keep the kernels from drying out.

The school has already had to cut down on some programs. Requirements of the North Central Association of Accredited Colleges and Schools in some cases have had to be cut back or eliminated. Costs on the repair of old busses (some are over 10 years old) make it impractical to run them-yet money is not available for the purchase of new busses.



The 2 mills will put us back in the black. Even with the cutting down on many activities and delaying the purchase of needed equipment we are heading for a deficit estimated at over \$19,000. With passage of the 2 mill levy August 28, all the programs needed cannot be put into operation. But the 2 mills will give us a balanced budget and a step in the right direction to give us the schools we want, need and have.
