Visitor's viewpoint

For 21 years I have never, outside of my maternal grandmother's family, heard of the name O'Dell. Then I came to Cass City. I would like to know if I am related to any of the area's O'Dells. Grandma's maiden name was Mary Elizabeth O'Dell. Her father's name was Lemuel. I don't know where they originally came from. They always lived around Bath, Laingsburg, Shaftsburg and Eaton Rapids.

Also there are nine Wilsons listed in the Cass City phone directory. Grandma married William Warren Wilson, who came from the same area as she did. His father's name was Warren William.

I'm probably related to a good many people in this area though they may not claim me. Still I'd like to know what the link is, if there is any, and where the original families came from.

Anybody got any ideas?

Sandy Legatz from Caro, last year's summer reporter, dropped in Aug. 12 and asked if I would like to go to Beaver Island with her. We spent the rest of the afternoon driving to Charlevoix to catch the ferry.

We missed it.

So I figured we could spend the night at Camp Huntington on Walloon Lake where a friend is working. However, a call to the camp revealed it was filled.

Then we thought we could sleep in the car. But the wind was blowing and we were tired. Next morning, after a night in a \$7 motel room, we found out that the Emerald Isle ferry which left at 9 a.m. would not return until 12 midnight.

There was a celebration on the island, sort of a home-coming called the August Dinner.

Everyone born on the island returned to eat, dance, renew old friendships and drink.

When we arrived at noon we rented a car and toiled off down the side of the island to go swimming at a secluded public park and cook our dinner of roasted corn, hot dogs, coffee and fried potatoes over an open, smoking fire.

We may not have been too good at building fires but that corn was delicious.

About 6 p.m. we headed around the rest of the island. It's really rather desolate. The timber is heavy and beaches deserted, even on home-coming. The population of St. James is about 387. It's the only town left on the island; the other, Nomad, is completely deserted.

They have a good airport on the west center of the island. Many people charter planes to bring them across the 32 miles from the mainland in 15 minutes. Otherwise it's three hours by ferry. Also, some of the permanent families have their own planes.

We had a superb time watching the sun go down behind a Coast Guard lighthouse and eating the small, sweet raspberries that grow wild. Our chilly swim made us feel relaxed and wonderfully pleased with the world.

After turning in our car after dark, we went to get some coffee and wait for the night ferry. We found that there was no place open that served coffee and that the ferry didn't leave until 1 a.m.

So we drank what was handy to steel ourselves against the three-hour boat trip and passed the time pleasantly enough.

Arriving in Charlevoix about 4 a.m. we unlocked the cold car, threw in our sandy things and headed back to the Thumb.

I made it to work about 10 a.m. Monday -- tired.

It was a good trip, though. Beaver Island, as far as I know, was settled by a partisan group of Mormons.

King Strang, the head of the sect, set up the only independent kingdom in the U. S. The Irish fishermen around Charlevoix tried to chase him off but didn't have luck on their side.

When Strang was killed, the rest of the Mormons took off for Wisconsin and then to Salt Lake City.

The Irish moved in and lived by commercial fishing until the lamprey eel killed off most of the fish.

Now Beaver Island is a resort area: a green jewel lying west of the mainland bulge above Petoskey.

It's worth a visit anytime: home-coming or not.

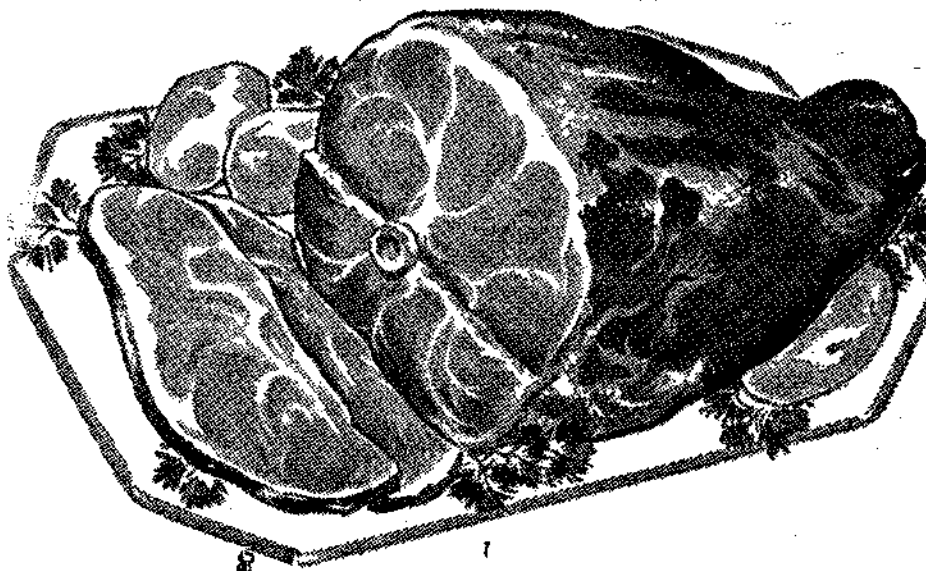

The school has already had to cut down on some programs. Requirements of the North Central Association of Accredited Colleges and Schools in some cases have had to be cut back or eliminated. Costs on the repair of old busses (some are over 10 years old) make it impractical to run them--yet money is not available for the purchase of new busses.



The 2 mills will put us back in the black. Even with the cutting down on many activities and delaying the purchase of needed equipment we are heading for a deficit estimated at over \$19,000. With passage of the 2 mill levy August 28, all the programs needed cannot be put into operation. But the 2 mills will give us a balanced budget and a step in the right direction to give us the schools we want, need and have.
