The Cass City Women's Study Club met at the home of Mrs. John Sandham Tuesday, October 24, with 21 members and five guests present.

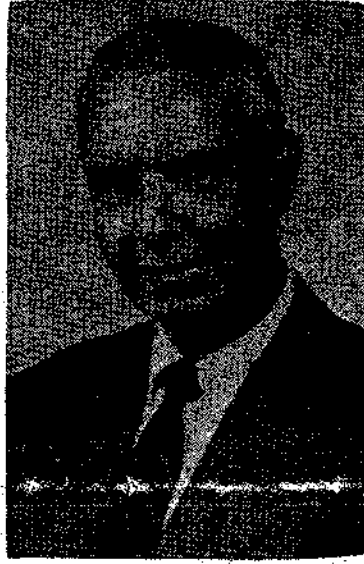
Guest speaker was Mrs. Robert Reich, Unionville, whose topic was the problem of the retarded child. Tuscola County has over 1,200 retarded children and between 300-400 are of school age. Approximately 84 per cent are educable, and can be taught skills. Another 13 per cent can be taught self care while only three per cent require hospital care all their lives.

Mr. Patch, who spoke from experience because of a retarded son, stated that there are no tax-supported schools in the State and education depends on the parents' financial condition and on charity.

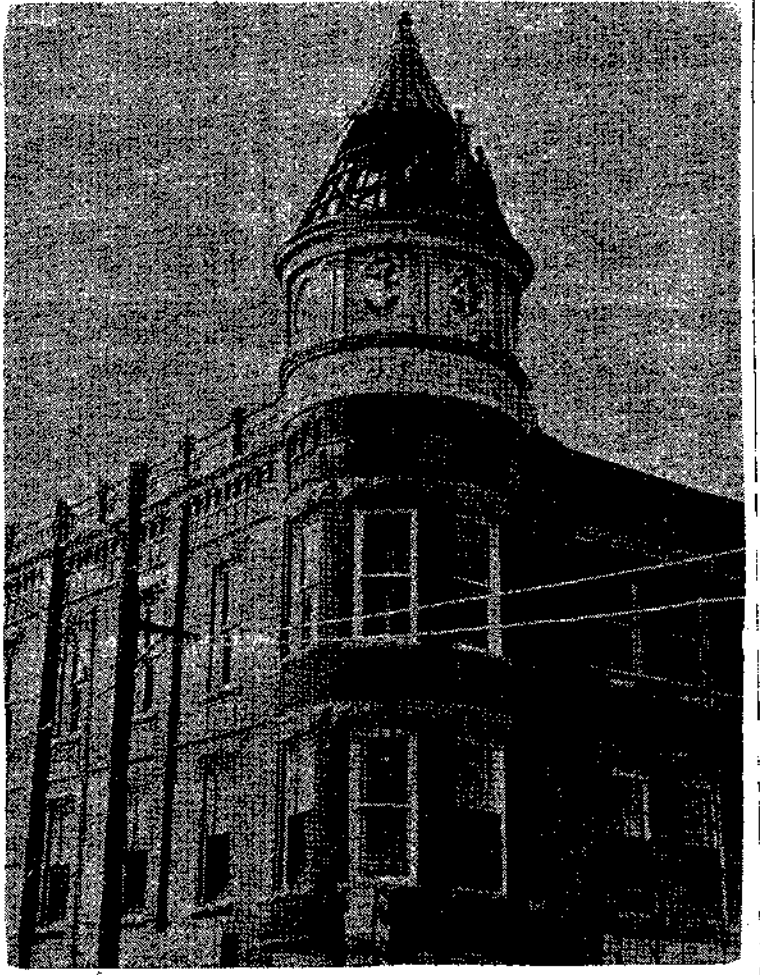
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### Tree Dedicated To Zonta Club's Charter President

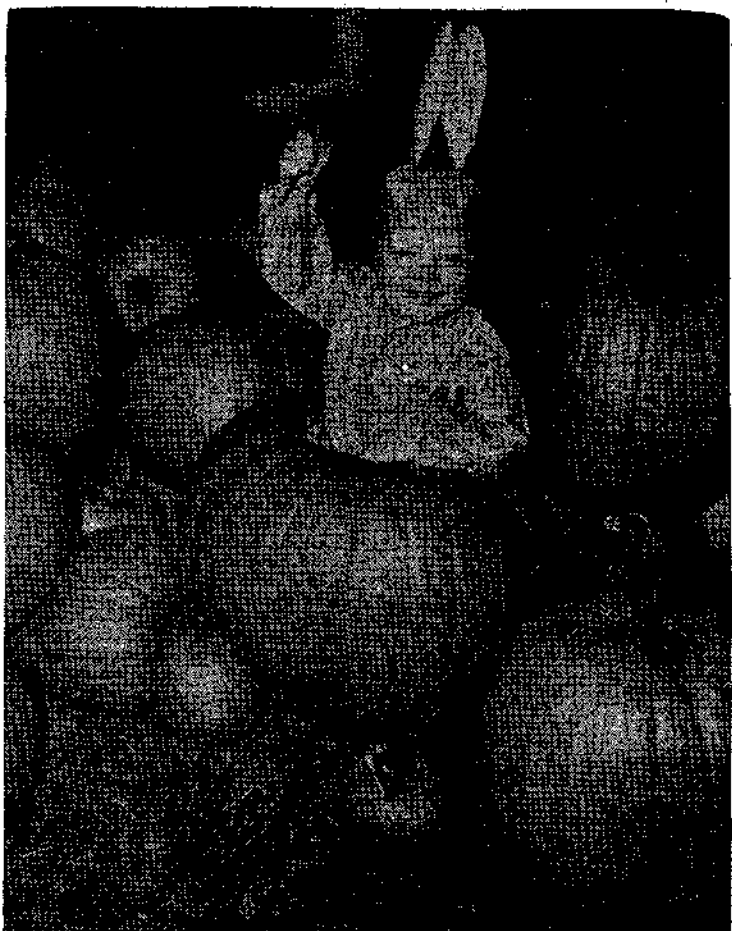

### Owendale Child Killed in Crash

An eight-year-old Owendale boy was killed shortly before noon Saturday in a two-car accident at the intersection of Rescue and Notter Roads, a mile and a half south of Owendale.

The boy, Mark Ricker, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Ricker, Owendale, was thrown from a car driven by his mother and pinned beneath the rear axle after the car had collided with another driven by James M. Houser, 21, Warren. He was dead on admittance to Scheurer Hospital, Pigeon. Mark was a student at Owendale School.

Huron County Coroner Alden A. MacAlpine said death resulted from internal injuries. The accident was investigated by Huron County Sheriff Merritt R. McBride. It has not been decided whether any action will be taken against either driver.

Mrs. Ricker was taken to the hospital for treatment of shock and cuts on the forehead. Houser escaped injury but two passengers in his vehicle were hurt. Robert Zak, 25, Warren, suffered chest injuries and Ronald Langley, 21, Highland Park, knee injuries. All have been released from the hospital.

According to a report filed by Sheriff McBride, the Ricker car was going west on Rescue Road and the Houser car south on Notter Road. A corn field at the intersection limited vision. Both cars were demolished.

Mark, born December 22, 1952, is survived by his parents and two brothers, John and Kitridge Ricker. Also surviving are his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Norman L. Wales, Owendale.

Final rites were held Tuesday at 2:00 p.m. in the Owendale Methodist Church by Rev. Fred Werth. Burial was in Grant Township Cemetery.

### Judge Graham Asks County to Hold Judgment

Judge Henderson Graham, Caro Probate Court Judge, faced with possible disciplinary action from the Michigan Supreme Court, issued a statement to the people of Tuscola County in an interview Tuesday, October 24.

Judge Graham is charged with allegedly seeking to induce a court-appointed guardian to loan him money belonging to the guardian's ward.

He stated in his interview that he had apparently violated a rule set up by the Supreme Court that he was not aware of and which could be unethical. "I want the people of Tuscola County to know that I haven't done anything in any way to take advantage of anybody or to better my position financially or any other way," the judge stated. "While an error of judgment may be involved," he continued, "on the advice of my attorney, I would like to ask at this time only, that the people of the county reserve judgment until the full facts can be presented."

"When this is done," he concluded, "we believe that it will be shown that no legal wrong has been done."

Supreme Court Administrator Meredith Doyle, according to Chief Justice John R. Dethmers, has been instructed to draw up a petition for the case which has been pending since February, 1961.

Judge Graham, who had assumed the matter closed, stated that the petition will probably contain a reprimand.

Her name is Renee Lorinda. She's five months old and she and her mother have come to live with us for awhile. Renee is a charming baby, but: "Undisturbed sleep, where hast thou fled?"

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My husband's work in Toledo keeps him there except for week ends at home. Consequently, it's been a bit on the lonely side at our house. So, I had a need; Renee and her mother had a need - we pooled our problems and thus far (after a week's trial) things seem to be working out just fine... except, perhaps, for Renee: she has two bosses now - and her great-aunt Hene is probably the bossiest!

The first task that Renee's mother and I have embarked upon is to do away with the one a.m. Bottle Command. We're hoping Renee won't be too disagreeable

with the idea! Only time will tell.

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About this time of year, the "old grads" are returning to their alma maters for homecoming games and the accompanying festivities. Here in the Midwest we hear most about the Big Ten schools. I think we sometimes lay too great stress on the prestige of the larger universities and forget the advantages to be found on the smaller campuses quite as well as at the large ones.

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There are men and women whom I consider to be educated people who have had little or no college training. By sheer determination and effort they have studied and worked to become what is referred to as "self-educated." Their success spurs me on in my efforts toward self-improvement.

However, it has always seemed to me that attending a college would make it so much easier to obtain an education - recognizing that education embodies much more than simply book learning. Perhaps I feel this way because I have been - and am in - the process of struggling to educate myself sans college experience (except for my year's course at the Bay City Business College and an extension course at the Rackham Memorial Institute in Detroit). It seems to me, as I plod along in my piecemeal fashion, there will never be enough time for me to learn all the things I'd like to know!

I am grateful, however, for my year at business college and especially thankful that the course I took emphasized English, spelling and similar courses.

When I reflect upon my present work as a bookkeeper, in which I have moderate success, I wonder how amazed would be my business college advisor who gave me an A in Punctuation Studies and told me to skip the course so that I could give more (and badly needed) time to my bookkeeping and tax accounting problems! Only goes to prove that we can do what we have to do!

## Plastic Products In Production At Walbro Corp.

Two new products are now on the market produced by the plastic division of Walbro Corporation, it was announced this week. They are "Ozonaire" cleaner and thermoplastic gasoline tanks for small engines.

One of the unusual features of the tanks is the plastic filler cap which features non-spraying yet provides positive venting. Walbro has patents on the cap.

The cleaner is used on lawnmowers, racing karts and tamping machines used in excavating. Tests indicate, authorities said, that these cleaners show improved dust holding capacity and eliminate rust. A snap-on cover gives quick access to the removable element, which is polyurethane foam, oil filled.

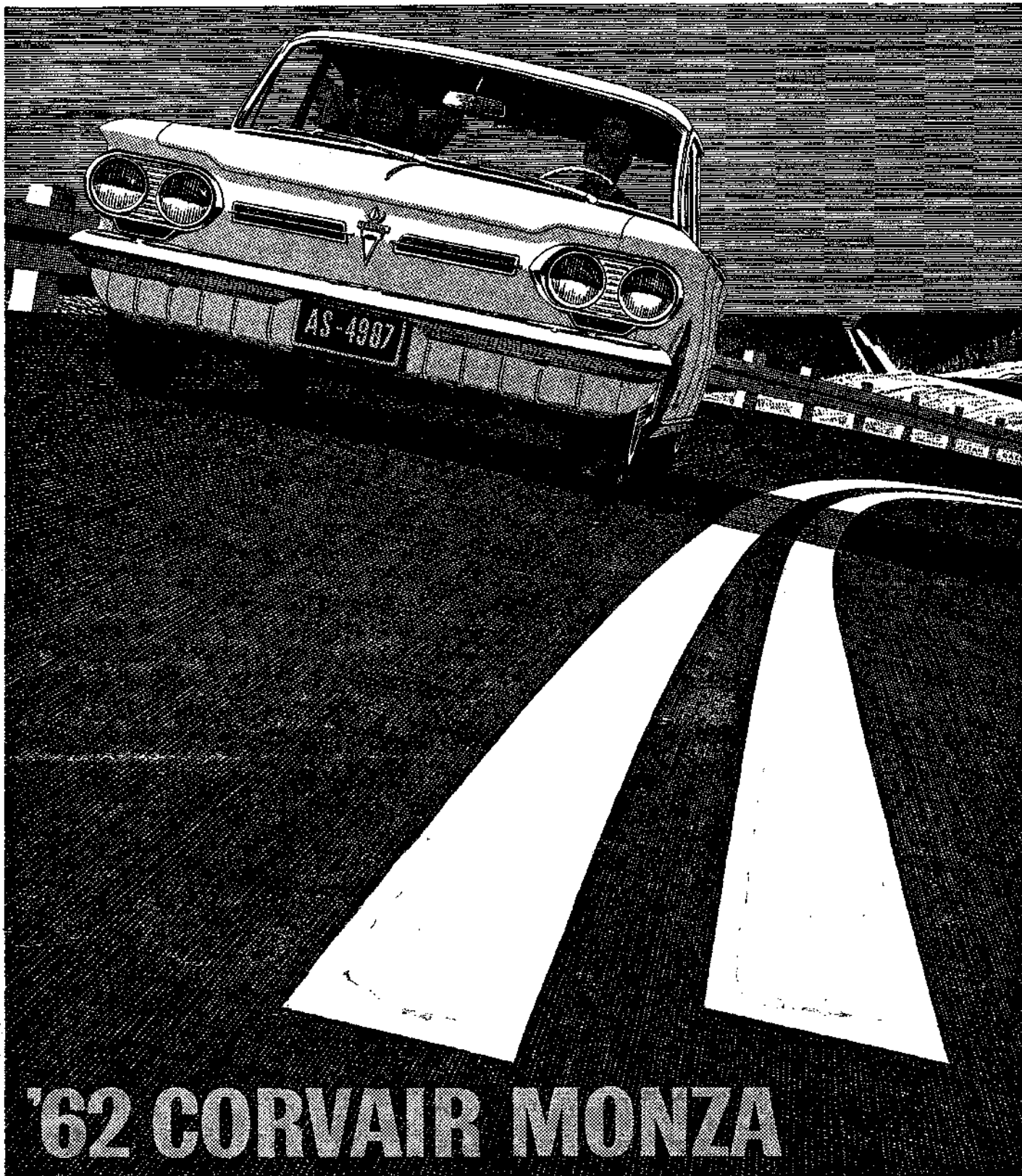
vised Ed to move to his church, said they'd make him a member of the Hymn Book Committee.

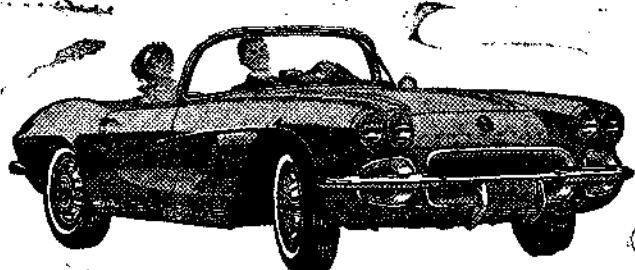

# Legislature Passes New Law Designed To Ease Absentee Voter Problems

Election workers in Michigan have a new tool to prevent woes caused by absentee voter problems.

It's a new law passed by the 1961 Legislature. It permits the naming of "Absentee Counting Boards" by the election commission of any governmental unit other than a county or the state.

Considerable flexibility in the operation of "Absentee Counting Boards" is allowed under the new law.

Secretary of State James M. Hare, the man who must supervise elections, says the statute has been interpreted to mean that the election commission must make decisions on which precincts are to have counting boards and many other details of procedure.

There are, however, some requirements in the law which are aimed at preventing any possible abuse or chicanery.

A recent publication of Hare's office, which goes to election clerks and other workers, outlined provisions of the new law because of possible confusion over some of the rather complicated wording. No regular election at which the counting boards could operate is scheduled until November of 1962.

A special election or primary can make use of "Absentee Counting Boards" as well as a regular election.

The value in the new procedure is that it relieves the regular election workers of the chore of compiling absentee voter ballots. At the same time it provides a somewhat closer check than is possible with the old method. An undesirable effect might be that it could make the voting procedure even more complex than it already is.

In precincts where a large absentee vote is expected, especially those where the absentee vote must be transferred onto voting machines for compilation, the time and frustration saved could be considerable.

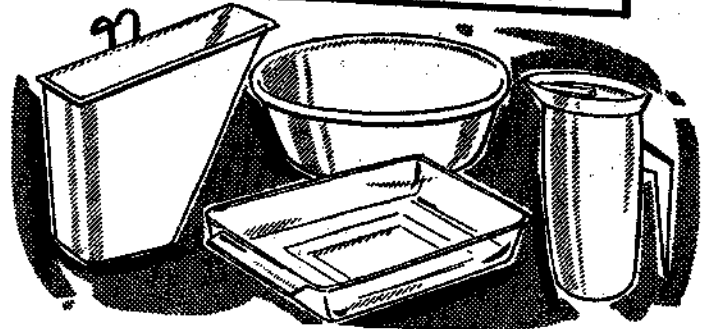

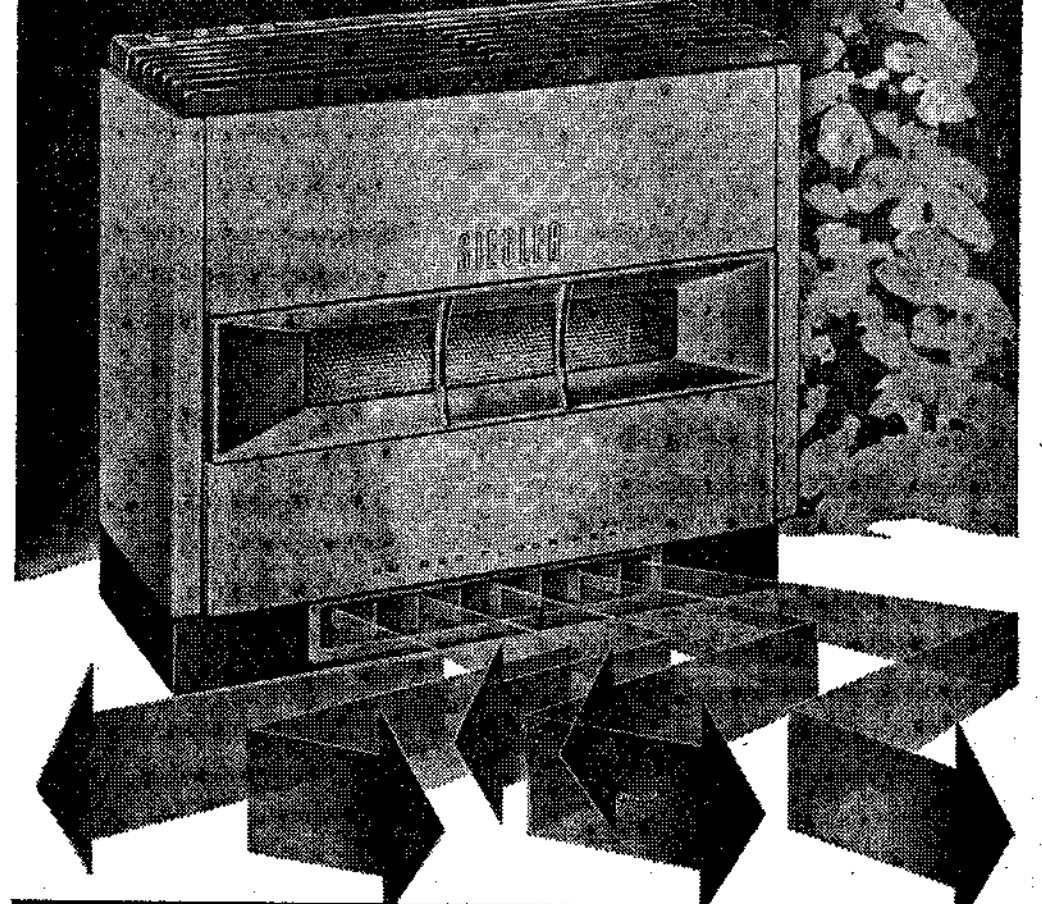

### Agent's Corner

Signs of autumn are all around: crisp mornings, a tree turned bright yellow and red and store windows enticing us with new fall woolsens. One of these days we will wake up to find "the frost on the pumpkin" for sure.

The fall apple season is here and the trees are loaded. There will be a wonderful supply to use in pies, cakes, rolls, cookies, waffles, desserts, candies, relishes, salads and to serve with meat, vegetables and dairy foods.

Michigan grows over 20 varieties, but those produced in the largest quantity are McIntosh, Jonathans, Delicious and Northern Spies.

Apples are not all alike! The McIntosh is medium to large in size, round-shaped and has a thick skin which snaps when bitten into or cut. The texture is relatively soft yet crisp which makes it good for eating or cooking. The pies made with McIntosh apples will be juicy. The rich, red color which covers about 90 per cent of the apple is another "plus" feature.

The Jonathans are usually a little smaller than the McIntosh. The skin, when fully ripe, will be a solid red and cover about 95 per cent of the surface. The skin is thin to medium thickness. The flavor is more tart than the McIntosh; it is less juicy and is good fresh or cooked. It is particularly good for baking.

The red and golden Delicious apples come from the same family and can be distinguished by their pointed shape. The red Delicious will have five points at the blossom end to further distinguish it. Both of these varieties are medium sized and have medium thick skins. These apples are favorites for eating fresh.

The Northern Spy is an old stand-by and the favorite for many people due to its crisp, tart, sweet flavor. The skin is very thin and tender, which poses problems for the producers, for the apples bruise so easily. They are large in size and usually about 50 per cent red color is considered very good. They are excellent to eat fresh or for cooking.

Some pointers to keep in mind when selecting and using apples. If an apple is supposed to be red, it should be red. Good red color indicates high sugar content and a well-flavored apple. The golden Delicious apples should be Golden with no green. Green color indicates too early picking and immature fruit, lacking in sweetness and flavor. The larger apples of any variety should be used first as they tend to break down and spoil more quickly than the smaller ones.

## IT SEEMS TO ME

### Not Welch's Republic, Lincoln's Democracy

Well, we hope the Yankees will defeat the Reds on a world scale as they unfortunately did at Yankee Stadium and Crosley Field. "Mighty Casey struck out" but replacement Houk carried on, and to much dismay and no surprise, Yankee power and confidence paid off again. It may be a different story when Houk runs out of the players Casey (Stengel) hired or when the Yanks face their National League rivals, starting play next year under the master's touch.

It's good to know old Casey is back, leaving the calm of a bank office for real life on the diamond. Or so it seems to me.

Is this justice? On September 14, three young men were tried before Federal Court Judge Mell G. Underwood in Columbus, Ohio. First, a forger was found guilty of forging and cashing a U. S. Treasury check. Sentence: one hour in custody of a US marshal. Second, a bootlegger was found guilty of possessing and transporting 1 1/2 gallons of moonshine. Sentence: three months in prison. The third - get this - as a member of a religious sect opposing a war, was found guilty of being a conscientious objector. Sentence (after a severe tongue-lashing by the judge): two years in prison.

If we consider the probable motive behind each of these three 'crimes', it appears that one member of the Ohio judiciary needs to re-examine, not only the balance of justice, but his own sense of values.

Winter visitors to Miami, Fla., this year will find that the population there has been swelled by nearly 50,000 Cuban refugees. These desperate people have fled their Castro-tossed native land with few possessions and little money.

They have been well-received by our nation and the people of Florida, whose welfare funds are being drained to help them. Federal and Church agencies have also played the Samaritan role.

These people are willing to work but there are not nearly enough jobs in Miami to offer them, and, believing another invasion of Cuba will be headquar-

tered in Miami, the Cubans dislike the thought of getting too far away.

Looks like another delicate job lies ahead for the Administration, whose previous effort rated a world-wide 'F' - for 'fiasco'.

Or so it seems to me.

Find the family dictionary, blow away the dust and check the differences between a 'democracy' and a 'republic'. Robert Welch, a good producer of fruit juice and a poor patriot, as head of the John Birch Society, joined with Billy James Hargis (I don't recall that he produces anything at all), who heads the Birch-like organization known as "We, the People", in a statement at a small rally in Chicago.

They "deplored" the advance of democracy and insisted that the Roman Empire's downfall started in 47 BC, when it admitted democratic methods. Mr. Welch's stamp machine prints that "America is a republic, not a democracy."

If your dictionary reads like mine, I prefer Lincoln's democracy to Welch's republic. But then I disagree on almost everything Mr. Welch believes, including his statement that former President Eisenhower is a Communist sympathizer. Irresponsible charges like this are a disservice to our nation.

Or so it seems to me.

We enjoy catching modern slang in wild-western TV dramas supposedly taking place at least a century ago. Heard in one such episode: "How about that?"; "With friends like that who needs enemies?"; "He spooks me."; etc. (I also saw a not-quite concealed zipper.)

But they rot the dictionary writers to support them in the one word without which they just could not exist. 'Ain't' ain't on the 'ain't polite' list any more.

A step backwards, ain't it? Or so it seems to me.

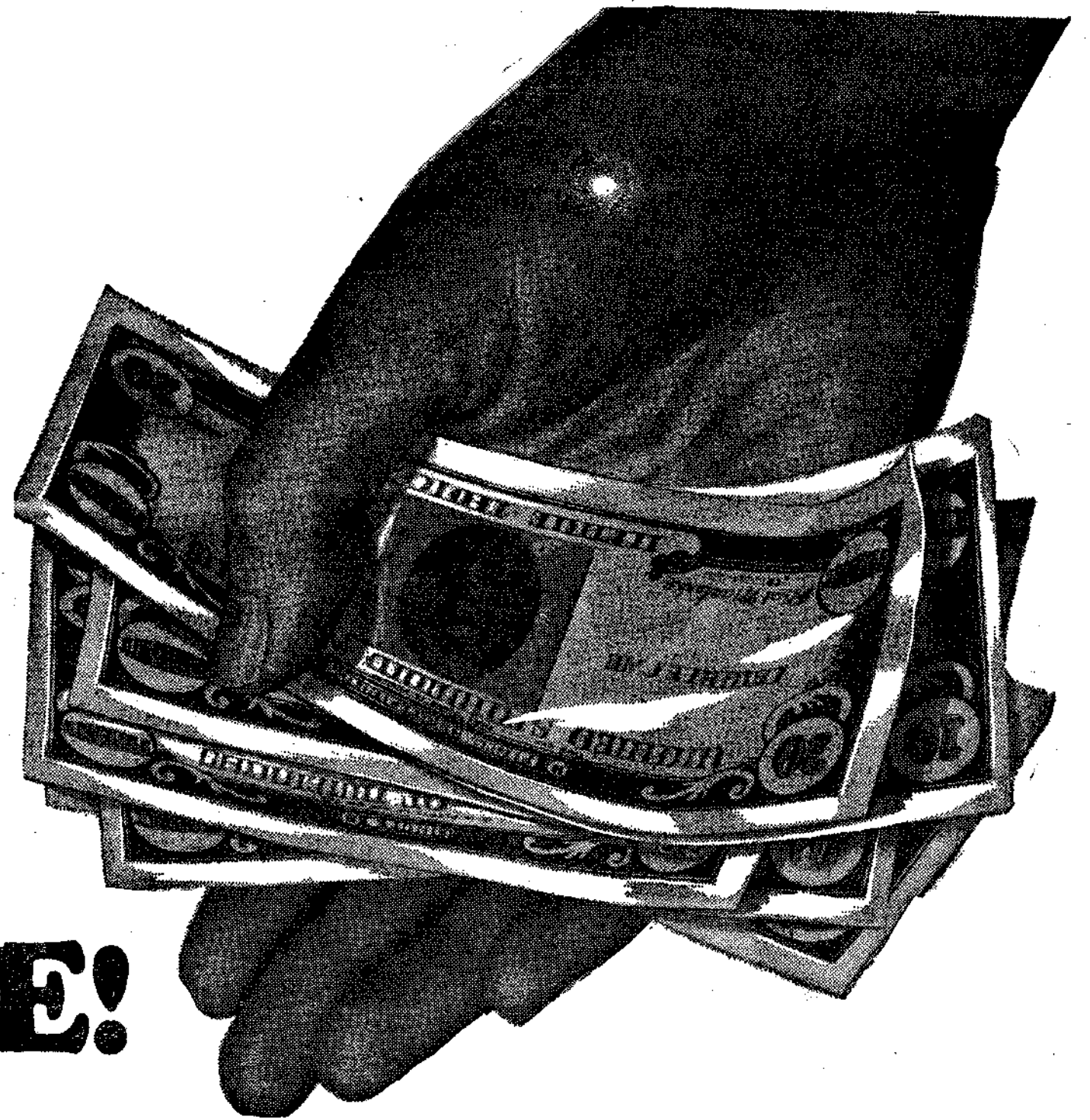

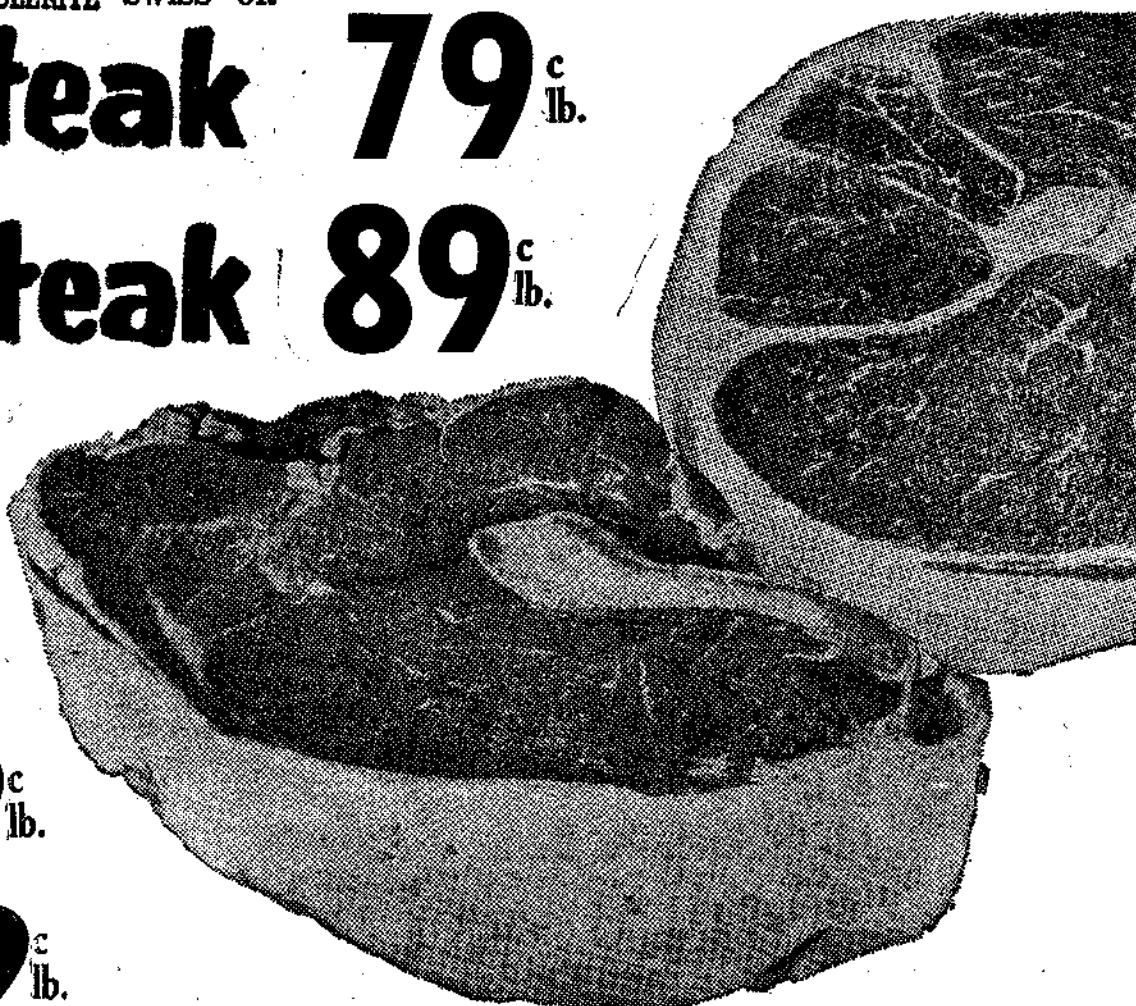
