

Taxes Upped 24 Per Cent

Michigan In Trouble Says Allison Green

Elkland township 1961 taxes are up \$51,858.00 over last year, according to figures released by Supervisor Ed Golding. Township taxpayers received their assessment statements Friday.

Total township taxes to be collected are \$213,772.62, as compared to \$161,919.68 in 1960, a 24 per cent increase.

Some residents reported, however, that their taxes appeared to be up 40, 50 and even 60 per cent over last year.

Golding pointed out that this is caused by an increase in valuations and that the raise is done on a percentage basis to the different classifications. For example, all homes in the township were raised the same percentage, based on individual evaluation. The same is true of all businesses and farms.

Primarily, the increase is caused by a nearly two and a half million dollar increase in State Tax Commission evaluations for the township without a corresponding decrease in the mill rate.

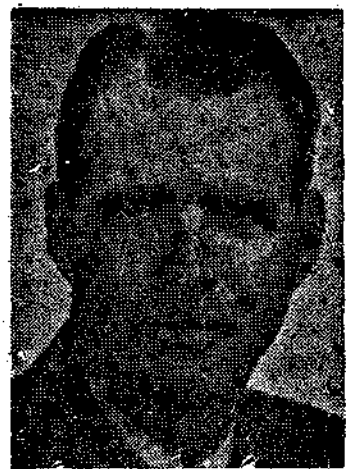
Evaluations have increased from \$7,903,383.00 in 1960 to \$10,624,207 in 1961. The increase, according to Golding, had to be spread out equally over the township.

The increase is also reflected in new homes and businesses. There are 1,434 taxable units as compared to 1,392 units in 1960.

Golding further pointed out that the state equalized valuation is 50 per cent of the true cash value as assessed by the state.

For township taxpayers who have any doubt about their property evaluation, Golding explained a method for checking the figure.

To find out the exact amount of money taxes are being paid on, multiply the figure in the left-hand corner of the tax statement by 1.41223, the equalizing factor. The figure obtained should be 50 per cent of the true cash value of the property as equalized by the state.



Michigan is in trouble and corrective steps must be taken," State Rep. Allison Green said Tuesday in an address before Cass City Rotarians at the New Gordon Hotel.

The state has established a poor image to attract and keep industry and Green said that there are several factors responsible for this.

"Our unemployment compensation costs are too high," he said, "they have jumped 42 per cent in four years." Other factors that give the state an unfavorable image for industry, according to Green, are that there is not a single businessman in a top position in the state government and what business feels is an unfriendly attitude of the courts.

Two times as many jobs are

moving from the state as are moving in, Green claims. This is responsible for a reduction in tax revenue for Michigan while other states are increasing, he said. This year sales tax revenues are down eight per cent from the previous year and Green says that the loss can be traced to the lack of employment caused in part by the labor climate.

What many voters overlook when considering the cost of government is the percentage used for the operation of the state. Michigan's government spends about one billion dollars a year, while the Federal government takes about nine billion dollars from local residents, he explained.

Fallout Shelter Opinions Differ

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the third in a series of articles about fallout shelters in the Cass City area. It is based on on-the-spot interviews in which residents were asked to express their opinion of fallout shelters.

There are as many opinions about fallout shelters in Cass City as there are people, if the reactions of six area persons interviewed Friday by the Chronicle are indicative of the general sentiment of the area.

In one-minute sidewalk interviews on Main Street Friday afternoon, local shoppers came up with replies that ranged from "I think they're good" to "I think they're for the birds!"

Despite the concern about the situation by several, no one interviewed was concerned enough about the situation to have a fallout shelter built and stocked.

This, then, is the reply of the "man on the street" in Cass City: "I think they're a bunch of hooey!" exclaimed Robert Profit, the first to be interviewed. "I think we should work for peace... if they throw one bomb,

they'll throw a dozen." Roger Little was busy working at his desk in Little's Furniture Store. "Fallout shelters are for the birds! They're a hoax... if you are in an area where you need a shelter," he explained, "they won't do you any good. If you are in an area where you are concerned about fallout, a basement is enough."

Tom Gruber was hailed just as he was about to cross the street. He advocated public shelters as opposed to individual shelters. "I think they're wonderful things if they could be arranged right. What good will it do us if they drop a bomb here (Cass City) and our fallout shelter is at home?"

"I wouldn't build one," stated Mrs. Clayton Root, the next to be stopped. "They might be alright if done right, but what do I want to live for after everything is gone?" she asked.

Mrs. Don Koepfen, the mother of five, was talking with a friend when confronted. "My husband and I are thinking about building one," she said. "It would probably be an underground extension from the basement."

Mrs. Emma Nichols, the last to be interviewed, was also in favor of shelters and explained why. "I think they're good. I haven't built one yet but it sounds like we might need them."

Firemen Seek Funds for New Equipment

The Cass City Village Council met Tuesday night at the Municipal Building and heard Chief Al Avery discuss the needs of the Elkland Township Fire Department, okayed the payment of bills and went home.

It was the quietest meeting on record.

Chief Avery explained that the department needs more equipment to maintain the present low insurance rate that the department has earned. He would like to see a one-mill levy on the township to provide needed funds for the department. How long the levy would be needed, Mr. Avery was not able to say Tuesday.

He said that he was explaining the needs to the council so it would be informed of the situation, if action on a tax is voted on in the spring.

Student Exchange Program Planned

The Cass City High School Student Council is organizing a foreign student exchange program with its goal set at bringing a foreign student to Cass City for the 1962-63 school year.

The council plans to stimulate interest in the program among the different civic clubs in the hope that some of the groups will help sponsor the program.

The purpose of the program is to acquaint foreign students with American families and community life by having them live in the community and attend school for a year.

The cost to bring a student to Cass City is approximately \$700. The sponsoring organizations has enough clothing, a part-time job and a family to live with. They must also help him with his school program.

A requirement on the part of the student is that he be able to read, write and speak the English language.

The end result of such a program will be to send a Cass City student to a foreign country sometime in the future.

Tell Local Effect of Phone Rate Hike

General Telephone Company facilities users are about to receive their first rate increase in eight years, according to District Manager H. F. Janson. The increase came about through a recent Michigan Public Service Commission ruling allowing the company to increase its annual revenues by \$2,478,000.

The new increase took effect Nov. 20, and will mean an approximate 9.2 per cent increase in total customer billing. It is the first increase since September 1, 1953. That increase, according to Janson, was based on 1951 costs.

Businesses will bear the brunt of the increase. One-party business rates will be up \$2.10 per month from \$7.65 to \$9.75, or approximately seven cents per day.

Two-party business rates will receive the highest increase. Monthly rates will be up \$2.20 or from \$6.40 to \$8.60. This class of service is limited to existing customers and will eventually be discontinued. There are eight users of this service.

Business-multi-party or rural zones one and two will also receive uniform rates. Zone one rates will be up \$1.80 or from \$5.00 to \$6.80 and zone two will be up \$1.55 per month or from \$5.25 to \$6.80.

Resident Users On an individual level, one-party resident rates are up from \$4.75 to \$5.60 per month or an increase of 85 cents per month. This is approximately 2.8 cents per day.

Two-party resident rates are up one cent per day for a 30 cent increase from \$4.40 to \$4.70 per month.

Four-party resident users will have a 40 cent increase from \$3.65 to \$4.05 per month or approximately 1.4 cents per day.

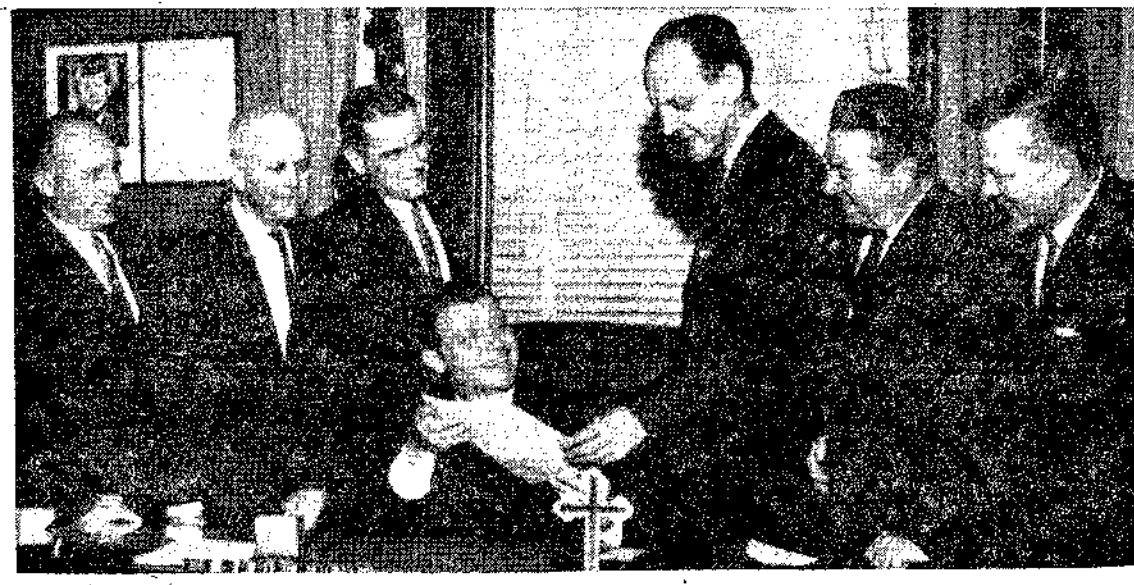

There is no known cure for brucellosis in domestic animals, according to Michigan State University scientists. "Laboratory tests show that such supposed cures as methylene blue, carbolic acid and wheat germ mixtures are a coincidence," says Glen Reed, extension veterinarian at MSU.

"Most infected cows abort only one, with or without treatment. Yet these substances are given credit when the cows do not abort at a later time."

Reed emphasizes that control of the brucellosis is not simple. It requires sanitation, control measures and vaccination of all heifers four through eight months of age.

George Parsons, MSU extension dairy specialist, notes that Michigan farmers will vaccinate over 100,000 calves against brucellosis during 1961. "Michigan now has only 250 infected herds compared to 7,500 in 1955," Parsons says. "But lax vaccinating could put us back where we started. It's important to vaccinate the entire herd, including all replacement animals."

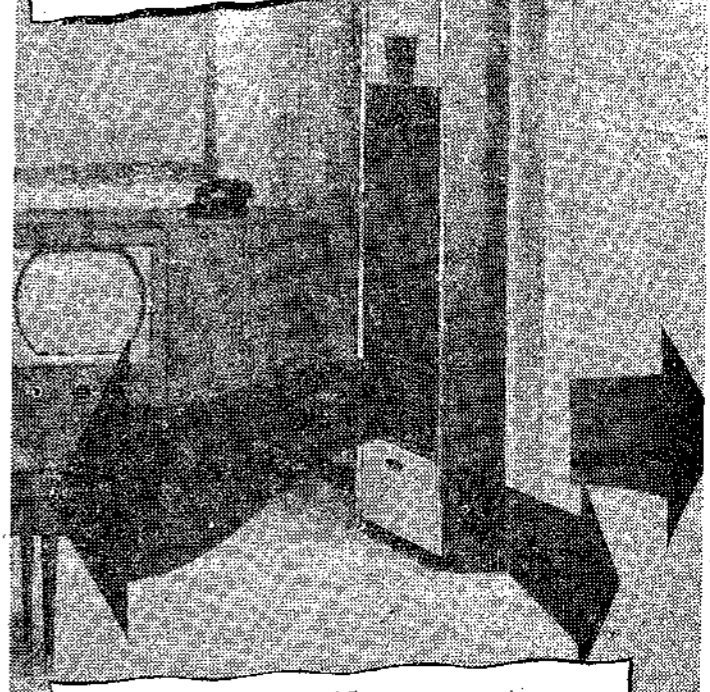

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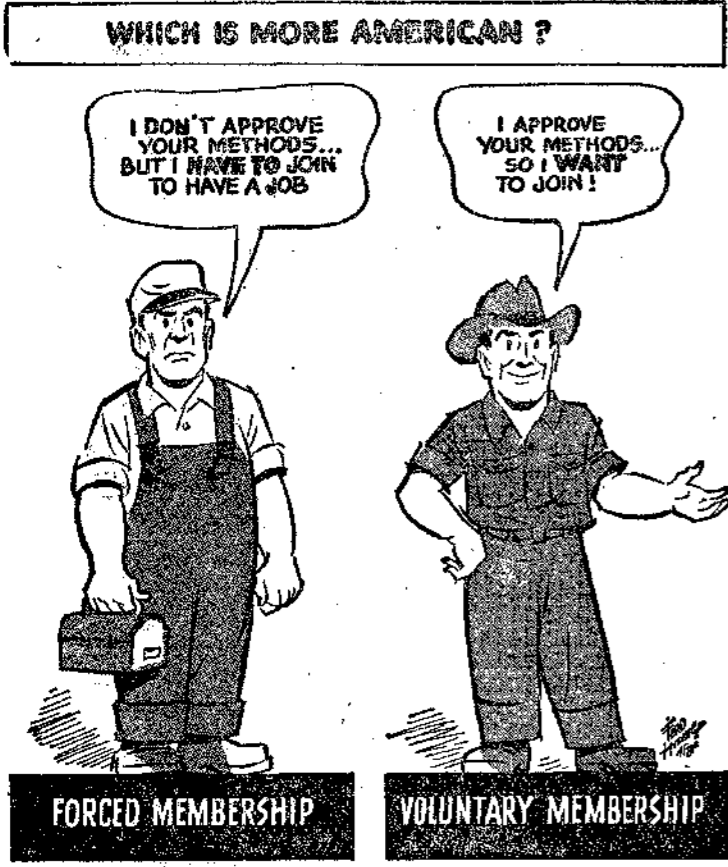

Did You Enjoy Your Thanksgiving?

Did you have an enjoyable Thanksgiving Day last Thursday? We did. We spent the day, a delightfully long and easy one, with my mother and sister in Caro. We had the traditional turkey - only we did the gobbling.

Most of us remember to be thankful throughout the year for the good things that come our way but, even so, it's pleasant to have a special day set aside for thanksgiving.

Today, November 30, is the birth date of Samuel Langhorne Clemens - more familiarly known, of course, as Mark Twain. Born in 1835, he lived and wrote about a colorful era in the history of our country. In fact, Mark Twain contributed generously to the shading of our national humor.

On my way home from Independence, Missouri, last spring, I stopped in Hannibal, Missouri, where I visited Samuel Clemens' boyhood home and the Mark Twain Museum. As the grown-up Ilene Warren, my interest in Mark Twain has been tempered by other things (though I still enjoy his pithy, pungent humor)

so I really made the visit for the little Ilene Dunlap who would have been delighted to view the famous fence so successfully whitewashed through Tom's promotional advertising and who would have fallen in love with the quaint, old-fashioned Clemens' home.

Thanks mainly to the efforts of Miss Genevieve Bourke, who taught at Sandfly School in Evergreen Township for the two years '34 and '35, the small library at that school was enlarged by the purchase of several well-chosen books. Among them were "Tom Sawyer" and "The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn," which I read and reread. I was eleven years old and enchanted by the mysterious and exciting adventures of these two boys and charmed by the lovely Becky Thatcher.

And thus it was more for this little girl than for my present self that I made the pilgrimage to the Twain Shrine in Hannibal last spring.

Individualism and beatnik-ism are two different ideas or attitudes - so let's not confuse them. I believe wholeheartedly in being individualistic but I don't dig this beat attitude.

The so-called beatniks make a fetish of being different - they must be different solely for the sake of being different, even to the extent of being alike in their differentness. They like to shock the "traditionalists" by what they say - even what they do. This is, basically, to satisfy some egotistic need.

While society doesn't have all the answers it has presented the best possible solutions to date. Until we come up with something better, our present standards will have to suffice - and, as yet, the beats haven't presented anything better!

However, there are those who choose to live a rather Bohemian existence. If that keeps them most happy and content who am I to tell them to cease their way of life? By the same token, I don't want to be told how to live my life.

We are constantly hearing complaints about people being slaves to materialism. However, there's no one who makes me go to work each morning or do the dishes at night. There's no one who could stop me if I decided to move into the woods and live like nature boy. I have a choice and since I choose to live as I presently do - and incidentally enjoy it - I resent being told I'm just an insignificant mite in the masses and am doing my daily tasks simply because I'm a poor, misled, twentieth century capitalistic cretin who doesn't know any better!

Lest I be misunderstood regarding my laissez-faire policy, may I hasten to add that while I'm aware we cannot thrust our interference into the lives of others, nevertheless I do not believe in a completely "live and let live" attitude. For while the old adage "You can lead a horse to water but you can't make him drink" is true, we still keep leading the horse to the trough even though we don't push his nose in to the water!

Group Believes Schools Should Teach Wives To Be Discriminating Buyers

Housewives in America spend at least one-third of the nation's annual income.

For this reason, a group of Michigan people believe public school education should train women to be discriminating buyers from the time they are playing with dolls until they are ready to buy toys for their own children.

A recent consumer protection conference conducted by a division of the state attorney general's office spent a long day considering the problems facing the public in everyday buying.

"It is rather difficult to explain to a person with a minimum education the difference between the various size packages in relation to price and content," said Mrs. Maxine Virtue, assistant attorney general in charge of the consumer protection division.

"The conference participants suggested education in this area should start in the grade school and be carried continuously in the curriculum through the university," she said.

It was also urged that people in responsible, leadership positions should educate the housewife-consumer regarding habits of discrimination as contrasted with economics.

"Industry interests play largely on motivational aspects of marketplace choice," Mrs. Virtue said. "If the consumer seriously wishes to be protected, she should develop a resistance to these practices."

Conference participants generally were agreed packaging habits of industry should be standardized by legislation.

"It seemed to be the consensus, however, that proper education and communication would bring about a great deal of voluntary self-regulation by both producers

and retailers," said Mrs. Virtue.

Year-end holiday preparations in Michigan bring a sharp increase in both commercial and private mail traffic.

"Christmas seals" account for a large percentage of the commercial mailings in November and December.

The term "Christmas seals" started many years ago when tuberculosis was striking at its peak. Since then many organizations joined the bandwagon and distributed stamp-like seals during the holiday season.

Tuberculosis associations throughout the nation have continued pre-holiday mailings of seals as their single fund-raising campaign of the year.

In Michigan this year seals were mailed to nearly two million homes and business places. The Michigan TB and Respiratory Disease Association hopes to set a new record, by collecting a million dollars.

Impact of the disease has lessened considerably, officials report. Leaders in the battle against TB have set 1970 as a target date for eradication of the disease.

The happy holidays this year will be somewhat less than joyous for many Michigan residents, state statistics show.

November, December and January are traditionally the worst months on the highways. Holidays throughout the year generally bring an increase in the number of traffic accidents.

The three year-end holidays contribute to heavy traffic substantially and wintry weather gives cause to extra care behind the wheel.

Highway department officials marked the recent opening of additional highway mileage with predictions the new multi-lane divided highway through the north central section of the state would result in a sharp drop in traffic accidents.

Located on Schweger Road two miles north of M-81, the farm was originally the Robert Wallace Homestead. Mr. Wallace came from Canada and established his homestead approximately 1870. 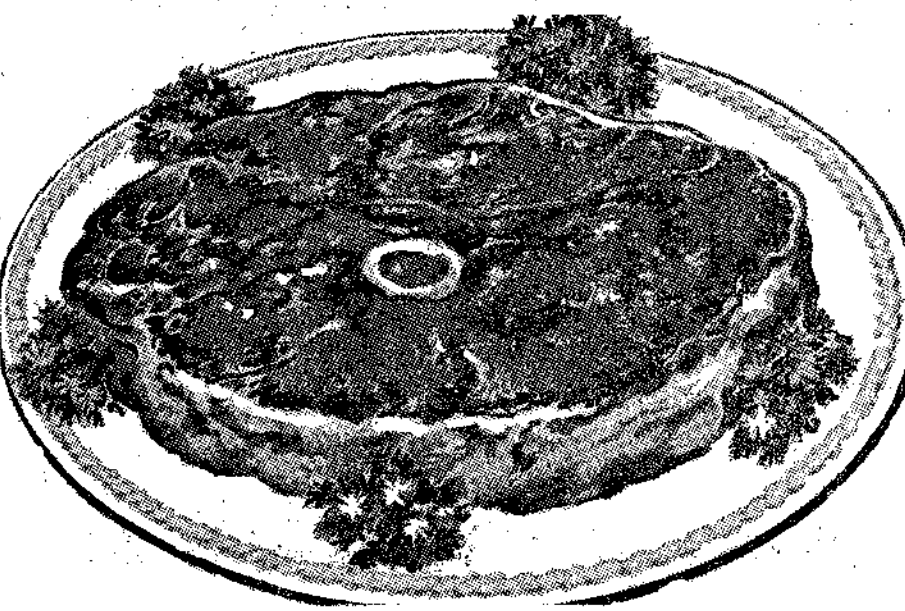

BOOK REVIEW

Edward Streeter Is Always Entertaining

If you had before you the names of only the first, "Dere Mable", and the most recent, "Chairman of the Bored", books by Edward Streeter you might reasonably conclude that the poor man did not know how to spell. However that may be, Streeter is always an entertaining writer (remember how you laughed at his "Father of the Bride?").

Although dealing with a serious and real theme, the problems of retirement, Streeter manages at once, in his recent book, to be light in touch, yet sensitive in treatment.

In "Chairman of the Bored" we are led to share the innermost thoughts of the aging Mr. Crombie, president of Crombie, Hamilton, and Gardner, Investment-counselors. These thoughts are divided into four periods in his life. The first is "Realization". When Crombie first founded the firm, he had insisted on compulsory retirement for all company personnel at age 65. But he never really accepted in his conscious mind that this would apply to him. When his wife and secretary both allude to the approaching retirement in the same day he begins to realize that the other executives in the business have already made plans to carry on without him. He is confused to find they probably can do just that, and hurt that no one begged him to stay on. Painful experience on painful experience brings him to painful realization: he—Crombie—was going to retire!

This leads to the second stage: preparation. What to do? Where to do it? What can they afford? Finally, on the basis of some idealistic dreaming, they buy an old house in the country where they can be more-or-less "gentel"—country squire. They maintain an apartment in the city to which they return two days each week. Mrs. Crombie, who has not cooked or cleaned in years, has the major adjustment to make and they wish they had been more realistic about retirement some years earlier.

The bulk of the story is about their life on Sunset Hill. It is a story of growing awareness that the dream existence was non-existent; that they would never feel anything but cast aside and that more and more time was spent with doing things they didn't enjoy with people they didn't really like.

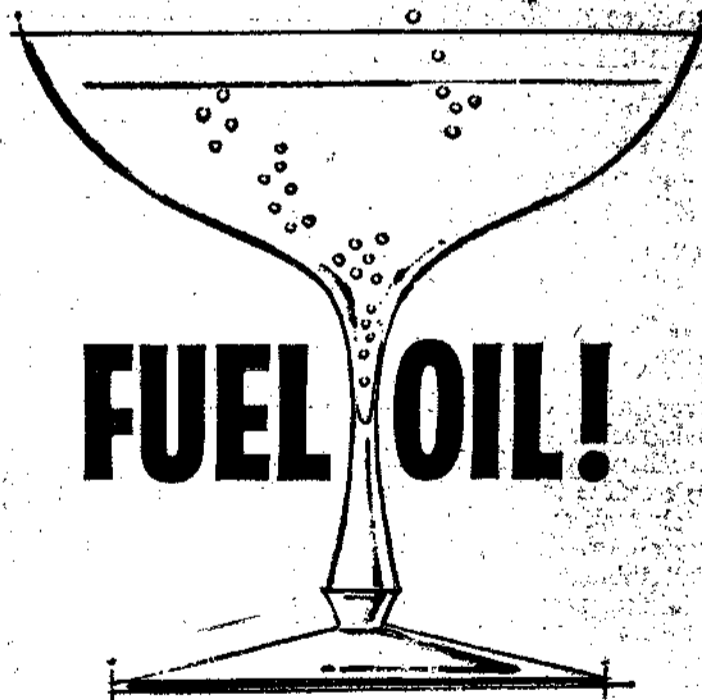

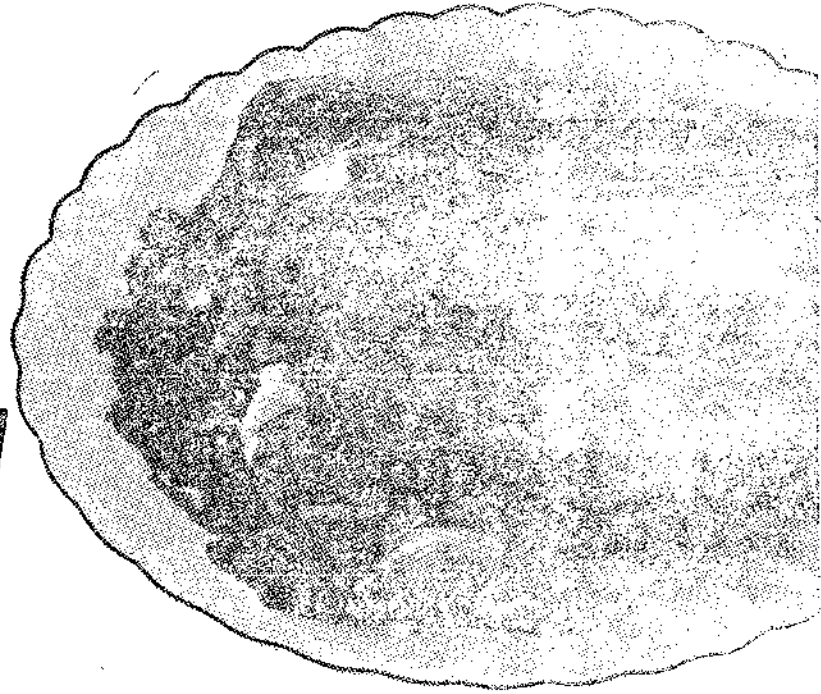

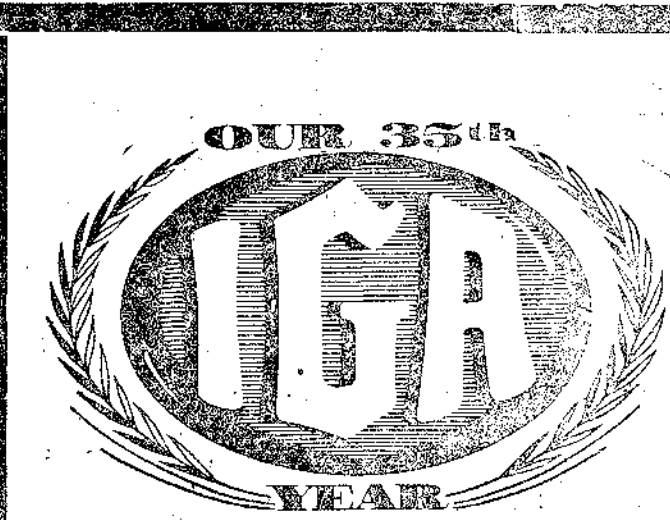
