While in Sandusky Friday night, we were impressed by the beautifully lighted tree on the courthouse lawn. It recalled the time that Cass City annually erected and decorated a Christmas tree on Main Street.

The Christmas tree here was abandoned two years ago because of the work involved. Until we were struck by the beauty of the tree in Sandusky, we failed to remember just how much a lighted tree adds to street decora-

Decorating Main Street by merchants is getting to be more and more of a problem as less and less persons turn out to help. Frankly, decorating Main Street is getting to be old stuff and the era of volunteer labor for the job is seemingly fast coming to the

Space Data Lands For Blind School Via Balloon on Bad Axe Farm

Anson Gingrich, Bad Axe rural mail carrier, had the distinction of having a package of sensitive recording instruments land on his farm, a mile south of Bad Axe, Tuesday afternoon. Released from a balloon at 130,000 feet, the instrument package landed in high-voltage Edison lines.

The instruments were gathering data for the National Aeronautics and Space Administration to determine the energy of electrons at a given altitude as part of a research project of Dr. McDonald at Goddard Space Center, Maryland

The package was launched by balloons at Sieux Falls, S. D., at 7:35 a.m. Tuesday and after reaching an altitude of 130,000 feet, was carried by 150 mileper-hour winds to Michigan. It landed in Bad Axe at 1:50 p.m.

Raven Industries, Sioux Falls, is in charge of the launching and recovery of such equipment and two of its men landed at Huron Memorial Airport shortly after the balloon landed.

The chase plane kept in contact by radio signals emitted by the package. Upon reaching the Sand Point area, the package was released by remote control and descended by parachute.

Hugh B. Eldred, president of the Michigan Sugar Company, announced this week that the first payment for the 1961 beet crop will be \$7.75 per ton and will be distributed Dec. 15.

Beet growers averaged a creditable 16.65 tons per acre this year but the sugar content was a low 13.86. Last year's crop yielded 14.04 tons per acre with a high sugar content of 16.73.

"It is especially disquieting to see that plans for improvements in the instructional program have been blocked by a financial situation which has necessitated the cutting out of some courses . . . let us hope that financial conditions will improve to allow your school to resume its position as



WHO SETS USED CAR PRICES?

Many motorists, about to trade in their used cars, wince when the salesman quotes them an allowance figure. They fail to realize he is only quoting, not setting, the market price.

Isn't it plainly evident, then, that the real used car price setter is the cautious used car snopper who looks long and hard before he lays out his hard earned money? What he is prepared to pay for a particular model in a given condition is that car's true market value.

Excepting a really top condition used car sold by a dealer with a reputation for quality, this true market price is a standard and uniform figure, common to all dealers.

It logically follows, because profit and loss economics is a hard master, that a dealer offering you more for your car than its true market value, must shortchange you somewhere else if he is to survive economically.



Agent's Corner

Frances T. Clark County Home Demonstration Agent

There are two peak seasons for the supply of pork in the markets. The pigs that are born in the spring reach the market in October and continue to January. The pigs which are born in the fall months are on the market in March to May. That is the reason that the supply of pork is limited during the summer months from May to October. It is usually during these months that the prices for pork are the highest of the year. Conversely, then the period from October to May prices would be lower since these are the seasons with the

largest supply.





Avoid Feed Flavors In Milk

bulk tanks may have to change farmer to help him correct offfeeding practices to prevent feed flavors. odors in milk. Off-flavors in milk from bulk tanks are more difficult to distinguish than in cans, Michigan State University researchers have found.

Dairies can return off-flavored milk back to the farmer when milk is shipped in cans. It is practically impossible when the dairy receives an entire tanker truckload of milk from many different farms.

J. M. Jensen, MSU food scientist, says that silage fed during the fall and winter months causes most of the off-flavor trouble. It is unfair to place the blame

says. Most of the time, the fault lies with roughage feeding prac-Most feed flavors in milk come from feeding silage before milk-

ing. The result is milk with a

silage smell. "When the silage and hay feeding is done after milking, there is great improvement in milk flavor." Jensen says.

Cows kept under loose housing, where all silage is fed after the morning milking, will usually produce milk with practically no feed flavors.

In most stanchion barns, the only off-flavor problem occurs during the evening milking, as most cows are not fed roughages until after the morning milking. But at night, the cows are usually fed before milking so that hay can be fed later.

Some dairy plants are currently collecting samples once a week from bulk milk tanks and determining flavor scores. The results 'but never with your reputation.

Jensen cautions farmers against milking cows in the summer immediately after taking them

from alfalfa or clover pasture. The trend toward year-around, barn-lot feeding of cows gives better control of flavor by feeding all roughages after milking is completed.



Be Careful When You Select A "Debt Management" Expert to Help You Out

Installment buying and "charge it" plans have grown in popularity with increasing speed in recent years.

Like many mushrooming facets of American's economy, the buynow, pay-later plans have led to many problems for the consumer, probably the greatest of which is staying within a budgeted in-

With the growth in the use of credit purchasing, a large number of Americans have found themselves over their heads in debt. Others, classed as opportunists or enterprising businessmen depending on how you look at it, found this a chance to help themselves while managing other people's affairs.

"Debt management" came into the vocabulary only a few years ago. It means the planning and management of the financial affairs of a debtor for a fee.

A wage earner who has a lot of creditors hounding him for payment and threatening repossession, garnishment or worse, may hire a debt management firm to work out a compromise

Experience in Michigan indicated some of the debt management firms which arose nearly overnight were abusing the purpose of their existence.

Corporation and Securities Commissioner Raymond F. Clevenger said reports indicated some "unscrupulous operators" entered the field.

"It is said that in some cases money turned in (to the manager) is not passed on to creditors: that there are exorbitant forfeiture penalties when management plans are dropped and dishonest advertising and other abuses," said Clevenger.

Before the 1961 session of the legislature, the wage earner had only his own resources to rely on to correct abuses. Most individuals who found themselves the victims of unreliable debt management programs had enough problems without adding this, lawmakers thought.

The more ethical segments of the debt management industry were also anxious that a policing job be done to get rid of the undesirable practices.

This year Michigan became one of the few states which regulate the business of debt mangement,

"The new law provides that a debt management licensee must show financial responsibility, experience, character and general fitness to warrant belief that the business will be operated fairly and honestly," Clevenger said.

Insurance of payment relays is provided in the law through a requirement that licensees keep a separate bank account for the benefit of creditors and a 15-day time limit is imposed on the remission of funds to creditors.

Legislatve apportionment, a possible Achilles' heel for Michigan's Constitutional Convention, may not be as tough a problem as it has been considered.

A plan presented to a Con-Con committee during its early sessions apparently has gained bipartisan support outside the convention hall.

The proposal was first voiced some years ago by former Democratic State Chairman Neil Staebler. It was presented to the

Republican Chairman George Van

It called for a skeleton of State Senate apportionment with an automatic revision clause for each 10-year census. This seemed to fit what authorities say should be in a state's constitution: just framework.

The plan called for a 35-member Senate elected from districts to be spelled out in the Constitution. Each district would have seven members in the Senate. The representational units within each district would, or could, be changed every 10 years as necessary to adjust to population

Although not a final solution, because apportionment of the Senate seats themselves would be left up to the legislature every 10 years, the proposal seemed to have a good chance to take some of the sting from the apportionment problem.

The spirit of non-partisanship

in the Constitutional Convention went with the wind in discussion of some relatively minor employee appointments so party support of proposals will probably be a prime factor in their

If Staebler, still a strong voice although no longer chairman of his party, and VanPeursem can agree on a solution it would appear the Con-Con delegates have a good chance of finding an ans-

There can be little doubt that agreement on apportionment would make the job of selling the Convention's product to the people much easier.

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



as I contemplate the great computers invented by men. In fact, as I look about me and wonder at the great inventions, both small and , large, conceived and created through man's ingenuity, I am amazed that we have come so far in this aspect of our growth and have advanced so little in humanities. We have fed the body and starved the soul.

Our plight is illuminated through the broadway play, "A Man for All Seasons", by Robert Bolt. This play concerns itself with the drama of Sir Thomas More and King Henry VIII. Sir Thomas was a man who placed his soul above his body. Because Sir Thomas More refused to sign an oath proclaiming the King supreme ruler of the Church (thereby denying Henry VIII the right to divorce Queen Catherine in order to marry Anne Boleyn), More was beheaded.

In Bolt's play, More urges an ambitious underling to be a fine teacher. The young man asks, "And if I was, who would know it?" More's answer typifies the spirit of the man: "You, your pupils, your friends, God. Not a bad public, that . . . "

Time magazine cites our situation succinctly in the concluding remarks of its review of this play: "Bolt's meaning is clear: one must resist the compromise that corrupts, the conformity with society that becomes deformity of the soul. But modern man's plight is more complex than Bolt's parable suggests: it is to locate the ground of faith on which to stand. Sir Thomas was an exalting figure of probity, but he possessed the inner certainty that his final public was, indeed, God."







# We Should Support Our Firemen

IT SEEMS TO ME

The indominable former Prime Minister of England had another birthday last week -- the 87th. I recall that in a press conference when he was still a young man (only 80) one of the reporters called to him, "I hope I'm here for your hundredth birthday, sir," to which the symbol of England's determination replied: "I don't see why not, young man, you look healthy to me."

I think there is a price for not going, however, and the price is making sure that the men who do respond have the proper equipment to minimize the risk of injury or worse. Our department operates outmoded apparatus, kept in amazingly fine condition by the firemen themselves. But, for example, they have no air packs (the masks attached to air tanks to enable safe invasion of smoke-filled premises).

I think we ought to support the request of Fire Chief Avery for more equipment as an act of appreciation of the work of 20 volunteers who answer the siren even in the worst weather . . . and, to make myself clear, these men are 'demented' only in the sense that, "you don't have to be crazy to be a volunteer fireman,

but it helps!"

We in small towns tend to be suspicious of labor unions. We read of them as gangster-controlled, and as being led by men seeking personal power, and these things are true but only in a very small segment of the union movement. Like management, unions are plagued by the fact that they are made up of people, some of whom are corruptible. Examples are the Teamsters Union and the large electrical manufacturing firms. But we forget that there are over 1,000 unions in our nation which have never been on strike and there are thousands of businesses which have not conspired to fix prices or deceive the public about a product. We need both good businesses and good unions.

As we observed locally in a recent vote at one of our plants, unions do not come in from the outside and take over. The emplovees must vote them in, in a referendum conducted by an agency of the federal govern-

In my brief residence here I have seen some evidence of poor working conditions, and pay scales ridiculously low. Why is it that we don't correct these conditions out of respect for each other as human beings before a union makes such conditions part of a recruiting campaign? Were I in management (and I have been) I think I'd re-evaluate my relationships with my employees, and the conditions under which they are required to work. Because, were I a union member (and I have been) I'd look to union leadership to bring about improvements. 'Or so it seems to
