A heated spring primary election is in sight for Cass City residents, judging by the last minute flurry of activity among candidates, a check Tuesday with Mrs. Wilma Fry, clerk, revealed.

Already submitted are four petitions for the three open trustee posts and several more are now being circulated. It is expected that this year's race will approach the interest shown last year when six persons vied for the three posts. Deadline for petitions this year is 4:00 p.m. Tuesday, Jan. 2.

In addition to the councilmen, the village will have a new village president. After several terms at the helm, incumbent C. R. Hunt has decided to step down. A veteran political figure in Cass City, A. N. Bigelow, has already filed his petition seeking the post.

Setting their sights on the three trustee positions are Jim Seals, Jim Shagena, Fred Auten and incumbent B. A. Calka.

Seeking re-election to her long held posts of clerk and treasurer is Mrs. Fry. Two library board members are also seeking to retain their posts. They are Avis Benkelman and Esther McCullough.

Mac O'Dell, as of Tuesday, was the lone applicant for the post of assessor.

## News Highlights of 1961 as Reflected on the Chronicle's Front Page

Old 1961 steps aside Monday to let a new year, full of promise and adventure, take his place. New 1962, however, will be hard pressed to fill his predecessor's shoes for 1961 was an action-packed year full of decisions and history making happenings.

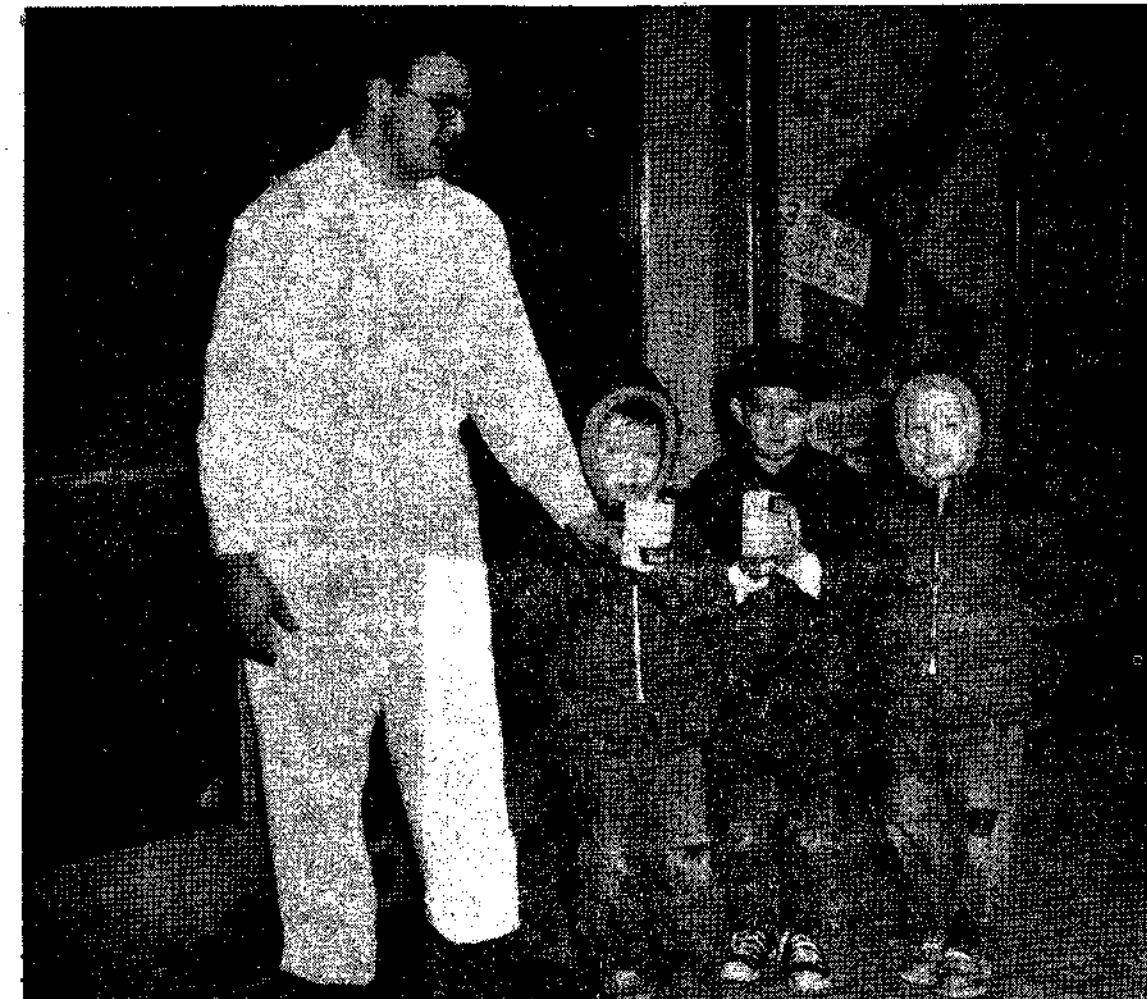
Cass City's School system was beset by turmoil because of financial difficulties. Two elections were held and lost and another set to raise much needed operating funds. Some teachers quit and others voiced dissatisfaction at pay and educational program cutbacks.

The village, too, had its problems. A break in the water main put the village without water for three hours, bringing to light the inadequacy of the present water system. The Village Council also had trouble finding a location to deposit the village's refuse, finally deciding to operate the present dump with more stringent rules and have a private dump for the town's garbage man.

Elkland township taxes took a 24 per cent jump as the township's evaluation was given a hike.

A number of Cass City area businesses changed hands and new business came to town. Cash crop farmers fared well with bumper wheat and corn crops.

These and other happenings dressed the front page of the Chronicle in 1961. Listed below are the highlights of the passing year.

## Fall to Buena Vista

Improving Hawks  
Just Miss Victory

The Cass City Red Hawks will never come closer to winning a basketball game and still lose than they did Thursday night when they played favored Buena Vista of Saginaw to a standstill before dropping a 54-52 decision.

The Hawks combined a hustling defense with an adequate offense to move into a first half advantage, only to see it fade in the third period and early moments of the final quarter.

Featuring balanced scoring by the entire club, the Hawks tossed in 13 points while holding the visitors to a pair of buckets and two charity tosses.

With Larry Robinson showing the way with nine points, the Hawks raced for 15 more while the best Buena Vista could muster was 11.

The Hawks were helped when Henry Morris, the visitors' rangy jumping jack forward, was removed from the game for a show of temper in the second period. At the intermission Cass City led 28-17.

The lead was short-lived. In the third period, Coach Irv Clasen pulled Casimir Lubaczewski, who had three fouls, and Buena Vista immediately started controlling the backboards. They whipped in baskets

with monotonous regularity while the Hawks were unable to hit the hoop. They registered a 19-9 advantage in the period and trailed by only a single point, 37-36.

In the final period the lead seasawed for the first five minutes and then Buena Vista went into the lead to stay, although the Hawks were threatening to the final gun.

Bob Morley led the attack of both teams with 19 points. Robinson pitched in 14 and Lubaczewski helped with 10.

Buena Vista was led by Morris and Ken Howe with 15 points each.

Brings Firemen

An overheated chimney brought Elkland township firemen to the Henry Austin farm seven miles north and three east of Cass City at 7:30 p.m., Thursday, Dec. 21.

Needs List of  
Invalids, Aged

If you have an invalid or an elderly person in your home and a fire breaks out, how would the fire department know where they were in the resulting confusion? Fire Chief Al Avery has the solution, but he needs your help to handle the situation.

The Elkland Township Fire Department, along with other fire departments throughout the state, has purchased a number of stickers to be placed on the front door of homes where invalid or aged persons live and on the windows of their rooms.

The purpose of the stickers is to let firemen know these people are in the house.

"Quite often the person owning the home is not there and the firemen have no way of knowing if or where such persons are in the house," Chief Avery explained.

To compile a list of homes with either or both types, he is asking that all persons who have or know of such situations contact him at Cass City Auto Parts and a member of the Fire Department will come and place the stickers on the door and window. Those who wish, may pick up their stickers from Chief Avery.

The sticker has the fire department emblem and an adhesive back for easy application.

## Estimated at Over Quarter Million

Need Bundles of Loot  
To Fix Water System

There is nothing wrong with Cass City's water system that a lot of money won't fix.

It will cost the village over a quarter of a million dollars to revamp its water system and provide adequate service, Frank Barnes of Hubble, Roth and Clark, consulting engineers, told members of the council Tuesday night at the Municipal Building.

The exhaustive survey covered all aspects of the village's system. The engineers found that the existing wells are more than adequate to serve the needs of the community.

What needs revamping is the water mains and the overhead storage facilities.

The engineers divided the work into three parts, assuming that the community would not attempt the project in its entirety at once.

Part one of the plan includes eight-inch water mains for the more crucial points where in-

adequate pressure is now much in evidence. It includes the northwest section of the community and the line leading to the municipal plant at the park. Cost of this work has been estimated at \$92,960.

Second in importance, the engineers feel, is the overhead storage. Barnes said that the present tank has a storage of 56,000 gallons. The recommended amount of storage for Cass City is 200,000 gallons. Because the present tank is 37 years old, Barnes says that a new 200,000-gallon tank is recommended. He explained that the normal life of a tank is around 20 years and that the utility of the present tank is probably nearing its end.

In addition to a new tank, the engineer recommended a new location, near the corner of Hills and Dales streets. The higher location will permit a shorter tank and avoid loss in water pressure as the water is forced to higher elevations.

The cost for the new tank without land has been estimated at \$62,000.

After the first two stages of the revamping are completed, the addition of more eight-inch lines and the completion of the

revamping of the mains is suggested. This work would cost another \$118,570. Total cost of the project, including engineering, is \$273,530.

The plan as outlined would give an adequate water supply to handle a community of 4,000 persons, about twice the present size of the village.

No discussion of the plan was made by the council with the exception that the work will be carried on as funds and time permits.

## Permit Tabled

In other business, a permit for an addition to Cass City Hospital was tabled until the builder fills out the form showing the distance from the lot lines of the facility.

Urgently Needed

Jack Smith, Hills and Dales General Hospital laboratory technician, has sent out a plea urging all those desiring to donate blood to do so at the next Hills and Dales Blood Bank, Friday, Jan. 5, from 1:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m.

Donations are needed to replace blood used by welfare patients and patients unable to pay for its use. It is also necessary that out-dated blood and blood lost in shipping accidents be replaced.

The possibility of losing the Blood Bank also faces Hills and Dales because of the lack of co-operation of patients who have used blood and have failed to replace it, Smith said in a news release.

The bank needs 130 pints to properly supply the area.

Voters who are not registered and intend to express their opinion in the coming special school election have exactly two weeks to register, according to a notice in this issue of the Chronicle by the Cass City Board of Education. The deadline is 5:00 p.m., Thursday, Jan. 11.

The election, to be held Saturday, Feb. 10, is for the purpose of obtaining a three-mill levy for operating costs to bring the school standards up to past levels.

Only persons who have registered as general electors with the appropriate city or township clerk of the township or city in which they reside are registered school electors.

Order New Signs  
To Aid Motorists

The village council is determined to give local motorists the benefit of every doubt. Because the new one way signs on the alleys next to Main street are not as noticeable as they might be, the village has ordered 10 more.

The new signs will be bigger (24x24) and will say "Do Not Enter". The 10 signs will cost about \$45, exclusive of posts which are on hand, and will be placed at the ends of alleys where entry is prohibited.

After these signs are erected, enforcement will begin, trustees said.

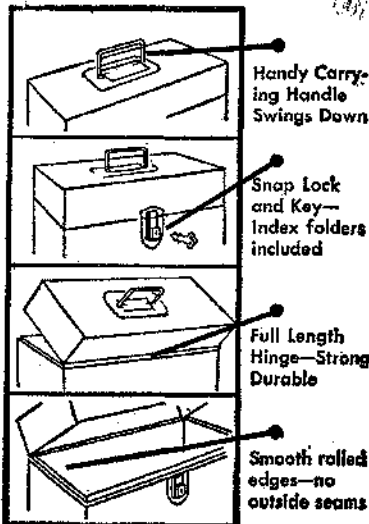
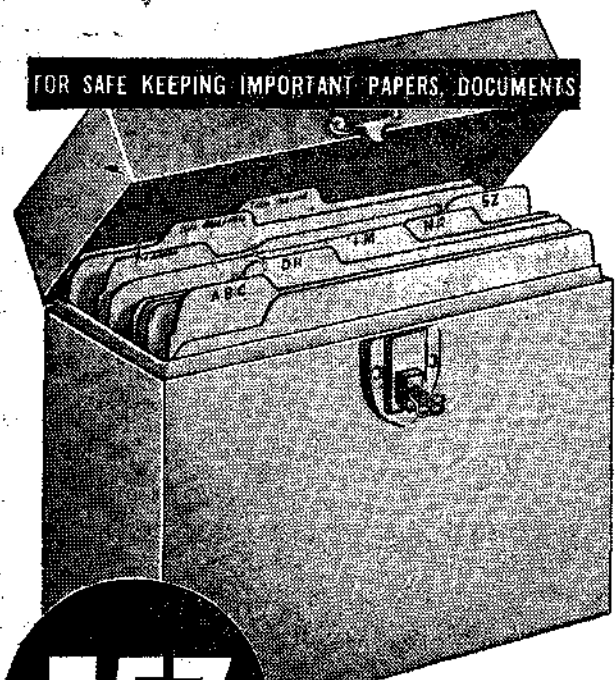

## Howard Bacon to Head Methodist Funds Crusade

Howard Bacon will lead the Capital Funds Crusade in the Cass City Methodist Church, it was announced this week by Keith McConkey, Lay Leader. The Crusade involves all Methodist churches in Michigan and has a total goal of three million dollars.

The local church is seeking \$2,100 over a three-year period. The funds will be used for education and church extension.

One million dollars will be used in buying suitable sites, organizing new congregations and providing the necessary loans and grants to start building church structures in Michigan's many new population centers. A second million dollars, Bacon said, will be secured from outside sources for the same purpose. More than 100 church situations now need this type of encouragement.

Eight hundred thousand dollars will be divided between the two Methodist colleges in the state, Adrian and Albion. Construction projects, faculty additions and student scholarships will be aided by this gift. The seminary where most Michigan Methodist pastors were trained, Garrett Biblical Institute (on the campus of Northwestern University), will receive \$200,000 toward a building program valued at \$1,180,000.

Local Methodists will be contacted in January and February, Bacon indicated. Bacon is general manager of Arjay Manufacturing Company of Vassar, a subsidiary of Walbro Corporation.

## Schedule Tri-county Poultry Clinic Here

Poultrymen and feed dealers from Tuscola, Huron and Sanilac counties will be attending a winter tri-county poultry clinic at Cass City. Those attending the clinic will receive current information for managing large laying flocks during the six class sessions, reports Don R. Kebler, county extension agent in agriculture.

Michigan State University specialists in engineering, economics, poultry nutrition, physiology, marketing and management will present their varied topics. Their topics will cover poultry housing design and equipment; feed formulation and use of drugs; management and promotional tips; marketing and handling eggs; record keeping, financing and use of credit; long range outlook for the egg business; and diseases and physiology of the laying hen.

Each topic will be covered in depth, mentioned Kebler. Each class session will begin at 8:30 p.m. and last until 9 p.m. The clinic will meet in Martin's Restaurant in Cass City. During each session a family style dinner will be served and the total cost of the clinic will be \$10.50 per person to cover the meals.

The first class will start on Thursday, Jan. 4, 1962 with the


remaining being held on Jan. 11, 18 and 25, and Feb. 8 and 15.

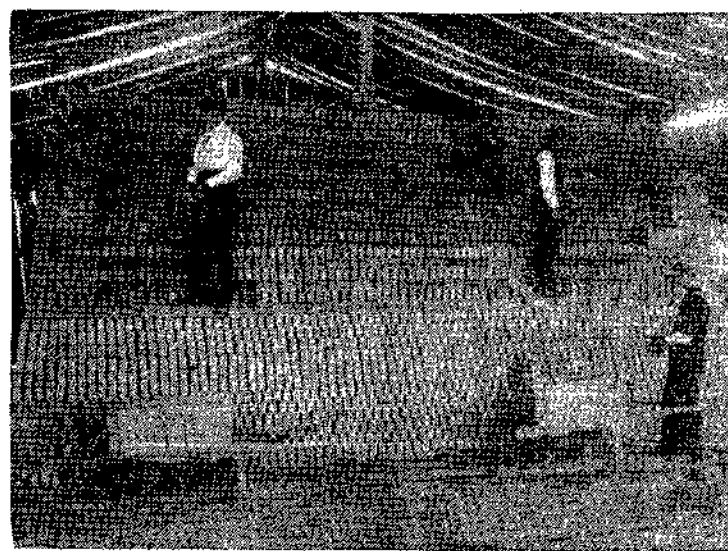

### Sam Bettis A Very Clever Man

Another colorful character from the Pages of the Past is Samuel Bettis. Many stories are regaled about him - according to them, Mr. Bettis was a man of many parts. He could do slight of hand, was an acrobat, could preach with great zeal and tell stories which were very near tall tales.

Sam Bettis planned to sail around the world. Joe Bingleman helped Sam build the boat. It is said that Sam did go down the Cass River to Saginaw where he exchanged his boat for a larger craft in which he sailed around the lakes to Chicago and thence to the Mississippi River. Somewhere on that river the trip ended.

In 1884 Mr. Bettis built a home in Shabbona. Some of the "old-timers" remember him. (Source of information: Jason Kitchen.)

### He Sold From The Middle of The Road

Sidewalk sales may be a modern innovation - however, shortly past the turn of the century, there was one enterprising businessman in Cass City who sold his wares from the middle of a street.

Odd as it may sound, there is a logical explanation. Nolton Bigelow, founder of the N. Bigelow and Sons Hardware, was building a new structure to house his business. He obtained permission from the

town to move the old wooden building to the side street while the new brick store was being constructed. There, in the street, Mr. Bigelow carried on "business as usual" until, in 1901, the new brick building (the one still in use) was completed.

One of the older businesses in town, it was established in 1883 by Nolton Bigelow and J. P. Howe. Its advertising slogan "Up to date since '88" is a familiar one.

### Any More Interesting Business Stories Like This One?

In 1881, David Tyo set up a barber shop on Main Street. His son, Clem Tyo, continued in the trade and passed it on to his son, Alex Tyo, and grandson, Tommy Tyo, which two are in business today on Main Street. The Tyo Barber Shop, started eighty years ago, has an older

Main Street existence than any other business. This page from the past has been carried over into the present.

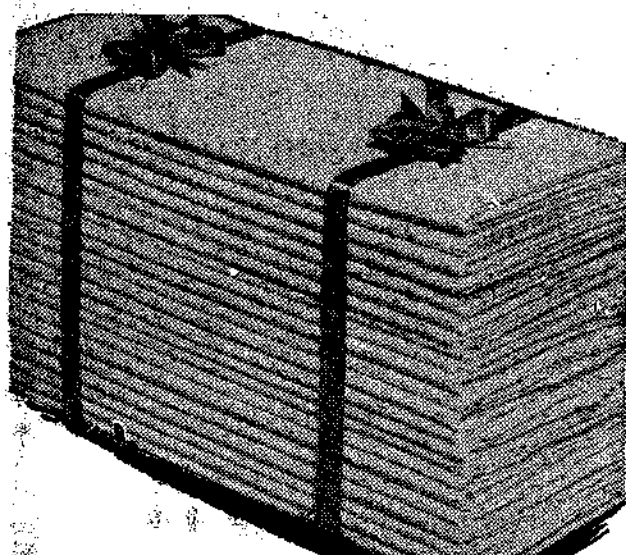

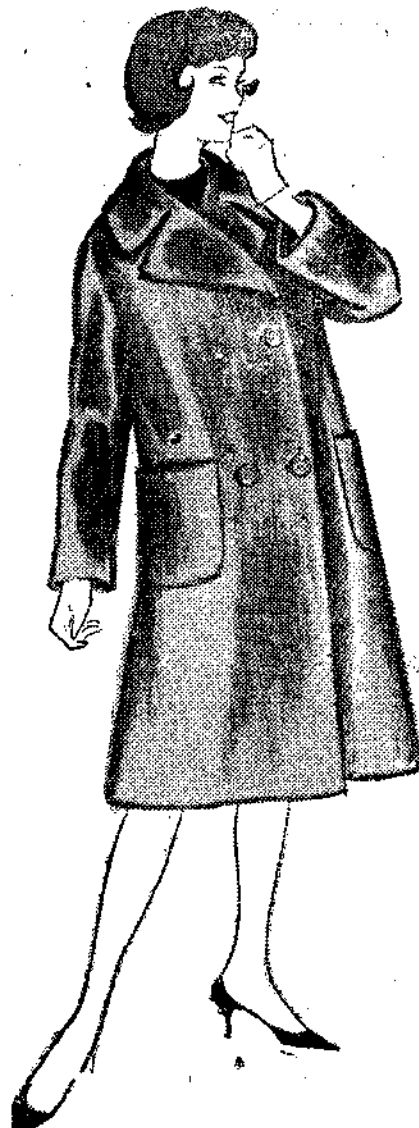

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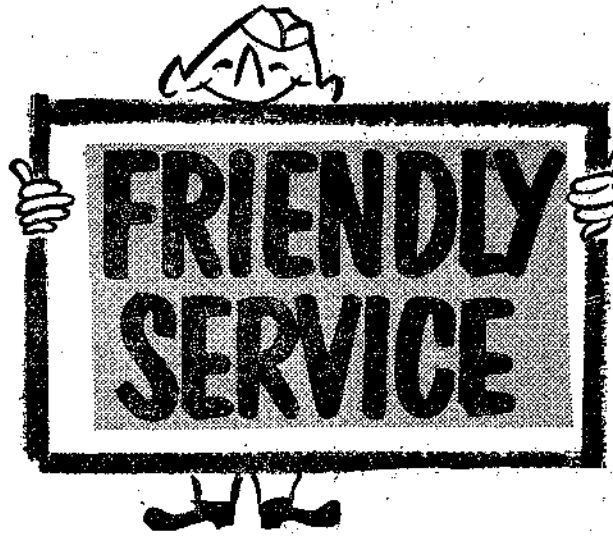

**Climate Important To Milk Yield**

Summer declines in milk production have generally been associated with changes in a cow's feed supply. Climate may be an even more important villain.

"Both humidity and temperature can affect milk production," Burton Cargill, Michigan State University agricultural engineer, told the semi-annual meeting of the American Society of Agricultural Engineers.

The U. S. Weather Bureau's recently devised Discomfort Index reflects combined temperature and humidity. In a research project at the University of Missouri, Cargill looked into the relationship between the index and milk production of individual cows.

"Under controlled laboratory conditions, production declined when the index got above about 75," Cargill told the engineers.

Optimum production occurred when conditions ranged from 77 degrees Fahrenheit and 80 per cent relative humidity to 90 degrees and 15 per cent humidity. As temperature goes up, the tolerable humidity declines.

"Much of the world does not have this kind of climate," Cargill pointed out. "Engineers may help by designing certain types of summer shelters which can maintain or boost milk production."

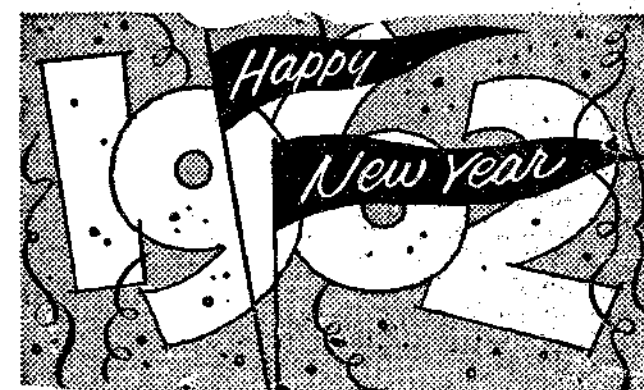

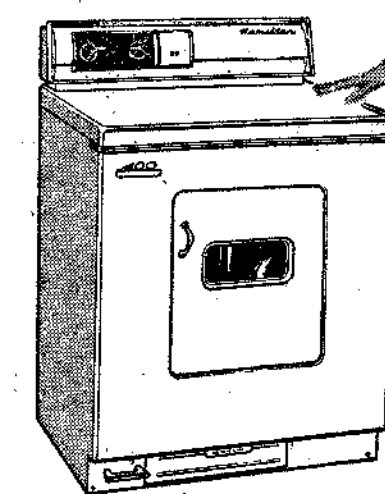

## Michigan Mirror

### Higher Education Has Changed Since 1907-8 State Constitution Was Written

Higher education in Michigan, especially in state-supported institutions, has come a long way since the 1907-08 constitution was written.

At that time the document, which is now under scrutiny for revision in Lansing, listed only

one institution, the University of Michigan, as a constitutional entity unto itself.

Now, two universities have been added to the list, Wayne State University and Michigan State University, and many of the other state institutions of higher learning have changed their status.

Eastern, Western and Central were formerly teachers' colleges. They have gained university status and their enrollments reach new limits almost yearly. The others, Northern Michigan College, Michigan Tech and Ferris Institute, have also grown with increasing rapidity.

This year, a 10th four-year institution was created by the legislature for western Michigan, now known as Grand Valley State College.

During the years these developments have taken place, other changes in the field of higher education have also been recorded. The number, size and curricula in community colleges have increased.

Educators now say the community colleges will gain in importance in future years, at least partly because of the rising need of some post-high school training for employment.

Michigan's college-age population, youth between the ages of 18 and 24, will be 95 per cent larger in 1975 than it was last year, according to a prediction by Dr. David Goldberg, program director of the University of Michigan's Institute of Public Administration.

This would give Michigan's colleges and universities a potential enrollment of better than 400,000 students in less than 15 years.

Need for a sound philosophy by state leaders about the financing of college education is underlined in a Wayne State University proposal which comes up for legislative consideration in the next session.

Wayne has submitted a plan to raise tuition at that university in return for an increase in state support. "The matching feature," says President Clarence B. Hilberry, "means a sharing of responsibility by the taxpayers and by the families immediately concerned, rather than the assignment of the whole cost to either." Wayne proposes that state funds be increased \$4 for each \$1 in tuition.

Loans to students is another suggestion from Wayne. This deferred payment feature would require the student or his family to start payment after he had finished college.

Initial reaction from legislators has been one of "interest." This is proper and predictable. Anyone connected with the budget should be interested in ways to reduce it and to make state

money go further.

It should be remembered, however, that one way to eliminate taxes completely would be to eliminate all state services. The other extreme is to eliminate the financial problem for the student and pay complete tuition costs.

What Michigan needs in order to have a sound solution to its college financing question is a facing up to the basic problem of what people of the state want to supply in the way of higher education for Michigan youth.

If higher education is sufficiently important to make it available to a high percentage of qualified high school graduates, increasing tuition seems to be a step in the wrong direction. If college training is to be made available to those who can afford to pay the portion the state cannot or does not pay, then the increase in the cost to the student makes sense.

Until the philosophical policy is determined, educators, legislators and the public will be dealing with stopgap ideas.

Women drivers may take some encouragement from a national study which shows the female motorist has far fewer accidents than men.

That is, the report is cheering for women if they read only the first section.

The final conclusion of a 12-month study by the National Safety Council indicates women have less accidents than men, but in proportion to the number of miles driven by the sexes, women have the poorer record.

About 61 million male drivers were involved in 15 million accidents during the study. In the same period 3,500,000 accidents occurred involving the nation's 21 million women drivers.

### What's Wrong With Television Westerns

TV Westerns — a minority report: There are persons who think TV western programs are dangerous to the morals of our children. As the father of three and a man in a profession concerned about our sagging morals, I disagree. While hardly vigorous drama or significant culture, and certainly having many objectionable features, it's not all bad.

Our tribe finds these programs to be high humor; for example, with the multiplicity of such programs, it is not unusual to see a man 'strung up' at 7:00; the same man a victorious defender of law and order at 8:00; only to live again as a romantic cow-puncher at 9:00! More humor in westerns: 'good men' always hit their human targets on the shoulder, thus not playing 'the killer type'; women shooting always hit their target; men in black apparel are always the 'bad men', etc.

Another point in behalf of westerns is the fact that always the bad man loses — the good man wins. Where can you beat that?

Despite intensive promotion by safety councils, most drivers have not installed safety belts in their cars. Research has left no room for doubt that a fastened safety belt reduces the extent and number of injuries and has saved countless lives. It seems to me that the coming of icy highways emphasizes the responsibility to our passengers and ourselves to provide the maximum safety possible. How does the value of your wife or child compare to the cost of safety belts?

Some of my readers have been questioning why I, a clergyman, have left Christmas cheer and warmth to come from my fellow columnist, 'Wandering With Warren.' The answer really is quite simple and, I think, necessary. When Mr. Haire asked me to write this column we agreed that I should steer clear of sectarian interpretation of events. For a man whose calling is the most important thing in his life, this is not always easy but it is basic to this form of writing. (What would happen if all my colleagues demanded 'equal time'?)

In honesty, I must admit that 'Payola' has reared its head in connection with the column. You will recall that three weeks ago I
