

Twenty-one more students will be attending Cass - City Pub'ic Schools this fall, following action by the Cass City School Board at a special meeting Monday night at the High School.

During the meeting, the board approved a request by Wickware school to annex to Cass City and accepted a proposal to transport students from the Stone school. Ten of the students will come from Wickware school which asked the board in a letter for approval to "annex or consolidate" to Cass City. The decision to annex was passed six to four

by the Wickware board at the annual meeting held recently. Approval must now be obtained from the Michigan Department of Public Instruction before the annexation becomes official. Wickware school is located east of Cass City. Following State approval, Wickware district voters will vote on the annexation.

The remaining 11 students will come from Stone school which asked that students in grades one through six be transported to Cass City. Senior high students are already attending Cass City. In approving the proposal, the

board passed a motion to accept the students as tuition students. In other business, the board was given the go-ahead sign by the County School Board to seek

bids on the cost of the proposed type A special education room. In a letter to the Cass City Board, the County board approved plans and a tentative estimate on the cost of the room. Rooms were also approved for Kingston and Mayville. Architect for the building is Warren Holmes, Lansing. Bids will be opened Tuesday, July 17.

School will begin Tuesday, September 4, according to the school calendar approved by the board at the meeting. The calendar is much the same as the 1961-62 calendar except that school

will be dismissed two days earlier than this year. The only other important

Community colleges are used for continuing education and night study. What are a community col-
