# Supervisors Okay Pay Raise for **Probate Official**

Tuscola County's 25-member Board of Supervisors voted an \$800 per year pay raise for Mrs. Beatrice P. Berry, register of probate, during their monthly day-long session Monday at the Courthouse, Caro.

In granting Mrs. Berry the increase, the board turned down an original request for \$1,400 on the grounds that they "might set a precedent."

Mrs. Berry sought the raise because of extra work caused by the Supreme Court's suspension earlier in the year of Probate Judge Henderson Graham.

The approved raise is retroactive to June 1, 1962, and is in effect until "normalcy of the office has been resolved."

#### **Confirm Appointment**

Confirmation of County Treasurer Arthur Willits as County Civil Defense Supply and Procurement officer was given by the board, following a request from the County Civil Defense Committee.

Willits was appointed to the post earlier by Frank Kroswek, county civil defense director.

On other fronts, the board approved the purchase of six chairs for the Social Service office; a typewriter for the Veterans' Council office and a water heater for the County Jail.

In closing out their session, the board set Tuesday, August 14, as the date for the annual County picnic for supervisors and county officials.

The next regular board meeting will be held Monday, August 13.

School electors will discuss the possibility of adding two classrooms to the building. It will be the second attempt to add more snace to the facility.

Despite an austerity budget for the past school year, Cass City Public School finished the year with a \$18,000 deficit, it was pointed out during a reading of the annual financial report at a Board of Education meeting Monday night at the High

School. Treasurer William Ruhl delivered the report, prepared by school accountants Leppin and

Gerou, Pigeon. On other fronts, the board purchased two new school buses (see story), discussed an auto mechanics class and accepted two parcels of land into the school district.

Although the school showed a deficit as of June 30, it did not go as far in debt as last year, because \$11,000 of the figure was

carried over from the previous year, for a cut in spending of \$3.000. The report, figured on a cash

basis, showed a balance in the general fund of \$266.22 as compared to \$7,821.64 for 1961. Neither figure is a true picture, because the report does not show outstanding debts. Instructional and administra-

tive costs were both down over \$1,000 as compared to 1961 expenditures. Instructional costs dropped from \$281,900 in 1961 to \$280,486 for the past year.

Administrative expenditures came down from \$25,022 for 1961 to \$24,015. Both reductions are reflected in a cutback in supply expenditures and no pay increases for administrative personnel. Another bright note in the school's financial picture is the

fact that it has \$56,060.02 in the Debt Retirement Fund, almost twice the \$29,000 required by law. The extra money is shown in the recent evaluation increase. **Mechanics** Class

What happens when you are out of sight of land on Lake Huron and your compass is swinging in dizzy circles? If you're like Frank and Glen Meiser, you set your boat in what you hope is a straight line and pray

that the gas holds out. Sunday the Meisers started on what they hoped would be a successful fishing trip to the Charities. Up bright and early, they hit the islands about 9 a. m. But the water started to become choppy and shortly after arriving they decided to return home as a safety precaution.

It proved to be a wise decision.

# Snoverite "Steamed Up" Over Mammoth Steam Engine

steam engines is nothing new for Morris Meredith, who has been around them since he was a toddler on the 32-acre farm where he now lives.

When most men get together there is usually talk of sports, politics, war or other important things. When Meredith, the 60 members of the Saginaw Valley Live Steam Association and the thousands of people who come to see their exhibits get together, there is talk of nothing but steam and steam engines.

Meredith, one of the most enthusiastic steam enthusiasts, is slated to be one of two Cass City area representatives at the annual association meet in Vassar July 20, 21, 22.

Despite his love for the mammoth antiques, he purchased his first engine, a 1924 Huber, from its original owner in Central Lake just a little over a year ago.

Stripped down to its essentials, the "naked engine and wheels" had stood in the same building for 31 years, generating power

Getting "steamed up" over to its original shape, size and beauty.

Restored, the gigantic green and red tractor stands 12 feet high, is eight feet, nine inches wide, 19 feet long, and weighs a

staggering 15 tons. Work included restoring all the brass fixtures, piping, canopy, tanks, stand and flues.

ever made, is capable of turning out 25 horsepower after reaching a working steam pressure of 150 pounds.

It was originally built to pull 12-14 inch plows in prairie sod.

> He also has the first sawmill installed in Port Austin in 1838. Meredith also has a nondescript smaller steam engine that he built himself. He resurrected the engine from a huckleberry marsh, purchased the boiler from another place, made the running gears and added a governor and steam pumps he already had. It was on exhibit at the Vassar meet last year.

Board Approves **Buses** 

Cass City Public School's transportation system received a needed shot in the arm Monday night when Board of Education members voted to purchase two new 54-passenger school buses.

The new buses, with chasis supplied by local dealers and bodies by Wayne Body, Lansing, will replace two buses dating back to 1947 and 1948. With the replacement of the two old buses, the system will not have a bus over eight years old. The school currently operates 14 buses, two of them leased locally. Chasis for the buses will be supplied by Bulen Motors and Rabideau Motor Sales, both of Cass City. The bodies will be purchased through McFadden Corporation, Lansing. Despite a new innovation in the bus bodies, the school will save approximately \$200 per body over the same body purchased in 1960-61. The new bodies, costing \$3,-275 each as compared to \$3,416 in 1961, will have rubber covered flooring. In deciding on the Wayne body, the board turned down a request by Grant Glaspie, Cass City Ward hus body representative, to submit bids on the bodies. Board members felt that since most of the school's buses had Wayne bodies, it would be in the best interest of the school to continue with that line. The buses were the first purchased since 1960-61. Up to that time, since 1954, the school had purchased at least one and sometimes two buses per year. Purchases include one in 1954, two in 1955, one in 1956, two in 1957 and one a year from 1958 to 1960.

**Caro State Hospital Tuscola County's Largest Industry** 

Its importance to Tuscola county's economy and the services offered at Caro State Hospital were sharply outlined by Dr. W. W. Dickerson, director, in an offthe-cuff talk at the Cass City Rotary Club Tuesday noon at the New Gordon Hotel.

We are the county's largest industry and the payroll for our 690 employees reaches three and a quarter million dollars yearly, Dickerson said. According to figures compiled by Alfred Ballweg, Tuscola county agricultural agent, that's about as much as the rest of the county's industry combined and approaches the agricultural income of the area, Dickerson ex-

plained. Today the hospital that cost \$4 million to build and has a replacement value of much more is a busy place. There is a waiting list of 77 patients who are qualified for admittance and 1,850 patients

are now cared for in the facility. The hospital was started in 1913 and additions periodically erected as demand for the services increased. All employees are under civil service. Despite this, we recruit most of the people we want and have them take the test so that they will be available when an opening occurs, the director said.

#### Explodes Myths

"We have no typical epileptic patients at the hospital," said Dickerson. "It's another of the misconceptions about the hospital."

### Vaccinate for Brucellosis Cure

Farmers still have a long way to go before they can completely wipe out brucellosis in Michigan. But, at least 240,000 calves should be vaccinated every year, says George Parsons, extension dairyman at Michigan State Universitv.

The state of Michigan is classified by the United States Department of Agriculture as a modified-certified brucellosis free area. This means that less than one per cent of all cattle and less than five per cent of all herds are infected with the disease.

At the present time, ten counties have qualified for a certified brucellosis free rating, Parsons says. These counties are all in the Upper Peninsula. Three more counties are reaching the qualification mark for certified area. Besides Michigan, 24 states,

Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands are currently classified as modified-certified areas.

New Hampshire and 80 counties in other states have qualified as certified brucellosis-free. All of Maine and 125 counties in other states will qualify as certified brucellosis-free areas shortly.

The entire country should qualify as a modified-certified area by 1965, and by 1972 should be completely free of bovine brucellosis.

Parsons says Michigan could become a certified-free area with three years if more emphasis were put on the present testing and calfhood vaccination programs. Great improvements have been made in the reduced number of infected cattle in the state during the past 15 years.

"In 1947, we had 302 cases of undulant fever, or human brucellosis, reported in Michigan," he says.. "Most of the cases were traced back to an association with brucellosis infected cattle." In 1960, only five new cases of undulant fever were reported in Michigan.

best job of producing fast gains and lean carcasses-even Letter than corn and cob meal. But the cost of making the pellets more than offset these gains.

In testing different rations, Hoefer compared rate of gain, feed efficiency and the quality of the carcass produced. The hogs were fed a corn ration supplemented with protein, minerals, and antibiotics until they reached a weight of 125 pounds. Hoefer concludes that the high corn rations will get the hogs off to a fast start. Then the high fiber rations are used to finish the hogs for market.

But why these high fiber diets? · Hoefer says one of the big problems facing the swine industry today is a case of "just too much fat." Consumers want a leaner. more muscular hog.

The problem could be solved by breeding, but this takes years. The other solution, according to Hoefer, is the nutritional approach. Farmers can either restrict the amount of feed they give to their hogs, or they can feed a ration low in calories.

Restricting the amount of feed is difficult to control. Low energy rations are not.

# Michigan Mirror Legislature Okays Two-Year Medical **Facility at MSU—Frowns on Expansion**

By Elmer E. White

**Michigan Press Association** Michigan's fourth medical education facility is well on the way toward becoming a reality at Michigan State University.

The Legislature has specified, in the 1962-63 appropriation for MSU, that the proposed two-year preclinical medical school shall not be expanded to a four-year training program without prior legislative approval. University officials, with little

choice, plan to abide by this dic-

tate. MSU's Institute of Biology and Medicine is scheduled to officially start operation in 1964 to prepare medical doctors, biologists, nurses and medical technicians. Dr. Richard U. Byerrum, acting director of the Institute, said he consulted a group of leading medical educators to help work out details for the new program. "Since our approach is new. we wanted to know if it would

be acceptable to medical educators," he said. The educators consulted, from medical schools at various universities throughout the country, were "generally enthusiastic" about the MSU plans, Byerrum

said. The Institute will be designed to help relieve the national and state shortage of medical doctors and biologists. Because the twoyear program will instruct in only preclinical work, it will not require extensive hospital teach-

ing facilities. Students who complete it, however, will be ready to fill the many vacancies which occur annually at the third-year level in

the nation's medical schools. One bit of advice offered by Dr. Morton Levitt, assistant dean of Wayne State University's medical school, will likely be incorporated as plans for the Institute program develop, Byerrum

said. Levitt recommended that the medical program in the Institute follow traditional patterns since students will be going to other schools for their final two years of training.

MSU plans several modifications in the Institute program which are not generally used,
