

## Sheets Guilty of Cruelty to Animals

**BULLETIN:** A six-member justice court jury found Richard Sheets guilty of "cruelty to animals" and he was sentenced to pay \$106.05 in fines and costs or 30 days in jail by Justice Harry Balhoff. The trial was held Wednesday morning in Sandusky.

The case went to jury shortly before noon and a verdict was delivered at 12:30. Sheets paid the fine.

A Cass City man was to have appeared in Sanilac Justice Court Wednesday morning to answer charges of "cruelty to animals," in connection with the starvation death of a number of head of livestock on a farm four and a half miles east of Cass City last week.

Sheets is accused of abandoning a dairy herd of more than 30 Holsteins and other livestock on the farm he occupied as a tenant farmer.

Sanilac County Sheriff's deputies report that Sheets told them he had an oral agreement to purchase the farm from Hyman Margolis, Oak Park. He said he became "fed up" when Margolis never came up to sign the contract. He reportedly abandoned the farm about a week before the livestock was discovered.

Slatel to appear to answer to the charges was Richard Sheets, 28. The jury trial was to have been held at 10:00 a.m. with Justice Harry Balhoff presiding.

At the state convention, delegates will be selecting candidates for state superintendent of public instruction, two seats on the University of Michigan board of regents, two seats on the Wayne State University board of governors, two seats on the Michigan State University board of trustees and two state supreme court justices.

They will also select new state central committee chairman and vice-chairman.

Circulation of 769 books in Cass City and Elkland township public library in the month of January showed an increase of 223 over the month of December and an increase of 12 over the number checked out to readers in January of 1962.

## "Schools Won't Run On Money Alone"

## Stickle Urges More Interest

"The day is fast approaching when Cass City will be unable to compete successfully with other schools because other schools have more and better teachers," Robert Stickle, Teacher's Club representative, stated in an interview this week on the club's proposal for teacher pay raises.

Stickle presented the pay raise proposal at the last board of education meeting in January. It is expected the board will act on the proposal at its next session, Feb. 11.

"Money alone isn't enough," Stickle stressed. "We have to have a community that's interested in having a good school."

Primarily, the teachers are seeking a pay raise because of increased teaching and pupil loads and because of the past year's jump in the cost of living.

Last year's board decision to change from a six-hour day to seven hours resulted in an increased student load, Stickle explains.

One teacher's student load jumped from 140 to 190 students. Although not an average, Stickle pointed out that the extra 50 students could represent 10-12 hours per week outside of the classroom.

The cost of living last year rose \$150, wiping out, Stickle contends, the \$100-a-year raise teachers were granted last February.

Stickle pointed out a number of problems inherent in the school in regard to facilities and supplies, which, he claimed, could be rectified with a millage increase.

When asked if he thought the teachers should push for a millage increase, he remarked, "It's not the teacher's business to advocate a millage increase . . . that was one of the things that caused ill feelings last year. The community thought the teachers were trying to get the millage passed to get a pay raise."

"The job of persons in education is to point out what is needed and it is the job of the community to do its best to support the school," he concluded.

Current Proposal

The current proposal by the teachers, in brief, seeks a base pay rate increase of \$100 to \$4,700; a six year increase at \$200 and six years at \$100; a master's degree differential raise from the present \$200 to \$400 and a number of intermediate pay steps. They also seek the formulation of a committee of board members, teachers and citizens to study merit pay and related systems.

Using a current Michigan Education Association salary study of schools of comparable size and evaluation, Stickle pointed out that four area schools are carrying higher millage loads than Cass City.

"The tax load for schools in this community is among the lowest in the state," he remarked.

Stickle cited Bad Axe, Caro, Marlette and Vassar, giving total millages, including operating and

Cass City is currently in a favorable position as far as minimum salary is concerned, Stickle pointed out. Of the four schools mentioned above, Cass City's current base pay of \$4,600 is the highest.

Counterbalancing this is Cass City's low increment. Although it starts out higher than the other four at \$200 for one year, the following 11 increments are currently for \$100.

The other four schools have 9-11 year increments ranging from \$125 to \$150.

Getting back to facility problems, Stickle emphasized that the teachers are concerned with many other things than salary. "Many feel teachers are interested just in salaries . . . if this were true, most of us wouldn't be doing what we're doing," he asserted.

In underlining the facility problems, Stickle cited specifically the library.

"In the past few years, we've spent just \$150 per student on the library system and much of it went to the new elementary library. The result is that when we assign research papers, we have to send to the State Library for materials."

He also commented that he, for instance, has to supply much of the material himself. He estimates that he spends \$50.00 annually on magazines that the school should have.

Stickle pointed out that the athletic department is also suffering from the millage shortage, stating that the two coaches "can't possibly handle all the programs and compete with other schools."

He also pointed out guidance needs, remarking that the system is one person short in that area. "A school this size should have someone entirely responsible for curriculum coordination."

In closing, Stickle charged, "A solution won't come necessarily with the passing of a millage proposal. It has to come as a result of an increased interest in the school by the community . . . money alone isn't enough . . . we have to have a community that's interested in having a good school."

## Deny Petition For Steve Hrabec In Circuit Court

An attempt to have Steve Hrabec, 78, Cass City, committed to Northville Institution, Northville, was dismissed Tuesday in Probate Court following a motion by County Prosecutor James Epskamp.

Hrabec is being held on a felonious assault with intent to murder" charge in connection with the November 5 hammer attack on his wife, Catherine, 83.

The petition to have Hrabec committed was denied by Judge Neil R. MacCallum, Bad Axe. Judge MacCallum, in acting on Epskamp's motion to dismiss, declared that as long as the case was under the jurisdiction of the Circuit Court, the Probate Court couldn't act on it.

The case was returned to Circuit Court.

**Agent's Corner**

The potato is a native of the Americas and when it first reached Europe in the early 16th century seemed to be a real "gosh present" from the New World to the Old ("Gosh, what'll we do with it?") Europeans did not care if the South American natives did love potatoes; they, the Europeans, were not about to eat them.

In Scotland they were absolutely shunned as the forbidden fruit of the Garden of Eden. Russians, now the world's greatest potato eaters, were once warned away from potatoes as "abominations" because, said some of their patriarchs, they were not mentioned in the Bible. Frederick the Great of Germany sent potatoes to a part of Swabia in 1774 to feed the people of one famine-stricken area. As a sort of home demonstration agent, he sent along a Swabian gendarme to strong-arm people into taking at least an experimental taste of

the mysterious new tuber. As late as 1771 the French were still so suspicious of potatoes that it became necessary for the medical faculty of Paris to announce that the potato was a good healthy food, in no way injurious to health and of great utility. Only the Irish immediately and forever made the potato their own favorite vegetable.

In time everyone began to enjoy potatoes so that today white potatoes are the largest and most valuable vegetable crop in the world. World production of potatoes exceeds any other table food plant, including any cereal. In the U. S., however, potato production is outstripped by that of wheat, corn and oats although far more potatoes are used for human food than either corn or oats.

Because potatoes are satisfying and have a bland flavor which goes with the traditional foods of many countries, we find them in use in almost all parts of the globe. This is fortunate because potatoes are a highly nutritious food. Because of their high mineral and vitamin content and the large amounts consumed, potatoes are one of our most important protective foods. Low in cost, they are an important bulwark against scurvy in many nations. Their high carbohydrate content makes them an important source of energy.

Just a quickie before I end my article. Did you know that science is really trying to help the dieter who does not like black coffee? New cream replacements are being tested at Michigan State University and will soon be tried by consumers. These new substitutes contain less than 10 calories per serving.

These mixtures are made from skim milk and contain less than one-tenth of one per cent fat when dispersed in coffee. Most creaming powders have anywhere from 12 to 25 per cent fat.

And here's more good news: the new mixtures will cost about the same as non-fat dry milk and much less than regular cream substitutes.

The processing companies will now try to find out if there is a market for the new products. Tests have shown that the mixtures work well, but it's up to the public to accept or reject the new products.

The mixtures make coffee taste like powdered skim milk has been added to it, but the coffee is not diluted out and any bitterness is counteracted.

The consumers will now tell the processor if the lack of fat flavor will be accepted by burying the product or not burying it.

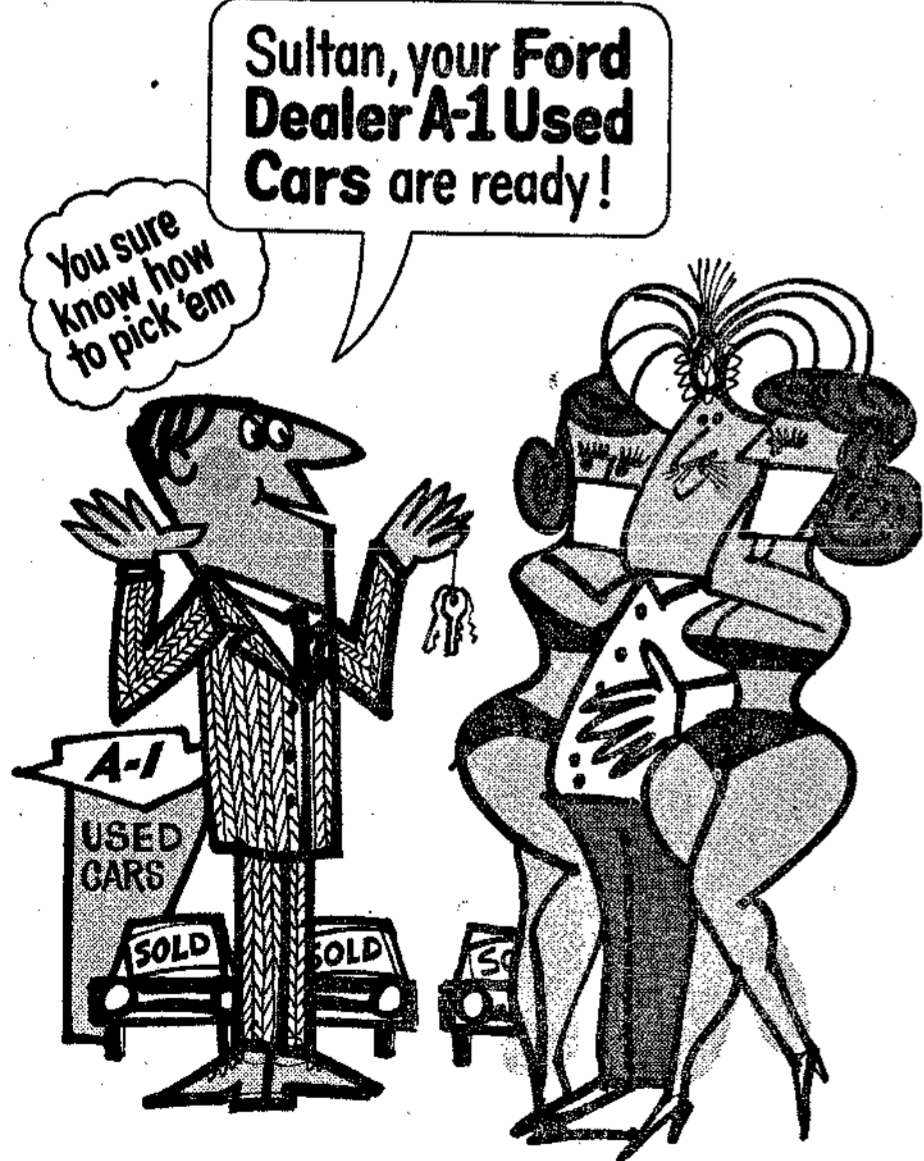

**Education Authority's Guarantee Loan Plan Helps Qualified Secure Education**

Michigan's higher education Assistance Authority, created by the Legislature but not given any funds to accomplish its purpose, is making great strides.

The Authority now has more than 50 banks participating in a loan guarantee program, whereby the banks back up loans in the amount of 10 times that which the Authority actually has available.

Superintendent of Public Instruction Lynn M. Bartlett said the guaranty plan was growing far more rapidly than was anticipated when it was first attempted.

The Authority was created by the Legislature in 1960 for the purpose of helping make it possible for every qualified girl and boy in Michigan to obtain assistance in financing his college education.

Because the Legislature failed to appropriate funds for its operation in both 1960 and the succeeding years, the Authority last fall planned the arrangement with Michigan banks.

Contributions for loans held at the various Michigan colleges

and universities are matched by the banks on a 10-to-1 basis by the participating financial institutions.

To date, Bartlett said nearly 60 loans have been granted to students at eight of the Michigan colleges and universities, both public and private, and Michigan students going to four out-of-state institutions have been granted them.

\*\*\*

Plans Farmer Tour

Still glowing over the high praise received for his department's part in the very successful "All Michigan Dinner" during the annual Michigan Press Association convention, State Agriculture Director George S. McIntyre is making plans for another unusual venture.

McIntyre gives much of the credit for the success of the All Michigan Dinner to his administrative assistant, Joe E. Wells, who worked for weeks ahead planning the meal of Michigan products and getting contributions from farm groups and food producers for the "gift bag" given to each guest.

This is the second consecutive year for another promotion. McIntyre, who serves as executive

committee chairman of the National Association of State Departments of Agriculture, will soon visit Europe and Asia laying plans for farmers' tours.

The Association sponsors tours of countries abroad for farm groups to see how their counterparts in Europe and Asia operate. A Michigan group went last year and initial indications are that farmers from 27 states will go on tours this year, McIntyre said.

His job on the two-week tour abroad is to line up tour arrangements. McIntyre will be working with Les Davis, coordinator of the Goodwill People-to-People program.

The two will consult with ambassadors, agricultural attaches and agricultural officials in Brussels, Moscow, Warsaw, Budapest, Berlin, Paris and London in making the selection of agricultural points of interest to be visited this year.

\*\*\*

Team Effort

Who is responsible for the widespread recognition of the progress of Michigan's highway system? Some would give the credit to one man alone.

But the man who might draw this credit, Highway Commis-

sioner John C. Mackie, says "teamwork at all levels" has been the key to success of Michigan's highway construction program.

"Without the understanding and support of local units of government, the Legislature, chambers of commerce, highway associations, news media and the people of Michigan, the success of our road building program would not be possible," he said.

Mackie notes that highway building is a "partnership" between the State Highway Department, city and village commissions, County Boards of Supervisors and County Road Commissions.

"It is because all of these groups, by and large, have been willing to work for better highways for Michigan that we have been able to accomplish what we have in recent years," he said.

Emphasizing the need for continued cooperation, Mackie said, "instead of getting Michigan out of the mud", as was the battle-cry in the 1920's, the problem now is how to keep the state out of a monstrous traffic jam brought on by its wonderful growth."
