The cookbook was printed in 1771 and the two books of poems in her lap were printed in 1810. She discovered all three in an estate left by her stepmother, Mrs. William Spurgeon, 35 years ago. (Chronicle

Antique Cookbook Valuable Keepsake

George Washington's favorite pie or Thomas Jefferson's best-loved cake or King George IV's favorite pudding?

Never? Well, don't feel bad; few persons living have, but Mrs. John Marshall of Cass City has a 192-year-old cookbook full of recipes that these dignitaries might have enjoyed and you're welcome to use it.

While you're waiting for your pie to bake, Mrs. Marshall also has two 153-year-old volumes of poems and plays to help you while away the hours.

Mrs. Marshall received the books 35 years ago, in 1927, as bart of an estate left by her stepmother, Mrs. William Spurgeon, a native of England. At that time, the books were just over a century and a half old.

The oldest book, "The Experienced English House-Keeper," was published in 1771 in Manchester, England, by Elizabeth Raffald.

The other two, a set, were ten by the Rev. James Hurdis, D.D., "late fellow of Magdalen College and Professor of Poetry in the University of Oxford," in

The cookbook is perhaps the most unusual of the group. It uses the old style letter "s" which closely resembles the letter "f", except where the "s" is on the end of the word.

The effect causes the reader to wonder if perhaps the author had a speech defect. "Goose" becomes "goofe", "glass" turns into "glafs" and "sweet, skin and shank" become "fweet, fkin and fhank."

Still in excellent condition, the book has obviously been rebound, perhaps sometime before 1890. A cure, pasted to one of the pages, has the date "23-7-90."

The cure, itself, shows how times have changed, even since 1890. It reads: "Dr. Salisbury's Cure for Indigestion, from H. Williams: One pint very hot pure water. One pound cold beef(very little fat). To be taken for breakfast, dinner and supper till the yeasting of the stomack is stopped and the indigestion ceases. This is the "Salisbury" cure, so called of Dr. Salisbury, the famous American physician who invented it. The cure generally takes two or

The volumes by Rev. Hurdis are the most attractive. Bound in gold leather with gold embossing and gold trim, both are in excellent condition.

One of the books is "The Favourite Village with an Additional Poem" and the other is "The Village Curate and Other Poems; including Some Pieces Now First

The books and the author were patroned by the Queen, a very. high honor.

Mrs. Marshall's stepmother came from England in 1910. When she died Mrs. Marshall found the books.

Mrs. Marshall theorized that her stepmother may have gotten the books from a cousin. The cousin worked for an English gentleman who died and left her

his estate. A report on the books appeared the Chronicle 35 years ago, shortly after she found the books. "It was quite a curiosity, that's why I took them. down to Herb

(Lenzner)," she explains. No value has been placed on the books. "They're just keepsakes," Mrs. Marshall reports. She has never been approached to sell them. Persons wishing to borrow the books may do so, Mrs. Marshall offered, as long as they take care of them.

"I'd like to pass them on to Jack (her son)," she says.

When asked if she ever used any of the recipes, she replied, "No, I never had time. If only I'd had as much time when I was young as I have now, I'd have enjoyed them more."

Mrs. Marshall, who will be 90 next June, has lots of time. She lives in retirement with her son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. John Marshall, on the farm built for her and her husband when they were married 56 years ago.

"It was nothing but rail fences and muddy roads when I came here," she reports. "The whole country has changed."

The farm is four and a half miles northeast of Cass City. The house, a huge, white brick affair, sits in the middle of a well-kept, large lawn surrounded by shrubs.

Mrs. Marshall's sharp, quick mind and gracious manner belie her 90 years. She keeps active by working crossword puzzles and watching quiz shows on television. "I don't care for westerns," she

says. Other times she reads or "just sits and does nothing."

> Wheat growers have two choices. A "yes" vote cast by twothirds or more of the growers voting will mean acreage allotments and marketing quotas. The total U. S. allotment will be 49.5 million acres and a marketing quota of 1,220 million bushels with 80 per cent, or 975 million bushels. certificated for a \$2.00 price sup-To the individual wheat farmer

this means a two-price system. The 80 per cent allocation will be known as "certificated wheat." Farmers will be issued certificates enabling them to get \$2.00 bushel for 80 per cent of the normal yield on their allotted acres (but not to exceed the normal yield on the farm's planted acres). All other eligible wheat will be guaranteed a price of \$1.30 per bushel, or about the current world price

If more than a third of the farmers vote "no", there will be almost no limits on production or marketings. The price support will be set at 50 per cent of parity or \$1.25 per bushel nationally for those planting within their allot- chances on a free market price.

Wheat is the most widely grown field crop in the United States. It is grown on more than half of the nation's 3.7 million farms.

Approximately 115,000 farms in Michigan grow wheat. Wheat, as a cash crop, brings in about eight per cent of the state's farm income.

In Tuscola county, wheat is grown on about 4,000 farms. The 50,000 acres normally planted means an annual wheat crop of around 2,000,000 bushels. Sale of wheat brings in about 18 per cent of the county's farm income, according to Alfred Ballweg, county extension director.

Since 1950, the U.S. wheat crop has averaged well over a billion bushels a year. That's double our annual needs for domestic use. Even with exports and foreign aid programs, the country maintains about a two-year domestic supply in storage.

Farmers must decide whether they want acreage allotments and marketing quotas in exchange for a guaranteed high price and payments for diverting land out of wheat. The alternative would be almost no limits on production or marketing. Farmers who planted within allotments would be eligible for price supports averaging \$1.25. Others would take their

Three New Bean Varieties Developed

Three new navy bean varieties are now available to Tuscola county growers for certified seed production, said Alfred Ballweg, county extension director. They are Gratiot, Saginaw and Michelite 62 -- all of which are joint releases of the Michigan Agricultural Experiment Station and the

U. S. Department of Agriculture. Gratiot is the first bush-type navy bean variety that is fully resistant to both bean anthracnose and common bean mosaic. It is a midseason, upright bush bean which has proved widely adaptable in tests conducted by Wayne Adams, MSU farm crops researcher, and Axel Andersen, USDA plant pathologist.

Saginaw and Michelite 62 are upright, vine-type navy beans which are also resistant to bean anthracnose and mosaic.

Developing disease resistance in beans is a slow process. Navy bean breeding, genetics and pathology were begun at MSU in 1948, but it wasn't until 1957 that Sanilac, the first variety resistant to bean anthracnose and mosaic, was released in quantity.

The researchers are presently working on a program to develop varieties resistant to bean root rot. "We are fairly confident that we will have highly resistant strains for preliminary testing by 1965," reports Adams. "Farmers will be able to purchase resistant varieties within four to five years after that."

The crop scientists have already found a tropical variety of navy beans which is highly resistant to the disease. Unfortunately, it is a black bean which is undesirable in quality and too late for Michigan's growing season. However, the scientists hope to use this bean to help develop a popular, high-yielding, disease-free variety which can be profitably grown in the state.
