

## From the Editor's Corner

It's the computer age. Representatives of the natural gas companies say they can tell within one or two homes how many customers they will have in a given area before they move in. In Cass City, they say they will have about 200 customers and about 190 of them will be using gas for heating purposes.

Organizers of the National Farmers Organization, which was to have held a 7th district meeting here Wednesday, expected to have upwards from 2,000 persons attend.

There had been talk of a holding action on milk in the fall, but a representative from the NFO parent organization is non-committal.

Donald Trost, of Northwood, Iowa, in town for the district meeting, says that headquarters will make up its mind on a holding action after hearing from locals concerning preferences.

The NFO feels that it can be a very effective bargaining organization with as little as 60 per cent of the farmers in an area participating.

But the NFO, like other farm organizations, has yet to prove that it can overcome the major stumbling blocks to effective collective bargaining: the independence of farmers and the perishable product that farms offer for sale.

## Hold Suspect for Forgery of Clark Company Checks

The Tuscola County Sheriff's Department is investigating the theft of payroll checks from the W. N. Clark Co. of Caro. Four of the stolen checks have been fraudulently cashed for a total value of \$247.24.

The victims are the various stores which cashed the checks. The Clark Co. stopped payment on the checks and they did not clear the Caro bank, they were drawn against.

Tuscola Sheriff Hugh Marr said that the police of Saginaw are holding a suspect in the case on another charge of probation violation.

He said that some of the stolen checks were found on the suspect, Lester Smith of Saginaw. Smith has denied implication in the forgeries and theft.

**Mailboxes Damaged**  
The sheriff's department is investigating a complaint by Mrs. Clayton Hobart of East Caro Road. She reports that her mailbox was smashed by an unidentified car. The box of Henry Kuehne at the same location was also hit.

Another smashed mailbox complaint was investigated at the home of Lester Battel, sheriff's deputies said.

## New Open Hours At Post Office

Postmaster Lewis Bishop announced new open hours for the post office in Cass City this week. He said that a new schedule for window service will start Monday.

The window service will be available from 8:30 a. m. to 5 p. m. daily. The former hours were from 9 a. m. to 5:30 p. m.

The windows will close at noon on Saturday. The new schedule advances the opening and closing hours of the department and with other changes will enable village residents to have mail service an hour earlier than they now have, Bishop explained.

## Plan to Bid Curb and Gutter For Garfield St.

Curb and gutter for Garfield Street in Cass City, delayed because of the possibility of the tearing up of the street for natural gas lines, has been given the green light again.

President Lee Rabideau said that no projects planned would interfere with the work. Specifications are now being drawn and the work will be let on a bid basis.

The work will start at Seeger street, extend east to the end of Garfield street and will be completed this year.

The council considered a petition by local residents about stray dogs in the village. The entire dog control problem was reviewed.

A resolution was passed by the council as one of the steps necessary in issuing the bonds for \$75,000 for a new water system in Cass City.

Holbrook was placed on a year's probation and ordered to pay a fine of \$150 and costs of \$100 at \$20 weekly.

Holbrook admitted stealing from Billy Joe Kelly of Arbela township. He took an electric razor, 22 caliber pistol, transistor radio and other items.

## Low Price Hurts

## Wheat Crop Good, But Not Great

Although not in the bumper crop category, this year's wheat crop is better than anyone thought it would be, George Fisher, manager of Cass City Frutchey Bean Co., said Tuesday.

With about 80 per cent of the crop harvested, Fisher said that he estimated the yield at 40 to 45 bushels to the acre.

"It is a very good crop considering the hard winter and the dry weather we experienced this year," Fisher explained.

The yield is slightly better than the 1962 crop. Hurt by winterkill, last year's wheat averaged about 35 to 40 bushels to the acre.

The wheat is of excellent quality and has very little moisture.

**Price Down**  
Because of the farmers' decision to do away with controls, the price of wheat is substantially lower than it was in previous years.

Last year the wheat was selling for around \$1.97 per bushel. Tuesday the price was \$1.62 per bushel.

The dates for registration of pupils for the Training Center for Retarded Children has been set for Aug. 12-13. The school is located two miles southwest of Caro, corner of Graf and Van Gieson Roads.

Parents are asked to pay a \$10 fee at registration time to cover cost of materials furnished during the school year.

## Methodists Burn Church Mortgage

Cass City Methodists have been proud of the sparkling addition to their church, completed in 1957 at a cost of \$34,000.

The work transformed the rapidly deteriorating church building to a modern house of worship, but it left the church in debt.

But now, just six short years later, the Rev. James Braid announced that the congregation has succeeded in paying off the mortgage.

The retirement of the debt was sparked by the building finance committee of the church. When the final drive started May 20, the church still owed \$1,816. About 45 days later, Dr. D. E. Rawson, committee chairman, announced that the necessary money to pay off the debt had been raised.

Assisting Rawson were Bob Keating, Bill Profit and Audley Rawson, members of the committee.

A special dedication will be held in the fall, according to Braid.

## Foreign Students Pour Into County

A continuing wave of foreign students attending colleges and universities in the United States are visiting in Tuscola county.

According to Mrs. Clare Carpenter, Tuscola County Farm Bureau Public Relations-Information chairman, their experiences could change the course of history and will be a determining factor in their attitude and understanding of the United States and its people.

After the visit by 74 foreign students in May from the Ecumenical Center at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, others expressed a desire to come to Tuscola county. In June there were nine adults and three children who came.

The guest list at the center grew until Friday, July 26, when the red carpet was waiting for 160 foreign students who came to spend the week end as part of rural American families.

The first group arrived at 6:00 from the Western Institute of Technological and Advanced Studies in Guadalajara, Mexico. This group of 27 students, three professors and three state department interpreters arrived by bus as part of a tour of the United States. They were placed by the Michigan State University Dean of International programs.

One hundred thirty students from 30 countries studying at the University of Michigan arrived at 9:00 that evening. Many of them were professional people of all ages, studying for specialized work and advanced degrees. Several brought their families with them.

## Seek Council's Sanction

## Gas Franchise Fight Raging

Consumers Power Co. made its pitch for the natural gas business in Cass City Tuesday night at the regular meeting of the village council at the Municipal Building in Cass City.

Headed by W. Anson Hitchcock, Saginaw Division manager, an eight-man contingent was present to tell how Consumers operates.

Also present was Jim Shaw, division manager for Southeastern Gas Co., the other company seeking the gas franchise.

In the opinion of trustees, each company has points in its favor. A comparison of the two companies leaves no clear-cut superiority for either.

Biggest point in the favor of Consumers is that its basic price is six per cent lower than Southeastern's.

For the average home owner this will probably not be decisive. For instance, if it cost \$241 a year to heat a home with Southeastern's rate, it would cost \$228 from Consumers.

However, Consumers charges for some types of service where Southeastern does not.

The only cost of servicing gas appliances from the Port Huron company would be for parts replaced. Labor is free in all cases.

Consumers does not charge for "light-up" calls due to malfunction of appliances, but does charge for repairs.

Consumers has a charge for hooking gas lines from the mains to the homes. This charge is \$47 for the first 60 feet. Southeastern will run lines up to 65 feet free of charge.

Consumers has a minimum charge of \$1.80 a month to gas customers, while Southeastern charges a minimum of \$1.50 to customers who do not heat with gas and \$3.12 for gas heating customers.

Representatives of both companies said that the minimum charge is rarely invoked. Practically all consumers exceed the minimum, they said.

## Delivery Schedule

The competition for business has spurred both companies. Consumers said that they would have gas in Cass City by the fall of 1964 to every home that wants it. Southeastern, which would not say in its initial meeting when

Trustee Harold Guinther about summed up the sentiments of many of the trustees when he said that Consumers has been in Caro for 30 years but did not offer natural gas until Southeastern offered to bring it to the community.

A decision in the case will be made in the near future. But before it's made, the council wants to hear from the citizens affected.

These are the trustees and an opinion expressed to one will be passed to the entire council: Harold Guinther, Jerome Root Jr., James Seals, Fred Auten, Lambert Althaver, Barney Freiburger and President Lee Rabideau.

Ora A. Rounds agreed to help out struggling Walbro Corporation for 30 days when they shifted from Fenton to Cass City and the veteran, personable toolmaker ended by "helping out" for nearly 10 years.

But all good things eventually come to an end and Ora finally called it quits Friday and a host of Walbro's dignitaries were on hand to say good-by.

In a semi-impromptu ceremony

Friday morning, Ora was presented with a dual purpose cake, commemorating his service to the company and the honor of becoming Walbro's first retiree.

Although Rounds spent only a small fraction of his working career with Walbro . . . it was by far the most satisfactory. "Of all the places I have lived and worked," he explained, "Walbro's has treated me the best."

And a statement like this cov-

ers a lot of territory. For Rounds has worked in many plants over many years.

He started as a youth, just a little over 13 years old, and has been continuously plugging away until his retirement at 70.

His first job was with a shoe factory at \$3.50 a week. He then worked in most of the various departments at Buick Motor Co. at Flint before moving on to the Flint AC factory.

It was here that he posted his longest continuous service . . . 26 years. He learned the art of tool and die making while at AC.

It was after his long tenure at AC that he came to Walbro when the company was in Fenton. There weren't many to greet him when he arrived. Only President W. E. Walpole and Engineer Bill Eberline preceded Rounds on the company payroll.

## Active Retirement

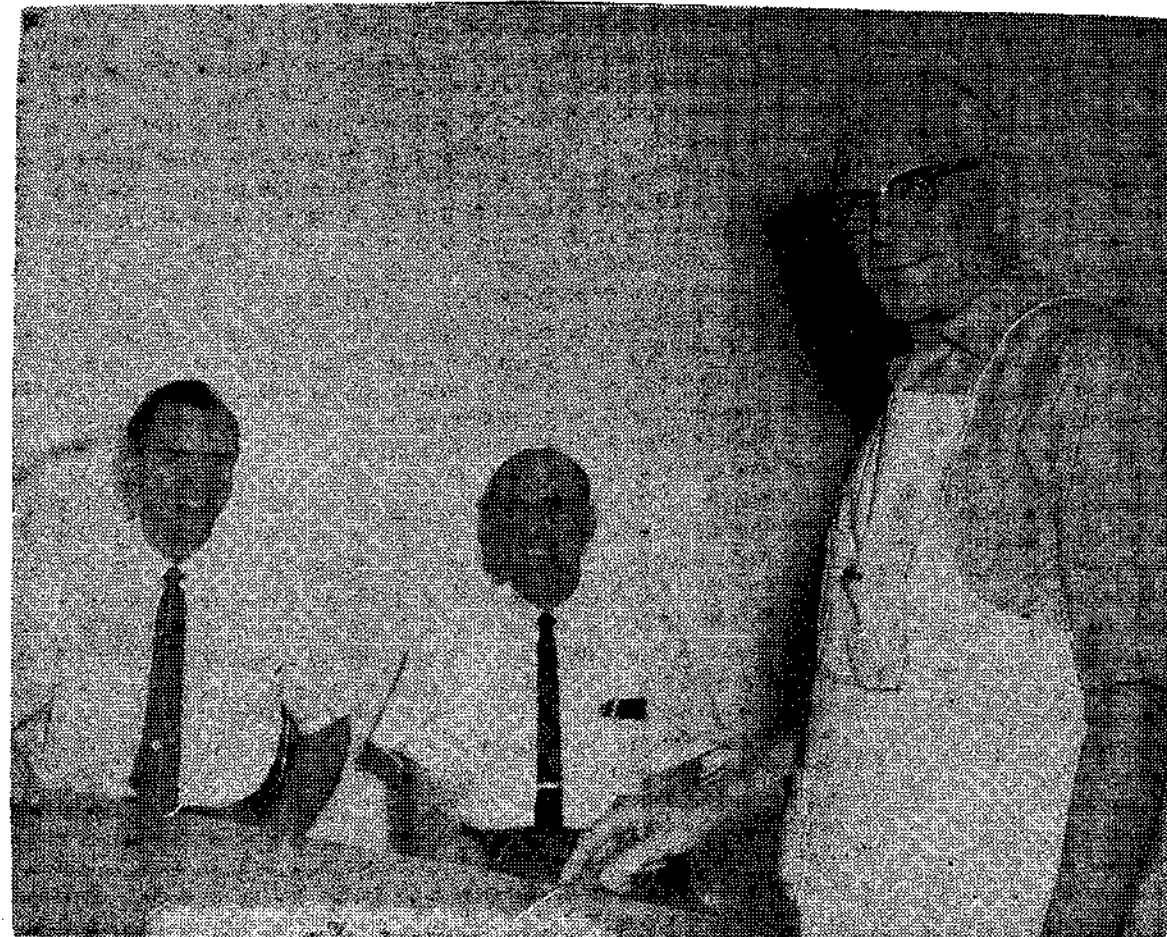
Many active persons who have worked all of their lives seem to wither away when they quit working. But Ora says this is not going to happen to him.

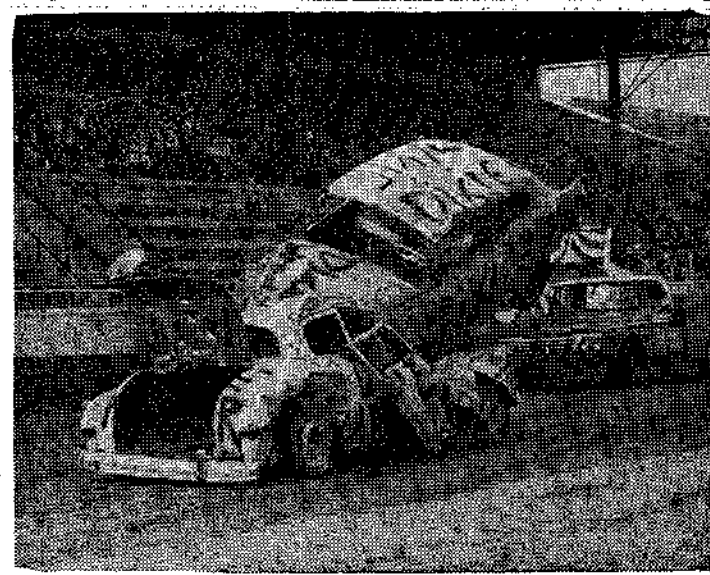

## Slate Bean Meet At 3 Area Sites

Akron, in Tuscola county, will be where one of a series of six meetings will be held throughout the huge bean-growing area of central and eastern Michigan by the Interim committee of the Michigan Senate, created to study the bean growing industry of the state.

Other meetings in the area will be held at Sandusky Saturday, Aug. 10, and Bad Axe Monday, Aug. 12.

The meeting in Akron will be held in the high school gym Friday, Aug. 9, from 8 to 10 p.m.

These area meetings are sponsored through the assistance of county agricultural agents in the counties involved. All state senators and representatives of these districts will be invited to attend.

Michigan is the largest bean producing state in the world with the heart of the crop in the central and eastern sections of the state.

The purpose of the meetings are to conduct an open public hearing to discuss the proposed Bean Commission bill.

The format of the Aug. 9 meeting, according to Harold Ruppel of Akron, chairman of the Tuscola Bean Growers Association, will be as follows: (1) Everyone will have an opportunity to fill out a card telling of his interest in beans. (2) Senator Emil Lockwood will explain the Bean Commission bill. (3) Questions from the floor. (4) Report from US Department of Agriculture representative.

Any bean growers or processors in counties not enumerated are invited to attend the meeting nearest to their home.

At the conclusion of the meetings a straw vote will be taken to see how many producers and processors favor the creation of the bean commission. The results of this vote will be announced at the annual meeting of the State Bean Growers Association in Ithaca Thursday, Aug. 22.

Ruppel urges that all county bean growers attend the meeting.

## Sewer Near Capacity

One of Cass City's more recent public utility additions is the sewage disposal plant that stands near the Cass River at the foot of Doerr Road, southwest of Cass City. It is a fine, modern plant that is destined to become inadequate long before it is paid for.

That's the only conclusion that can be drawn after learning the facts from Nelson "Moose" Willy, veteran operator of the plant here.

Today the plant is handling an equivalent of 2,400 persons, plus industries, Willy estimated, and the plant is designed for 2,500 persons, plus industries.

At the present time we are handling the sewage with a minimum of difficulty, Willy explained, but the addition of cer-

tain types of industry could send us past the point where we could meet the state's standards.

For instance, plants processing milk can be particularly difficult and, in terms of plant capacity, be more trouble than plants twice their size producing other products, Willy explained.

Built in 1955

Cass City's plant was erected in December of 1955, one of the first in the Thumb to comply with Michigan Water Resources Commission's demand for sewage disposal that would not pollute the state's rivers and streams.

The plant was financed for \$160,000 and bonds issued. Now eight years later, the village debt is \$123,000.

The last of the bonds are due to be retired in 1980.

**Need More Pumps**

The plant needs one addition now, Willy feels, and that is the addition of another pump. We need to have a pump in reserve for peak periods. Now we are using both pumps three days a week, and the addition of a pump would increase the plant's capacity, he said.

Also needed is a reserve operator. At the present time there is no one working for the village who could fill out the necessary reports and do the work required if Willy becomes ill.

Plants are graded by size and Cass City's classification is "C". Every plant must have a licensed operator. By studying, Willy has not only become licensed to handle a "C" plant but is also qualified to run a larger "B" plant.

**New Truck**

One addition that the plant is expected to receive in the very near future is a truck. The unit will be the one used by the village and being replaced by a new unit. A tank will be placed on the unit slated for the disposal and used to dispose of the digested solids.

The waste can then be hauled for disposal where it is most needed. First applications will probably be at the park and other public lands that show a need for the fertilizer, Willy concluded.

In past years, the two sisters have dominated the Junior Division of the Zepelin tourney. Lenore has won the crown twice and Marianne has captured the title three times, including this year.

Lenore, a Central Michigan University graduate, was national collegiate rifle champion in 1959 and finished third in last year's Camp Perry, O., national rifle competition.

## Fiscal Reform Tops On Solons' Agenda

The prospect of a long fall session of the Legislature is strongly indicated when one views the subject matter to be discussed.

First and foremost, the Governor's special call to the Legislature sometime after Labor Day will ask for consideration of fiscal reform. This vast project has been an aim of the two Democratic predecessors of GOP Gov. George Romney.

There is still no real indication that Romney will get the full cooperation he needs from legislators in his own party for his fiscal reform program, still to be spelled out in detail.

Secondly, the Legislature will have before it a number of bills designed to bring Michigan law into conformity with the new Constitution which will take effect next Jan. 1.

Much of the implementation of the new document will take place next year and in successive sessions, but some sections of the state's recently adopted basic law require immediate changes in the statutes.

A committee headed by Rep. Rollo G. Conlin, Tipton Republican given bipartisan credit as the

Legislature's tax expert, has been studying the Constitution this summer.

Only priority measures will be taken into the special session by Conlin's committee.

Then during the 1964 session the various housekeeping measures will be introduced. Finally, in 1965 the Legislature will likely complete most of the statute revision needed to implement the new Constitution.

With tax reform and law changes required by the Constitution on the fall docket, some Capitol observers are predicting the special session could easily run until mid-December.

## Voting Lack

Voters who either overlook or deliberately fail to cast ballots on machines for local issues and special questions may one day get biennial lessons in exercising their voting right.

The recent recount of the new Constitution and a survey of the vote on the document has prompted Secretary of State James M. Hare, whose department administers Michigan's elections, to ask for ways to eliminate this practice.

Hare said a study of voting habits on machines as compared with tallies in paper precincts showed many machine voters consistently fail to cast ballots for minor offices and special questions.

The reason for this sharp difference is not known, of course, but Hare and many others think lack of familiarity with the machines could be a major factor.

Normally when a person first votes on a machine, a precinct worker will demonstrate on a sample ballot. The succeeding elections, however, often find the voter not looking at the sample machine which shows the various offices to be filled and questions to be decided.

A refresher course in operating the voting machine at each election likely would increase the percentage of votes cast for the ballot questions other than major offices.

The Secretary of State said a study of the Constitution vote last April indicated one substantial fact; if most of the voters who failed to had cast their machine ballot on the document it could have been defeated or approved by such a margin that the costly recount would not have been sought.

The cast pointed out by Hare is similar to the many stories heard before every election of how one man's vote has meant the difference in many tallies.

## Starts Working

Several cities are planning to make use of economic development legislation passed this year, but Pontiac gets the "first" rating.

State Rep. Gilbert E. Bursley, Ann Arbor Republican who spearheaded the movement of the legislation through the House, notes Pontiac officials plan to set up a business development corporation.

One of the development bills passed this session provided for the creation by municipalities of business development corporations to help industry location.

In Pontiac, Bursley said, two local banks have pledged to assist businesses seeking Pontiac area location through this new corporation.

The Ann Arbor legislator said a number of other cities expressed interest in getting a full explanation of how to create industrial parks, business development corporations, or other industry-drawing plans.

As a result of the widespread interest, Bursley said his economic expansion committee would spend much of the time before the fall session visiting with officials around the state about procedures and ideas.

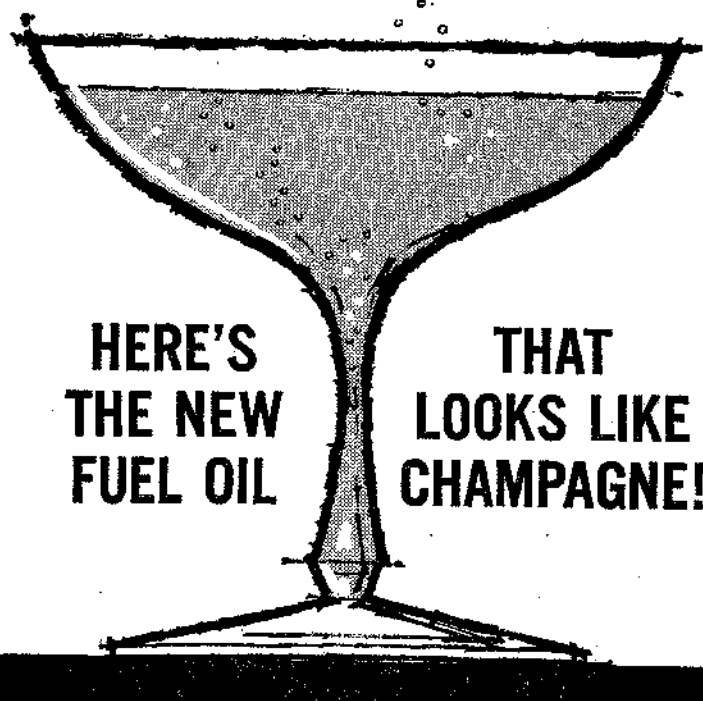

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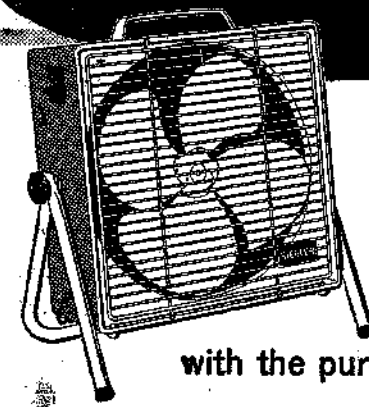

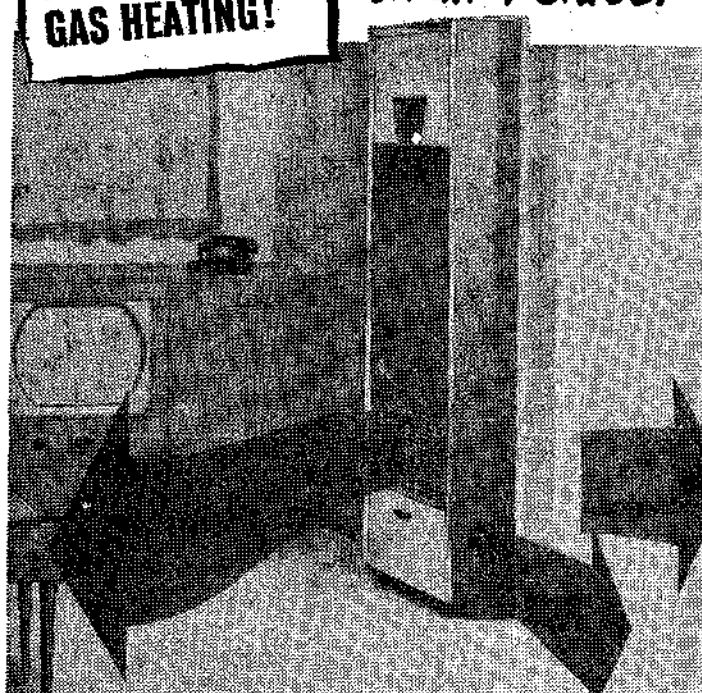

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## Questionnaire Tells All to Local Draft Board

**Editor's Note:**  
The draft has been extended for four years, until July 1, 1967. This means that the young men of the country must continue to expect to serve in the military forces. This series of articles outlines the basic responsibilities and rights of young men under the draft law.

### Classification

Some time after he has registered, each man will receive from his local board a questionnaire. The answers provide the basic information which the local board will use to decide whether a man should be deferred or exempt, or whether he should be considered as available for induction for two years of service.

The local board also considers information from other sources such as employers, dependents, government agencies and other legitimate sources. But fundamentally, the law imposes on the registrant the responsibility for keeping the local board informed of anything in his personal situation which might affect his classification.

Every classification must be made on the basis of individual status. There are no group classifications.

No classification is permanent and, in some cases, expiration dates are set. A man classified as available for service may find his individual situation so changed that the local board may defer him. And a man who is deferred or exempt may not remain in that class after the conditions on which the exemption or deferment is based cease to exist.

The classification assigned by the local board determines, basically, whether a man will enter service in his turn or remain temporarily in civilian life. The local boards are made up of unpaid, volunteer citizens of the community. They may not be members of the military service.

The local board may require a registrant to appear before it and has the authority to subpoena witnesses. Every registrant is required to submit to the board any information requested of him.

Add to that the fact that only once in a half-century does the weather keep us from going anywhere, at this time of year, and we have an ideal time to serve the church of our choice.

Historically, the summer months should be busy ones for the church. The "church year" starts with Easter and the summer season is just half-way. The church school teacher can add interesting projects to the class agenda. Incidentally, the teacher has more time to prepare interesting lessons at this time of year, too. There is more time to do the many volunteer duties. I think of beautifying the church lawn and the always present outdoor jobs to be done. This is an excellent time of year to visit church-sponsored institutions such as colleges, homes for the aged and for youngsters without parents, camping sites to see what goes on there. What better time to visit these extensions of the offering envelope we drop in the plate regularly. (You do send your money so such places as mentioned above can continue in operation, don't you?)

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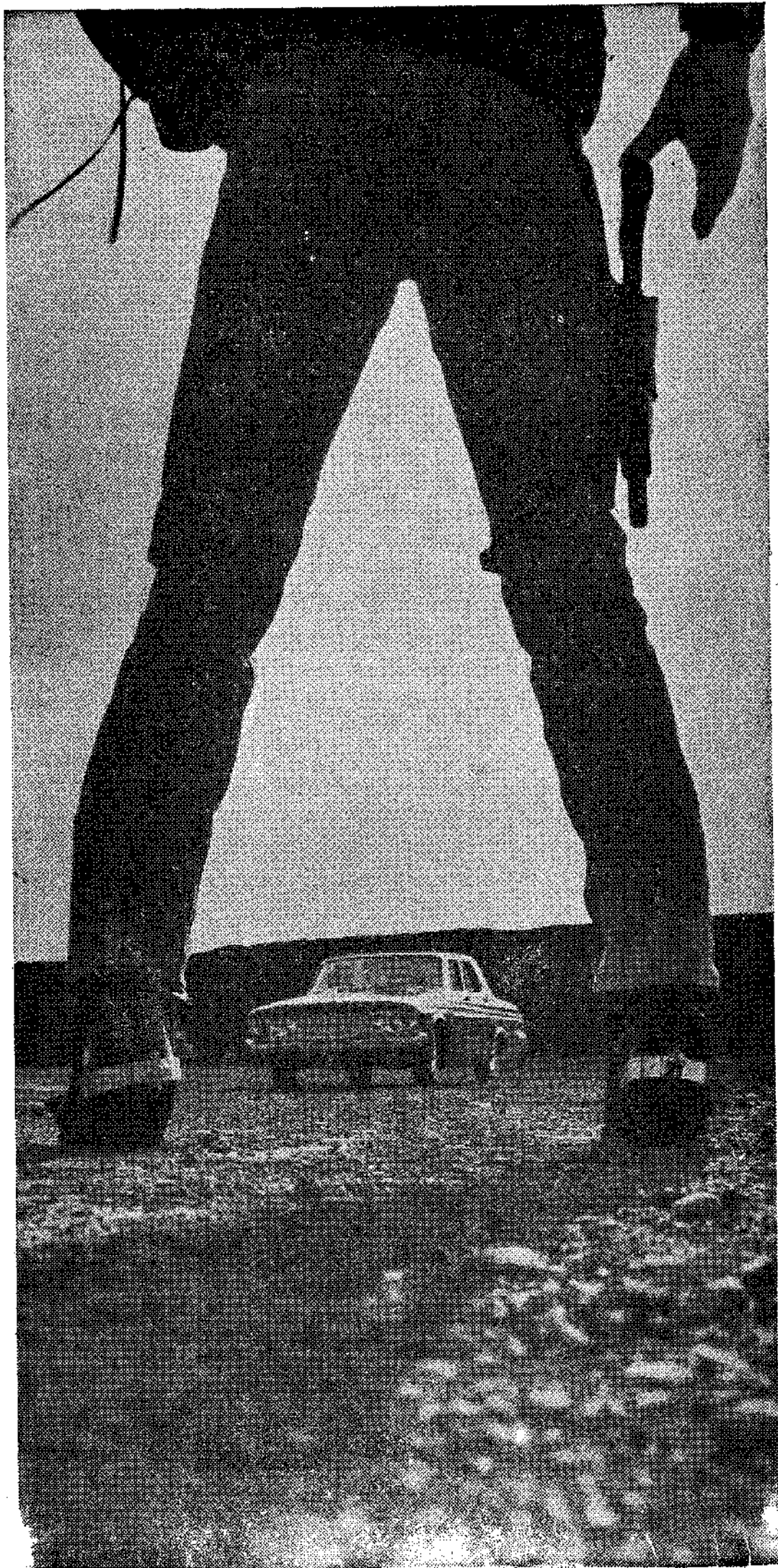

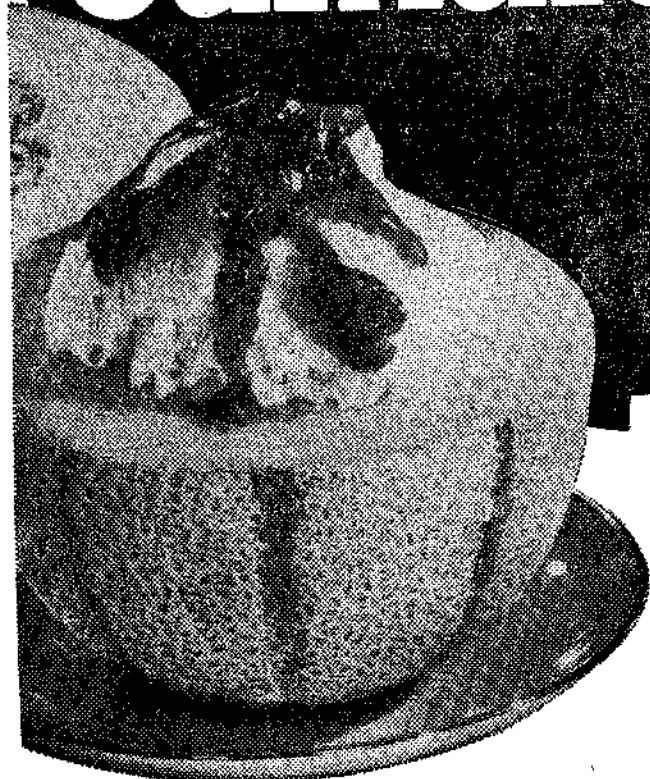

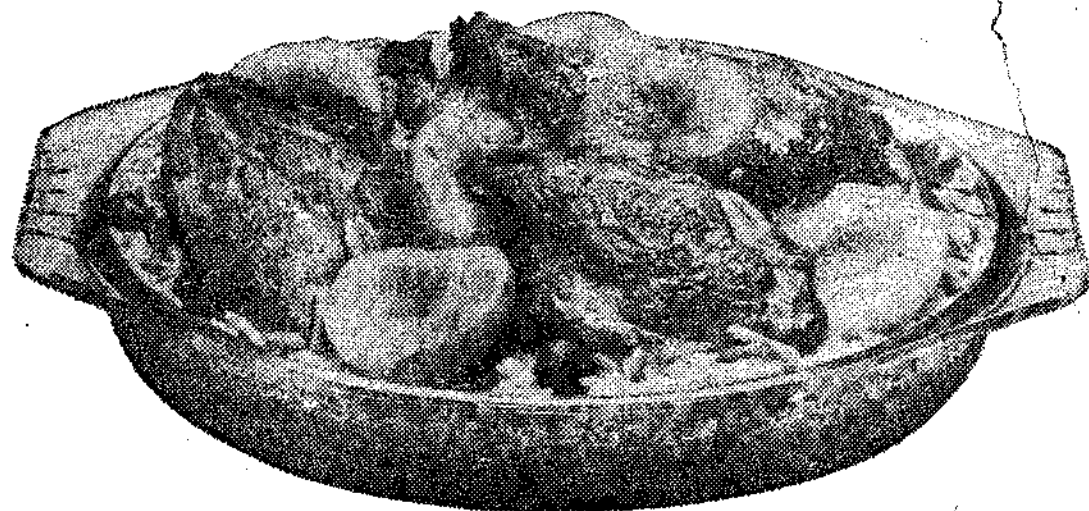
