## Old-timers Recall Early Years Here

A man who came to Cass City on business every other Monday night for 34 years came back to visit Wednesday, July 31, for the first time in 41 years.

Henry Goppelt, 94, of Saginaw arrived with friends to visit C. E. Patterson, 93, of Cass City. The two were business associates many years ago.

Patterson started his business career in Cass City in 1910 as an implement dealer at the site of the present John Deere store. A few years later he changed businesses and started a general store. It was then he met Goppelt.

Goppelt has lived in Saginaw all his life and worked as a salesman for Simon Brothers. He recalled many incidents in the early years of his life.

The only practical means of transportation in the early part of the century was by train. In winter trains were often halted for as long as two or three weeks by the enormous amounts of snow.

In 1940 Goppelt was forced to remain at the Gordon Hotel for a full week because the snow made traveling impossible. To complicate things even more the water was constantly frozen at the hotel, but Goppelt recalls these as happy memories.

While working as a salesman for 54 years, Goppelt visited almost every country in the world. He spent a good deal of time in Germany, made two trips to Europe and was all over the Mediterranean. The most fascinating of all his travels and experiences were three visits to the Holy Land.

# Village Buys Tower Site

The Village of Cass City has purchased some five acres of land within the village limits from Mrs. Frank Morris. The transaction was completed Wednesday afternoon, July 31.

The village reportedly paid \$5,000 for the land. The property is located in the northwest section of the village. Its eastern boundary starts west of lots owned by Dr. William Selby and

Robert Stickle on North Seeger and is adjacent to the Hills and Dales Subdivision at its western boundary. It is adjacent to the north village limits of the village.

The land was purchased as a site for the new water tower to be erected as part of the new \$150,000 water system slated for the village.

### Rodeo Site

The council has tentative plans of allowing the 4-H Wranglers Club to use part of the land for a corral. The club wants to have a place to work their horses and prepare for shows. They had asked for a site at the park, but were turned down by trustees.

### New Road

Provisions for a new road are included in the plans for the land. The road would connect Seeger Street with the Hills and Dales Subdivision.


Guest speaker will be Sterling Garron, secretary-treasurer of the Michigan State Firemen's Association.

Pfingsten said that supply and demand has been proven not to work and that the answer is to have a firm price before producing the goods.

Lloyd Fairbanks, NFO organizational director, told of the progress of the organization and said that enrollment in the last four months has been higher than any other similar period in the history of the NFO.

Local supporters of the organization say that many new memberships have been signed in the area in recent days.

We received a bill for services from a hospital and doctor in Standish two days after we were treated for minor injuries suffered in our car accident.

As a member of Blue Cross our expenses were paid simply by supplying our policy number. In this instance we were also covered by a medical expense clause in our auto insurance.

The car insurance company will reimburse us for the medical care when we present receipted statements. We requested them from Standish. The accident is now nearly a month old and we haven't yet received the receipted statements.

We note with interest an editorial in the Bay City Times telling how their community is falling behind in industry and jobs and urging a cooperative effort to get the city growing as other area communities are.

## Village Loses Leader

Cass City lost one of its native sons this week when Andrew N. Bigelow succumbed to a lingering illness at Hills and Dales General Hospital Sunday.

His death marked the end of a bitter struggle with an incurable disease. He had gallantly battled his illness for five years at home and in various hospitals. He was forced to sell his hardware business this summer that had been a business landmark in Cass City since 1888.

Mr. Bigelow was always one of the community's most popular citizens. He served with distinction in local government.

His regard by the voters can be measured by his record. "Andy" never lost an election and when the village trustees were named by caucus, he once received every vote cast from the 25 persons attending... even though there were three candidates running for the two open



positions.

Mr. Bigelow was village treasurer from 1930 to 1943. He also served several terms as village trustee before being elected village president in 1962. His illness forced him to leave this post shortly after he was elected.

Mr. Bigelow was a member of Tyler Lodge F&M No. 317. He attended the Methodist Church. He was born in Cass City Feb. 22, 1903, the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Bigelow. He married Miss Marie Martin in Akron Sept. 30, 1926, and the couple made their home in Cass City.

Surviving, besides his widow, are: two daughters, Mrs. Fred Auten of Cass City and Miss JoAnn Bigelow of Birmingham, Mich.; a brother, Charles of Cass City; two sisters, Mrs. Alice Jackson and Miss Laura Bigelow, both of Cass City, and three grandchildren.

Memorial services were held at Little's Funeral Home at 2 p. m. Tuesday. The Rev. James Braid officiated.

A private interment at Elkland cemetery was held.

# Peace Corps Needs Ag Help

India and Pakistan have asked the Peace Corps for 88 more volunteers trained in agricultural skills, County Extension Director Alfred Ballweg has announced.

Training will begin next September for 30 poultry specialists and 25 dairy husbandmen requested by India and for 22 agricultural extension workers, 6 farm mechanics and 5 vocational agricultural teachers to work in Pakistan.

The Peace Corps already has 160 volunteers on the job in India and 205 in Pakistan. The call for additional workers reflects the need for trained agriculture personnel to help increase food and fiber production in these and many other developing nations.

The Indian request for more poultry specialists grew out of a pilot program started by four Peace Corps volunteers who developed a new, cheap feed from

easily accessible local materials, upgraded the stock, wrote a handbook on poultry management in the Punjabi language and streamlined processing and marketing procedures. So successful was their program that the Indian government now plans, with Peace Corps help, to launch similar projects in other parts of the nation.

In Pakistan, Peace Corps volunteers will work to improve methods of irrigation, machinery maintenance, marketing, plant protection and soil conservation at the village level. They will be working through experimental stations, workshops and agricultural training schools.

The great need for volunteers to work in agricultural projects such as those planned for India and Pakistan was summarized recently by a young Peace Corpsman working in South Asia, who

described the challenge of his assignment this way:

"People who live on a handful of rice a day, who cannot read or write and have never seen or heard of modern conveniences—how can we help them? By improving farm methods to support twice this number of people. Because it can be done, it must be done. There are endless improvements that can be made. We are struggling for perfection—they are struggling to live. They need more masons, more agriculturalists, more youth workers, primary and secondary teachers, mechanics, electricians and technicians of every kind. These must not come in a high-level capacity, but must be down-to-earth, hard-working and patient.

### TURNPIKE SAFETY

Expressway driving is becoming a common practice with most drivers during Summer months so perhaps it is in order to mention a few safety pointers that may save you some trouble.

If your car is disabled on an expressway, don't leave it and walk for help. Hang a handkerchief on your doorknob or radio antenna and

leave the engine hood up. Police who patrol these roads will pass by before long and render assistance. Incidentally, an expressway tow charge can be quite a convincer that preventative maintenance is a real economy measure.

Expressway speeds can be hypnotic and lull the driver into following too closely. Safest procedure is to travel twenty feet behind the car ahead for each ten miles per hour of speed. This makes a 60 mph speed require the driver to follow at 120 feet or more. All of this distance is required to safely bring the two tons that the average car represents to a standstill in case of an emergency.

Fog horns in low lying areas are now being tried experimentally to warn motorists approaching a fog belt in an effort to prevent chain-reaction rear-end collisions that occur from time to time in these areas.




The interest is reflected in the records of the Cass City Livestock Club and other area 4-H clubs.

**The Record**  
At the Tuscola County Fair last year, entries from the Cass City area virtually swept top honors in sheep competition. "We'll be all right again this year," reports Dr. Harry Crandell, not noted for over-enthusiasm. Crandell is the club's advisor on sheep.

Mention cattle and a gleam comes in the eyes of Clarence Merchant and Jim Milligan who help the kids prepare in this competition, while Art Battel helps bring back the blue ribbons in the swine department.

Each year the competition gets a little more rugged and requires a little more extra effort as literally hundreds of exhibitors compete for cash awards and ribbons.

## Highway Death Toll Climbs Near All-time State Peak

What was feared early in the year is now becoming a daily nightmare to State Police officials. This year's highway death toll is very likely to be the worst in the state's history.

Traffic fatality counts seem to follow patterns of high incidence interspersed with a few low death years. This year another peak will undoubtedly be placed on the charts.

The last peak occurred in 1955 when 2,016 persons were killed. Rapid action by the Legislature in bolstering safety efforts that year dropped the toll in 1956 and decreases were recorded the two succeeding years also.

Since 1958, however, charts have showed relatively steady, but minor rises in the fatal accident count. This year a sharp change has occurred.

By midyear, the traffic death toll was nearly 100 ahead of the count at the same time in 1962 and climbing steadily. Multiple death crashes have contributed greatly to the toll.

State Police Commissioner Joseph A. Childs blamed part of the current year's bad record on the fact that his department is lacking manpower. In addition to legislative refusal of the bulk of his request for additional troopers, the Civil Service Commission has now put into effect a maximum 48-hour week for State Police.

Under the previous 56-hour work week, the troopers covered 20 per cent more area.

Lack of appropriations for the traffic safety center at Michigan State University and other safety programs initiated after the 1955 peak, have tended to create a lack of crash consciousness, according to the experts.

Add to these factors the increased number of motorists on the road and the facts that better

roads and more powerful cars lend themselves to greater speeds.

The predictable result of these factors is exactly what has happened. Motorists, with less enforcement in proportion to their numbers, have tended to become more careless. Placing more confidence than caution in the machines they drive, Michigan motorists are committing suicide and murder on the highways!

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**Risks On Water**

Accidents are also an increasing problem on Michigan's waterways. With this in mind, the Legislature last year enacted a comprehensive boating law.

With nearly 600,000 boats of various sizes registered in the state, enforcement of the law is a problem just as it is on the roadways. Enforcement of the water safety law is left largely to county sheriff patrols on the inland lakes. On the Great Lakes the U. S. Coast Guard maintains control because federal laws are in force.

One of the most important sections of the new law specifies that all motorboats must be equipped with a Coast Guard approved life preserver, vest, ring buoy or buoyant cushion for each person aboard.

\*\*\*

Fire extinguishers are also required on all water vehicles of closed or semi-closed construction. The number depends on the size of the boat. Good boating dictates the presence of a fire extinguisher on open vehicles too.

The new law also spells out requirements for whistles, horns, lights and mufflers. Additional sections deal with "rules of the road," safety precautions for water skiing and diving and accident reporting requirements.

Spelled out in a booklet called "What Every Boater Must Know," being circulated by the Secretary of State, the new law is designed to protect lives while at the same time assuring the most

pleasant and compatible use of Michigan's many lakes and streams.

**Northern Development**

Another effort to enhance industrial development in Michigan's northernmost regions has been accomplished.

The Small Business Administration recently opened a branch office at Northern Michigan University in Marquette to serve the 15 Upper Peninsula counties and eight counties below the Straits.

Previously businessmen seeking SBA loans for expansion or other activities had to make all contacts by mail or telephone. Glenn G. Potter, formerly in the SBA office in Detroit, was sent to Marquette to manage the office.

\*\*\*

The more convenient availability of advice on SBA programs and procedures is expected to encourage business development in the North.

In addition to providing loans for plant construction, expansion and conversion, the Small Business Administration assists businesses in selling products to and buying property from the government.

Funds also are available through the SBA to small business investment companies, which in turn duplicate the Administration's services to some firms which might not qualify for SBA programs.

**Book Review**  
**Visit the Vatican Through Reading**  
By the Rev. Robert J. Searis

This book, by design or by accident, takes us to the center of the Vatican through the form of the novel. There is no doubt that Catholic writer Morris L. West knows of what he writes. The title, **IN THE SHOES OF THE FISHERMAN**, accepts the idea of Peter having been the first Pope; that idea I must, as a Protestant clergyman, reject.

The novel is, however, quite fascinating and well written with all the characters having been made in the form of realistic men. West does a fine job of having his characters alternating from the "ideal" talk of idealistic men to the very frank talk that reveals how difficult it is to carry ideals with you when you work at the Vatican.

The newly-elected Pope has just returned from imprisonment of fifteen years' duration as an enemy of Soviet Russia. He is a man of deep spiritual insight with a deep desire not to hurt any man unnecessarily. He involves himself in that unique center of political power, the Vatican, and himself takes steps to bring the Soviet and Western leaders together.

West utilizes a technique, the value of which he overestimates, I think. He has alternate chapters take the form of the diary of the Pope — telling of his disappointments, his dreams for a better future, his plans. He has contact with only one "outsider," Ruth Lewin, whom he discovers by accident when taking a walk by himself very early in his reign as Pope. Other important characters are two cardinals, Rinaldi and Leone; a newsman, who seeks permission of the Roman Rota to marry the wife of a man of growing political power. The second most important character is Jean Telemond, who dies before he is able to defend his work against the charge of heresy. I see I have not mentioned that the fictional Pope is Kiril the Pontiff.

The principal problem of the Pope is, West seems to believe, that of maintaining the power of the church and yet to keep it sufficiently humble. Because he was a prisoner for so many years, Kiril has an outlook that is different from what the Church leaders hold. He faces the practical problems of trying to operate the biggest business in the world, and still make sure it functions to lead men in the realm of the spirit, too.

Of course, all turns out well in the end, and we catch glimpses of fine Christian leadership. West has done an admirable job as he has in the past. And I hasten to add that this is a fine novel told with dignity and excitement. I recommend it for anyone of any church affiliation for good relaxing reading.

In a recent herd classification conducted by the Holstein-Friesian Association of America at Brattleboro, Vermont, Richard Keene, official classifier for the association, rated the Carpenter herd.

Their sire, Glenafton Rag Apple Climax 270881, was made an excellent sire in type with 90 points, at the age of three years. He is a son of Rosafe Signet, a well-known Canadian bull and son of Glenafton Laurel Brownie. It is very seldom that a sire receives an excellent rating at this age, authorities said.

**Class 1-A Puts You In the Service**

**Editor's Note:** The draft has been extended for four years, until July 1, 1967. This means that the young men of the country must continue to expect to serve in the military forces. This series of articles outlines the basic responsibilities and rights of young men under the draft law.)

**Class I-A, Available**

There are five general classes with numerous subdivisions which local boards use to indicate whether a man is available, deferred, or exempt - and why.

Every man is considered as available for induction, in Class I-A, until his eligibility for some other classification is established to the satisfaction of the local board.

If a registrant does not establish his eligibility for deferment or exemption because of hardship, occupation, study, Reserve or National Guard membership, or other reason, he is placed in Class I-A. In the normal case, a registrant in Class I-A will be ordered for an Armed Forces examination shortly before his time to enter service, to determine whether he is qualified physically, mentally and morally. If he is not qualified, he is deferred in Class IV-F or Class I-Y. If qualified, he is kept in Class I-A until he is reached for induction. Class I-Y means that the registrant is not qualified under current standards, but would be qualified in a war or emergency. Class IV-F means he is not qualified for any military service.

All registrants in Class I-A are divided into categories in an order of priority for induction. Local boards in meeting their quotas first summon men who have been declared delinquent for failure to comply with the draft law. Next to be taken are men who volunteer for induction. Then the local boards complete their monthly quota by calling Class I-A qualified men between ages 19 and 26. They are called




