The man or whose 70man erves are in working ormal rder, free from nnatural pressure is vitally live. energetic and healthy.

it doesn't seem possible that such a little thing as nerve pressure could make so great a difference in the lives and happiness of people who are otherwise alike and yet of two men equal in wealth, education and opportunity, the one with the most healthy set of nerves is the man most likely to succeed in his chosen field - be it commerce, art or industry.

If you could look inside the bodies of those who have achieved success in different lines of endeavor, you would find excellent sets of nerves, each performing its normal healthy duty. Plan Now for Next Year's Wheat Crop

It's not yet wheat planting time, but it is planning time for many Tuscola county farmers, says Alfred Ballweg, county extension director.

Behind good management and competitive production practices are a lot of planning and decision making. Dr. Lynn S. Robertson, soil scientist at Michigan State University, has a set of 10 questions and answers which wheat growers need to consider before putting in next year's crop:

Is the field adequately 1. drained? "It's probably too late to consider tiling, but it isn't too late to shape the surface so water duesn't stand on land," says Robertson.

2. Are weeds controlled? Good plowing helps control. Wheat yields increase as much as 10 bushels per acre where the timely use of approved chemicals is combined with good tillage and water control.

3. Have soils been tested? A big step toward top production is using needed amounts of a balanced fertilizer. Take soil samples now.

4 Are you using the best available seed? Certified seed is guaranteed to be pure and there is less opportunity for disease losses.

5. Do you check the fly free date before planting? "Last year Hessian flies took over in several areas where farmers 'cheated' on the fly free date," Robertson reports.

6. What crop does wheat follow? "Wheat after wheat, alfalfa-brome, winter barley or quackgrass is not a good bet because these crops serve as alternate hosts for some root rot organ-

7. Where should fertilizer be applied? The ideal placement is an inch to the side and one inch

8. How effective is fertilizer broadcasting? Only about 50 per cent as effective as fertilizer used at planting time, says Robertson. "This does not mean that it is possible to get the same yields by broadcasting twice as much as used at planting time," he warns. Don't seed wheat without the benefit of some fertilizer at

Of Local Board

Editor's Note-The. draft has been extended for four years. until July 1, 1967. This means that the young men of the country must continue to expect to serve in the military forces. This is the last in a series of articles outling the basic responsibilities and rights of young men under the draft law.

In keeping with the decentralized, "grass roots" prinof Selective Servciples operation, decisions of ice local boards on classifications are final. But provision is made for appeals to volunteer civilian appeal boards under conditions specified in the law and regulations.

An appeal may be taken from any local board classification.

The registrant, a dependent, or an employer under certain conditions, may appeal from a classification. The basic period in which an appeal must be taken is 10 days, with longer periods when the registrant is outside of the country. The time period is counted from the date the local board mails the registrant a notice of classification.

The Government appeal agent, who is a volunteer member of the local board team, also may appeal, as may the State Director or the National Director of Selective Service.

An appeal is taken by written notice to the local board, but no particular form is required.

If the appeal board's decision is unanimous, no further appeal rights exist except for the right of the State Director or the National Director to appeal to the presidential appeal board. If the appeal board's decision

is by a split vote, the case may be appealed to the presidential appeal board by the registrant and others entitled to take the first appeal.

Another right given to the registrant is the right of a personal appearance before the board if requested within 10 days after the notice of classification is mailed. The right of personal appearance is in addition to the appeal right.

Section 1. Permission is hereby granted to Southeastern Michigan Gas Company, a Michigan corporation, and to its successors and assigns, to construct, operate and maintain in the public streets, highways, alleys and other public places in the Village of Cass City, Tuscola County, Michigan, all needful and proper gas pipes, mains, conductors, service pipes and other apparatus and facilities requisite for the manufacture, transmission and distribution of gas for all purposes to the Village of Cass City and the inhabitants thereof, and for conducting gas elsewhere to supply neighboring cities and villages and other territory supplied with gas by said Grantee, subject, however, to all conditions and restrictions hereinafter contained.

Section 2. All construction work done under this grant shall be under the supervision of the duly authorized representative of the Village of Cass City and the Grantee shall pay to the Village of Cass City, upon presentation of an itemized bill, the costs of such supervision at the legal rate of charge for the same.

Section 3. The rules and regulations applicable to the service, the quality of the gas furnished, and the rates charged therefor by the Grantee herein, its successors and assigns, shall be as fixed from time to time by The Michigan Public Service Commission or such other state authority as shall have jurisdiction of the subject matter.

This Ordinance shall take effect upon its confirmation Section 4. by a three-fifths (3|5ths) majority vote of the qualified electors of the Village of Cass City voting thereon at a special election to be held October 14, 1963, and it shall remain in force for thirty years from the date of such confirmation.
