## Mississippi Stands Alone in Nation

I doubt if this nation often listens to a sermon like it did to the one delivered by the Rev. Martin Luther King, leader of the Southern Leadership Council and widely acclaimed Negro leader and pastor. This was given as part of the March on Washington. Most of us shall not soon forget this sermon, especially the way he used the phrase, "I have a dream..." And it was a dream, already guaranteed by the US Constitution.

Nineteen Presbyterians recently escaped recapture by armed Cuban troops. Some hid in the rocky terrain and others buried themselves in the sand. The refugees said their group included no revolutionaries but "only humble God-fearing people..." Our only arms were Bibles." In the long run, the Bible-bearers will win out over those who follow today's Communist manifesto, or so it seems to me.

The State of Mississippi stands alone in our nation, under the leadership (if it can be called that) of Gov. Ross Barnett, in not having even a token compliance with the 1954 Supreme Court ruling. When he appeared at the student forum of one of our Michigan Universities, he had with him, as body guards, members of his own state police. Apparently he views himself as in constant danger wherever he goes; there are, undoubtedly, Michigan residents who might view his removal as being of benefit to our nation. The only way I can view this man as an opportunist; maybe he would like to be vice-president on Gov. Wallace's presidential ticket. Or, so it seems to me.

Our Congress has approved, after a great deal of debate, the nuclear test ban. Although our leaders accomplished Russian compliance, they found our Congress to be more stiff-necked about it. More than eighty other nations had signed it before we did. Reminds us, or did you realize, that of the major nations of the day, ours was the only one that never joined the League of Nations. Maybe we would never have experienced the holocaust of World War II if we had supported our President, Woodrow Wilson, after his heroic efforts. Or, so it seems to me.

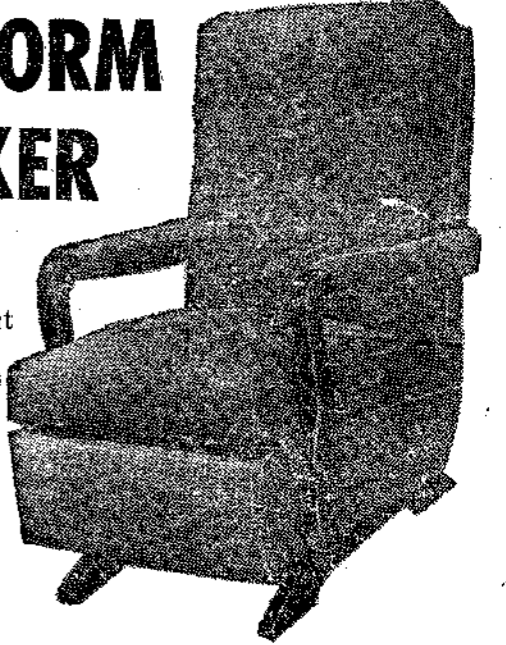
Club officials are urging all members of Federated clubs and their friends to attend the convention.

**Michigan Observes National 4-H Week**

Michigan is jumping the gun on other states in observing National 4-H Club Week this fall.

The special fall week of recognition for 4-H Club members and volunteer leaders doesn't go into effect on a national basis until 1964, but the dates of Sept. 28 through Oct. 5 will see Michigan holding a preview showing of the 1964 observance.

Until this year, National 4-H Club Week has always been held early in the spring - usually in March.

There are more than 72,000 4-H Club members in Michigan who belong to nearly 4,000 clubs which are led by more than 14,000 volunteer leaders. Tuscola county had 1,203 members enrolled this year.

Observance of National 4-H Club Week in Michigan will kick off a series of leadership training activities at Camp Kett, the State 4-H Club Foundation training facility in Osceola county. More than 600 older youth are expected to attend one of four junior leadership schools scheduled during October.

Four major 4-H leader training workshops will also be held during the month at Camp Kett. Kicking off the series will be a workshop for first-year county recreation chairmen Oct. 1-2. A 4-H home design and furnishing workshop will be held Oct. 9-11. Clothing leaders will attend a session Oct. 15-17. A joint meeting of the State 4-H Council and a conference for county 4-H program council members Oct. 31 through Nov. 2 will close out the month's activities.

Furthermore, when the thing got a little fresh air, it was discovered that the private shipbuilders had conducted the same survey for \$20,000.

I reckon it would be a sight in this world how many of them 3 billion documents was put in the secret department to keep the taxpayers from knowing the truth. I always thought Government secrets was things we didn't want the enemy to know but it looks like them bureaucrats in Washington has got the taxpayers classed as Enemy Number One.

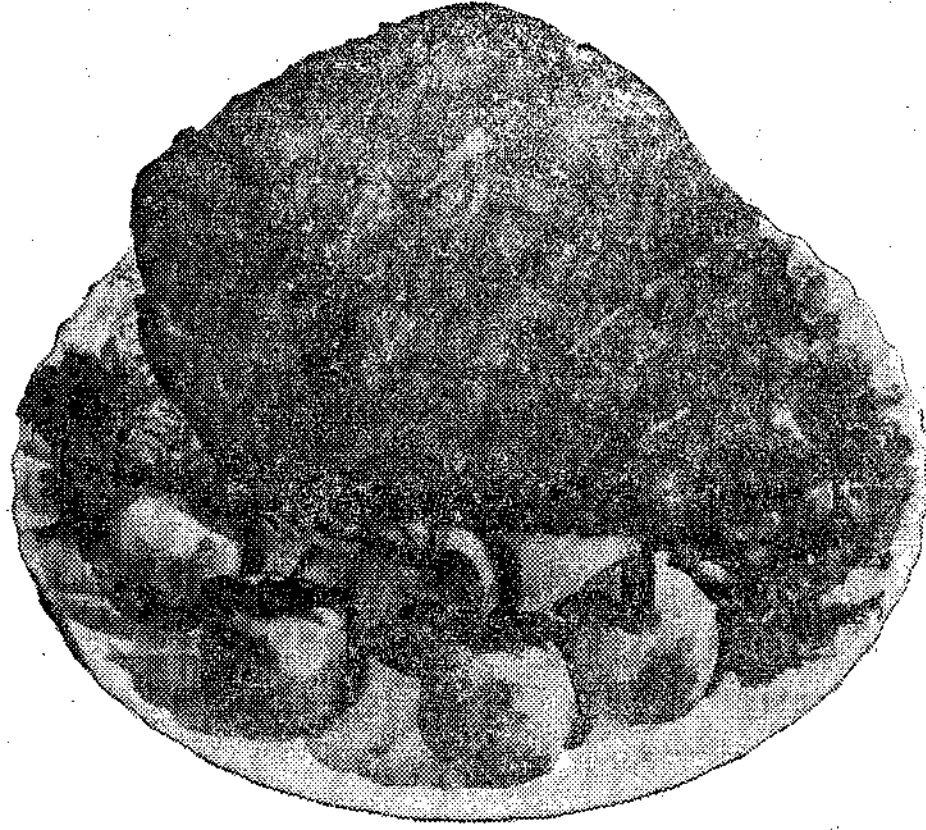

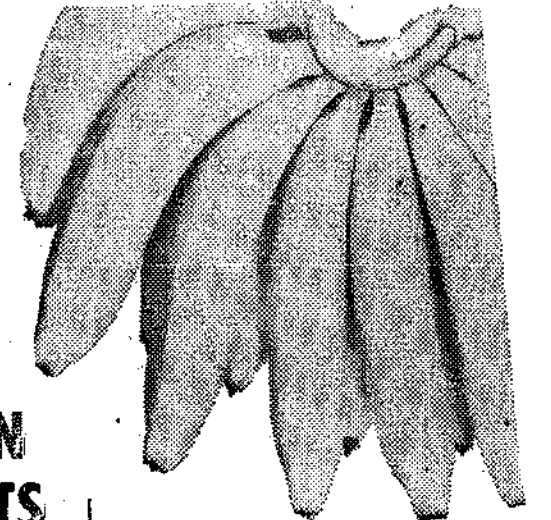
