Cass City are not in the current five-year plan that is slated to end in 1967 and no plans for this type work are now in sight in another five-year plan.

Complete Study

The department arrived with a study of the accidents in 1962 on M-81 in Cass City. It showed that 95 per cent of the accidents involved Tuscola county residents. The study indicated that 12 of accidents occurred while motorists were involved in angle parking. No statistics were revealed that would present a comparison of the number of accidents that might be expected to occur if parallel parking were in

Using the National Safety Council figures for the cost of accidents, the department said that accidents in Cass City cost at least \$11,500.

The Recommendations

The department wants to prohibit angle parking on Main Street and paint the road as a four-lane highway from near WestStreet to near Sherman

They want to change the traffic light at Main and Seeger to a dual signal. The cost to the village of changing this signal would be \$975. The cost of erecting the necessary signs and pavement markings would be taken care of by the highway department.

Cass City is one of the few communities that has a State highway running trunkline through it that does not have parallel parking.

But local residents who favor angle parking point to the wide Main street and say that no other community has streets as wide as the village's either.



On the cover of a small pamphlet given all visitors to the Leader Dog's for the Blind School in Rochester is a picture of a German Shepherd dog with the words 'Eyes in the Dark" over the pic-

Several Cass City Lions, their wives and guests toured the school Sunday to see how monies contributed by the Cass City Club are being used to help provide those "Eyes in the Dark."

Leader Dogs for the Blind provides seeing-eye dogs for blind persons throughout the nation and hemisphere at no cost to the individual.

Making this possible in part by being the largest single financial contributors to the school are the Michigan Lions. Iast year, Cass City Lions alone gave \$175.00 from monies raised through various community projects. Leader Dog's anticipated budget for the current year is approximately

If all goes well, the units are graduated at the end of the month and the students begin to broaden lives that heretofore had been restricted.

A roster of students slated to arrive Sunday for the start of a new month of training included rersons from Quebec. Tennessee, Illinois, New York, Michigan and Other classes have had students from Mexico and South America,



POWER BRAKES AND WINTER DRIVING

Some motorists will be using power brakes and steering on snow and ice for the first time this winter. Perhaps a few words of caution now may save somebody from a costly and injurious collision. The main thing to bear in mind is that a skid



occurs when the front wheels are turned in a direction other than that in which the car is moving. It takes very little speed to cause this to happen on packed ice or snow. If a skid should occur, turn the front wheels in

the direction the front of the car is skidding while you gently apply the brakes until the momentum has slowed to allow you to straighten out again. A skid is much more easily caused by power

steering until you become used to it. The reason is that the turn is often sharper, putting the wheels abruptly at an angle to the car motion. The same problem of suddenness applies to power brakes, so press your foot down as gently as possible. It is even better to pump them, releasing your foot each time.

When starting on ice, the least possible pressure on the gas pedal required to move the wheels is the best pressure.







IT SEEMS TO ME

Mississippi Stands Alone in Nation

By the Rev. Robert J. Searls

I doubt if this nation often listens to a sermon like it did to the one delivered by the Rev. Martin Luther King, leader of the Southern Leadership Council and widely acclaimed Negro leader and pastor. This was given as part of The March on Washington. Mest of us shall not soon forget this sermon, especially the way he used the phrase, "I have a dream . . ." And it was a dream. already guaranteed by the US Constitution.

Nineteen Presbyterians recently escaped recapture by armed Cuban troops. Some hid in the rocky terrain and others buried themselves in the sand. The refugees said their group included no revolutionaries but "only humble God-fearing people . . . Our only arms were Bibles." In the long run, the Bible-bearers will win out over those who follow today's Communist manifesto, or so 'it seems to me.

The State of Mississippi stands alone in our nation, under the leadership (if it can be called that) of Gov. Ross Barnett, in not having even a token compliance with the 1954 Supreme Court ruling. When he appeared at the student forum of one of our Michigan Universities, he had with him, as body guards, members of his own state police. Apparently he views himself as in constant danger wherever he goes; there are, undoubtedly, Michigan residents who might view his removal as being of benefit to our nation. The only way I can view this man is as an opportunist; maybe he would like to be vice-president on Gov. Wallace's presidential ticket. Or, so it seems to me.

Our Congress has approved, after a great deal of debate, the nuclear test ban. Although our leaders accomplished Russian compliance, they found our Congress to be more stiff-necked about it. More than eighty other nations had signed it before we did. Reminds us, or did you realize, that of the major nations of the day, ours was the only one that never joined the League of Nations. Maybe we would never have experienced the holocaust of World War II if we had supported our President, Woodrow Wilson, after his heroic efforts. Or, so it seems to me.

Let us leave the national and international scenes for a moment to pay tribute to two local men, one who died, the other who has left Cass City. Audley Kinnaird, rriend to all his pastors, of which I was one, will be greatly missed. His voice was always raised in the support of great causes, and he would change his mind if given enough reasons.

The Rev. Lloyd Wilson was the 'dean' of local ministers having remained at Cass City Church of the Nazarene for (I believe) in excess of 12 years. Their new church building was erected under his leadership. We're sorry to

Michigan Mirror

Need Many New Community Colleges to Care for Pupils

By Elmer E. White Michigan Press Association Double It

Education facilities above the high school level are increasing in Michigan, according to Superintendent of Public Instruction Lynn M. Bartlett.

Construction at the state supported colleges and universities make this very apparent, but it is even a bigger factor where community colleges are con-

cerned. Bartlett noted that when the Michigan community college law is 13 years old, the number of its public locally operated colleges will have doubled.

"While this growth rate has been outstanding, we will again need to almost double this number in the next 10 years if we are to satisfy anticipated demands for post-12th grade education," said

Bartlett. By next fall, 18 community colleges will be in operation. In 1951, when the legislation to establish community college departments was passed, nine junior colleges existed.

Growth of these institutions in terms of use has been almost more significant. The superintendent noted that enrollments in Mr. and Mrs. Hazen Kritzman community colleges have grown in the past 10 years from 8,000 to were Sunday evening visitors of an estimated 40,000 this fall. Mr. and Mrs. Earl Kritzman, Ar-

> Bartlett emphasized, however, that Michigan has not yet met the real impact of need for community college space. The biggest jump in college enrollments is expected to hit in 1965.

"Considering the fact that some of our community colleges are not now able to accommodate all those who seek admission, we can see the imperative need for rapid expansion in this area," he said.

One new institution, Bay de Noc Community College in Escanaba, opened this fall. Next year the 18th community college, in Northwest Wayne County, is due to begin classes.

These could include two facilities in Macomb County, and one each to serve Oakland, Ionia, Monroe, Washtenaw, Livingston, Mason and Cass-Van Buren Counties.

Seek Tenure The Michigan Education Association would very much like to

have Michigan become the 25th state to provide tenure for public school educators.

"A careful study of tenure in the 59 Michigan school systems where tenure has been adopted locally has convinced the MEA Board of Directors that this important principle should be applied on a statewide basis so that all educators may enjoy the advantages of this provision," said Dr. E. Dale Kennedy, MEA exe-

cutive secretary. "It is another important step in our continuous efforts to upgrade educational programs available for Michigan children,"

With this in mind, the association is sponsoring a petition campaign beginning in mid-October to secure 250,000 signatures of proponents of a tenure law.

Tenure, as defined by the MEA. is the principle of having probationary periods of employment followed by assured positions as long as a teacher continues to give satisfactory service.

The association's arguments for the law include that good administrative practices are encouraged, comprehensive personnel policies are made desirable, and adequate protection for both the teacher and school district are provided.

The petition drive, if successful, will place the question of statewide tenure directly before the State Legislature.

The Navy was certain the figgers would show they was doing the job cheaper than the private shipyards. But the figgers showed private shipbuilders was doing the job much cheaper. Well, the Defense ·Department immediate classed the survey as top secret. The cat was let out of the bag when a reporter on a Baltimore paper accidental got hold of a copy and his paper printed it on the front page. Farthermore, when the thing got a little fresh air, it was discovered that the private shipbuilders had conducted the same survey fer \$20,000.
