

## Police Search Initiated

### Bizarre Ending For Canoe Trip

Three Cass City residents were the center of an intensive search by the Tuscola County Sheriff's Department Sunday and were not found until they walked innocently into the sheriff's office in answer to a note attached to the windshield of their parked car.

Miss Betty Jo Agar, Lloyd Vyse and Roger Parrish were enjoying a pleasant autumn afternoon Sunday with a canoe trip down the Cass River. The group utilized two cars, parking one at the Ellington bridge where they were going to start and the other at Caro where they planned to emerge.

When the trio started at the Ellington bridge the water was smooth and deep and travelling was a pleasure. But about two miles down the river the canoeists ran out of canoeing water. "From there on in we carried the canoe . . . and I don't mean we portaged over shallow spots in the river," Vyse explained. "We carried that canoe for three miles until we reached the Deford bridge."

"We left the canoe at the bridge and started hoofing it towards Caro, right along the main highway."

At about 11 p. m. the hikers finally arrived at the car in Caro and found a note attached to the windshield asking them to report to the sheriff's department.

"I thought that I had received a ticket for parking on private property," Vyse explained, "and I couldn't understand why the police were upset."

"After we got to talking with the authorities, we found that we had been the object of an intensive search. They found our cars and our canoe, but failed to locate us."

"I guess the trouble was," Vyse surmised, "that the police were combing the back roads while we took the main highway right into town."

### Final Payment for 1962 Beet Crop Due Tuesday

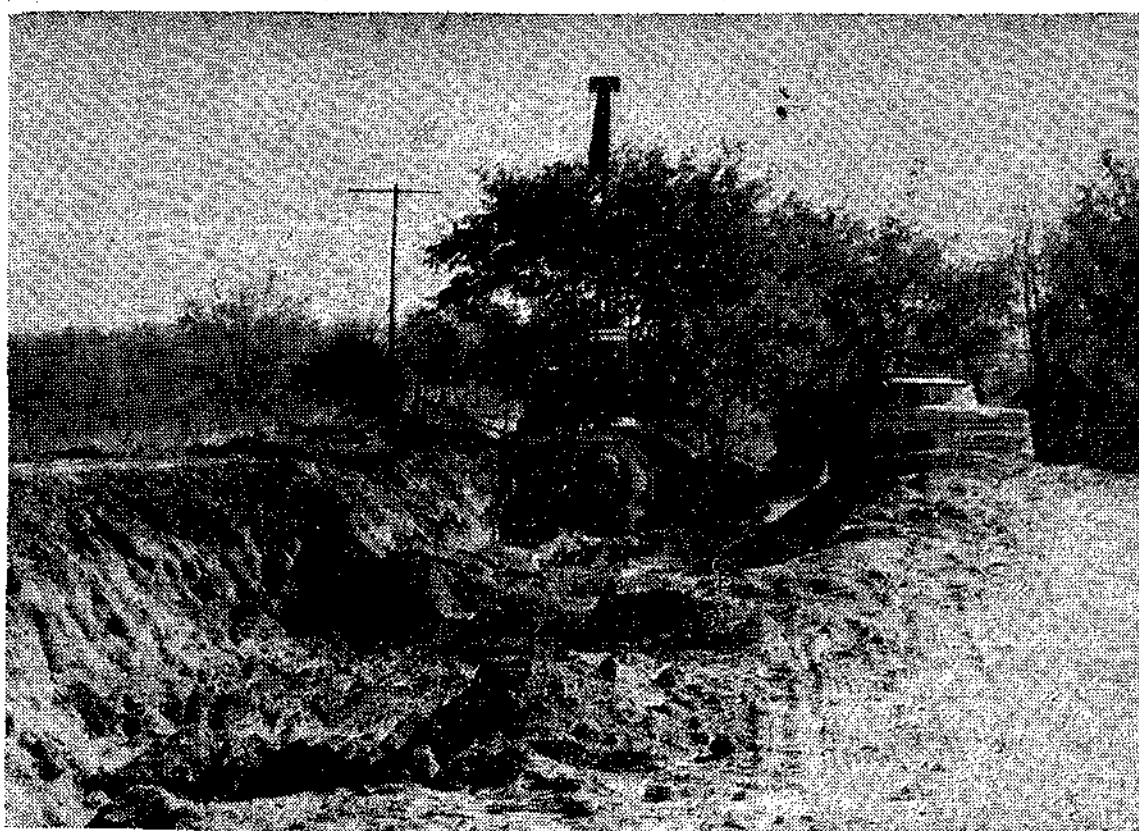
Gilbert Smith, manager of the Caro plant of Michigan Sugar Co., announced this week that the final payment for the 1962 sugar crop is scheduled to be paid Oct. 15.

The last payment will be \$1,938.7 per ton and will amount to \$286,700 in the area covered by the Caro plant.

Total payment for the 1962 crop amounted to \$14,638.7 as compared to \$12.25 the previous year.

Sugar content was low last year and the sugar content looks better than it was at a corresponding time last year. The sugar average at the factory Tuesday morning was 15.71, Smith reported.

The plant was closed for a couple of days, but was to open Wednesday morning and should be going strong for the remainder of the season, Smith said.

The average pay for beginning nurses jumped \$15 in the last year.

A 16-year-old Caro youth admitted leaving the scene of an accident when questioned by Deputy Jim Barriger of the Tuscola County Sheriff's Department this week.

The crash occurred Saturday on M-81, about three and a half miles west of Cass City.

Cars driven by Thomas William Nowakowski, 16, and Robert Barrons of Caro were damaged in the crash. The mishap occurred, according to the sheriff's department report, when Nowakowski was driving near the center line of the road and failed to stop after the collision.

### Gas Election Set Monday

Voters in Cass City will decide whether or not to franchise Southeastern Michigan Gas Co. of Port Huron in a special election Monday.

The polls at the Cass City Municipal Building will be open until 8 p. m. Interest in the measure has been relatively light, but final campaigns may stir enough interest to bring a representative number of electors to the polls.

In order to authorize the franchise a three-fifths majority of the voters must approve issuing the franchise.

One of the key issues surrounding the election is the relative merits of natural gas as opposed to fuels now in use in the community.

In this issue of the Chronicle local fuel dealers and Southeastern present the case for their respective fuels.

Southeastern claims natural gas means progress and progress stimulates industry in the community, thus providing more jobs.

Local fuel dealers point to the number of persons presently employed by serving the fuel needs of the community.

They say that profits from the sale of the fuel are spent locally, in local businesses that share the interest in the community and the community's problems.

## Predict Favorable Sale

### Okay Sale of Bonds For Village Water

Attorney General Frank J. Kelley, chairman of the Municipal Finance Commission, approved the sale of \$75,000 of general obligation water bonds for Cass City.

The approval was necessary before the village could advertise the bonds for sale and start work under the Accelerated Public Works program.

The bonds were approved by local voters June 24 and will run through 1981.

The money, together with an equal amount of Federal funds, will be used for a new water tank and water mains in the village.

**Good Time**  
The village will be entering the money market at what many financiers call an advantageous time. Municipal bonds have been selling for an average interest rate of 8.1 to 8.16 and authorities predict that Cass City's bonds will sell in the same general range.

It is the opinion of many qualified observers that interest rates are not going down in the future and may be on the rise.

**Open Bids**  
Bids on the bonds will be opened at 8 p. m. Thursday, Oct. 17, at the Cass City Municipal building.

After the bonds have been sold, the village will receive bids on the work and construction will start this year, under the plan approved by APW when it authorized the money for the work.

### Book Review

#### It's Entertaining; But Is It Factual?

A few years ago, it became very proper and exceedingly lucrative to write novels reflecting the home of ministers.

PAPA WAS A PREACHER and GET THEE BEHIND ME were both early examples of parsonage-located novels. Several were made into motion pictures, also lucrative. Now has come THE DEPARTURE, a first novel and written by "p. k." (preacher's kid) Kathryn Martin.

The players are Matt, the preacher; Serena, his wife (a parsonage queen in her husband's eyes) and their only child, Ruth. A short review could tell you the plot and have done with it. Matt, admired and productive, serves a church, which, when the book opens, is going well and gives its minister recognition of that fact, but the early presence of a Bishop in the congregation one Sunday morning is an omen. Better things lie ahead for Matt -- a large city church has a change of pastors in the wind and now needs someone who can heal some breaks that have taken place. This will be the ideal move for Matt, the Bishop feels. Serena, only slightly brought up-to-date by Mrs. Martin, dutifully packs and handles the emotional problems of only-child Ruth, for whom the move comes at the beginning of her teen years.

Two years later we see Matt, having healed the loyalties enough that the church is starting a building fund, but being sent to a smaller church (the word 'demotion' is not in a Bishop's dictionary), broken in health, not feeling any sense of accomplishment in the excellent work he has done. Soon he is calling, and working in his usual effective manner and with his usual results. Ruth, later to become a concert pianist, has just graduated from a private high school and feels deprived at this move that means not only less money for her plans, but also resending the sense of rejection that her father has. This colors her view of Bishops and, unlike most daughters of the parsonage, when we see her last, she is living outside the church. It is here, serving this church, that we are forced to face the fact that Serena dies; Serena, who was constantly faced with making par-

sonages look like home; who comforts daughter Ruth and plots with her so she can go to a dance in spite of father's objections; Serena, whose personal warmth has eased the burdens for her husband in every church.

This story is entertainingly written, although if Mrs. Martin were not a p.k. herself, we would have to consider this volume a little 'dated'. The life in most parsonages today, if the minister and his wife have thought it through, is not like living in a goldfish bowl. In fact, what with TV, most people do not have the need to control a parsonage family today.

## State Ranks Fourth in Nation In Unemployment Benefits

Michigan boosted its unemployment compensation rates by \$5 this year and was one of 16 states which jacked weekly jobless pay benefits higher.

The current \$60 maximum benefits in Michigan placed the state fourth highest in the nation, behind only Alaska at \$70, Connecticut at \$67 and Massachusetts.

In Massachusetts an unemployed man draws a maximum of \$45, but \$6 is allowed for each dependent child. The maximum in compensation cannot exceed the worker's average weekly wage on the job.

Of the 16 states which increased benefits to unemployed workers this year, Massachusetts and New Hampshire also added \$5 to the allotments.

The 1963 state changes brought the nation's average maximum benefit rate for out-of-work employees to about \$42.50 per week.

In a switch from the trend to higher benefits, two states decreased the maximum payments. Colorado rescinded a bonus previously paid to employees with stable work records and Wyoming adjusted its escalator clause downward by 5 per cent.

Although the number of weeks for which benefits are paid varies from state, Michigan ranks with the majority which limits payments to not more than 26 weeks.

### Busy Policemen

If you ever have an idea that the Michigan State Police don't have their work cut out for them, take a look at the department records.

During a single recent month, when department strength was below 1,100 men, the department recorded 17,446 arrests of adults. During the same period 645 juvenile traffic offenders were arrested and 574 delinquent and wayward minors were apprehended.

This is just the beginning, however.

Troopers assisted 6,175 motorists during the month. An additional 7,624 cars were investigated; some 22,850 drivers were given oral warnings, and more than 1,000 property and liquor inspections were made.

Department vehicles traveled well over 1.5 million miles, of which 853,000 were on traffic patrol and the rest on criminal investigations and other complaints. This was the activity outside the police posts and headquarters in East Lansing.

Inside the offices of the department there was other work to be done. Some 12,268 sets of fingerprints were received for identification. Of these, 7,060 were criminal and the rest civilian. Thirty-one "wanted" persons were identified through this process. One unknown dead was identified through the same means.

Criminal records also were found on 235 of the 2,289 appli-

cants for permits to carry concealed weapons.

The department's crime lab recorded 783 examinations during the period. These included questioned documents, firearms, tool marks, microscopic and botanical examinations. Over 100 requests for lab services from other law enforcement agencies also were handled.

### Meet Meat Opportunity

Observance of Michigan Meat Week from Sept. 30 to Oct. 5 was very replete with the usual attention gaining whoopdoo that such special weeks usually engender. Proclamation by the Governor, a kickoff dinner, special displays by meat retailers, and ample publicity on the event were a part of this affair under sponsorship of the Michigan Livestock Improvement Association in cooperation with meat retailers and others.

The event focused attention on two things -- the desirability of Michigan produced red meat, and

the opportunity in raising more livestock in the state.

Michigan is a surplus state in production of many fine agricultural products. Most states do not have the wide variety of exportable products. But red meat is not one of them.

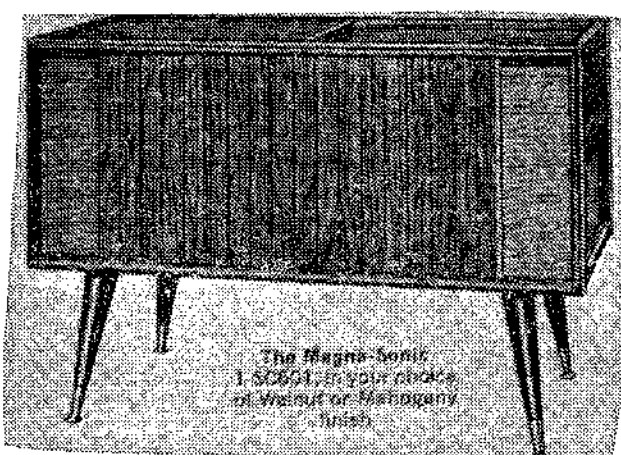

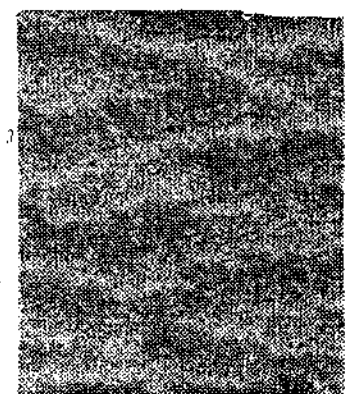

Ray Elmer Yakes, 68, died suddenly at his home in Harbor Hills, Fla., Saturday, Sept. 28.

He later was transferred to the Motors Holding Division with offices in New York City, where he was a financial director until 1950. He resided in Ardmore, Pa., until 1962, when he purchased a home in Harbor Hills, Fla.

He was a charter member of the Michigan Alumni Fund and a life member of Genesee Masonic Lodge, Flint. He was also past president and honorary life member of the City Business Club of Philadelphia.

He married Ruth Elizabeth Babcock of Brooklyn, N. Y., June 16, 1933, in the Union Church of Bay Ridge, Brooklyn.

After moving to Bradenton, Fla., he transferred his church membership to the Palma Sola Presbyterian Church where he was a teacher of the Men's Class.

He is survived by his wife Ruth; two daughters, Mrs. Robert Mortenson of Carbondale, Ill., and Mrs. Norman Estrella of Cincinnati, Ohio; a brother, James A. Yakes of Port Huron, and two sisters, Mrs. Harry Vickers of Bradenton, Fla., and Mrs. Alton Mark of Cass City.

Funeral services were held in the Palma Sola Presbyterian Church. The pallbearers were elders and deacons of the church and honorary pallbearers were the members of his Sunday School class. Burial was in the Manasota Memorial Cemetery near Bradenton, Fla., Tuesday, October 1.

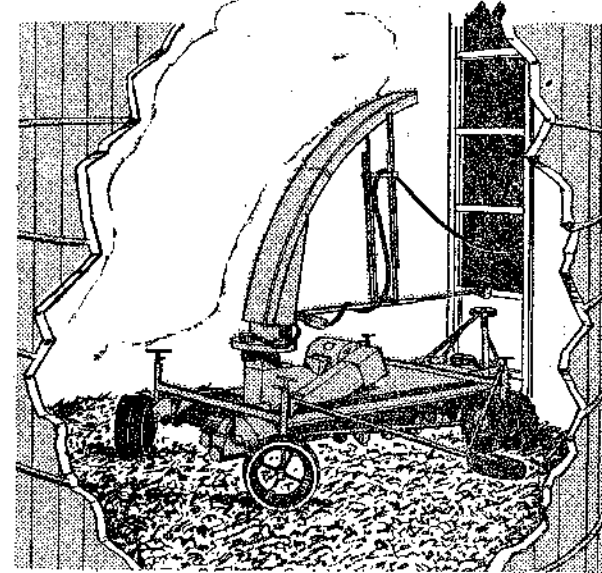

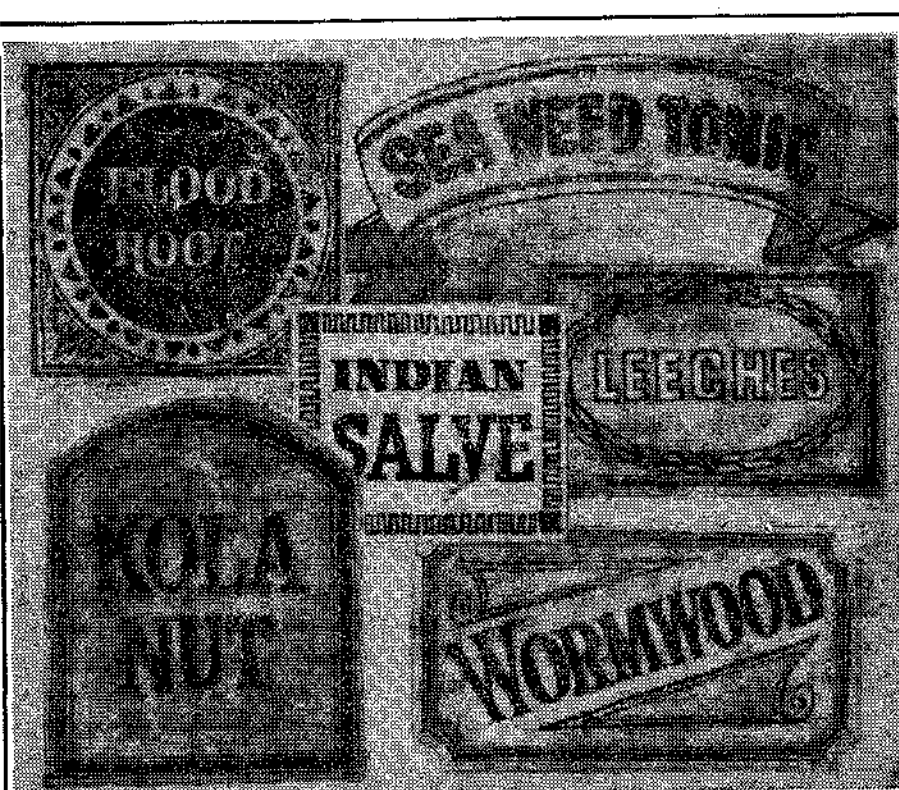

The bonds will be dated September 1, 1963, will be numbered consecutively in direct order of maturity from 1 to 75, inclusive, and will mature serially, as follows

\$1,000.00 October 1, 1964;  
\$3,000.00 October 1st of each year from 1965 to 1968, inclusive;  
\$4,000.00 October 1st of each year from 1969 to 1974, inclusive;
