## IT SEEMS TO ME White Man Practices Progressive Polygamy

WELCOME BACK to fellow-columnist Dave Kraft! It was getting a wee bit lonesome being this paper's only male columnist, but as it turned out he didn't end his column but just took a leave of absence, which I did at one time, too. At any rate, we're happy to know that he is back in the fold with his plotting mind and "Krafty" style.

Last Fourth of July an attempt was made in Baltimore to integrate an amusement park. Dr. Eugene Carson Blake of the United Presbyterian Church was one of the leaders at that "Play-In." They were unsuccessful at that time and since then many church and other groups have avoided the park in protest. But the park did integrate in August and closed with receipts larger than ever! And what is more encouraging is that the future never looked brighter for the park, with reservations for next year higher than ever. So, desegregation is not always financially a liability -- or, so it seems to me.

Allow me to bring you up to date on the proposed merger of the United Brethren Church and the Methodist Church. On September 20, the representatives of the two denominations completed the first draft of the plan for union. The Methodist Church has elected Bishops for life while the EUB Church elected them for four years at a time. The Methodist practice will be part of the new church whose name is proposed as The United Methodist Church. There are other changes, too, but these for the main are just adjustments of detail. Current membership of the Methodist Church is 10,234,986 and EUB membership is 761,754. 1964 is the earliest the merger could be officially achieved -- but church mergers in process now mark a period of exciting church history. Or, so it seems to me.

Roman Catholic participation in the President's cabinet will reach three with approval of John Austin Gronouski as Postmaster General. It never before contained more than two.

A Southern Baptist clergyman who preached against segregation and was asked to resign his pulpit has announced plans to enter the ministry of the Episcopal Church. Dr. Henry J. Stokes Jr. was pastor of the First Baptist Church of Macon, Georgia. It is a reminder that many Christian people are paying a high cost for preaching the Gospel in America. Or, so it seems to me.

The white man practices 'progressive polygamy,' declares an Anglican churchman from Africa. The missionaries say "one man-one woman," said Bishop S. O. Odulola. "But when we come to your universities we find that you don't live like that." He was speaking about our high divorce rate and that while we do not accept the idea of more than one spouse "at a time," we have made it very easy to obtain divorces and to marry again. That sort of hits home, it seems to me.

Cass City bears promise as a 'ministerial retirement village.' Already, we have enough of them (or, 'us') to start a club for fellowship and political purposes. Just this afternoon I had coffee with the Rev. Sam Wurtz who said that he plans to make Cass City his home when he retires. I can see somebody who has financial resources creating a new

subdivision of good small homes, containing a study, for ministers. Down payments could be made while the minister is in middle age, with additional payments to be made each year, so that upon retirement it would be paid for. Of course, trust funds and other matters enter into any long-term deal of this sort. This kind of thing is being done at various spots around the nation. Some even have only one heating plant for 10 or 12 homes, so that when warmer climates lure their occupants south for a month or so in the winter, their heating problem at home is taken care of. Maybe someone with the resources will look into it and Cass City will have another source of revenue and population. Or, so it seems to me.

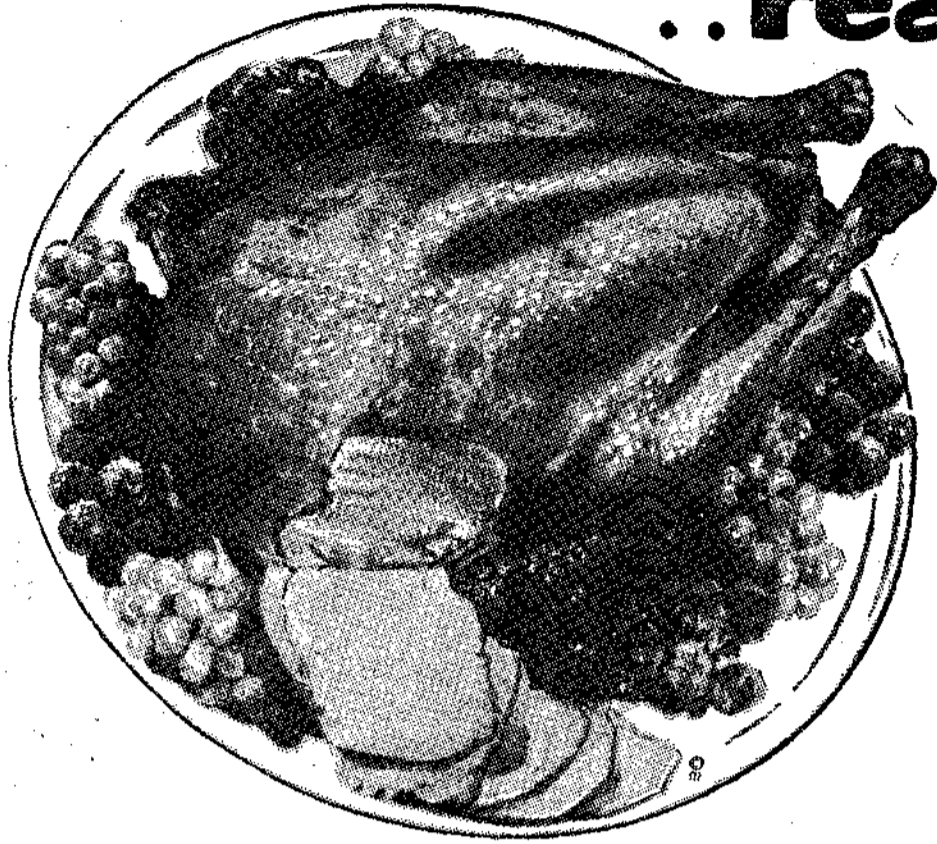

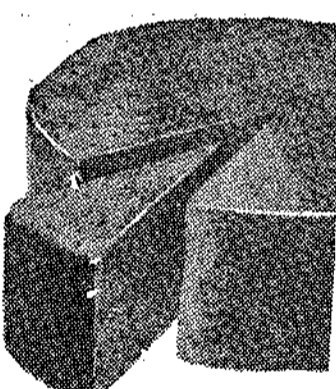

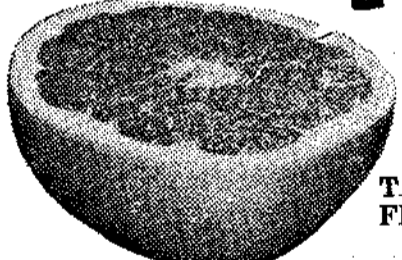
