Local Wood Returns As New Products

Scott Paper Company is shipping carloads of local wood to its Detroit mill where it is being converted into products which are retailed by local stores as well as others throughout the country.
The company has spent some \$50 to \$60 thousand locally in setting up a pulpwood yard in Tuscola county and purchasing some 3,500 units (approx. 140 train car loads) of wood during the year's first year of operation. This wood previously has been neglected and considered of no value.
The 3,500 units hardly dents the available supply. In Huron, Lapeer, Sanilac, St. Clair and Tuscola counties there are some 150,000 acres of aspen (poplar), according to the latest survey figures. From this five-county area, 25 to 30 thousand cords of aspen could be harvested year after year without depleting the source.
Scott wants to raise the yard purchases up to at least 9,000 cords next year, adding about a quarter of a million dollars to the economy. If the yard reaches the needed level of production, then it is very probable that the company will further expand their buying procedures, thus making pulpwood harvesting a big item in the economy of the "Thumb".
According to Alfred Ballweg, Tuscola County Extension Director, more persons should take a long and serious look at pulpwood harvesting as most farms have the necessary equipment for harvesting this cash crop and the equipment for the most part will be sitting idle for most of the winter months. Thumb area people should take advantage of this market for our pulpwood or it could be lost to this area of Michigan, concluded Ballweg.
