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TOUGHEST DRIVING OF THE YEAR

Getting your car to start all winter long is really a simple matter. A competent fall tune-up is usually sufficient or a battery warmer in stubborn cases. It is much more important though that you know how to stop it.

Collisions due to the inability of motorists to brake their cars on icy roads accounts for the overwhelming majority of winter driving accidents.

One common mechanical fault that you should have looked after now, if you haven't already done so, is uneven brake pressure on the front wheels. Uneven pressure that can cause a braking car to swerve dangerously on dry roads becomes downright disastrous in winter.

One wheel gripping before the other can easily throw a car into a spin and out of control. Just as bad is one bald tire that fails to grip. A traffic study of 2154 skidding accidents showed half the cars had 40 per cent more braking power on one side than the other; 30 per cent had one or more tires worn smooth.

Snow covered roads make slow speeds a moral obligation. The standard stopping distance on dry pavement at 50 mph is 188 feet. To equal this on hard-packed snow with good tires you can't drive faster than 28 mph! Thruway authorities recommend 528 feet (26 car lengths) between cars when you are following at 60 mph on snow packed roads. That's double the recommendations for summer.

**Taxes Grow Twice As Fast As
 Income During Last Ten Years**

 Tax Income Up**
 Personal income increased slightly less than 40 per cent in the last 10 years in Michigan, but revenues from state and local taxes have grown more than twice that percentage.
 The State Revenue Department's report shows personal income went from \$12.9 billion in 1953 to \$18 billion this year, an increase of 39.93 per cent. During the same period the total state-local taxes combined brought in 109.84 per cent more to government units.
 Local taxes increased the greatest, the department indicated, with a 128.09 per cent jump in revenue. State taxes jumped by 98.01 per cent during the 10 year period.

Poor Fish
 Michigan's fish industry, badly hurt by the recent botulism scare, may get federal help toward a comeback.
 Although federal and state officials attempted to make clear that only smoked products were suspect in the botulism poisonings many people just crossed all fish products off their shopping lists. At least one firm blamed its bankruptcy on the scare.
 Now, however, urgings of officials from Michigan and Wisconsin prompt the U. S. Senate to broaden the small business disaster loan program to include special relief for the Great Lakes fish packing industry.
 The change in the loan program made is applicable to all natural disasters. U. S. Sen. Philip A. Hart, Michigan Democrat, spearheaded a move to the change when he termed the botulism scare a "severe disaster" for the industry.

Watch Mail
 The holiday season at the end of each year is one when individuals should be particularly aware of the well-known maxim "Let the Buyer Beware."
 State Attorney General Frank J. Kelley notes that one of the most frequent problems called to his attention during this season is that of unordered merchandise being received by mail.
 A check with the U. S. Post Office Department indicates that mail can be refused at any time and that a person is never required to accept either letters or packages.
 Any mail, including packages, can be given back to the mailman

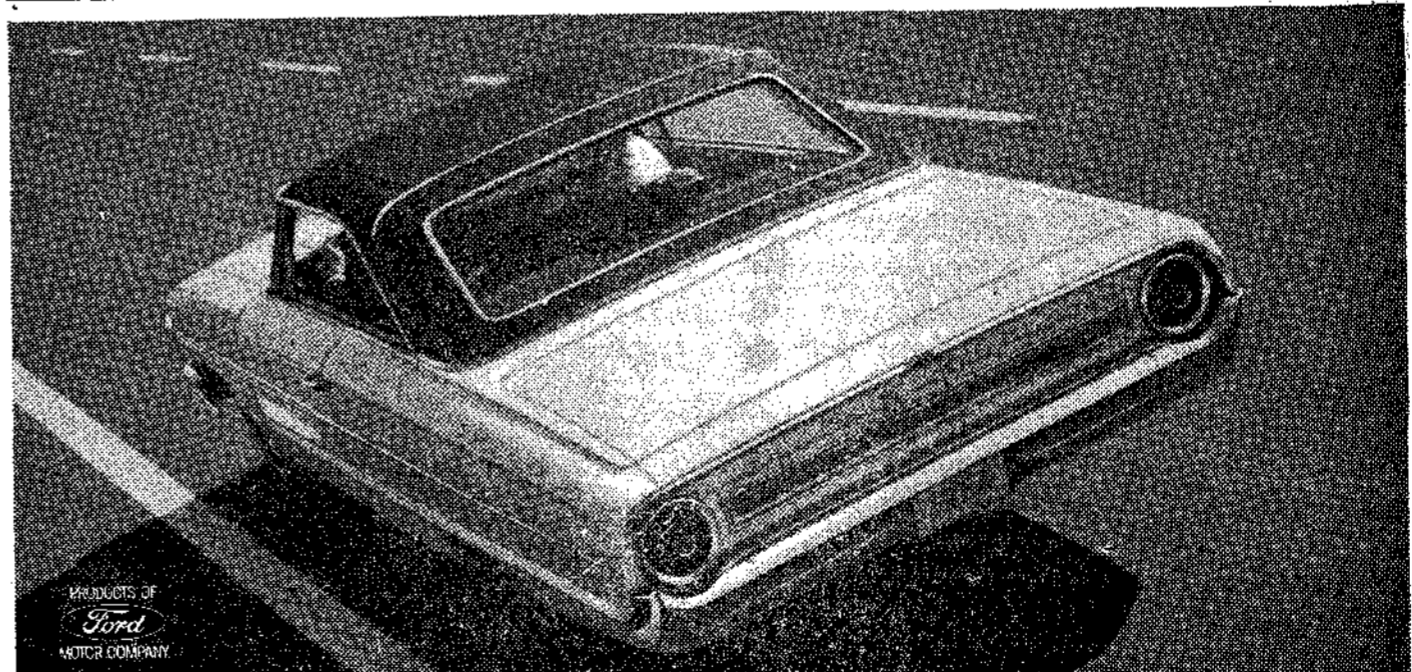

Some Detroit pastors, including some that I know, were recently arrested while attempting to worship at Capitol Street Methodist Church in Jackson, Miss. They had some Negro friends with them and included the Rev. Mr. James Nixon, who was a Lenten speaker in Cass City three years ago. Trustees of the Church have complained to local law enforcement agencies at the arrests which have taken place weekly since early in October. There is something redemptive about such actions... or, so it seems to me.
