Question Grading Methods

Parents of two Cass City High School students, irked at citizenship grades given their children, appeared before the Board of Education Monday night and sparked a review of marking techniques.

An irate mother, acting as spokesman for the group, implied that the teacher had shown unreasonable and harsh judgment in the grading of the children and wanted to know why. Some board members and ad-

ministration members present defended the teacher's position by stating that what one teacher may consider essential for grading, another may not. At one point the exchange

between the mother and a teacher grew hot. However, at no point did discussion get out of hand. No decisions were reached in

the matter. However, Principal Arthur Holmberg concluded that such exchanges "are not useless. I think as long as we keep our heads and remain friends that something is accomplished."

Another charge was leveled, this time against the athletic department, when James Milligan, board member, reported that a parent had asked him why the department could offer new suits for the boys but would not allow his son to play basketball because it didn't have enough equipment.

Coach Oarie Lemanski explained that the basketball program couldn't carry more than 15 boys. "I told the boys that they couldn't dress for games, but that they could come in and practice any time they wanted to."

"I can't look after more than 15-16 boys at one time," he concluded.

The new suits were purchased this year and the original suits were handed down to the junior varsity.

Board President Horace Bulen was instructed to investigate the possibility of a new special education room. The question of the room rose when Mrs. Gerald Prieskorn pointed out that the school enrollment was up 31 students and mostly in the elementary section.

"If we do that again next year," she charged, "We're in trouble.'

The special education room would be used for regular classes until the need for another special education room arose. The school currently has a special education room that does not have the full complement of 15 students allowed.

Under the present setup, the county reimburses the school for the building of special education rooms, under the conditions of the three-fourths mill special education levy now in effect within the county.

If another special education room is secured, and used for regular classes, it will be paid for by the school and then when it is turned into a special education room, the county will reimburse the school.

It was also suggested that the 1.5 mills recently passed be used in another year for the purpose of building a room. The idea was squelched when Superintendent Willis Campbell pointed out that the millage was voted on as being specifically for operation and not capital outlay.

In other business, Holmberg reported that indications are good that the junior high athletic program will be able to continue Doug Webster, extern after teacher, returns to Central Michigan University in February.





Getting your car to start all winter long is really a simple matter. A competent fall tune-up is usually sufficient or a battery warmer in stubborn cases. It is much more important though that you know

how to stop it. Collisions due to the inability of motorists to

Without the zip, it could go to a city of the same name in lowa, New York, Texas or Missouri. With the code it's properly delivered. The Zip helps the mailer and the post office.

With universal use it should help reduce postal costs and perhaps avoid, or at least delay, the six-cent letter.

We did so because we felt that disclosing the name of the parent could embarass the student and pinpointing the teacher could result in unfair criticism.

Michigan Mirror

Taxes Grow Twice As Fast As **Income During Last Ten Years**

Elmer E. White Michigan Press Association Tax Income Up

Personal income increased slightly less than 40 per cent in the last 10 years in Michigan, but revenues from state and local taxes have grown more than twice that percentage.

The State Revenue Department's report shows personal income went from \$12.9 billion in 1953 to \$18 billion this year, an increase of 39.93 per cent. During the same period the total statelocal taxes combined brought in 109.84 per cent more to government units.

Local taxes increased the greatest, the department indicated, with a 126.09 per cent jump in revenue. State taxes jumped by 98.01 per cent during the 10 year

The department report shows the greatest increases on the state level were on the business activities, use, cigarette and intangibles taxes.

The business activities levy, just written into law in 1955, brought \$30 million in the first year and \$77.9 the most recent full year of report, for a hike of

In 1953 Michigan residents were paying 7.53 per cent of their personal income for state and local taxes, while this year the figure had jumped to 11.29 per cent, the department said.

Resorts Prosper

A tardy winter could well have some effect, but the tourist industry in Michigan is hoping to surpass its record \$20 million season put on the books last year.

Some 85 winter sports facilities will be open this year, State Tourist Council Director William McGraw said before the season opened. This represents a total increase of two over last year, but eight new resorts will be opening this year. Six center operators decided against continuing in business, McGraw said.

The new facilities are well scattered around the state. They will be at Harbor Springs, Bellaire, Holland, Lakeview, Kalamazoo, Oxford, Rockford and in the

Al Quaal Recreation area of the Upper Peninsula.

McGraw said major improvements also have been made at a number of resorts throughout the

This winter, ski buffs will have their choice of many new ski runs, improved slopes and additional tow equipment. There will be 20 chair lifts, 42 T-bar and J-bar lifts and 19 pomalifts in operation. Some 28 ski areas are geared to make their own snow this year, he said.

Poor Fish

Michigan's fish industry, badly hurt by the recent botulism scare, may get federal help toward a comeback.

Although federal and state officials attempted to make clear that only smoked products were suspect in the botulism poisonings many people just crossed all fish products off their shopping lists. At least one firm blamed its bankruptcy on the scare.

Now, however, urgings of officials from Michigan and Wisconsin prompt the U.S. Senate to broaden the small business disaster loan program to include special relief for the Great Lakes fish packing industry.

The change in the loan program made is applicable to all natural disasters. U.S. Sen. Philip A. Hart, Michigan Democrat, spearheaded a move to the change when he termed the botulism scare a "severe disaster" for the industry.

The holiday season at the end of each year is one when individuals should be particularly aware of the well-known maxim "Let the Buver Beware."

Watch Mail

State Attorney General Frank J. Kelley notes that one of the most frequent problems called to his attention during this season is that of unordered merchandise being received by mail.

A check with the U.S. Post Office Department indicates that mail can be refused at any time and that a person is never required to accept either letters or

Any mail, including packages. can be given back to the mailman as "refused" if it is unopened. This cannot be done, however, if the merchandise is opened.

Post Office regulations also prohibit the mailing of any merchandise C.O.D. which was not ordered, Kelley said the U.S. government department is anxious to learn of any violations of this regulation.

"My advice to anyone who receives unordered merchandise is to return it at once to the mailman or local Post Office without opening it." Kelley said.

"To do otherwise may well result in your becoming legally responsible for the payment of merchandise you did not order and do not want."


