new elevator includes two 3,000bushel capacity mills, a large dryer and an automatic scale. Hoffman estimated the new mill

> The new elevator will consist of four 130-foot high concrete silos surrounded by a wall of concrete. The area between the four silos will be quartered and divided to provide at least 12 additional storage bins.

The new portion is expected to be finished sometime in June, just before the July wheat harvest. Contractors are Borton Inc., Construction and Engineering, Hutchinson, Kan.

Hoffman announced that the new elevator will be used to handle each of the three major crops, wheat, beans and corn, during their respective seasons and that the older elevator will handle smaller acreage grains such as barley, oats and rye.

Frutchev Bean has 24 elevators in the state. Last year, a similar elevator was built at Lennon and three years ago a new elevator

fire destroyed the original elevator.

Frutchey's two elevators in Cass City will continue to run as individual plants although there is some talk that the two may merge in the future. If a merger should occur it is speculated that the two elevators will specialize in the handling of certain crops.





#### The "Inside View" Told In Eisenhower's Book

By the Rev. Robert J. Searls

Probably the most crucial of the tests of our foreign policy relates to the countries in this hemisphere which lie south of our border. At the time Eisenhower was our president, he sent his brother to that area as his personal representative. Since that time our foreign policy has been largely built on this educator's report. At a mid-way point in President Kennedy's initial term office, Milton Eisenhower

wrote of what he tried to accomplish, both with the Latin American states themselves and for them in terms of economic aid. THE WINE IS BITTER, by Milton S. Eisenhower, is a rather readable report of an attempt by our country to stabilize Latin American nations and help them to grow.

This is the sort of book we can well afford to read. In doing so, we gain an 'inside view' of names we see in the newspaper - both persons and nations. A basic problem to any help that will be used effectively in illiteracy - the inability of too many people to read or write. For example: "Illiteracy ranges from 47 per cent in Ecuador to 71 per cent in Guatemala. Average per capita annual income is \$200 in Ecuador. \$170 in Guatemala, \$155 in Peru, and only \$75 in Bolivia." Yet each of these nations has several very rich people that are the real rulers of the country. One result is that the tax load is

ment of all taxes. Another key problem for all these nations is education at even elementary level, In rural areas, especially, the education is, in too many instances, seriously crippled by both a lack of teachers and a lack of students. Mexico, among others, is making great strides in combating this serious problem which underlies all other problems. Mr. Eisenhower takes each one and tries to show in a chapter how that problem is being met by

poor, while the rich evade pay-

each country in Latin America. His chapter headings indicate the wide scope of the book and the problems the author finds pertinent to a realistic and helpful solution. To quote a few: "Where there is little meaning in life, there is little respect for death," "We cannot afford the luxury of ignorance; it costs too much," "We cannot change history, but we can act so that our children won't want to," and this important one, "A man with a home, a full stomach, and children in school is a poor revolu-

tionary." And there are more! The inroads of Communism in Latin America is of concern to every thinking American. We can see from the Cuban situation how close Communism can come if we allow it. A report to the Congress by the Corporation for Economic and Industrial Research estimates that there are 200,000 Communist party members in Latin America.

The Communist way of life wants these nations in the Communist camp and Eisenhower traces for us, in horrible completeness, the degree to which they are gaining this objective and the multiplicity of their ap-

proach. For example, he tells of attempting to get an American radio station on the air with absolutely no success (in Nicaragua); yet with no difficulty at all he got 11 Soviet stations!

When you have reviewed the present situations, his analysis of steps we must take becomes evident. He suggests what steps can be taken under President Kennedy's leadership. Now we look to President Johnson to guide our nation in a successful policy of no Communism in this hemisphere.

The necessity of getting planty of rest before driving long highway distances can hardly be emphasized enough. Thousands of drivers who fail to pull over when they feel drowsiness creeping over them and killed each year as they pile up against trees, bridge abutments and other obstacles.

How long does it take to die from such a collision? Less than a second, according to studies by the National Highway User's Conference.

Taking an average speed of only 55 mph, onetenth of a second of contact is required to crush the bumper and grill. In the second one-tenth of a second, fenders buckle, the hood flies up against the windshield and the back wheels leave the ground. If, as is often the case, the driver's legs are held stiffly in front of him, they may break

at the knees.

Three-tenths of a second after impact, the body, still traveling at 55 mph, smashes into the steering wheel while the motor block hits the tree. In the next three-tenths of a second, the driver's chest is crushed by the steering wheel. His head smashes through the windshield and shock paralyzes his heart. He is dead.

In seven-tenths of a second in all, hinges tear, locks spring and the driver may be thrown out of the car.

Seat belts will help a lot. But the only sure safeguard is alertness that never rests. If you are celebrating over the holiday season, sober up and rest before you attempt to drive.

#### Assassination Aftermath

The almost unbelievable assassination of President Kennedy hit Michigan as it did each of the other states, much like a sharp blow from an axe.

A flurry of controversy erupted immediately over whether the major universities should continue plans to play football games, political meetings were cancelled within hours of the Nov. 22 disaster and people in every city wondered if this really did

For many it took several days for the reality to begin to sink in. Each had to consider how this event would affect his life.

In Lansing and the home towns of Michigan's elected officials the question of effect loomed larger than to most individuals. No partisan expressed this on the surface, but it was apparent the wheels of political thought were turning fast, attempting to get a kaleidoscopic view of the impact.

Immediately four "non-partisan" events honoring public officials were cancelled, to be scheduled after the official period of mourning is completed. Each event was to honor a partisan officeholder but was to be attended by members of both parties.

Though non-partisan in support, such tribute dinners often are a starting point for a cam-

A few Democrats broke the unwritten party \_rule\_of no campaigning or public decision announcements.

More than one Michigan Democrat came forth within a few days after the President's death with statements regarding their interest in the 1964 gubernatorial

Political expediency induces thoughts and decisions which do not meet the eye, so it is impossible to judge the wisdom of the pronouncements by some politicians about their future plans. Oddly enough, however, the violations of the unwritten party rule came from persons who have very closely followed the party line in the past.

#### Winter Hazard

Danger: Thin Ice. This is a warning which soon will be on many of Michigan's lakes, streams and ponds, but there will be more places where there will

The warning should be firmly implanted in the minds of all, and particularly children who are usually more venturesome when winter spreads white across the

At least one dozen persons drowned last year when they fell through ice in Michigan, state police reports show. The previous year winter water accidents claimed 13 lives.

Commissioner Joseph A. Childs warns that the greatest danger occurs fairly early and again late in the winter. Both periods are those of transition from one sea-

son to another. State Police advise ice should be several inches thick on deep bodies of water to assure safety. Special precautions should be taken at private ponds or flooded areas where children might slide or skate. Rescue devices should be handy at all times.

Warnings are not limited to children, however. Ice fishermen or persons who decide to "shortcut" by driving their cars across frozen lakes should be very familiar with the depth of the water

and the thickness of the ice. Ice is frequently "worn" thin by underwater currents or breakthroughs may occur from surface pressure cracks, Childs notes.

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
