Swedish Home

One dish that is always featured is Lutefish, sort of like a creamed codfish, Mrs. Harold Perry reports. Another that is tasty and brings a lot of fun is a rice pudding with an almond in it. "The one who gets the almond is supposed to be married the next year," Mrs. Perry explained with good natured laugh. Pickled herring is also a must at the Christmas dinner.

Besides these items, you'll find a table loaded with other dishes. Meat balls and brown beans are one of the favorites of the Swedes and can almost always be found. Christmas Day dinner will always be featured with turkey or goose, Mrs. Per-

ry concluded. German Delight

"We're going to have turkey this Christmas," said Mrs. Louis Sattelberg, "but only because we were too late to get a goose. It's always goose for Christmas

Besides the goose, the Sattelbergs have a dessert that has been passed from generation to generation . . . it's German plum pudding.

It's always a highlight of Christmas when the rumsoaked pudding is lighted and comes flaming on to the dinner table, Mrs. Sattelberg explained. "We use rum because it's easier to get, but brandy is sometimes even better."

Greek Dishes "We sort of break tradition a little at our home," says Mrs. John Scandalios. "Oh, not in the type of dishes, but in the time they are served."

In Greece, Christmas is a Holy day and the exchanging of gifts and holiday favorite dishes wait until New Year's. But we jump the gun a little, Mrs. Scandalios explained.

During the entire holiday season we have special

Christmas cookies that have been in the family for years ... my mother waited until New Year's to serve them.

Besides the cookies, of course, we have many dishes prepared in a style that appeals to Greek families, Mrs. Scandalios explained, but are not specially prepared for Christmas

We build our Christmas dinner around turkey, she concluded.

Polish Favorites

"Because many of our daughters-in-law and sonsin-law do not appreciate Polish dishes, some of the tráditional dishes will be absent when the 25 members of the family gather for Christmas dinner this year," Mrs. Enick Rutkowski reported.

"Oh, there will be some favorites as pigs in a blanket, Polish sausage and decorated cake and we'll have turkey and ham, but that's about all this year."

Christmas will start right after church Christmas Eve and lasts throughout the day at the Rutkowskis.

"Enick wanted to have a goose, a traditional holiday fowl, but we decided against it because of the visitors." Another Polish delicacy is a soup that includes the blood from ducks or geese. "We have it several times a year, but not at Christmas because of the guests who may not care for it," according to Mrs. Rutkowski.

We stress mince pie and plum pudding and, of course, we have turkey . . . but you have all of that here, too, she said.


One thing about the English at Christmas, they seem to go in more for caroling than we do, Miss Addison explained.



The increase in color sets in the area is in keeping with the general buying trend across the nation, following recent color receiving improvements and reduction in prices.

"In a few years," speculates Bud Schneeberger, of Schneeberger TV Sales and Service, "there will be just as many color sets as black and white."

He also expects color prices to "drop in the next five or 10 years to the same level as black and

Color television, introduced 10 years ago, has zoomed in sales during the past few years. Estimated sales for 1963 across the nation have been set at 750,000 and next year is expected to exceed one million.

optimistically Schneeberger guessed that his sales next year would double, "By 1965 RCA color sales are expected to surpass

The only petition not in is Seals' who indicated in an earlier interview that he would seek reelection.

One of the major projects facing village officers in the coming year will be Cass City's \$150,000 water system revamping project.

In connection with the water project, Bridges announced that word was received Thursday, Dec. 19, via a telephone call from Chicago, that the village had been given the go-ahead to advertise for bids on the project.

Bridges stated, however, that until written confirmation is received, there will be no advertising.

Unionville-Sebewaing Move Forward With Merger Plans

A merger between Unionville and Sebewaing school districts moved a step closer to reality last week when members of the two boards met at Unionville with William A. Scott, county superintendent of schools, and George Schutt, of the Department of Public Instruction, attending.

Merger proceedings can be started by electors of the districts submitting petitions or by resolutions by each board requesting the intermediate superintendent of schools to start consolidation proceedings.

If the districts decide to act,

they will probably use the resolution method of getting a ballot before the voters in the districts.

The intermediate district must submit a request for merger to the Department of Public Instruction for approval.

The date for an election in each district would be set by intermediate district authorities.

One merger barrier that the districts will not have to face is the question of bonded indebtedness. Both districts are free of debt. The merger is under consideration to improve the educa-

Authorities believe a better curriculum can be developed with a larger district.



A State Police crime laboratory investigator has ruled that the death of Stanley Graham, 75, rural Cass City, was "definitely a suicide", acording to Sheriff

Sheriff Marr received confirmation late last week from Edgar W. Kivela, crime lab investigator that "although there were two wounds . . . death was by suicide from self-inflicted wounds."

Marr ordered the investigation after Graham was found dead from two gunshot wounds at his home southwest of the village.

On other crime fronts, Marr stated that he expected to receive word soon from the crime lab which may help identify a skeleton found Dec. 2, east of Vassar, by two hunters.

At the time Marr attributed death to a skull fracture and tentatively identified the remains as those of a Kingston man missing since 1959.







producing streams which enter the upper Great Lakes. Records spanning the last 50 years show that whitefish may be ready for a population explosion within the next few years, but here again much depends upon the success of lamprey control efforts. Other factors, such as weather and food supplies, are also considered important to any possible surge in whitefish numbers. One thing is certain: The whitefish is very prolific. A relatively low supply of these spawning fish can produce a remarkable population buildup. Such has been the case at other times in the upper Great Lakes when commercial production plunged, then bounced back to yield tremendous catches

Probably the most important single staple in their diet is field mice, but they also normally eat insects, snakes, rabbits, fish, dead creatures found on roadways or in the woods, corn, frogs, and many other kinds of meat, vegetables, and fruits. In proportion to other things, foxes do not eat many pheasants or rabbits, mostly because these two important game species are too tough to catch.—Mich. Dept. of Conservation

Fire Can Spoil Mappy Holiday Babbs Switch, Caribou and

Billings can tell you that a happy Christmas is a safe Christmas.

Babbs Switch is a small Oklahoma community. On Christmas Eve, 1924, about 150 men, women and children were gathered in the frame schoolhouse for the community's biggest-ever Christmas party. A series of incidents—a Christmas tree branch brushed against a candle, a kerosene lamp knocked off a table, and a stage curtain thrown on the flames—led to a fire which destroyed the schoolhouse. killing 36 persons and injuring 40.

In more recent years, church fires occurred in Billings, Mont., and Caribou, Me.

In Billings, an attendant lighting candles accidentally set fire to a large velvet curtain behind the altar Fire spread to a combustible fibre-board ceiling.

In Caribou, Christmas trees placed around an altar in the auditorium of a church fed a blaze. They were ignited when a small girl knocked over a tree which fell on lighted candles nearby.



Quite some time before Romney became Governor, it should be noted, several legislators were shouting about the state's expenditures.

Rep. Harry De Maso, Battle Creek Republican, was one of the more vocal of these. As each new tax was proposed during the late 1950's, De Maso had the same thing to say: "Tax problems exist because of decisions to spend and they grow because spending grows more rapidly than existing tax bases. Both the level and the trend of spending, but especially the latter, determines the size of the problem."

De Maso's solution to the an-

spending demands is a simple one. "It is time we all took a good look to see if the (spending) barrei has a bottom, for from the taxes that have already been levied and spent it seems the barrel is bottomless," he said.

Careful, tedious studies of spending and agency management

in the past year or two have indicated there are many areas where savings could be accomp-These studies are yet to be

fully implemented but it appears progress will be made. Most of the areas noted represent savings of only a few thousand dollars per agency, but multiplied by the number of agencies in operation it could mean a substantial amount of funds could be eliminated from the state's budget or put to areas of real need.

Substantial or not, the maxim of "A penny saved is a penny applies to state and federal governments just as it does to individuals.

Ten Year Review

A new phenomena is taking place in state government, but it will be repeated every decade in the future.

The new Constitution provides for dicennial apportionment of the State Legislature to be accomplished by an even'y divided biportisan commission named by the major political parties.

The first commission operating under the apportionment provision has been at work for several months. By the end of January the eight man group hones to have an apportionment plan

A deadlock appears likely even though the method of dividing the 110 House seats and 34 Senate spots is spelled out in the Constitution.

The reversion of the commission's responsibility to the Supreme Court and the prospect of developments there could well give Republican Commission members a strong desire to settle it themselves, holding as much as they can but giving some small measure to their political counter-


