Response by sympathetic Cass from the hospital on crutches. City residents to the Don Finkbeiner emergency fund canisters placed late last week in local stores has been overwhelming, according to Cass City and Elkland Township Fire Department officials.

Finkbeiner suffered second and third degree burns on his face, ears, hands and wrists Tuesday, Jan. 14, in an explosion and fire at the home of Mrs.Mack Little on Garfield Street.

Twenty-four of the canisters were placed throughout the village Friday afternoon by firemen. Fritz Neitzel, who with his wife Peg made the canisters, reported that "we started with a half dozen and it just sort of snow-balled. Stores began asking for the canisters faster than we could make them."

Saturday afternoon the canisters were picked up and coupled with approximately eight individual contributions delivered to Chief Al Avery, \$87.65 was delivered to Finkbeiner. In charge of the pick up were Eldon Stout-

endourg and Dean Toner. Firemen hit on the canister idea when it was learned that Finkbeiner had no hospital insurance. He has an accident policy that brings in a few dollars each

Compounding Finkbeiner's financial difficulties is the fact that Mrs. Finkbeiner is expecting a baby the last of February. The

couple have two children. Finkbeiner, who will celebrate his 27th birthday today (Thursday), is reportedly "doing nicely,"

according to Dr. H. T. Donahue, attending physician. "His face looks as if it will

heal without too much scarring and I'm pleasantly surprised at the way his ears have turned out," Donahue commented, "They look as though there will be no need for skin grafts." Some lung trouble from fumes

is clearing up and Finkbeiner is back on a regular diet.

Donahue also reported that Finkbeiner is able to move about the hospital and should be home in a couple of days.

County Still EnjoysSurplus

There was little change Tuscola County's financial picture in 1963.

Tuscola county finished the year with a surplus that was close to 1962's \$90,451.77 even though the reports submitted to Supervisors during the January session by Treasurer Arthur Willits showed a balance of \$74,596.21.

Willits explained to supervisors that coupled with the \$13,599.18 they placed in a Building Fund Reserve in December, the county actually finished the year with a surplus of \$88,168.39, or just \$2,283.38 less than in 1962.

Even though the county has posted surpluses close to the \$100,000 mark for the past two years, Willits doubted that taxes would be affected in 1964. The county had almost \$54,000

more to spend in 1963 with total funds available skyrocketing from \$705,505.40 in 1962 to \$759,358.70 last year.

Willits attributed the increase in available funds to surpluses left over from last year in the

The county spent more in 1963 also with total fund charges zooming to \$684,789.40 as compared to \$615,053 in 1962. For a more detailed account of why spending was up, see Clerk Archie Hicks' report.

Tuscola county supervisors are slated to return to their January session Friday to work on the 1964 budget after taking a threeday recess to attend the Supervisors State Convention in Lansing. The convention began Tuesday and ends Thursday.

Supervisors have already spent four days hearing and accepting reports from various county offices and handling regular January business. The January session began Wednesday, Jan. 15, and recessed Monday.

Supervisors made sure the County Road Commission would have a busy summer, the opening day of their January meet by purchasing 2,440 road signs from Gregware Equipment Company. The signs cost \$7.40 for a staggering total cost of \$18,056.

The board also purchased 30,-000 feet of two-inch pipe from Morley Brothers at a cost of \$9,100. The pipe will be used as standards for the signs.

Plan Disaster Jourse

A course in medical self-help, designed to help people survive in the event of a nuclear war or natural disaster, will start Feb. 4 at Hills and Dales Hospital at 7:30 p.m. it was disclosed by Tuscola County Civil Defense Director, Frank Kroswek.

The course is a new, in-depth 16-hour program designed to teach families how to survive and to meet their health needs in the event they are deprived of their physicians' services.

The course was evolved by the U. S. Public Health Service in cooperation with the American Medical Association's Council on National Security and Committee on Disaster Medical Care. It is endorsed by the Michigan Department of Health.

The course consists of 11 lessons to be given by qualified instructors, under supervision of physicians, allied health person-

nel and trained lay instructors. Subjects taught in the course include radioactive fallout and shelter, healthful living in emergencies, artificial respiration bleeding and bandaging, fractures and splinting, burns, shock, transportation of injured, nursing care, infant and child care and emergency childbirth.



Paciescznys Still Fight Misfortune

Things are still a long way from easy for Mr. and Mrs. Basil Paciesczny of Deford these days, but it must seem like nothing at all when compared with their early experiences. For the couple were brought together by adversity and started their life together in displaced persons camps in Germany.

There war experiences read like something straight out of fiction. Both were uprooted from their homes at an early age by German and Russian conquerors.

Mrs. Paciesczny had just turned 17 when she was jerked from her home by Nazi storm troopers and whisked 200 miles away to work on a collective farm.

The food was terrible and scarce and the quarters almost unbearable, Mrs. Paciesczny recalled. "We worked 12 hours or more every day and often our meal was a slice of black bread and a piece of cheese. I often thought that if could just have my fill of potatoes I would be in heaven."

At the camp she was in there were 145 women in one room, stacked three high in triple-decker beds. They were so crowded czny said, that one night I left my bed and when I returned in the darkness I was unable to find again and I walked all night. Varied Career

Mr. Paciesczny's war time experiences are even more remarkable. When Poland was overrun. he was pressed into service by the Russians. While in service he was assigned to guard a supply station with blankets and other wanted

He was ordered to shoot anyone who came close. While on duty a friend from his home town came past the prohibited area and instead of firing he shouted for him to leave.

His refusal to act proved disastrous. A Russian soldier observed the action and Paciesczny was promptly made a prisoner. While being transported into Russia he and three others es-

come a German prisoner, arrested by the Nazis who had overrun the uniform, his wife said.

The Paciescznys met in Germany during the war and were married in 1945. They spent five years in various displaced persons' camps where they started a fam-

that the family consists of two Poles, three Germans (born in the camps) and four Americans. Mrs. Paciesozny is studying to become the fifth American. She already speaks English with only a slight accent. "I read it even better," she said proudly.

Move to Colorado Through the efforts of the Catholic church, they found a sponsor in Colorado and were admitted to the United States. They chose the States over Canada or Australia where they could also have immigrated.

They worked for their sponsor on a farm for two years before he found work in Detroit. In 1958 they moved to their present small farm southwest of Cass City. Mr. Paciesczny kept his job at a lumberyard in Detroit and still sees his family only on week ends when he drives home. Himess Strikes

Misfortune struck the family again last 'year when Mrs. Paciesczny became critically ill and received 16 pints of blood. It's been an expensive process, Mrs. Paciesczny sighed. We have insurance but it is costing us about \$1,500 besides. I'm very grateful to some folks who have already paid back six pints of blood to the hospital, she said, and will greatly appreciate any other blood that is repaid for me.

A former Cass City Police Chief, with a flair for the inventive, is "shedding some new light" on crime detection and causing quite a stir among local, state and national law enforcement bodies.

In the center of the spotlight is a special lighting attachment for police cars invented and developed by Bill Wood of Holly, former Cass City Chief of police.

Wood's light, called appropriately the "Wood-Lite", is a rack, similar to a car-top carrier with the large beacon ray mounted in the center and a side light at

Wood hit on the idea for the light last summer when he noticed that the patrol car he was driving didn't have a spotlight. He recalled that even with a spotlight, the patrolman's needs were still unanswered.

A spotlight, shining 30 yards from the car, illuminates only about a four-foot area. Wood's lights, resembling headlights, and adjustable to 360 degrees, shine as far as 200 yards and at 30 yards. yards wide. One or both lights can be turned on from inside the

The huge light area offered by the assembly makes it ideal for patrolling alleys and for general patroling, accident scenes and

Another advantage is that the removable rack makes it possible to convert the patrol car to a plain car in 20 seconds, should the need arise. The use of the rack also eliminates drilling four holes in the top of the patrol car to mount the red beacon light.

Also in the light system's favor is the fact that the three-unit attachment actually costs less than the price of having a beacon ray and spotlight installed on the

Installation takes about onehalf hour compared to half a day for the other system. Since the unit is sent out complete from the factory, it needs only to be placed on the car and connected to a hot wire. The side lights can







Among the many fine gifts I our nation's ambassador to Engreceived for Christmas, one of land. the more unique was a book entitled BEN FRANKLIN'S WIT AND WISDOM. Many issues of Almanack Richard's were mined for this collection, which is also notable for the woodcuts of Joseph Crawhall.

Franklin, if you recall, was not just content to shut himself in the printer's shop. The Philadelphia Public Library grew out of his interest; so did that city's street lights. We all know about his famed experiment with the kite and the key, and today many ultra - modern homes boast of possessing the Franklin Stove, just one of many inventions attributed to this early American. Politics came into his life rather naturally, and he held many political posts, chief of them (before the Revolutionary War) as

He was sent to France to direct negotiations for peaceful relations and for the recognition of the United States by the government. He carried on the successful effort of our nation to end the war, and to be recognized as a nation by Great Britain. He served with the Continental Congress. While a member of Congress he was a signer of a memorial to Congress

to abolish slavery in this nation. Permit me to quote just a few of the many pithy sayings from this collection, written, remember, by a man active in the life of the world around him: "Each year one vicious habit

rooted out in time might make the worst man good throughout." "Hide not your talents, they for use were made: what's a sun-dial in the shade?"

"He that lieth down with dogs, shall rise up with fleas." "He's a fool that makes his

doctor his heir."

"When man and woman die,

As poets sung, His heart's the last part moves,

Her last, the tongue." "Three may keep a secret if

two of them are dead." "Love well, whip well." Of course, these reflect the age

in which they were written, but like a catalogue of sins, seem remarkably up to date. Naturally, a book of this sort is not the easiest to read because it contains a collection of hundreds of thoughts or sayings without a single dominant theme and there is no story. I enjoyed the brief excursion through the land of Benjamin Franklin; why don't you try it?


