"We stand to lose on any redistricting deal," he charged. "Tuscola and Huron counties will lose a Republican representative post which will probably go to

Protest Tower Color

A protest movement spearheaded by Bruce Gee over the color of the new water tower has resulted in the scheduling of an open meeting for affected persons Tuesday, June 9, the village council decided at its regular session at the Municipal Building. The site has not been announced.

Originally planned for an offwhite, for which the paint has been purchased, the objections have resulted in further study. Samples, of paint colors approved for towers will be available at the meeting and a decision reached, subject to council approval at its Wednesday morning session.

If the color is changed, the persons proposing the change will pay for the added expense, which means the freight for returning the new color.

In other decisions regarding the tower, it was decided to have no lights unless required to do so by law and to eliminate lettering the village's name on the side of the tank. To Test Mains Meanwhile, authorities announced that progress on the construction of the new water mains is on schedule. The mains will be tested today and should be in use within two weeks, according to present estimates.

tion came after Democratic Justices Paul L. Adams and Otis Smith threw in with three Republican members of the court to create a 5-3 majority for the GOP plan.

Commonly known as the "Hanna-Brucker Plan," the plan was drafted by William Hanna, Muskegon; former Gov. Wilbur Brucker, Detroit; Alfred LaPorte, Standish, and Ralph Huhtala, Kingsford.

The Legislature passed the bill last week, along with an act pushing the fall primary back from August 4 to September 1.

Despite its Republican origin, the plan could swing control of the House to the Democrats and sharply narrow the Republican margin of control in the Senate.

Locally, the redistricting would pit Rep. Allison Green, Kingston, Speaker of the House, against Rep. Edmund Good, Huron county.

"In such an instance," Rawson commented, "I would imagine that the Speaker of the House would have an edge. I would guess that Good wouldn't even seek the post but would try for some other office."

Under the Supreme Court plan, Tuscola and Huron counties would be joined to form state House District 15. Currently, Tuscola county is a separate district.

The Senate districting plan approved by the Supreme Court would join Huron and Tuscola counties with Bay county. Huron and Tuscola are now joined with Sanilac, which would be coupled with Lapeer.

The Bay, Huron and Tuscola district would be the 9th, instead of the 20th, which it is now.

Livestock cards returned by farmers to their carriers will be mailed direct to the Michigan Agricultural Statistics Reporting Service in Lansing. Information

from each card will then be tabulated and combined with other reports to give indications of changes in livestock on Michigan farms. These indications will be used to establish estimates of the current milk and egg production, the 1964 calf crop, lamb crop, wool production and spring pig crop, as well as plans for fall farrowing.

Section 1. Permission is hereby granted to Southeastern Michigan Gas Company, a Michigan corporation, and to its successors and assigns, to construct, operate and maintain in the public streets, highways, alleys and other public places in the Township of Kingston, Tuscola County, Michigan, all needful and proper gas pipes, mains, conductors, service pipes and other apparatus and facilities requisite for the manufacture, transmission and distribution of gas for all purposes to the Township of Kingston and the inhabitants thereof, and for conducting gas elsewhere to supply neighboring cities and villages and other territory supplied with gas by said Grantee, subject, however, to all conditions and restrictions hereinafter contained.

Section 2. All construction work done under this grant shall be under the supervision of the duly authorized representative of the Township of Kingston and the Grantee shall pay to the Township of Kingston, upon presentation of an itemized bill, the costs of such supervision at the legal rate of charge for the same.

Section 3. The rules and regulations applicable to the service, the quality of the gas furnished, and the rates charged therefor by the Grantee herein, its successors and assigns shall be as fixed from time to time by The Michigan Public Service Commission or such other state authority as shall have jurisdiction of the subject matter.

Section 4. This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon the publication hereof as required by law, and, upon confirmation by a majority vote of the qualified electors of the Township of Kingston voting on said proposition at the next regular election, or at a special election called for such purpose, shall remain in force for a period of thirty (30) years from the date hereof.

LICENSING OF JUNK YARDS Whereas, Act number 12 of the Public Acts of 1929, for the State of Michigan (19.731 to 19.733, Michigan Statutes Annotated) authorizes townships to pro-vide for the licensing of junk yards and places for dismantling automobiles; the aunual license fees and to adopt rules, regulations and conditions for the oper-

regulations and conditions for the oper-ation thereof; and Whereas, the Township Board of the Township of Elmwood, Tuscola County, Michigan, desires to regulate and li-cense junk yards and places for dis-mantling automobiles; Now, Therefor, the Township Board of the Township of Elmwood, Tuscola

County, Michigan, in meeting assembled this 7th day of May, 1964, resolves to adopt the following for the licensing of junk dealers and junk yards and places for the dismantling, wrecking and dis-posing of the junk and/or refuse ma-terial of automobiles in the Township of Einwood, except therefrom the Village limits of the Village of Gagetown, namely;

Section 1A No person, corporation, or other organization, directly, or indior other organization, directly, or indi-rectly, or its agents or employees, shall engage in the business of a junk dealer, or establish a junk yard or place for dismantling of automobiles within the corporate limits of the Township of Elm-wood, Tuscola County, Michigan, except the corporate limits of the Village of Gagetown, without having first obtained a license therefor from the Township Board.

Section 1B. "Junk" as used in this ordinance, shall be deemed to be any personal property other than clothing, household furnishings and office and/or store fixtures, which is or may be salvaged for re-use, resale, reduction or similer denosition similar disposition

Section 2. Applications for such license shall be made in, writing to the Town-ship Clerk and be filed with said Clerk. It shall be referred to the Tuscola County, Sheriff for investigation as to the moral character and previous record of the applicant, Such applications shall contain the name or names, of the ap-plicant, location of the place or places to be operated as junk yard, or places for the dismantling of automobiles, the names and addresses of the stockholders, if a corporation or organi-zation or partnership. Said application zation or partnership. Said application shall also contain an excrement on the part of the applicant to accept the license, if granted, upon the conditions that it may be suspended or revoked for violation of "the regulations of the con-duct of the business as may be re-quired by the Township Board. Appli-cants shall also file with the application the written consent of 60 per cent of the owners of real estate within a radius of 1000 feet of the property where such business is proposed to be conducted. Section 8. The Township Board shall

not issue a license for the operation of a junk yard or place for the accumula-tion of junk material at any location ly-ing within 500 feet of all highways in ood Township, or within 500 feet of a public park, cemetery, hospital, public school or church. The Township Board

nuay refuse to issue a license until the applicant therefor shall have enclosed such property with a properly painted tight board fence at least eight feet high and erected in such a manner as to oblitare the premises from view which obliterate the premises from view, which the licensee.

Section 4. When such licenses have een granted the Township Clerk shall ue the same upon payment of the sum of \$15 dollars.

Section 5. No licensee hereunder shall buy or receive any article or automobile from anyone under the age of twenty-one years without the written permission of the parent or guardian of such minor, nor shall any such licensee or employee receive any article by way of a pledge or pawn,

receive any acutic by way of a preuse or pawn. Section 6. The Township Board may impose as a condition for the granting of a license to operate a junk yard, or place for dismantling of automobiles, that it shall be so conducted as not to create a unisance by reason of noise or dis-agreeable odors or fumes, and that no loads of iron or other heavy materials may be unloaded or loaded nor break-up hammer used between six o'clock p.m. until nine o'clock a.m.; that said junk dealers shall not burn rubber or other substances so that the air may be pol-luted, nor cause to be placed outside of their property lines any second hand articles, used car parts, wheels, tin, from or material of any kind or nature; and the Township Board shall impose such other regulations and restrictions as may be necessary to prevent the basi-ness of the licensee from being conducted in such a manner as to be a nuisance,

On this Year's Ballot By Elmer E. White **Michigan Press Association** Party Changes

Minor political parties will be fewer on Michigan's ballot this fall.

Michigan Mirror

In the 1960 election, the last presidential race, Michigan voters had seven parties to choose from. This was the largest ballot in the state in more than 20 years.

The 1960 election, however, saw the five minority parties pick up only 10,302 votes of more than 3 million cast.

This year it appears at least one of the perennial minor parties will not be on the ballot although a new party has filed for ballot placement.

Indications are the Prohibition Party was not able to gain enough petition signatures to file for a place on the ballot. This party has been on the ballot regularly since the late 1940's.

The new entry this year will be a group originated in Detroit known as the Freedom Now Party. Its announced intention is to put up an entire slate of Negro candidates in an effort to further the civil rights fight for that minority group.

Two traditional ballot entries are expected to be present again this November: the Socialist and Socialist Labor Workers' Parties.

The two others which earned listing in 1960, the Tax Cut and Independent American Parties, have been somewhat dormant since that balloting and are not expected to file.

Computer Tests

People who have taken state civil service examinations in the past are getting a surprise in the tests now being given.

Instead of the standard multisection written examination used for years, prospective civil service employees and those personnel taking promotional exams are faced with a stack of computer data cards. Answers to each question are checked on a single card.

State Personnel Director Franklin DeWald says the new automatic checking of the examinations has speeded up the testing, checking and recording pro-

determines is whether a person could follow written directions. A person who put two answers on a single card would not be following directions. **

Computer use is also designed to improve the quality of the civil service exams, as well as speeding up the correction proc-

Now under study is the potential use of a computer in item analysis of exams. Previously a board of persons experienced in the field to be tested for checked each question considered.

Another trend in testing methods is reducing the importance of group assembly examinations by giving more tests at the time of employment application, said DeWald.

This permits a much earlier classification of job seekers and helps weed out those who obviously are not qualified for a particular position. Thusly, time is saved for both the applicant and the state.
