More than 70 of Cass City's teachers and their wives or husbands attended a dinner honoring retiring Supt. Willis Campbell Thursday night, May 28, at Frankenmuth's Bavarian Inn. Present, in addition to Mr. and Mrs. Campbell, were their daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Bruce Jones of Lansing.

Wayne Wilson served as master of ceremonies and paid tribute to Campbell's long service to the Cass City Schools. The

gift presentation was made by Mrs. Brewster Shaw who lauded the retiring school man for his numerous contributions of time and effort to a great variety of community projects. Campbell was presented with a leather traveling case as a gift from the teachers.

In a previous event, the students of Cass City High School presented Campbell with an engraved wrist watch, a gift from all six classes at the school. The presentation was made as a part of the annual "Swing-Out" program.

Speaking in behalf of the students was Fred Reid, this year's student council president. Campbell responded by thanking the students and recalling some of his experiences during the many past years of his service to the school.

Evergreen History Lists Top Events

A history of Evergreen township would, on first appearance, seem to be of interest to only those persons directly connected with the township, but Jason Kitchin, former Evergreen supervisor, has compiled a mimeographed booklet that is calculated to interest history lovers anywhere.

Probably the most detailed history of the township in existence, the booklet hits on major events starting with the opening of lumbering in the area in 1851. Detailed accounts of landowners, Indians, births and deaths, marriages, the great fires, taxes, churches, schools and tragedies appear throughout.

First written in 1948, the booklet is a revised edition "with some additions to bring it up to date," Kitchin explains on the front page.

In his foreword, Kitchin explains that the history was begun as an extension class project by him and his wife.

"I was township supervisor at the time and thus had all the former tax rolls. The more we investigated, the more interested I became and so determined to delve deeper and rewrite much that had been written and also add some subjects," he states.

"Had this been written even 25 years ago, it would have been much easier to get the facts on the earlier days and in some cases, the results would have been more accurate. Twenty-five years more... even less... and much of what we gathered would have been unobtainable."

The work is the compilation of numerous hours spent driving and making personal calls and hours poring over old records.

Of special interest to some will be the lists of veterans who served in the Civil War, World War I and World War II.

Crashes Injure Three

Three Cass City area persons were injured in two of five collisions investigated by area police during the past week.

Sunday afternoon Duane J. White, 18, and John Mulrath Jr., 16, both of Cass City, were injured when White lost control of his car in loose gravel on Kelly Road, near Cemetery Road and it went into a ditch.

White apparently drove too close to the edge of the roadway, according to investigating officers, and the loose gravel pulled his car into the ditch. The car crossed the ditch and stopped on the west bank.

A car driven by Estelene M. Wilcox, 18, Cass City, struck a bridge abutment late Thursday afternoon on Deckerville Road at the Cass River. Miss Wilcox told sheriff's deputies that she put on her brakes when it appeared that a second car, coming from the other way, was not going to stop. Her car went into a skid and struck the abutment. Riding with her was Lynn Taylor, 17, Cass City.

BULEN TALKS CARS

CARS ARE MY LINE

You may have read of the drunkometer test they use in some cities for drivers suspected of having a few too many. The driver breathes into a balloon and the police test his breath for alcohol. A certain percentage of alcohol and . . . you've had it. And no chlorophyll gum can help you.

Most people know about a similar test you can try on a used car (not that our cars look drunk, mind you, but it's a similar idea). Almost everybody watches for smoke from the exhaust, but I find a lot of people really don't know what they're looking for, or why.

When you're browsing around a used car, race the engine a few times and watch the exhaust fumes for blue smoke. It's the blue you want to look for, not gray or black.

What does it all mean? The car that billows blue smoke is burning oil. Eventually, it will require a ring job, as all cars do sooner or later.

It's not a sign of anything fundamentally wrong (the driver in the breath test can be sobered up pretty quickly). If you like the car in other ways it will still be a good buy.

We didn't have any blue-smokers on the lot the last time I looked. When you're shopping around, though, I hope you'll ask to be shown everything you want to see, ask the things you want to know — poke around a little yourself to make sure.

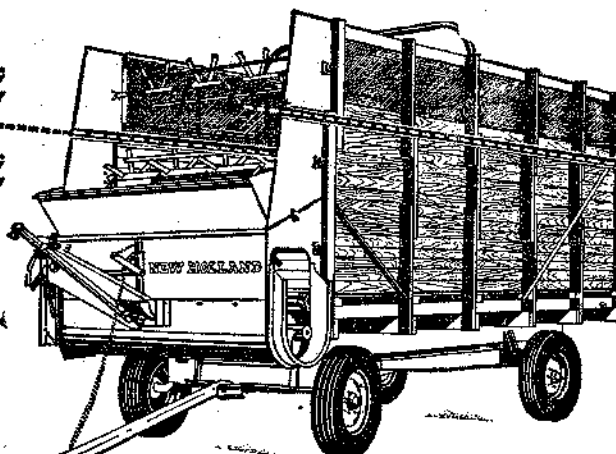

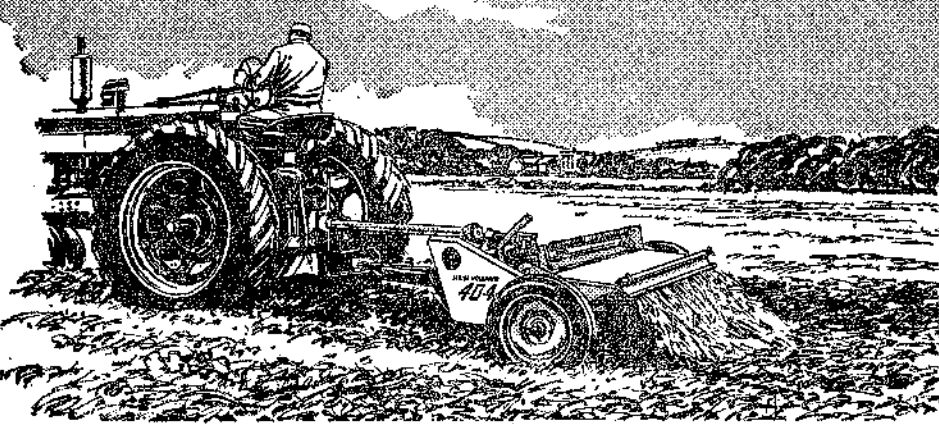

Award Schroeder 1st Walbro Grant

Agriculture Research Continues in Tuscola County

Perhaps no other basic contribution has meant so much to our farmers' success as agricultural research, remarks Don R. Kober, county extension agent in agriculture.

Tuscola county for many years has been cooperating with Michigan State University and private business on agricultural research. The County Cooperative Office has nearly 15 research plots again this year.

One of the oldest continuous types of research has been for the development of navy bean varieties. These variety plots have been kept for over 13 years.

This year bean research is being conducted on nine varieties at the Albert and Carl Vollmar farm. Liquid zinc carrier and fertilizer plots are being conducted on the Edward Ruppall farm co-operating also with the R and S liquid fertilizer company. Dry fertilizer and zinc plots will be on the Paul Donahue farm.

A new form of research is being tried to discover what cultural practices will reduce or eliminate root rot in beans. These plots are at the Morris and Lloyd Petripin farm.

Soybean interest has led to the establishment of a soybean plot for the second year now. This year six variety plots will be at the Erwin VanPatten farm.

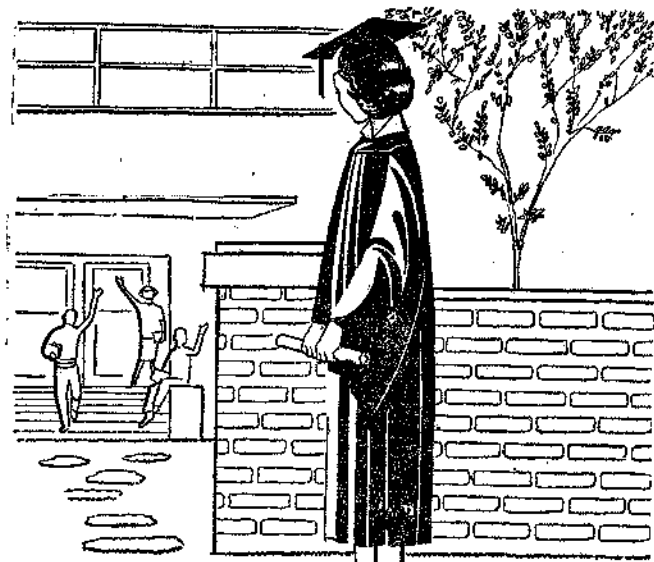
Small grains are not being overlooked either. Three malting barley varieties will be grown on

six different farms. Betzes and Proctor, two row varieties, are being grown on the Roy Hickey and Neil Prime farms. Larker, a six-row barley, is growing on the Foster Hickey, Arnold Krumnauer, Ray Laursen and Elwood Findlay farms.

Five oat varieties will be compared at the Grover Laurie farm. They are Cushmore, Au Sable,

Gary, Rodney and Clintland 63. The wheat variety plots are on the Harold Hickey farm.

This year the newest line of research is being initiated. This research is for pickle fertilization and variety comparison. These plots are at the Merle Roller farm and with the close cooperation of the H. J. Heinz Company.

Predict Death Toll Will Rise by A Third This Year

Death Prediction

Predictions of a full year's activity, whether it be park use, auto sales or employment rates, are usually made on a conservative basis.

The current prediction for Michigan in a vital area is startling at best, even if it is a conservative guess.

Secretary of State James M. Hare is predicting on the basis of the current high rates that about 2,500 persons will die on Michigan highways this year.

A toll this high would be about a one-third increase over the nearly 1,900 persons listed as traffic fatalities last year, which also was a boost from the previous year.

Many forces are still at work attempting to determine ways to cut down the mounting road death toll. Plans and campaigns to date have seemed to have little effect, unfortunately.

Safety belt sales, vehicle inspection, driver training, law enforcement, public education and research methods are all under study now by various groups.

It still appears that individual concern will provide the key for reducing the daily slaughter on Michigan's rural roads and rambling freeways.

Bigger-Better

Commendations go to thousands for the outstanding success of the May 17-23 Michigan Week.

In every facet of local and state activity, there could be seen official recognition of the annual observance.

Success was also noted on a large scale in bringing Michigan Week to the spotlight nationally through the special "Michigan Day" at the New York World's Fair.

Planned by a committee headed by restaurateur Win Shuler with assistance of Ralph Swan of Michigan's Economic Expansion Department, and Wes Baker, an S.S. Kresge executive, the Fair Day activities prompted many to note the wonders of Michigan.

The success of the 1964 Michigan Week is past and No. 12 is already in the works. One of the last chairman's newsletters to Michigan Week organizers called attention to the 1965 observance, May 16-22.

In the interim, statewide, regional and county chairmen will be named. By midfall work will be progressing in every area to make the 1965 event an even bigger one.

A new promotion of the state will be taking to the roads July 1.

A notable part of Michigan Week this year was the announcement by the State Historical Commission of the use of a new vehicle known as the "Historymobile."

In cooperation with 11 businesses and 14 museums throughout the state, the Commission will take the Historymobile first to the Detroit Freedom Festival.

The Historymobile will carry to all Michigan residents the story of our state, from prehistoric days, through the French and British eras, the beginnings of American rule, territorial days, migration activities, to achievement of statehood and development of Michigan into its present greatness.

Study Study Methods

The increasing size of Michigan's colleges and universities in the next five or ten years is of concern to parents, educators and lawmakers.

The increasing demand for a college education in the employment market poses a dilemma which has not yet been met. The degree is a requirement for many jobs, but the task of educating at the college level grows more difficult and costly each year.

Michigan State University officials have started the first of several likely studies to set a blueprint for guidance in meeting this dilemma.

Objective of this study is to permit MSU to educate an ever-growing number of increasingly able students with higher quality education at little or no increase in cost per student.

A new unit within the MSU president's office is working full-time on research and implementation of a University Educational Development Program.

A faculty committee which recommended the study stated its case this way: "We believe that it is the obligation of a state university to provide higher educational opportunities for every

I'll tell you how little heat it put out. You may not believe this, but those five wieners had to huddle together for warmth.

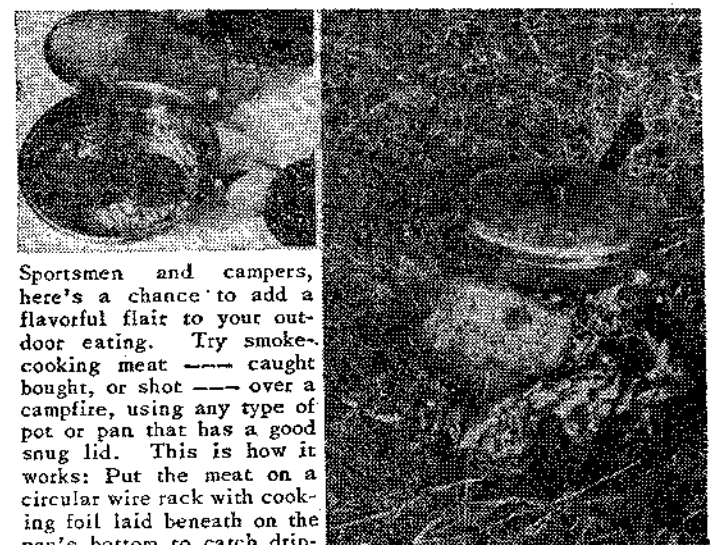
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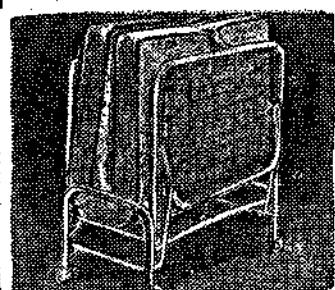
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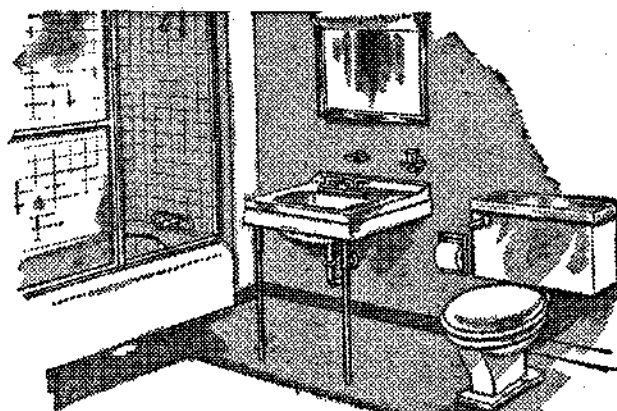
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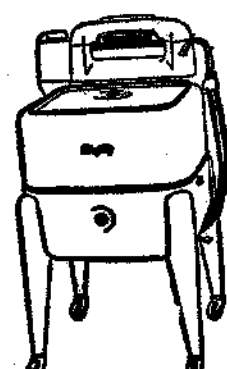
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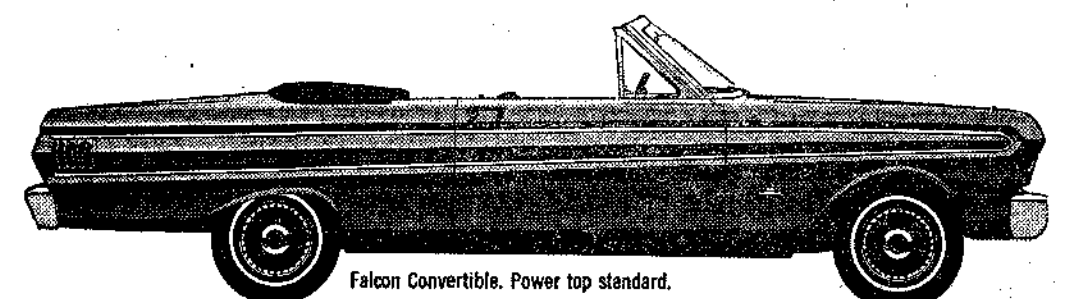


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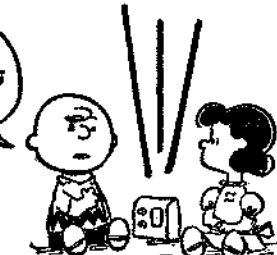
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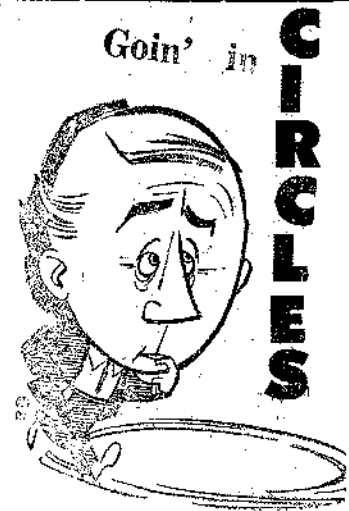

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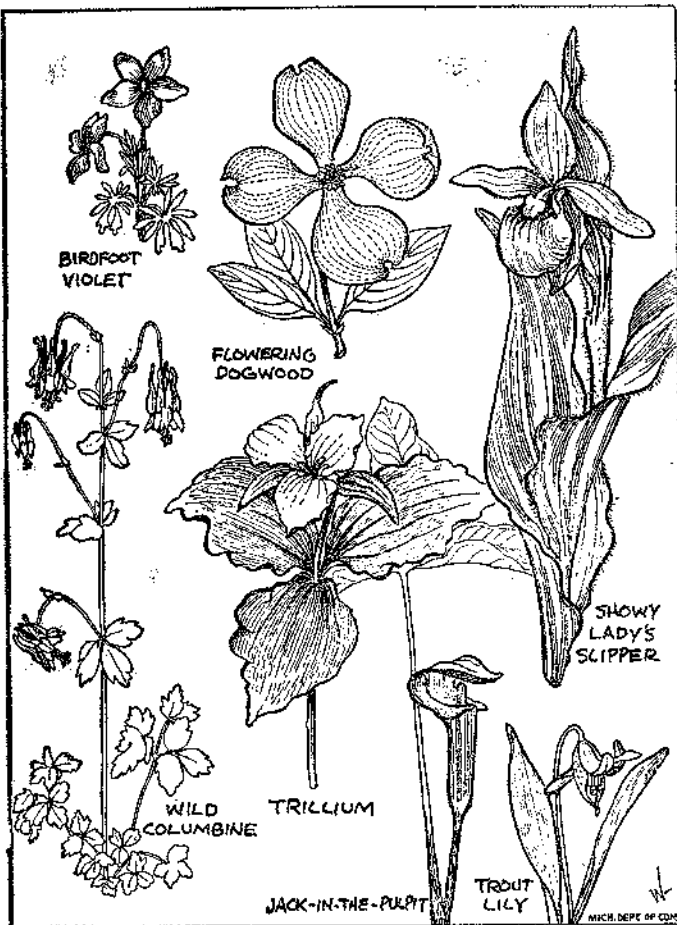
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To Enjoy But Not For Picking

Every spring and summer, one of nature's most spectacular acts is the unveiling of wildflowers in all their living beauty. Sadly, however, each year also sees some plants losing ground to the pressures of a sprawling population. Among these are the rare species shown here. Protected by law in an effort to keep them from fading completely out of the Michigan picture are the birdfoot violet, flowering dogwood, trillium, and showy lady's slipper. Although there is no regulation against it, the wild columbine, jack-in-the-pulpit, and trout lily should not be picked because of their scarcity in many parts of the state. There are many other wildflowers which are protected and/or in short supply. Strong public support is urged to preserve them and their shrinking habitat. To learn more about plants which need your help, write to the Conservation Department's Publications Room in Lansing for free copies of "Living Beauty." A color movie of the same title may be borrowed without charge from the Department's film loan service in Lansing.

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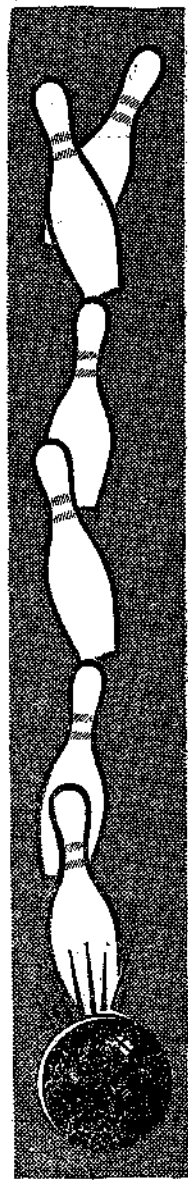

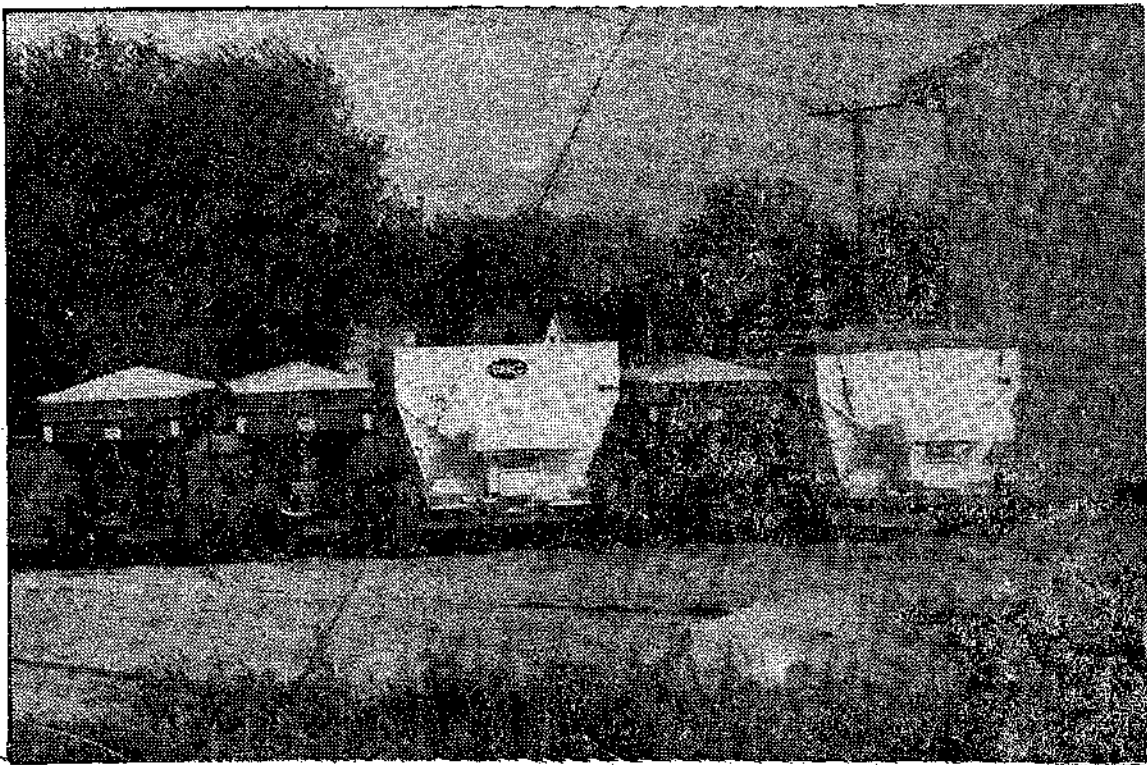

Dear Editors:

I would like to thank you for your coverage of school board meetings. I have always felt that the citizens and taxpayers I have represented have a right to know how I feel and vote on matters concerning our school problems. Because of your interest I have felt school news should be released to the Cass City Chronicle first.

In your Editor's Corner of the May 14 issue I believe you are critical of the school board because we adopted a regulation concerning the hiring of teaching personnel. You suggest this job be left to the Superintendent and the board use their time on major items such as a new school. In my issue of Michigan School-Laws it gives as one of the duties of school board members the hiring of teachers, after a recommendation of each teacher in writing from the Superintendent. We are concerned about our need for a new school, and individually and together we have talked to different architects. Some of us have visited classrooms now under construction. Recently board member Don Reid and I spent a day in Cleveland, Ohio, studying school room and athletic field lighting and school room heating. We have also talked to school board members from other areas comparing building problems and maintenance.

Before our last regular school board meeting I had compared our non-teaching personnel wages with our local factories and the Caro School. I found most of our Secretarial and Kitchen help to be equal or above these places. I also found our Custodian and Bus Driver pay a little low in comparison with the others. At a recent Parent Teacher meeting at the Cass City School, a panel of high school teachers told of their needs for more classroom aids. I hope soon these aids might be provided. Because of these facts I voted negatively on the motion to increase Secretarial and Kitchen help pay and affirmatively for a raise to Custodians and Bus Drivers. My decision was also prompted by seeing the probability of a red figure in our financial report at the end of the school year.

In answering Cafeteria Mana-

ger Mrs. Hutchinson's letter in the May 21 Chronicle, I would say I am sure the school board members have been aware of the sources of revenue for the school, also how it is spent. We are aware and sorry for the crowded condition and lack of equipment in the kitchen. We are also concerned with the elementary rooms and teachers carrying around 40 pupils each when they were designed for 30. Each of our High School and Junior High teachers is carrying a big load. Each time new, young, good teachers leave our system it disturbs us.
