

Area Schools Elect Trustees

Ruhl, Maharg Win School Board Seats

Area school district voters named school board members Monday in elections held in Cass City, Deford and Evergreen districts.

In Cass City, incumbent James Milligan lost by a 71-vote margin to Ken Maharg. Maharg polled 219 votes and Milligan received 148 votes.

Another incumbent, William Ruhl, polled 330 of the 352 votes cast in the race for the two four-year posts.

Hicks in Deford

Gerald Hicks was re-elected by acclamation to his second three-year term on the Deford district board. No other candidates were named. Hicks was treasurer during his first term.

Voters turned down a motion that the school become a registered school district. Hicks reported in an interview that the general consensus was that open meetings give voters an opportunity to express their opinions.

At a school board meeting following the election, the district voted to borrow \$7,000 against anticipated state aid to finish out the school year and to operate for the summer. The school will finish the year \$1,300 in the red.

Tuesday's Wind Damage Slight

Incumbents Burton Roth and Fred Cooley were re-elected to the Owen-Gage board with no opposition. Roth polled 339 votes and Cooley, 329 votes. A total 404 persons voted.

Discuss Available Sites for New High School Building

Cass City School Board members and spectators took a 20-minute break Monday night to look over one of three suggested sites for the proposed new Cass City High School.

Horace Bulen, board president, called the break to give the board an opportunity to look at a 18.2-acre plot of land just north of the Recreation Park softball diamond. The parcel of land is owned by Morton Orr.

Orr has set a price of \$1,500 per acre on the land which is some \$500 less per acre than was offered by Dr. H. T. Donahue on 20 acres closer and just to the north of the existing high school.

Also discussed as a possible site was property owned by Mrs. Avis Youngs to the east of the Recreation Park, which Mrs. Youngs has reported is "available."

Both the Orr and the Youngs sites were taken under consideration when some board members announced that a high school located away from the junior high and elementary school would be better for the younger students.

Drawbacks were found in both properties and Bulen named a seven member committee to study the three sites. Recommendations are to be given at the next board meeting. Members of the committee are: Willis Campbell, retiring superintendent; Donald Crouse, new superintendent; and Robert Stickle, Donald Reid, William Leverick, Horace Bulen and Mrs. Paul Murray, elementary principal.

Harvey Makes Candidacy Official

In an anticipated move, Congressman Jim Harvey today formally announced his candidacy for re-election to a third term from Michigan's Eighth Congressional District.

In Congress, Harvey holds the unusual distinction of serving on two major House Committees, Public Works and Banking and Currency.

On the Banking and Currency Committee, he has been selected to present the minority views on such key legislation as the Area Redevelopment Act, Water Pollution, the general Housing Act, which includes Urban Renewal and the International Development Association.

Mr. Harvey was born July 4, 1922, in Iron Mountain, Michigan. He has a law degree from the University of Michigan.

He first went to Saginaw in 1949 to commence the practice of private law. From 1949-53 he served as Assistant City Attorney, and in 1955 was elected to the Saginaw City Council. In 1957 he was chosen one of Saginaw's youngest Mayors at the age of 34. That same year, he was named one of Michigan's Five Outstanding Young Men through his work with the Saginaw Jaycees.

The Harveys have two children, Diane, 15, and Thomas, 11.

Village Okays New Curb Bid

Cass City saved money by taking new bids for curb and gutter and sidewalk on east Main street. Only one bid was received in an earlier letting and was not approved by the State Highway Department.

The bids were opened and the contract awarded Tuesday night by the village council.

The low bidder was Barthel Construction Co. of Northville. Their bid was \$3.15 a foot for curb and gutter; 50 cents a foot for sidewalk and \$1.50 a foot for sand. Previously the bid had been \$3.98 for curb and gutter and 44 cents a foot for sidewalk.

Total cost of the project has been estimated at \$15,501.25.

Approve \$13,000 Blacktop Job At School Site

Willis Campbell Elementary School's "muddy-when-it-rains" playground bit the dust Monday night as Board of Education members approved a close to \$13,000 blacktopping project for the elementary school.

The work will consist of blacktopping the road that runs east and west, north of the school and blacktopping of portions of the playground on the north, east and west sides of the school. A 10-foot wide sidewalk from the cement sidewalk to the playground was also approved.

The work on the road will be done by the same firm that will be blacktopping village streets this summer. Anticipated cost of the road job is between \$1,500 and \$2,000.

Kernit Hartwick, Cass City asphalt contractor, will do the rest of the work for an estimated \$9,111. Another \$1,500 will be spent for gravel and sand to level the playground.

Originally, the budget called for \$3,000 to be spent on the project. It was determined, after considerable discussion, that the budgeted figure would barely begin the project. Funds for the job are to come from the recently passed 1½ mill levy.

Tower Color to Remain Off-White

The storm about the color of the new water tower in Cass City proved to be a tempest in a teapot as only three persons attended the special session of the council Tuesday night to discuss the project.

The project and the reasons for selection of "off-white" as the color were explained and seemed to meet with the approval of the few persons interested enough to attend. No other color was suggested as adequate.

State Funds to Aid Marine Patrolling

Tuscola county marine law enforcement received a shot in the arm Monday when county supervisors approved a \$600 appropriation which will be matched two-to-one by the State.

The state matching funds will total \$1,200, bringing the total for the marine law enforcement to \$1,800. The money will be used to pay personnel and for expenses and equipment.

Supervisors are to meet Monday with architects for the proposed new Tuscola county jail to study preliminary plans and costs. Shuford Kirk, chairman of a special building committee, reported on progress being made on the project.

County Prosecutor James Epskamp was called before the board to offer advice on the setting of county millage and procedures for putting the issue on the ballot.

"Stinkhole"

A letter from Mrs. Alvin Claverly, Kingston, complaining about a "stinkhole" in a planned extension of the Adler Drain in Kingston was shunted aside when Chairman Quentin Howell, Reese, ruled that the board had no jurisdiction over the situa-

Cost to the village will be relatively little. The estimated cost of the curb and gutter is \$5,276.25 which will be paid by the State Highway Department.

The sidewalks will cost some \$10,000. All of the first five feet and half of the remainder of the cost will be paid by the affected property owners.

Next step in the procedure will be to hold a hearing. The work must be started no later than July 1 to qualify for this year's highway budget.

Besides the Barthel Construction Co. bid, three other bids were received. Tucker and Taylor, who was the only bidder when the project was let earlier in the year, was second with a bid that totaled \$15,922.50.

Hunt Construction Co. and Barnes Construction Co., both of Cass City, submitted bids at the request of the village to assure a competitive situation.

In other business regarding the streets, trustees voted to advertise for bids for curb and gutter work on Third street east of Seeger and on Ale, from Third to Garfield.

On Water Job

Whitfield Asks for Action

Albert Whitfield, clerk-of-the-works, for the water project in Cass City, reported Tuesday night to the village council that the contractor laying the pipe was not living up to his contract.

Speaking before a special session of the council Tuesday evening at the Municipal Building, Whitfield charged that the contractor was responsible for maintaining the roadway while construction is in progress.

All over town there are hills or holes where they have been working, he explained. They should keep these spots level until they are ready to return them to their original condition.

Whitfield, who has been in construction all of his life, said that he felt that the construction crew's efforts in maintaining the roadway were about as poor as he had seen.

Council's Job

Unfortunately, Whitfield said, I do not have the power to enforce the contract. The council, as the owner, must do this.

President Lee Rabideau and the council immediately said that they would begin action to see that Whitfield's recommendations are carried out.

The recommended procedure calls for someone to keep the roadway level and to work on bad spots in the area as they occur and to replace blacktop where needed with the proper base under it. Several spots will have to be dug up and the proper gravel base installed and compacted, Whitfield explained.

Wickware Voters Okay Annexation

Superintendent Willis Campbell and Horace Bulen, president, acting on behalf of the Cass City Board of Education, accepted the keys to the Wickware School Tuesday, following an annexation motion 22-4 in balloting which ended Monday night. The district has been transporting its students to Cass City on a tuition basis for the past two years.

The one-room, brick school building located across from the Wickware store, will probably be sold.

Damage Slight In Grass Fire

Cass City firemen extinguished a hard-to-reach grass fire Saturday night on the Grand Trunk railroad tracks near the village sewage disposal plant.

Firemen were unable to drive their trucks into the fire area and water had to be carried to the fire. Damage was confined to the immediate area.

Cause of the fire was undetermined.

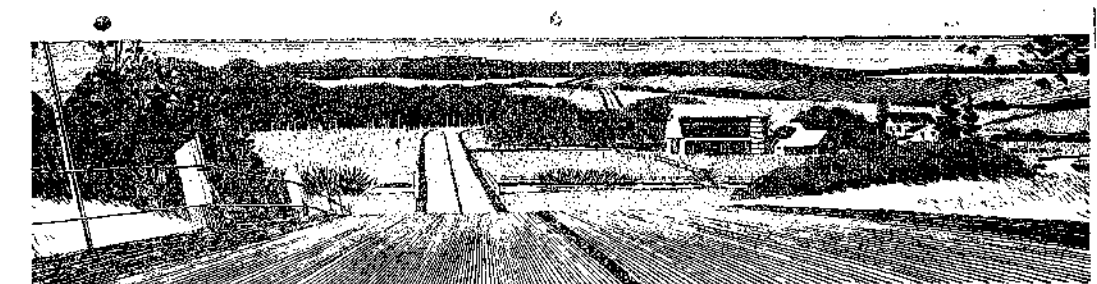

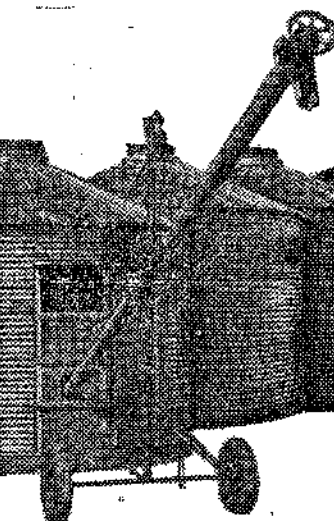

Political Battle Lines Set In Final Days of Legislature

Fall campaign issues were clearly set in the final days of the 1964 Legislature.

The Massachusetts ballot, new Congressional districts and the legislative reapportionment plan approved by the State Supreme Court will provide the highlights

for the biennial GOP-Democratic struggle for public offices.

Republicans, led by Gov. Romney, saw the Massachusetts ballot as a means to, as Romney put it, "whittle away at excessive partisanship."

Democrats, on the other hand, viewed the new voting method an unfair and unnecessary removal of one choice in the balloting process. The new ballot eliminates the straight-ticket lever on voting machines and box on the paper tally.

field for game this fall by virtue of legislative approval of conservation experts' advice.

Approval of a special limited elk hunting season for the state will be implemented by a select number of licenses issued by the Conservation Department.

Michigan's elk herd is largely concentrated in the Pigeon River game area. Preservation of the herd has been a serious effort for years.

Population of the herd has been increasing at a faster rate than biologists anticipated, providing an excess of elk over the number desired to maintain a supply of the animals in the state.

Thus, Conservation Department biologists suggested Michigan hunters be allowed to take a small percentage of the herd. The hunting number will probably be held down to the very serious by the \$25 license fee imposed by law and the powers of limitation given the Department over license issue numbers.

Vacation Dangers

Hazards of summer activities loom large as Michigan residents start vacation time, the season for long-distance traveling, water recreation and camping trips.

Motorists have become a hazard the year-round, and water accidents are common on ice as well as sun-sparkling lakes, but one of the dangers of camping often goes unheeded until it is too late. This is primarily a summer problem.

Often a dry season, summer brings a marked increase in the number of fires both at home and outdoors.

State Police records show fires hit an all-time high in Michigan last year, claiming 273 lives and causing an estimated \$59 million in property damage.

A total of 86,845 fires of all types caused the highest damage figure in 10 years, said State Police Commissioner Joseph A. Childs.

Teaching caution with fire is fundamental where children are concerned but all too often it is adults who are careless. The deaths from fire last year included 188 adults and 85 minor children.

Careless smoking and accidents where clothing caught fire were primary among the 86,845 blazes recorded in 1963. Many of these were at home barbecues and camp sites, cases where the fun of family activity led to carelessness.

Michigan ranks fourth in the production of onions, a vegetable which ranks fifth in popularity in the nation, according to Michigan State University agricultural economists.

The second one referred to so and so "and his sin-in-law."

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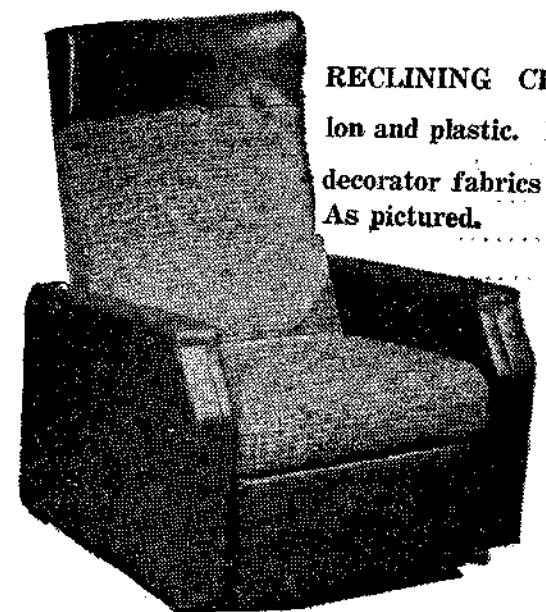
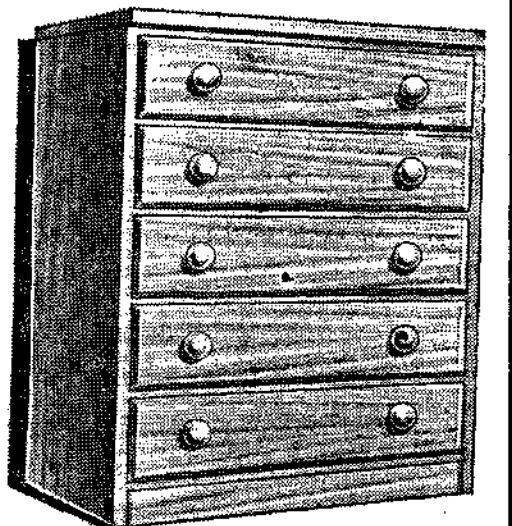
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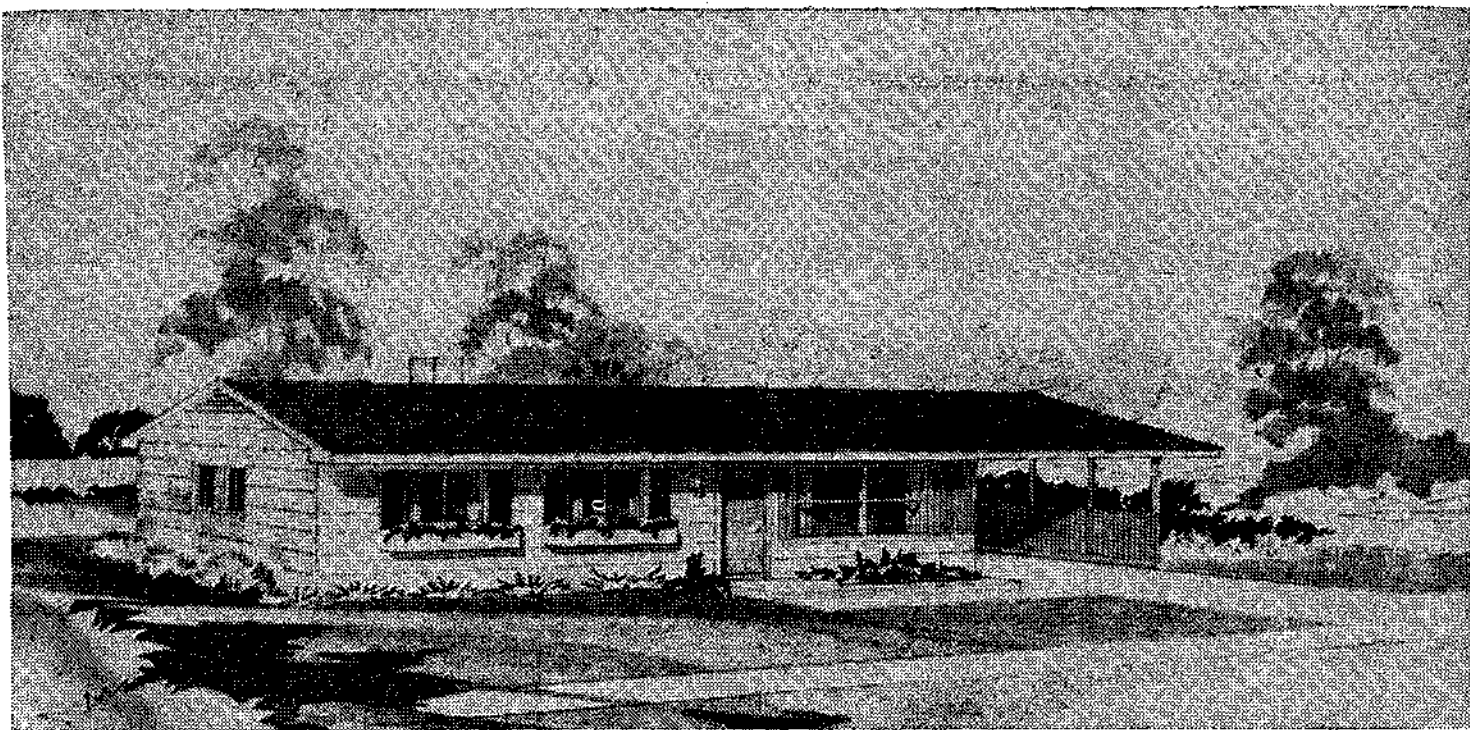

BOOK REVIEW
It's A Good Story
For Summer Reading

If you are looking for a book to read in the heat of the summer, try *THERE MAY BE A HEAVEN* by Elisabeth Ogilvie. This is the kind of book that you can lay down while you rescue Junior from the lake, and pick it up again without losing the trend of the tale. We are told on the jacket of the book that Miss Ogilvie has written a number of books, all but one of which are novels; she has written widely for magazines and has written numerous books for young readers.

The one fault of the book ought to be laid right at the door of the publisher for I found numerous errors in spelling and minor mistakes in grammar, besides one paragraph completely misplaced (I hope!).

The persons in this novel are either commercial fishermen or related to them. The setting is in Maine and an offshore island that is owned primarily by the Judsons - mother and sons. To recover from the death of her husband, Claire Carradine has come to stay for a time with Mag, who is frank and down to earth. She is the 'earthy' sort, and can and does help Claire sort out her confused mind.

In due time Claire meets Finn Judson who is the youngest of the four Judson brothers. He is a likeable, carefree young man with whom she spends increasing periods of her time. During these times spent together, Claire helps Finn in sorting out his hopes and ambitions. This leads to the time when one of his (jealous) brothers deliberately runs into his moored ship, just when he has a contract to sell his fish to advantage. As he attempts to borrow no-longer-used boats from his brothers, he has to face the fact that only one of his brothers really cares about him.

As the summer rolls on, Finn and Claire, unwillingly at first, fall in love. Claire at first feels guilty at falling in love so soon after her husband's death - aided by the excessive grief of her mother-in-law. A brother-in-law, it turns out, has also fallen in love with Claire!

Finn also has to evaluate his ties to his brothers, their families and his mother. In short this began the process of Finn's maturity. His brothers have dreams of forsaking the fishing industry to make the island into a resort area, which dreams are blocked, for a time at least, by Finn and his mother. As the novel ends, the principals in the novel experience a tornado which destroyed one of the fine new ships owned by one of the older brothers; seeming, to me, to say that once more the hero emerges triumphant and the bad guys get what's coming to them!

I enjoyed this novel; possibly my enjoyment was enhanced by the conversations that Claire and Finn have on their walks together. At any rate, if you are looking for summer reading that is pleasant, your search is over.

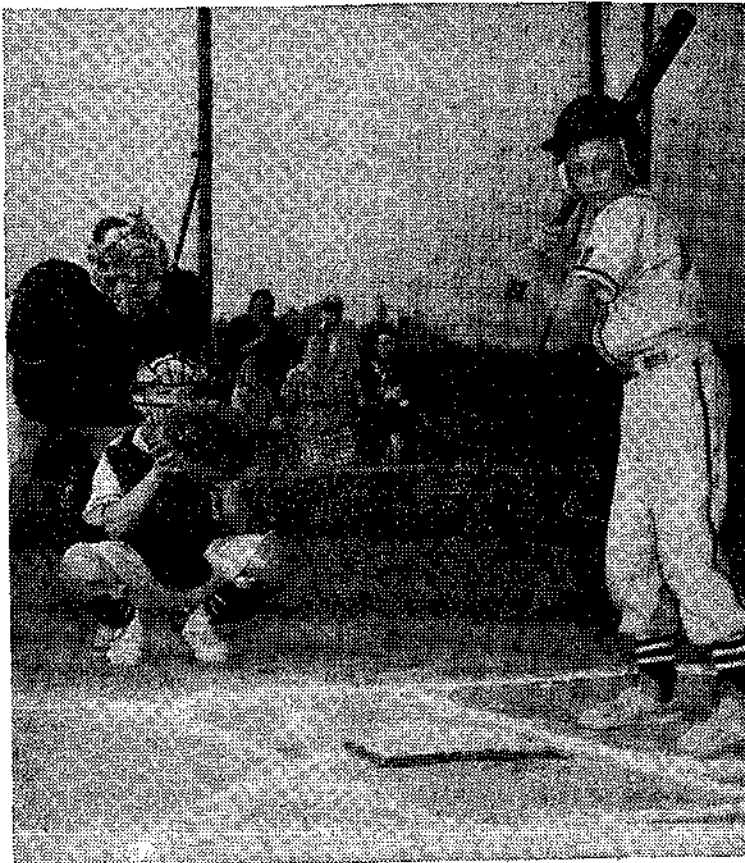
