

## Plan Cultural Center Here

Turning an eyesore into an eyesight is the ambitious program that has been scheduled by a special group interested in creating a cultural and recreational center in Cass City.

The group, spearheaded by Jim Ware and Mrs. Lucile Bauer, has ambitious plans for turning the Elkland Town Hall into a much used, presentable building. Already secured has been the okay by the Elkland town board for a major renovation of the

building, not at the township's expense.

**Form Corporation**  
Plans call for a formation of a nonprofit corporation to handle the work.

The building will be painted and shutters will be added to the windows. The interior will be wired, painted and a new heating system installed. The roof will be supported and a false ceiling erected in the building.

The first use for the new building will probably be as a display center for items connected with Cass City's Centennial. All historic items connected with the village's history are expected to be placed here.

Although the first use may be by the centennial committee, lasting benefits are expected.

The building is planned as an art center and a place for the use of 4-H, Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and similar organizations are expected to be able to use the building.

Supervisor Ed Golding said that, if the plans are completed, it will be a definite advantage to the township and the village.

## Workers Clearing Rubble After Disastrous Barn Fire

Workmen began spreading out still smoldering hay Wednesday as they prepared to start cleaning up the debris from the \$100,000 fire that wiped out Dr. H. T. Donahue's dairy farm at the northern outskirts of Cass City early Monday morning.

After the hay has burned down, all the ashes remaining will be buried to cut down odors and health risks.

Cause of the fire which destroyed 60 head of prime Holstein cattle has been attributed to faulty electrical equipment by Donahue while Cass City firemen speculated that it was spontaneous combustion.

Destroyed in the inferno, which began at about 2:00 a.m., were 49 registered Holstein cows, eleven calves, 300 tons of hay, some corn and other feeds and equipment.

First estimates set the loss of the cattle alone at \$25,000. Donahue reported to the Chronicle.

Bob Speirs received emergency treatment in Caro, after he was unable to locate a local doctor, for lacerated index and thumb. He told the Chronicle that he was cutting screening slats and was not sure what caused the accident.

Speirs is employed at General Cable.

A 41-year-old Cass City man is recovering at home from injuries suffered early Sunday afternoon when he caught his hand in a table saw.

Neighbors told that the fire started with a loud roar. Mrs. Frank McComb reported, "I woke up with a sore throat, smelling smoke. I looked outside and couldn't see anything. About 10 minutes later, I heard a loud roar, just like a storm was coming and then everything was red."

Mrs. Harold Craig, another neighbor, recalls hearing a blower in the hay mow going off at about 1:00 a.m.

Sparks from the blaze showered neighboring homes and residents were kept busy sweeping them off or standing by with hoses.

The glow from the fire at the highly mechanized and modern farm were reportedly seen as far away as Sebawaing and despite the hour, many spectators were attracted to the scene.

In other fire news, firemen responded to a garage fire call from the Harold Francis residence, six miles south of Cass City, Tuesday morning, but were called back before they were halfway there because the fire had been brought under control.

The fire whistle also disrupted village serenity later in the day by blowing several times because of an electrical malfunction.

A Gagetown man was injured early Monday morning when he lost control of his car on M-188, a mile east of Akron, and it slammed into a stump.

Alejandro Lopez, 22, Gagetown, was seriously injured in the crash which took place at 3:30 a.m. He was taken to Caro Hospital for treatment.

A truck driven by Alex Bulatam, 53, Caseville, damaged two parked cars when he turned too short at Evans Products, Gagetown, Thursday morning, June 18.

The two cars were owned by Stanley Hutchinson, Clifford, and Roy Karg, Unionville. Bulatam was driving an Evans Products truck.

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## One Man, One Vote Splits Tuscola County

Tuscola county became a county divided, at least politically, with the State Supreme Court decision Monday for the "Austin-Kleiner" redistricting plan.

The Democratic sponsored plan, which provides for "one man, one vote," chopped off a large portion of the northwest section of the county in the State

House of Representatives district while joining the rest of the county with a portion of Huron and all of Lapeer county.

The Senate District 28 includes St. Clair, Sanilac, Huron, all but a portion of Tuscola and small portions of Bay and Saginaw counties.

Acceptance of the plan will pit

incumbents against incumbents in both the house and senate.

House District 78, the new designation for the Huron, Lapeer and Tuscola district, will be the battleground for Rep. Allison Green of Kingston, Rep. Edmund Good of Gagetown and Rep. Roy Spencer of Lapeer. All three are Republicans.

At least one candidate, Orville Hubbard of Kingston, has found the repeated change too frustrating and after circulating two petitions has withdrawn from the race.

The new House district includes, in Tuscola county, the following townships: Almer, Columbia, Dayton, Elkland, Ellington, Elmwood, Fremont, Kingston, Koyton, Millington, Novesta, Watertown and Wells.

Akron, Wisner, Gilford, Fairgrove, Indianfields, Denmark, Juniata, Tuscola, Vassar and Arbel township will be part of House District 84.

The new Senate District will put Sen. Arthur Dehmel, Unionville, against Sen. Frank Beadle, St. Clair. Both men are Republicans.

Three townships will go into the huge Senate District 35 which includes the main portions of Saginaw, Bay, Midland, Gladwin, Arenac, Ogemaw, Iosco, Oscoda and Alcona counties. The townships are Arbel, Tuscola and Denmark.

## Oh Hum-School Presents Budget

What it costs to run Cass City Public Schools is apparently of little interest to school district voters as only one person attended the annual budget hearing Monday night in the High School auditorium.

School Board members ended the hearing 15 minutes after it began by approving a \$473,161 budget for 1964-65, some \$6,872 more than this year's actual expenditures of \$466,289.

Expenditures, according to the budget, are expected to be about \$1,200 over anticipated receipts of \$472,028. The school finished the year about \$2,200 in the red.

State and primary aid is expected to be up \$5,000, primarily because of the annexation of

Wickware School to the Cass City district. However, tuition will drop almost \$900 because the eight Wickware students were being transported to Cass City.

Maintenance took a nose dive from \$38,128 to \$18,000. The \$20,000 drop was caused because the system had to put in a new boiler last year and repair the school roof.

Capital outlay is expected to go to \$9,500 from \$3,500 primarily because of work being done on the Willis Campbell elementary school ground.

Before adjourning, the board set the annual meeting for Monday, July 6, at 7:30 p.m. with the regular board meeting to follow.

## Gagetown Water Supply Inadequate

A special hearing Monday will kick-off a drive in Gagetown for a new estimated \$40,000 water system in the village, President William Downing announced this week.

At the meeting representatives from the village's consulting engineers will explain the proposed project.

The system must be improved, Downing explained, if reasonable fire insurance rates are to be maintained.

Downing explained that the village is still waiting to find out whether the present well serving the community is adequate.

If it is, a 100,000-gallon storage tank is planned.

The village also needs new water mains to replace the approximately 11 blocks of wooden mains now serving the community.

To secure the money, the village would like to raise the water rates and issue new general obligation bonds to finance the project.

Details of this plan will be explained at the public hearing at the public school building at 8 p.m.

In raising money for utilities, villages have the option of issuing two types of bonds. General obligation bonds require a vote of the taxpayers. Authorities can issue revenue bonds without a vote.

Gagetown plans general obligation bonds because they always carry a lower interest rate. General obligation, as the name implies, pledges the full tax resources of the village behind the bonds, while revenue bonds pledge only certain revenues for repayment.

**No Help**  
Village authorities said that they had tried to get an accelerated public works loan to pay half of the cost, but were informed that the appropriation under the act has been depleted.

The entire program will be paid by village taxpayers, if they approve the program as outlined by the engineers.

Miss Dian Cardew said that the first of the many special events has been scheduled for Friday when the annual "on-wheels" parade will be staged.

In other announcements concerning the park, authorities said that the price they previously announced for the swimming pool of 25c for adults was in error. The cost is 15c, the same as it was last year.

Swim lessons will start Tuesday, June 30.

## Hunters Host Visitors from Land of Aborigines and 'Roos

Aborigines, kangaroos and boomerangs ... that's Australia. At least that's what the average American thinks Australia is when he thinks about Australia ... which isn't too often.

Pickpockets, race problems and nice people ... that's America. At least that's the America two visitors from the land "down under" will remember when they think about the United States.

After spending several days traveling across the United States by bus, during which time Eric R. Watson of Adelaide, South Australia, had his pocket picked, he and his wife, Gladys, are full of impressions about America and its people.

The Watsons spent a week in Cass City visiting the R. M. Hunters. Mrs. Watson and Hunter are cousins who met for the first time in their lives when the Watsons arrived in the village Friday, June 12.

Their Cass City visit is one leg of a nine-week jaunt through the United States on their way to Europe where they will spend another 26 days touring the Continent.

The couple left Adelaide March 8 by steamer at the start of what Watson estimates will be a 40,000-mile trip costing in the neighborhood of \$5,600.

**Bad Weather**  
About two-thirds of the way

across the Pacific on their way to our West Coast, their ship encountered "one week of very bad weather" because of the Alaskan earthquake. A daily map Watson kept of the crossing shows a sharp jog as the vessel changed course to fight high winds and water.

A retired insurance agency manager for all of South Australia, Watson is a lawn bowling enthusiast and his affiliations with an international lawn bowling organization stood him and his wife in good stead when they finally reached the West Coast.

**"Wonderful Tour"**  
As they traveled down the coast, lawn bowling friends the couple had hosted at meets in South Australia helped them with accommodations.

"Helped? No, they didn't just help ... they overwhelmingly took us into their homes," Watson asserted.

"The whole trip has been a wonderful tour. We've thoroughly enjoyed it. The people here have been outstandingly kind and helpful. We've had dozens of experiences with all kinds of persons."

**Pickpocket**  
One experience might have changed his mind, but evidently it hasn't. Just as he and his wife were getting on their bus in St. Louis, Mo., a pickpocket snatched

Watson's wallet, or what he thought was his wallet.

"You see, we wear our wallets backwards to what you people do," he explained. Consequently, when an attendant told him that the authorities had caught a "chap" who had just taken his wallet, Watson checked his wallet pocket and found everything intact.

He dismissed the attendant and it wasn't until the bus had left that he found that his address book, listing friends and relatives in America and Europe, had been stolen.

Americans aren't a new experience to the Watsons. During the war, he and his wife and two children entertained servicemen stationed in the country.

**Accents**  
Watson is an exact replica of a movie English businessman who reminds you of someone you've seen before. He and his wife both talk with the typical Australian accent which sounds much like something one would hear from an old-school New Englander.

Flower becomes "flars" and rock is "rook", but primarily there are no linguistic differences.

# Hunters Host Australians

Aborigine population. The Aborigine has, like the American Indian, been pushed onto the reservation or "preserve" and the current 100,000 Aborigines left are being educated and assimilated into the white Australian community.

"We've no race problem at all," contends Mrs. Watson. "But we're aware of your social problem and we're amazed."

"What do you Americans read of Australia in the newspapers? Virtually nothing," charged Watson. "Our newspapers are full of American news about your race troubles."

**Living Standard**

A comparison of Australian and American living standards was listed from a brochure given him at the start of his trip by the travel agency.

Seventy per cent of the Australians own or are buying their own homes. There is a car for every four persons and one person in five has a telephone. One person in six has a television set. The average take home pay is

24 pounds or about \$60 American. Although \$60 doesn't sound like much, Watson explains that living expenses are less. A \$2,800 car here would cost \$2,300 there, for example.

Adelaide, with a population of 600,000 persons, sets on the edge of Encounter Bay, just off St. Vincent's Gulf at the southern end of South Australia. South Australia is a member of the Australian Federation and is similar in land area to, say, Texas.

**Familiar Industry**

Adelaide, with a mild climate, is surrounded with wheat and fruit growing land. Most notable of its industries is a General Motors automobile plant.

Its national symbol, the kangaroo, grows in nearly every section, except the deserts.

Rabbits, once a national pest that threatened to overrun the country, are now scarce. Man, in attempt to outguess nature, introduced the rabbits to the country and they bred faster than they could be harvested.

In an effort to stop the scourge, a blood disease, carried by mos-

quitoes, was introduced and man has again succeeded in fouling up the balance of nature to the point where the rabbit is almost extinct.

With its reversed seasons, the Watsons left Australia in summer, will tour during the summer and will return home in summer. They left Cass City Friday, June 19, for the East Coast where they will visit Washington, D. C., New York and, of course the World's Fair.

Next stop is their 26-day Cooks' Tour of Europe and then, on October 6, they leave for home out of South Hampton, England, aboard the Himalaya.

Mrs. Harold Kilbourn and two children furnished several numbers in song and on the piano, and Mrs. Knoblet conducted a short memorial for those who died during the year.





BOOK REVIEW

Both Creditable And Captivating

This week we are reviewing "Love, Let Me Not Hunger" by Paul Gallico.

This is both a book showing insight into the lives of a large group of people who are connected to life in a circus, and a novel dealing with a romantic theme.

The basic story is that of a small but good traveling circus, one of many touring England and the Continent, which finds that the 'telly' is cutting permanent inroads into attendance at circus performances.

Horribly, the 'big top' of this little circus is struck by lightning and burned to the ground in a violent storm one night, soon after they find the initial Spanish crowds receptive to the Circus.

Marvel immediately departs for England to make settlement with his insurance companies easier, and quicker, to enable him to start afresh and to pay off his workers.

Before leaving Spain, Marvel leaves a few of the circus performers to care for the remaining animals; the other players are paid off and drift off to hook-up with other carnivals and circuses, only to appear when the circus is sold.

If one were forced to choose a main character in this plot, it would have to be Rose. Picked up from the streets by Jackdaw Williams she keeps house for him, leaving him only when he leaves Spain. She makes her way back to the circus and to Toby with whom she has fallen hope-

lessly in love. While he could never be chosen for the principal character of this novel, the most appealing is Mr. Albert. Wearing part of a tuxedo, he becomes the main animal keeper as his extra job. Unfortunately, this pleasant little man and Janos (a midget whose act had been that of making performing dogs act) give up their own freedom in order to get feed for the remaining animals, and Janos dies.

The final one left behind to care for the animals is Toby, who was part of a family act. He grows up in the period covered by the book, and falls in love with Rose. I have neglected to include the sole elephant who tears loose from her stake in a scene of terror.

All in all the story is an unusual one and effectively told. This is the twenty-sixth novel that Paul Gallico has written! If he writes all of his stories as if he knew the plot and characters intimately, as he did in this one, we can understand his success in this field.



I was a little disappointed.







## Village of Gagetown

# PUBLIC HEARING

The village of Gagetown will hold a public hearing Monday night at 8 p.m. in the public school building for the purpose of explaining the urgent need for raising the rates for municipal water. The Village Council paradoxically hopes to save the citizens money by this action because the Michigan Inspection Bureau has notified the village that, unless certain costly water system improvements are made, the people in Gagetown will be faced with a fire insurance rate increase. The Michigan Inspection Bureau maintains that the present fire-fighting capacity of the water system is sufficiently questionable to necessitate the rate increase to cover the additional hazard which will persist if no water system improvements are made. Mr. William Downing, mayor of Gagetown, has requested Mr. Frank DeDecker of their consulting engineering firm of Spaulding, DeDecker and Associates of Birmingham, to attend the public hearing and review the proposed improvements and necessary rate increase to effectuate such improvements.

The Village Council is hopeful that a good representative number of the citizens will be on hand to learn of the progress being made to alleviate the present problem.

**Screening Pupils Major Task In State's Scholarship Plan**

Screening an estimated 20,000 to 25,000 applicants for Michigan's first state-supported scholarship program poses a big job for one of the smallest government agencies.

The Michigan Higher Education Assistance Authority distributed about 300 scholarships under a private funds-guarantee program in slightly over two years.

Now plans call for the Authority to award 1,000 college aids by fall. A total of \$500,000 was appropriated for the scholarships by the Legislature.

Applicants will first be narrowed down to about 7,500 through consideration of the various available intelligence tests. Then, partly on a statewide basis and partially on the basis of legislative districts, the financial need of individual students will be considered.

Scholarships are expected to average around \$500, said Superintendent of Public Instruction Lynn M. Bartlett, who serves as chairman of the Authority. The maximum allowance in the 1964 legislative act is \$800 per student per year.

Students who finally receive the scholarships will have their choice of many institutions. All accredited colleges and universities in Michigan, 47 in all including private institutions and some community colleges, are eligible for use of the scholarships.

Major advantage of the program is provided to students who select any of the 23 accredited private institutions. The scholarships are renewable throughout four years of college, contingent on the display of satisfactory performance and continued financial need.

**Salaries Up**

Michigan's governor will be among the highest paid chief executives in 1965, and state lawmakers will hold a similar place in rank among their counterparts.

Only New York, California, New Jersey and Pennsylvania pay their governors more than the \$30,000 Michigan's governor will receive next year. The new rate is a \$2,500 boost over the current salary.

Legislators gave themselves a bigger hike: with a 43 per cent raise in salary and 100 per cent increase in expense allowances. The new rates will be \$10,000 salary and \$2,500 expenses per legislator.

Many of the current Legislature members will not take advantage of the new rates, however. The 1965 session is expected to include more new faces than have been seen in many years past.

**New Faces in '65**

Redistricting and the new Constitution played major roles in the prospect of high change in the Legislature for 1965.

Several members have announced plans to retire rather than face another incumbent in a merged district. Others were eliminated from eligibility by the Constitutional provision prohibiting individuals on other public

payrolls, such as city officers and employees, from running.

Still others have been lured into contests in new Congressional districts, and a few will seek election to the State Court of Appeals, a new creation in the judicial branch section of the 1964 Constitution.

**Help For Study**

Initiative toward self-improvement in job knowledge and skills has been lauded in private industry for a good number of years.

In the past three years, Michigan government has also recognized this initiative in its employees by paying part of the costs of continued education.

For the coming year, the State Civil Service Commission set aside \$12,000 as incentive for further study by employees in job-related fields.

State employees who take college credits related to their work are partially compensated for satisfactory completion of approved courses.

Employee enrollments have increased in each of the three previous years, said State Personnel Director Franklin K. DeWald. There also has been an accompanying hike in the number of approved courses taken.

In the past year nearly 350 state employees took almost 500 courses approved by the commission. The state paid about \$9,000 in partial tuition reimbursements, DeWald said.

During the 1964-65 school year, the personnel director estimates an increase of 25 to 50 employees will be involved in the program. Of course, a major incentive in addition to the partial reimbursement is the prospect of promotions and increased salaries resulting from the added knowledge in the individual's field of work.




