## Green Alters Political Aims

Allison Green of Kingston announced Wednesday that he will be a candidate for lieutenant governor on the Republican ticket at the GOP convention in Detroit Sept. 19.

Green is completing his seventh term in the House. He has served as floor leader for eight years and speaker for two years.

In a prepared statement, Green said: "I believe that a Romney-Green ticket can win in November and carry at least one house, despite the vicious gerrymandering in reapportioning the state."

Another Republican seeking to become lieutenant governor is William G. Milliken, state senator from the 27th district.

The delegates will select the man to run and will probably adhere to the wishes of Gov. George Romney in the selection of his running mate.

## Plymouth Firm Low Bidder on Street Work

A Plymouth construction company was the low bidder Monday on an estimated 5,000 lineal feet of curb and gutter work to be done on two Cass City streets. The bids were opened at a special meeting at the Municipal Building.

Low bidder was Michigan Curb and Construction Company with a bid of \$1.86 per lineal foot or approximately \$9,250 for the whole project.

Village Clerk H. L. Bridges pointed out that similar work last year on Garfield Street cost \$1.89 per lineal foot. Cost to residents will be \$1.75 per lineal foot for curb and gutter that abuts their property.

High bidder was LaLonde Construction of Caro with a bid of \$3.25. Other bidders were: Tucker and Taylor of Clawson, \$2.25 per lineal foot; A. J. Remus of Bay City, \$2.10 per lineal foot and Barthel Construction Company of Northville, \$1.99 per lineal foot. Barthel is currently doing the sidewalk construction in the village.

The two streets involved are Third Street, from Seeger to Woodland and Ale from Garfield to Third.

The village has been doing preliminary work on the project and work ordinarily done at the beginning of such projects will be finished by the time the Plymouth company starts, according to Bridges.

## Spencer Makes Representative Candidacy Official

State Rep. Roy Spencer of Attica (Lapeer County) announced his candidacy this week for the new 78th District. The 78th includes all of Lapeer County, about half of Tuscola County and about a fourth of Huron.

The 44-year-old poultry farmer has served four years as Representative from Lapeer county. Spencer is generally classified among the Republican moderates in Lansing, and as a Romney supporter.

He was one of the leaders in the unsuccessful fight for the Romney tax reform program last year.

Spencer is on two important committees—apportionment, and

rules and resolutions. He is chairman of two sub-committees.

The bulk of Spencer's work has been in the fields of tax reform and school aid. He was co-author of the school aid bills of both the last session and the present session. Each increased school aid by \$10 per student and gave a bigger share to outstate districts.

He also secured a ruling from the State Tax Commission which set personal property exemptions on state equalized value rather than on cash value. In effect, this doubled the exemption for farmers and for businesses.

## County to Vote On Jail Millage

Tuscola county supervisors added one more ballot to an already long list awaiting county voters at the September 1 primary election when they decided Monday to put the issue of millage for the proposed new county jail before the voters.

The ballot will ask for one and a quarter mills for 1964 and 1965 or approximately \$175,000 for each year. Total cost of the project is estimated at about \$450,000. Coupled with \$130,000 in a special building fund, the millage will provide a total of \$480,000 for the project.

The next board meeting will be August 10.

## In Cass City Talk

Congressman James Harvey of Saginaw lashed out at the recent Supreme Court decision that calls for one man, one vote Tuesday, saying that the Court had exceeded its authority as granted in the Constitution.

Speaking Tuesday noon, before the Cass City Rotary at the hotel, the GOP candidate for U.S. Representative in the new Eighth District said that the people had voted to accept a new apportionment in Michigan and Colorado. The court is taking the power of the people into its own hands when it nullifies this action.

"In effect this nullifies our constitution," he explained. "You can probably advance a good argument for one man, one vote, but not for nullifying the vote of the people," he said.

Because of his stand on reapportionment, Harvey has submitted a motion in the House to amend the constitution to allow one house to be decided by both population and land area, if it is voted by the people.

Harvey was introduced by State Senator Arthur Dehmel.

Harvey also announced that he will be in Cass City from 1:30 to 2:30 p.m. Friday, July 17, as part of a tour with his mobile office in the Eighth district. Persons with questions or requests are invited to meet with him on one of the stops on the tour, Harvey concluded.

## "K-12" Bill

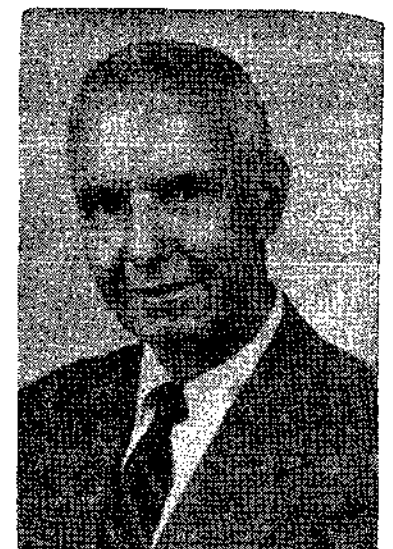
Superintendent Donald Crouse announced that a major portion of Monday's meeting will be spent going over the so-called "K-12" bill which deals with the reorganization of school districts.

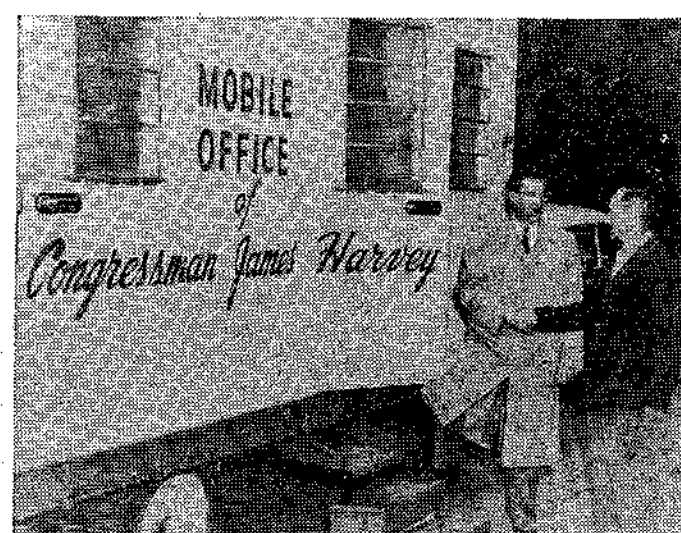

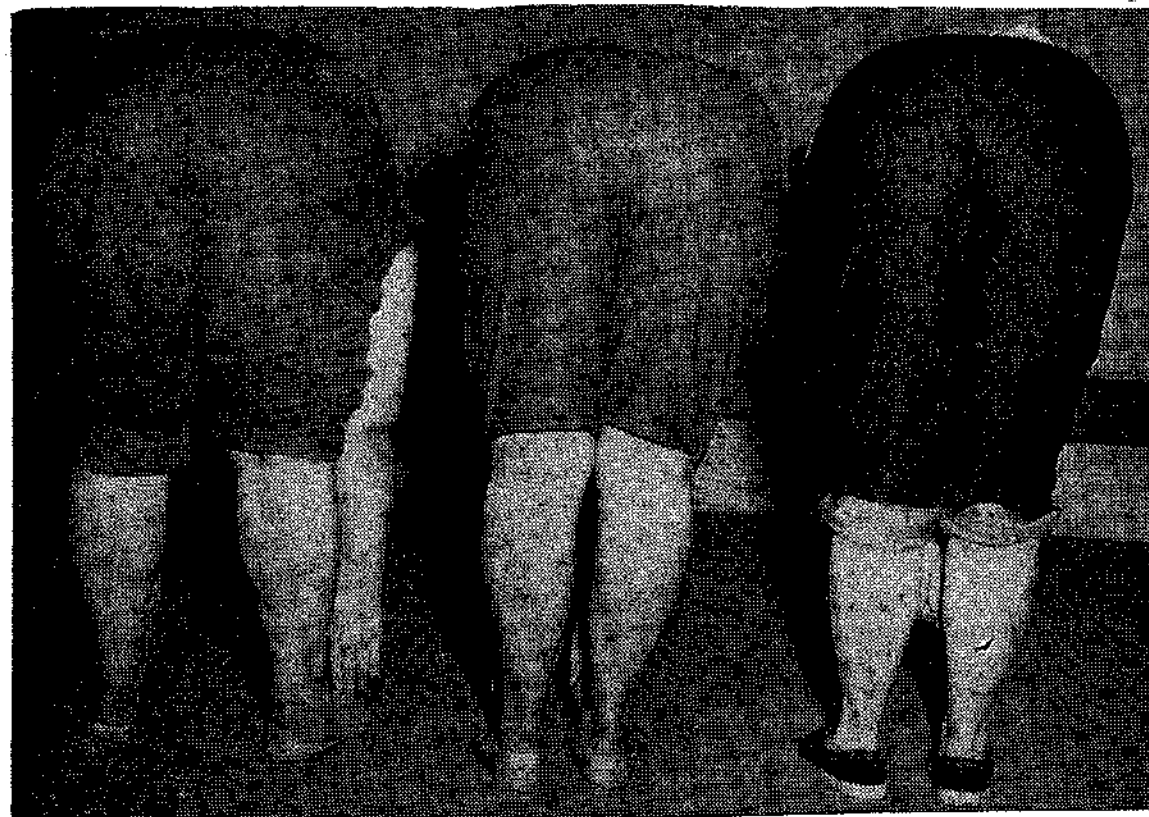

## "Streamliners" Train in Try To Take Off Excess Baggage

Everybody loves a fat man, but not too much is said about the fat woman, at least to her face. Eight Cass City women got tired of not having anybody say anything about them last February and they resurrected a reducing club called the "Streamliners."

Although their gains, or perhaps losses would be a better term, haven't been astronomical, and some of the women look the same as when they started, they have a lot of fun at regular weekly meetings every Tuesday night at the Deford Hall.

Chief spokesman for the group and president is Mrs. Leo Tracy of Cass City. Other officers are: Mrs. Armand Curtis, vice-president; Mrs. Tom Creason, treasurer, and Mrs. Gene LeValley, secretary. Also in the club are Mrs. Frank White and Mrs. George Remsing, both of Cass City. Two of the original eight quit.

"We started the club four years ago with 14 members, but some of us went to work and it died out," explains Mrs. Tracy. "We started putting on weight again and a few of us decided to try it again."

After five months of exercising and following whatever diets each member chooses, the ladies calculate they've lost about 62 pounds between them.

"Sixty-two pounds doesn't sound like much but it's a lot of pounds when you're talking about fat," Mrs. Tracy defends. She has dropped from 205 pounds to 185 pounds.

If the club had a creed, its chief tenet would be "helping

each other lose weight. You have a tendency to lose weight a lot better together than on your own," says Mrs. Tracy.

"We welcome anybody who wants to join," she offered, "and there are lots of prospects around Cass City that could join the club. All you have to be is 20 pounds overweight."

"Some women are hesitant to join because they don't want anyone to know their weight," she adds.

Giving the women added incentive to lose weight is a series of fines levied for not attending meetings and gaining weight.

"Our dues are 25 cents a meeting plus a fine of 25 cents for every pound or part of a pound gained from the last meeting. If you don't come to a meeting you have to pay double dues next time plus a 10-cent fine."

"It's fun going to the meetings just to see who has gained when you've lost."

"We're weighed and measured every week and the one who has gained the most takes home this big red pig and writes her name on it."

Sometimes, the casual observer gets the feeling that the women aren't really as faithful to their cause as they pretend. Take for instance the time they built their treasury up and spent the money in a wild spree in Saginaw on a pizza eating orgy.

"We tried extra hard to lose weight the next week," she confesses.

A typical session starts at 7:30 p.m. with the reading of the minutes and a discussion of old or new business. This may include gifts to the sick and for the hospitals or discussion of different diets.

Then, with a certain amount of moaning and groaning, the unpleasantness of exercising get under way. Exercises include kneebends, bicycling and toe touching. "We can't get very far down," she tells. Each member offers their favorite exercise as taken from television.

Uniforms for the sessions are blouses and jeans. "They don't make shorts or slacks in our size... unless at Saginaw Tent and Awning," she joked.

To help get through the rigors of exercising, Mrs. Tom Remsing made up some songs for the group.

## Appointing Auditor General Could Pose Knotty Problem

Replacement of the elected Auditor General by one appointed by the Legislature is ordered in the new Constitution.

Implementation of this provision failed in two attempts this year. Administrative problems could result in January if no agreement is reached by then.

Gov. George Romney has indicated he would call the Legislature into special session after the election to resolve this problem if he thinks agreement can result.

Current Auditor General Billie S. Farnum would serve in his post until a successor is appointed under the provisions of the Constitution.

That is, he would serve unless he chose to run and was elected to another office, such as Congressman. In this event, Michigan would be without an Auditor General until such time as one was appointed.

Work on the Auditor General law was done by the Legislative Audit Commission, a joint House-Senate body working since 1962. It has been labeled the "watch-dog committee" which checked and rechecked much of the work of state departments which also was reviewed by Farnum's office.

Objections to the Commission's previous recommendations for methods of appointing the Auditor General centered around the power position the Commission wrote into the law for itself.

Some legislators said the proposed measures would have placed the Commission entirely in charge of the auditing process. The appointive Auditor General would have been a glorified errand boy, said the critics.

The Constitutional provision was designed to give the Legislature closer control over use of funds they appropriate to various state agencies.

Most members felt, however, that the Auditor General should continue to have basic adminis-

trative independence to carry out his job.

### Teachers Learn

Every fall, thousands of Michigan school children get one or two days off while their teachers and school administrators attend regional conference sessions.

After a full summer of contending with the children day in and day out, many mothers gasp, "Oh, no, not another day off." They loudly wonder at the purpose and effectiveness of the short refresher sessions for the teachers.

A look at the activities of a teachers conference answers these questions. Teachers hear general discussions of state, national and world problems in education and attend smaller meetings dealing with their special field.

Classroom communication, international understanding, quality education and aerospace education are typical subjects for general discussion of concern to all teachers and administrators.

In addition there might be as many as 75 to 100 smaller meetings dealing with such specialized teaching interests as beginning teacher problems, extracurricular social activities, the slow learner, team teaching or teacher education and professional standards.

New techniques in teaching reading, under-achievers, elementary art, business, foreign languages, English, math, the sciences and even kindergarten also get attention at the sessions.

One theory behind the conferences is that not every teacher can or does spend the summer studying new techniques in his field.

Every teacher needs periodic reviews of the methods and aids available, however, and conferences such as those sponsored annually by the Michigan Education Association provide exposure to these for every educator.

From the one or two-day conferences, it is up to the individual teacher to carry on with his ever-continuing education.

### Who Cares?

Acute examples of human indifference for the well-being of others first were noted in New York City.

More recently, however, several incidents involving needless human suffering have been reported in Michigan.

Two boys drowned because nearby fishermen did not heed a third youth's pleas for help in rescue. A woman died for failure of neighbors to listen to her screams of torment by assaulting teens. These are the most notable examples.

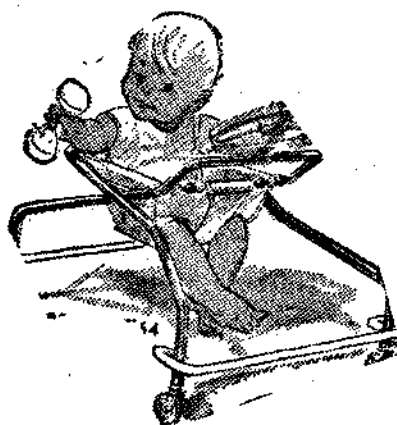

When this happens, as might be imagined, quite a bit of price bargaining goes on between buyer and seller, sometimes with a very humorous twist.

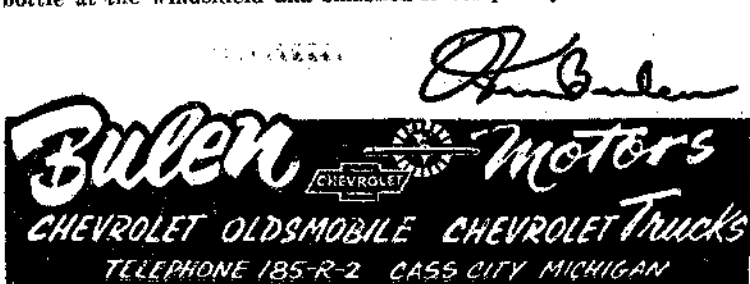
This was the case recently when two dealers ended up arguing over a windshield with a pinhole in it that the buying dealer thought should be good for \$50.00 off the price.

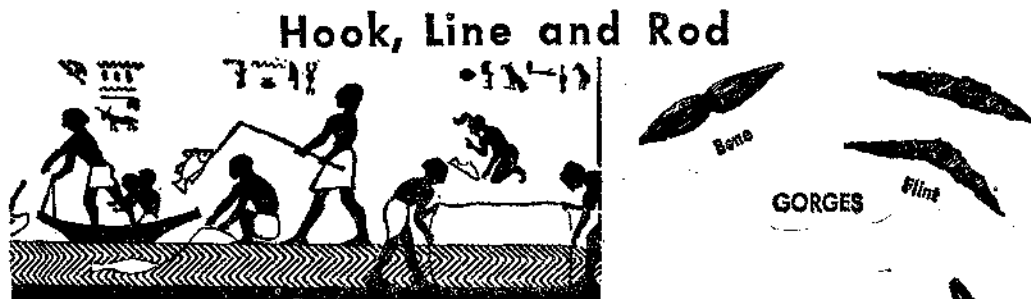

Since the dawning days of his being, man has been caught up by the haunting challenge of that "special" fish, using many tricks in a bid to outsmart this great tempter which still lies somewhere in the deep. As early as 8000 years ago, man began to make inventions to help his cause, including the gorges and the hook and line which were unique in that they gave the fish some choice of whether he got himself caught or not. Other inventions, such as harpoons and nets, were designed to take fish unaware. The fishing rod was first found on a depiction in Egypt (top left), dated at about 2000 B.C. It was probably much older than this date. About 950 B.C., the first cane pole appeared, apparently made from a plant called Calamus, a member of the reed family. In those times, the fish line was made of braided horsehair or flax; barbed hooks were bronze and other metal. The ancients were quite good at using artificial flies. By about 1500, the age of rules and sportsmanship had come to fishing in England, and long, limber rods of 18 to 22-foot length were used to play fish on light tackle. By 1676, with the invention of the reel, these long rods gave way to rods which compared more closely with present langleys.

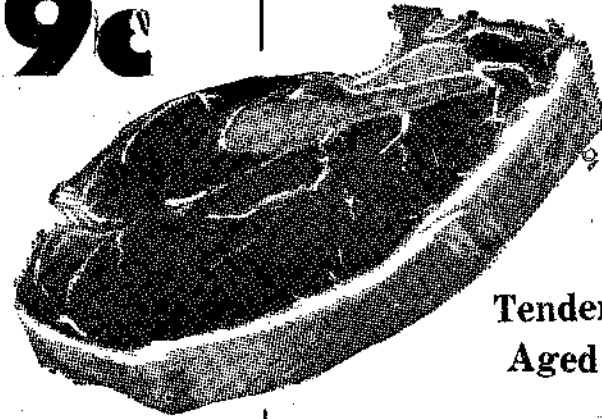

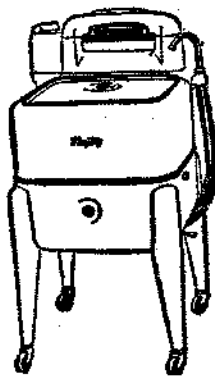

## Lyle Holik Seeds Rye Cover in Corn

Lyle Holik, cooperator of the Tuscola Soil Conservation District, is seeding a cover crop in his corn this year, according to Wilbur Kellogg, Work Unit Conservationist of U. S. Soil Conservation Service. Holik is using one and one-half bushels of rye per acre broadcast in the corn, just ahead of the last cultivation. In this way the rye is covered by the cultivation.

The use of a cover crop seeded in, or just following, a row crop has many advantages from a soil and water management standpoint, Kellogg stated. Some of these are: prevent or reduce soil loss from wind or water erosion; reduce loss of water and plant food by lessening runoff and leaching of water; add organic matter to the soil; improve soil structure; remove excess water from the soil by early spring growth; improve drainage, and provide a turf to facilitate use of farm equipment.

Probably the most important of

these benefits is that of increasing the amount of organic matter in the soil, Kellogg explained. Organic matter might be called the lifeblood of the soil. It serves as a sponge to hold moisture, it is a readily available source of plant food; it provides living quarters for soil bacteria, and makes the soil work easily.

Cover cropping is a soil and water conservation practice that most farmers in the Tuscola District should add to their farming system, Kellogg emphasized.

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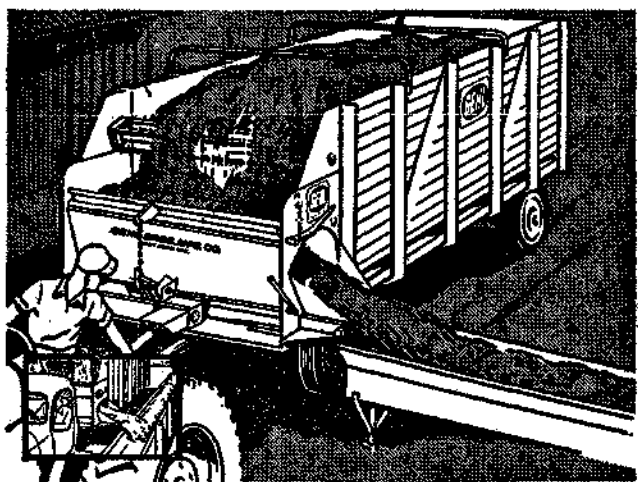

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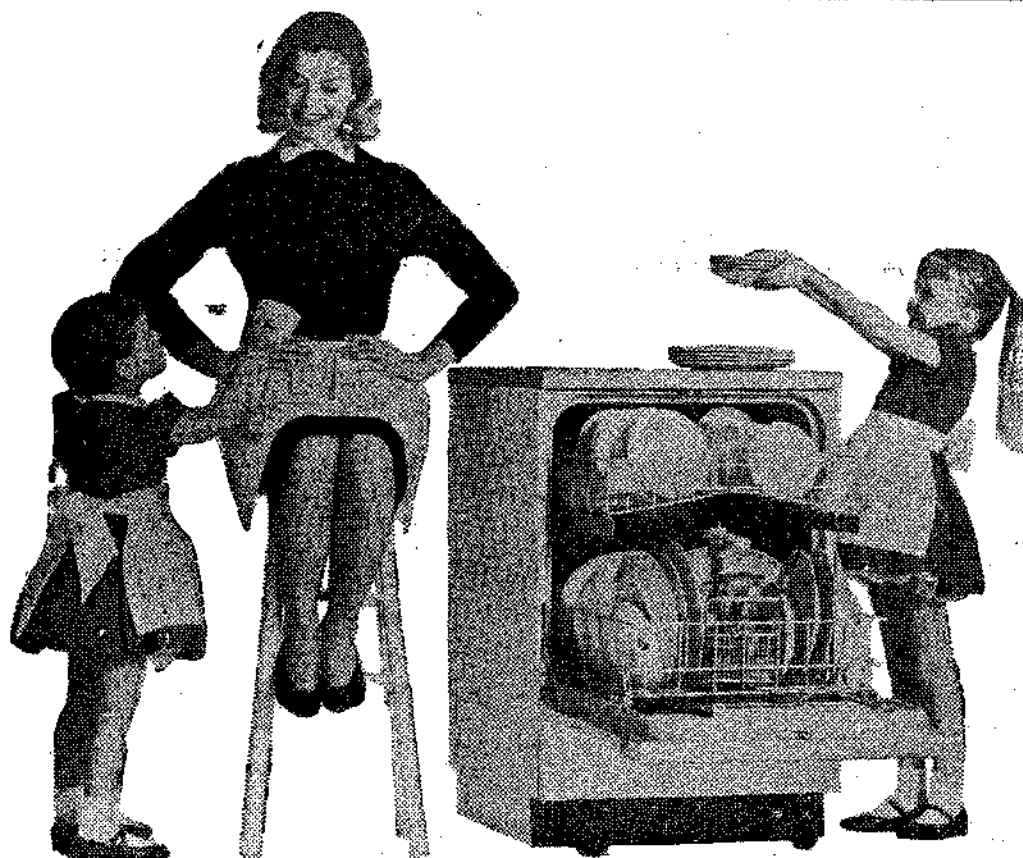

## BOOK REVIEW

### "Run Me A River"

Exciting and Readable

Regular readers of this column will recall that not long ago we reviewed another book by this talented and prolific writer. Following that review, one of our out-of-town readers sent us a story from a Sunday supplement, telling of this author.

This latest of Mrs. Janice Holt Gile's books, RUN ME A RIVER, is an exciting and readable account of five days on the river boat "Rambler", primarily a boat (I doubt that it would occur to anyone to call the "Rambler" a ship.) that handles cargo. Its regular route of travel is the Green River where it carries primarily cargo of merchandise and livestock from one town to another.

The "Rambler" is an inglorious craft, with repairs just 'making do' and the captain saving money to buy a new boat. The crew members are mainly one-trippers, slaves loaned by their owners, plus a few regulars such as Luke (the bookkeeper and a part time apprentice helmsman), Foss (who had charge of the engine room and was second in command only to the Captain), and Bohannon (Bo) Cartwright, who wants to be let alone to run the "Rambler" on the river.

Early in the story the boat rams a smaller one occupied by "Sir Henry", a Shakespearean actor, and his granddaughter Phoebe. They "fit-in" and become valued members in several escapades, with 16-year-old Phoebe taking over the galley, and providing the crew with some of the finest food on the river.

Danger, always an unseen and unwanted passenger, becomes greater and more dangerous when the war between the states comes to roost in Kentucky; then river-boating becomes a challenge to the "Rambler", which is the last boat on the river. The tale becomes dramatic when, hiding from

gunboats, they have to get safely by Bowling Green and its locks on the river. Everybody gets in the act, with some of the crew infiltrating into the city to create a diversion during the locking period! (If you can read this without getting excited, you might as well go on to your chores, because you're dead and just afraid to admit it.)

There is the battle just before they are docked at their home port. Gone is a great deal of the railing on the "Rambler", shot away; some parts to the boiler must be installed before shipping out again; and the cabin is in bad need of repair or replacement. Bo wants to try outwitting the generals on both sides, using the "Rambler", but instead enlists, leaving the "Rambler" to his crew to operate, hopeful of making enough money to buy a new riverboat when the war is over.

And running through the plot, but never becoming obvious is the potential love story involving Bo and Phoebe. We hope that a sequence may be written to this book, in which they might get married and engage in river commerce with the new boat - possibly named "The Settle"?

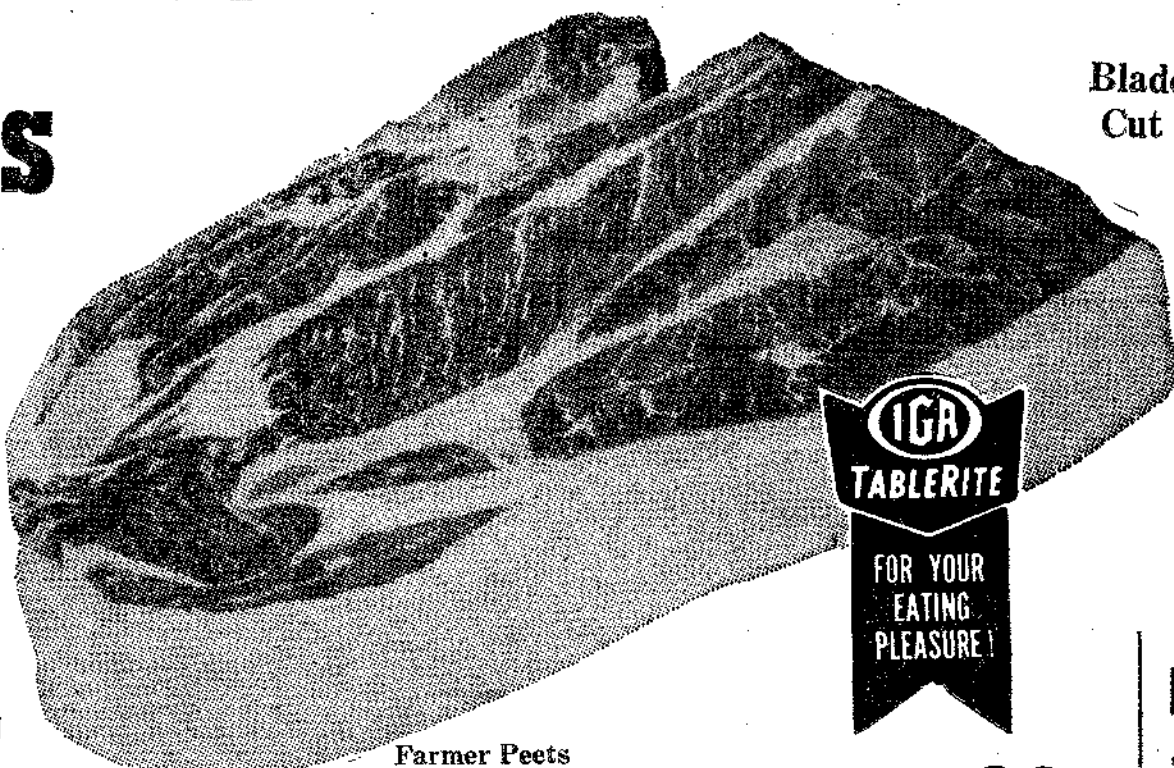
