After they leave, the only Main street lullaby will be provided by the village crew as they sweep the main stem at about 5 a.m.

We were having breakfast the other morning and the usual regulars were on hand. The conversation switched to the circus that was coming to town. One of the cynics at the table said that the Legion would probably be lucky to break even after sponsoring the event. The local post did better than that... but only slightly... netting just \$36 from the ticket sale.

If you want to learn about circuses there is a man in Cass City to see. It's Charles "Duke" Turner.

Duke is a member of the Circus Historical Society and has always been fascinated by the Big Top. For nine years, Duke made his living as a professional musician on the drums.

His unfulfilled ambition was to play in the circus band. He is a personal friend of Merle Evans, head conductor of the Barnum and Bailey circus, and collects Evans' circus music.

Duke can talk knowledgeably and entertainingly for hours about the circus and seems happy to do so.

The current gas war in Cass City is especially hard on the smaller operator who buys gas from a wholesaler who in turn buys from the parent company.

His smaller profit vanishes with overhead expense and as one operator put it, "I haven't made a nickel this summer." "It used to be that our customers would come in and get the gas they need and drive away. You could sell service and quality. Today, the first action of a driver as he pulls in is to see what the price of gas is today."

One station is reported to have made an ironic gesture about the whole affair by placing a sign in front of the station Sunday that read gas 19c a gallon and then closed up.

An estimated 65 persons, including chaperones, are expected to take part in the program.

## Strike Cuts Gas Service

Routine service calls for Southeastern Gas Company customers in Cass City may be a long time getting answered following a decision Tuesday by service and engineering employees to reject the company's last offer and strike.

Company officials announced Wednesday morning that the offer which Teamsters Local Union No. 339 rejected included wage increases totaling 25 cents over a period of three years.

The company emphasized that it will continue to furnish essential services to its customers with supervisory personnel taking over the duties of striking employees.

The decision to strike followed an election conducted by the Michigan State Labor Mediations Board Tuesday. A company spokesman has stated that there are no meetings scheduled with the union.

Fair authorities say that an outstanding attraction has been scheduled for each day of the fair.

Four full days of harness racing have been carded. The annual championship horse-pulling contests will be held Monday for teams under 3,200 pounds.

Special acts secured for the fair include the Grand Old Opera stars Thursday night; the Paul Bunyan Canadian Show at 8 p.m. Friday night, and Hurricane Hell drivers at 2 and 8 p.m. Saturday.

In addition to these special attractions, the fair will offer all of the traditional events. Open and 4-H and FFA exhibits will be judged. The 4-H and FFA steer and swine sale set for the 4-H barn at 3:30 p.m. Thursday is always one of the highlights of the fair.

Another crowd pleaser is the crowning of the Huron county Bean Queen at 9:30 p.m. Friday.

The traditional children's day has been set for Wednesday when the grandstand will be free to children under 12 in the afternoon and two bicycles will be given away.

## Unregistered May Not Vote Says Clerk Patterson

You're out of luck if you missed Monday's Primary Election registration deadline. That's the word from C. E. Patterson, Elkland township clerk.

Voters who failed to register by Monday are ineligible to vote in the September 1 Primary Election.

Patterson also reported that persons who haven't voted since the 1960 elections may also be in trouble when they go to the polls for the Primary. According to a new ruling, persons who have not voted in the last two years will not be able to vote at the primary election unless they have re-registered.

More details on this aspect are to be released later, Patterson announced.

Interest in the coming Primary has been high, the clerk reports, with over 100 new registrations in by the deadline.

"I got a lot of last minute registrations," he remarked.

Total registrations for the township, according to Patterson, are "in the neighborhood of 1200 persons."

## Two Grass Fires Bring Firemen

Cass City firemen were called out twice during the past week to fight grass fires which caused slight damage.

Sunday afternoon a grass fire behind the Gross and Maier slaughter house, just south of the village limits, got out of control but firemen were able to extinguish it before any damage resulted.

Earlier in the week, on Thursday, July 30, firemen were called to fight a grass fire at the Herman Charter farm, six miles northwest of Cass City. Charter was burning out a ditch without a burning permit and the fire got out of control.

He had it under control, however, before firemen arrived.


Village residents were awakened early Monday morning when lightning and a loud thunder clap set off a false alarm.

## Circus Net Less Than Expected

Although an estimated 200 persons attended the two showings of the Clark and Walters Circus Friday night south of Cass City, American Legion officials were somewhat dissatisfied with the net results.

Leo Tracy, commander of Tri-County Post, Unit 507, announced that net profits to the post from the venture was \$36.00. The money will go to a building fund.

Tracy blamed the small return on a lack of advance ticket sales. "Everybody waited until the last minute and bought their tickets at the gate," he explained.

"Also, there wasn't a concentrated push of ticket sales by Legion members," he added.

The Legion was to get 25 per cent of the first \$200 in advance ticket sales. Advance sales amounted to about \$100. They also got 10 per cent of the gate sales.

He reported that the circus should return in another two years and when it does, a more concentrated effort will be made on ticket sales.

Tracy estimated that the building fund totals about \$300 with proceeds from the circus. "We need as much as we can get," he remarked.

Eventually, the Legion plans to raise a complete building above the present basement meeting place.

Legion project monies are also used for local projects, including a program of Americanism.

## Wonder Whether It's Weather or Just the Mood

County officials are trying to determine whether July's hot temperatures have had anything to do with a record number of marriage applications or if everybody's just in a marrying mood.

Fifty-four couples applied for licenses during July, according to the office of Clerk Archie Hicks. The figure tops last year's record of 45 applications for July.

Although the figure is an all time high, it is just part of a trend for the year. At this time last year, total applications for the year were 179. This year's total, from January 1 through July 31, was 251, or 72 applications more than the previous year for the same period.

## Car Crashes Hurt Seven Area Persons

Seven persons were injured during the past week in accidents in the county and area.

Friday, five persons received injuries in a two-car crash on E. Dayton Road, near Caro. Hurt were, Fred S. Williams, 38, Owendale; Lawrence Brigham, 18, Deford; John LaFave, 17, Ubyly; Don Brigham, 15, Deford; and Stanley A. Putnam, 33, Caro. The injured were treated at Caro Hospital.

The accident occurred when Putnam lost control of his car when he attempted to miss a dog and the car slammed head-on into Williams' vehicle.

Putnam's car skidded 228 feet, according to deputies, before the impact.

### One Hurt

Monte R. Sokolowski, 23, Detroit, was injured slightly when a car he was riding in, driven by William D. Mathews, 24, Deford, was struck in the rear by a car driven by Jerome Jones, 63, Mt. Pleasant, just east of Caro on M-81.

Mathews was attempting a right turn when the accident happened. Riding with Jones was his wife, May, 56, and Mr. and Mrs. Charles Collions, both 37, of Saginaw.

Two persons escaped injury in an accident Sunday, July 26, on Kinde road, two miles east of Caseville.

Larry Goodall, 21, Cass City, told sheriff's deputies that he swerved to avoid an oncoming car and drove into a ditch. The car rolled over once, coming to a stop on its wheels.

## Mrs. Lemanski Shoots Up State Small Bore Match

Cass City's sharp shooting English teacher, Mrs. Oarie Lemanski, has been at it again this summer, racking up several championships.

At the Michigan State Small-bore Rifle Championships held at Waterford, Mich., on July 25 and 26, Mrs. Lemanski made a clean sweep of winning the Michigan Metallic Sight championship, the Any Sight championship, the women's title and the Michigan Open championship.

Her winning aggregate score over eight 40-shot matches fired during the two days of competition was 3188 of a possible 3200.

This is the third time Mrs. Lemanski has won the Michigan Open championship (over men and women) having held the title in 1962 and 1960.

Following closely behind and pushing her all the way, was Mrs. Lemanski's sister, Marianne Jensen of Allen Park, a student at Central Michigan University, who finished in second place with a total score of 3186.

In addition to the above scores, Mrs. Lemanski also received trophies in two individual matches, the Dewar (20 shots at 300 yards).

## Bumper Oat Crop Harvest Nearly Completed

Local grain elevator operators are reporting a "real good" oat crop this year with high yields and high test.

With about 80 per cent of the crop in, yields are averaging about 60 bushels per acre with a test of 38 pounds.

If the weather holds, elevator officials speculate the entire crop will be in by the end of the week. Very little damage was reported from Sunday night and Monday morning's heavy rain.

Next on the harvest agenda will be beans. Just how much local crops have been affected by the bean beetle is still unknown. Farmers failing to take precautions may lose much of their crop.

There is also some concern about the lack of rain during the blossom time this year which could also have an effect on yield totals.

Following the bean harvest will be the corn harvest sometime in late September and early October.

## Board Delays Decision

Because of the cloudy situation concerning the work on Leach and West streets, north and south of Main street, the appeal board of the Cass City Planning Commission failed to act on an appeal made by Arthur Caister Tuesday night.

Caister reported that if the original plan for angle parking and a street wider than is necessary for parallel parking is activated he will again take his case back before the appeal board of the commission.

Any decision of the appeal board is binding on the village council and the property owner concerned. After a decision by the board, only court action is capable of reversing the ruling.

## Still Need Teacher At School

Cass City Public Schools is still short one teacher, according to Donald Crouse, superintendent, but the vacancy is expected to be filled with no trouble by the time school starts.

Still vacant is the post of junior high science teacher previously held by John Schmitt-hausier. Crouse reports that placement agencies at various Michigan colleges have been notified of the opening within the past week and applications should start coming in soon.

Three new teachers have been hired within the last month, two in the elementary level and a senior high science teacher.

Hired were Mrs. Martha Butcher, half-time kindergarten; Mrs. Geraldine Tibbitts, fourth or fifth, and Robert Gray, science teacher.

Mrs. Butcher is from the Caro area and Mrs. Tibbitts has been attending school at Bethel College, Mishawaka, Ind. Gray is a recent graduate of Michigan State University.

Mrs. Tibbitts is a former Deford area resident. Gray replaces Ron Raulin as science teacher.

## Students Start Fund for Stirton

Junior High students at Fraser, determined that one of their teachers, although dead, will not be forgotten, have started an Archie Stirton Jr. Memorial Fund, it was reported to the Chronicle this week.

The students started the memorial fund for their own accord. Stirton was a junior high science teacher at Fraser.

He was drowned Monday, July 27, in Arcadia, Calif.

## Deliberate Charge In Deford Accident

Sheriff Hugh Marr was to have conferred with Prosecutor James Epskamp to see what action, if any, would be taken in the shooting of a 12-year-old Deford boy Thursday by a 17-year-old neighbor youth.

Still in Hills and Dales Hospital recovering from a .22 bullet wound in the abdomen is Lee Kilbourn, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Kilbourn.

He was reportedly shot by Eugene Haney, 17, a neighbor, who apparently became frightened and ran away after putting the gun under his bed.

Marr reported that the two boys and two other youths had gathered at the Haney home and

a target practice session was held in the backyard. The group was breaking up to go home when the accident occurred.

Gary Lindahl, 14, and Gerald Mozen told Sheriff Marr that Kilbourn was on his bicycle, ready to leave, when Haney pulled the trigger on the supposedly empty gun. Kilbourn was struck in the abdomen by the shot.

Both boys told the sheriff that they believed the gun to be empty with all shells used up in the target practice.

Sheriff's deputies searched the Deford area that night for the Haney boy who hid in his barn. He returned home early Friday morning.

Vacation Is the Berries as Far as George Is Concerned

Ever wonder what happens to teachers when school's out in the spring? Do they disappear into hibernation or are they packed away with the books and dusted off next September?

Well, most of them work at related or varying jobs, some study and others travel.

One teacher in the Cass City school system finds his thrills on a flat "Blueberry Hill" located just outside Otter Lake in northern Lapeer county.

Life is just a bowl of blueberries for George Elliott, Cass City High School guidance counselor, as he directs the operating of a 40-acre blueberry venture that is known throughout the southeastern portion of Michigan for its outstanding berries.

Located, oddly enough, on Blueberry Lane, a half mile west and a half mile south of Otter Lake, the blueberries are a cooperative venture operated by Elliott and his father, Arthur, since 1940 when the first plants were put out.

On any given day, the patch's parking lot may have cars bearing plates from Florida, Georgia and other states surrounding Michigan and from almost every county in southeastern Michigan.

"Pick Your Own" Operated for the most part on a "pick your own" basis, the project yielded a staggering 40 tons of berries last year.

A recent Sunday's beautiful weather brought pickers out in droves and Elliott estimates two tons of berries were stripped from the plants.

The elder Elliott purchased the farm in 1939 after scouring nearby counties for the proper soil needed for the blueberries. At that time he was in the legal profession and the blueberry project was just a hobby.

Introduced Crop Because of the venture, he is considered the first person to introduce cultivated blueberries to eastern Michigan.

He has since retired from the legal profession and gone into the blueberry business full-time. Since his retirement, he has branched out and three years ago he purchased some land in Florida. Working with Dr. Ralph Sharp, research breeder for the University of Florida, the pair are attempting to grow blueberries in Florida.

Full-time Job

For the younger Elliott, bossin' a blueberry patch is a full-time job in the summer and during the winter, the patch manages to fowl up some pretty good fishing weather.

The job becomes full-time as soon as school lets out and doesn't become part-time until school starts again.

"I get up at about 6:15 a.m., leave Cass City by 7:00 a.m. and I'm usually here by 8:00 a.m.," he tells. "I'm usually home by 7:00 p.m., unless I have to close up."

Elliott spends his week ends in the winter, trimming the well-spaced rows of blueberries and other pre-season preparatory work. "That is, when I'm not ice fishing," he added.

No Trouble

Picking starts about July 15 and ends by Labor Day. Elliott says he has surprisingly little trouble with his pickers damaging bushes or causing other problems.

"We have four basic suggestions for our customers," he explains, "which provide everyone with good picking."

Customers are asked to "pick each bush of all ripe fruit, stay on rows and bushes assigned to you, avoid damage to bushes and children under 12 are not allowed in the picking area."

He provides swings, slides and sand boxes to keep the younger children occupied while their parents are in the fields.

Helping Elliott keep things in order are nine other full-time employees and one part-time worker.

"I hire mostly college help," he says, "I find them much more responsible." Four of his workers are in college or will be this fall and three are high school seniors. The other three are adults.

Berries Huge

The berries, luscious and huge, some as large as a quarter, sell for 30 cents or 25 cents a pound, depending on the time of the season. Earlier berries are more expensive.

The berry fields are laid out so that they may be picked in sections. This gives each area a chance to recuperate and berries ripen before picking starts again.

One reason customers favor Elliott's fields as compared to fields in Imlay City and other spots is the fact that "I let my fields sod up. This way, customers can come out in their Sunday best and don't have to be afraid of getting dirty."

Michigan Leader

Michigan and New Jersey are the two leading blueberry growing states and, according to Elliott, are about evenly matched in production.

"The berries first in your store are from New Jersey or North Carolina," Elliott claims. "In season, most of them come from Grand Junction, Michigan."

Blueberries are native to Michigan and are more commonly known locally as "huckleberries." Plants last indefinitely and wild plants in New Jersey are believed to be 1,000 years old.

Not Local Crop

Blueberries are not likely to become a popular crop in Cass City, according to Elliott, because an extremely sour soil is needed. "Anything else, and you might as well forget about it."

He stated that the berries may grow in the Deford area in view of the fact that there are some wild berries now.

What most persons at Elliott's blueberry field don't know is that they are taking berries from plants that may some day revolutionize the blueberry industry.


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# Apathy Dangerous In Judges' Race

Ignorance is Risky

Lack of familiarity by the voting public with an issue or office can be dangerous to both the candidates and the electorate.

This year such a danger exists, in theory at least, where the State Court of Appeals election is concerned.

One outstate candidate for the new court estimates that only one out of 100 voters knows that nine Appeals Court judges will be elected this fall and that each elector will cast a ballot for three candidates.

Being a non-partisan race, the judges ballot will be separate from other offices in both paper and machine precincts.

Elections officials say regretfully that frequently machine voters ignore nonpartisan contests. Less often, but still too frequently, the same thing occurs in paper ballot precincts where voters tire of their job before even looking at the non-partisan contests and issues before them.

Many well qualified candidates, including local judges and present and former state legislators, have filed in the Appeals Court district races throughout the state.

Failure by the voters to be familiar with these candidates could be costly. This court's nine judges will get many of the important appeals in the future. Wise minds must be selected for this heavy responsibility if the voters are to be properly served in the future.

**Dollar-Sound**  
Final audits will not be completed until mid-September, but tentative figures on activity during the fiscal year ended June 30 indicated a good financial position for the state.

In addition to providing a clean slate for the 1965 legislature to work with, the fact that Michigan's books are again in the black provides major political fodder for the coming campaign.

Republican Gov. George Romney will undoubtedly claim much credit for having eliminated the \$85 million general fund deficit and putting nearly \$50 million in surplus on the books.

Legislators of his persuasion also were given some credit for the fiscal stability by Romney in a recent announcement of the financial position.

Romney said it was largely due to the thrifty attitude of GOP lawmakers in writing budgets that Michigan was able to retire its debts and yet some extra funds in the public coffers.

Democrats will take a different view this fall in the campaign.

A batch of so-called nuisance taxes reimposed since 1960 and new ones enacted into law rather than levy a state income tax will be blamed by Democrats on

the Republican legislators.

Democrats will claim that these new taxes, enacted during the final year of Gov. John B. Swainson's term, were totally responsible for the increase in revenue this year to \$610 million. This was the figure, they will say, that made the surplus possible.

Romney also will put some credit for the surplus to several spending studies by task forces which recommended money-saving methods to several state agencies.

Perhaps most difficult to evaluate is who or what should really get the credit for the increased revenue.

Some factors outside the executive office and legislative halls certainly must be considered. Three consecutive boom years in the auto industry provided additional spending money in pockets, part of which went to the state in taxes.

Another certainty is that the several lean years previously made administrators more conscious of the value of the money they had to spend. There can be little doubt that in state government, as well as in private life, it is easier to count pennies closely when faced with a shortage than when money seems to come from a bottomless well.

**Another Approach**  
One approach to traffic safety improvement is to take the known hazards off the roads.

These include landmarks which cause blind intersections, dangerous curves on the roads themselves, and, probably most important of all, the drivers who have had driving records.

Tough treatment on known bad drivers has been set down on the record books this year. Secretary of State James M. Hare reports more revocations and suspensions of licenses the first half of this year than ever before.

On the positive side, however, Hare also reports that his office is attempting to step up its driver-improvement program for the sometimes errant drivers.

Pointing up some common errors in motoring to the several-times offender frequently will make him mend his ways, Hare's department feels.

The steady rise in the death rate will likely continue, if the first-half annual statistics are any indication, but revocations, suspensions and lecture techniques may be part of the large key which will turn this unfortunate tide.

The other day I got a letter from a young lady on Severance Road and enclosed was a... you guessed it, a six leaf clover.


The letter was signed simply "Mary."



### VILLAGE OF CASS CITY COUNCIL MEETING

A regular meeting of the council of the Village of Cass City was held on July 28, 1964, at 7:00 p.m. All members were present except Mr. Auten.

Minutes of the June regular meeting and of three special meetings were read and approved as read.

The clerk was instructed to write a letter to Zemke Real Estate advising that the concrete wall on Ale street is expected to be removed no later than August 15th or the Village will arrange to have it done and bill the owner.

In attendance to inquire as to what is being done in connection with completion of the project on West and Leach Streets were Arlan Hartwick, Keith McConkey, Warren Kelley, Gilbert Albee and William Kritzman. President Rabideau explained that the primary reason for delay was the lack of grade and drainage plans from the surveyor, that the plans have now been received and that the project probably should proceed as originally planned in the near future. It was pointed out that it would be necessary to obtain petitions and hold a public hearing in connection with the assessment. The delegation thanked Mr. Rabideau and the council and were excused.

A lengthy discussion of the overall program was had by the members.

Motion by Althaver seconded by Rawson that the program of curb and gutter, sidewalks, widening of the streets and ultimate blackout on West Street one block north and one block south of Main and on Leach Street one block north and ½ block south of Main as originally planned, with consideration being given to the planning commission recommendation on width, be put into motion. Yea-5. Nay-0. Motion carried.

A report from the committee indicated that no decision had been reached that would allow for a recommendation for a new

secretary-bookkeeper. Motion by Rawson seconded by Althaver that H. L. Bridges be retained for the month of August at a salary of \$110.00 per week. Yea-5. Nay-0. Motion carried.

President Rabideau advised the council that Detroit Edison trims trees in the Village once each three years. This is the year that the trimming should be done but due to the animosity that exists in Cass City, the Company refuses to do the work until the interference by citizens is eliminated. Mr. Freiburger and Mr. Rawson were appointed to a committee for the purpose of recommending an ordinance for the care and preservation of trees.

Due to its very poor condition the blackout on a portion of Ale street is to be removed and the street graveled and graded.

Motion by Althaver seconded by Freiburger that an extension of 30 days to August 13th be granted to Chicago Bridge and Iron Company for completion of their contract for installation and painting of the new water tower, due to the delay caused by the Village in determining the exterior paint color. Yea-4. Nay-0. Motion carried.

President Rabideau recommended that the council consider the purchase of an auxiliary motor and gear box for the second well house at an approximate cost of \$1,200.00.

Motion by Freiburger seconded by Root that the treasurer be granted an extension of 30 days to August 28th for the collection of Village taxes. Yea-4. Nay-0. Motion carried.

Mr. Rawson agreed to investigate in connection with the proposed purchase of a spray for the application of chemical to preserve trees.

Final inspection on the water project was held with our engineers, Hubbel Roth and Clark, and the federal representatives inspecting and preparing the punch list. They recommended that, if John Carlo, Inc. is in agreement, the Village complete the punch list items in connection with the water mains that were installed. Mr. Miller of HHFA recommended that the Village pay Carlo for their total contract and that they reimburse the Village so as to avoid additional involvement with the paper work.

Motion by Althaver seconded by Freiburger that Henry Cooklin be reimbursed \$100.00 for loss sustained by him because of damage to his hay crop, and that the Village seek reimbursement from John Carlo, Inc. for 50 percent of the amount. Yea-4. Nay-0. Motion carried.

Mr. Seals was not present at the time the latter three motions were made.

A violation by Chester Szarapski in the building of a car port was to be returned to the planning commission for recommendation of action based on all of the information at hand.

Mr. Rabideau agreed to investigate in connection with insurance coverage for the new water sphere.

Mr. Rawson agreed to investigate in connection with medical insurance coverage for accidents at the Village park.

The clerk was instructed to write a letter to the John Deere Company requesting reimbursement for the amount that was billed for the new front end loader that replaced the original which was defective.

Mr. Althaver agreed to contact General Cable Company regarding the material that they burn which causes a foul odor.

Mr. Rabideau agreed to arrange a meeting with the Elkland Township Board to discuss the fire department agreement.

Motion by Rawson seconded by Freiburger that the meeting be adjourned.

## BOOK REVIEW Never Dull, But Crammed With Facts

Reading James Donovan's account of how he became involved with Colonel Rudolph Abel's defense and ultimately arranged that spy's exchange for U-2 pilot Gary Powers in the book, STRANGERS ON A BRIDGE (The Case of Colonel Abel), was a great deal like reading an unusually exciting mystery story. While the account is long (covering 425 pages crammed with textual material for the most part) it is never dull or stuffy but is a fast-moving account of an anything-but-fast-moving trial and the ultimate exchange of personnel with the Soviet authorities in East Berlin.

Donovan had been in the O.S.S. during World War II, and served as associate prosecutor or at the famed Nuremberg trials. Since the Abel trial, he has obtained the release of over 9,700 Cubans and Americans from Cuba. Among many civic duties, he served, at the time the book was written, as president of the Board of Education of New York City.

He was asked to serve as Abel's attorney by the trial judge through the Bar Association. First he had to leave a very extensive practice and very successful firm of attorneys. Then he had to obtain assistants, for whom there were no funds. (Donovan himself was to receive only a token fee of \$10,000 which he promised to varied charitable groups.) But one young lawyer was paid by his firm just as he would if he had put in full time for them.

Public reaction to his part in the trial was initially a problem to his wife and children. However, as the trial progressed, this problem seemed to disappear.

We are taken into every phase of this highly important case of a spy captured during peace time. Most of the actual work on the case is just plain painful drudgery. But one thing that glows through the book are the growing conversations of Abel and Donovan on a wide range of subjects, both political and otherwise.

I recall from the newspapers of the day that hollow pencils and all sorts of similar devices gave credence to Abel's being a spy. Donovan felt he had been given too difficult an assignment with too little time to prepare. However, reluctantly, the Court allowed him some additional time. Still, Donovan felt that he was going into Court unprepared. Abel took a scholar's interest in his own trial, frequently giving his attorney suggestions — part of which he had received from prison inmates! Through the lawyer's efforts, letters to Mrs. Abel and letters from her to her notorious husband were allowed, most of the time.

The verdict was 'guilty' and the sentence was 30 years in a federal prison. Largely due to Donovan's very strong defense of his unpopular client, the trial was widely reported, and it was generally felt that Abel had a fair trial and that the prestige of the United States was greatly enhanced.
