

## Council Orders Petition

A petition for curb and gutter and sidewalk on the much discussed Leach and West streets project was ordered drawn by village trustees at their meeting Tuesday night at the Municipal Building.

Although there is little possibility that the project will begin this fall, the petition will be presented to affected property owners and as much preliminary work as possible will be done.

The work will include a block north and south of Main Street on both Leach and West Streets.

**New Truck**  
The village will purchase a new two-ton Dodge truck from Rabideau Motors to replace a 1955 truck which is currently in need of repairs. Village Clerk H. L. Bridges reported that the older truck just had some repairs and needs an additional \$700 work done.

The new truck will cost approximately \$8,150 and will have power steering in the event it is used for snow removal.

Trustees Barney Freiburger and Jerome Root Jr. were appointed to a committee to investigate water service possibilities outside the village limits following several requests for the service.

The committee will check to see if the present lines could handle the added load and if so, what extensions would be needed.

**Christmas Decorations**  
Village crews are slated to remove Christmas tree light brackets from the Main Street light poles. Lloyd Vyse has consented to paint the brackets and the Detroit Edison Co. will paint the poles.

Recommendations for a heating unit for the Municipal Building are to be obtained from the South-eastern Michigan Gas Company. The heating plant has been budgeted for at least two years.

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## No Opposition To Novesta Oil Lease

Novesta township board members met no opposition at a meeting Thursday night, Aug. 20, to the signing of a contract with a Mt. Pleasant firm to drill an oil well at the Novesta Township Dump.

The C. J. Simpson Petroleum Company of Mt. Pleasant began drilling Friday after the 12 persons attending the meeting gave their approval to the lease, according to Henry Rock, township clerk.

Officials of the company say they expect to drill 9,000 feet at the site. The rig on the site is the second largest in the area.

## Rotary Stronger Governor States

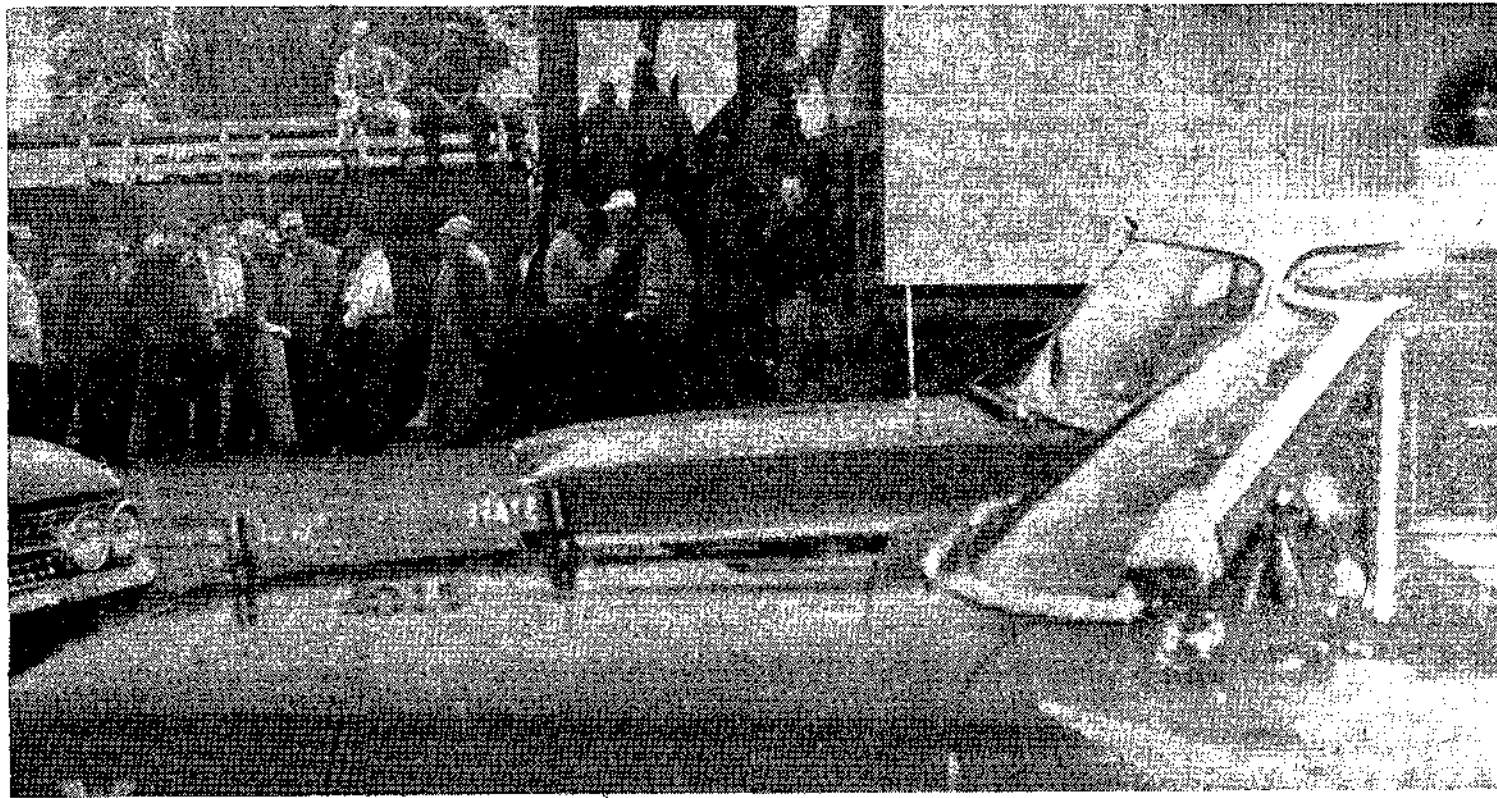

## NFO Action Ups Meat Prices

## Buyers Begin to Feel Pinch

National Farmers Organization-backed pickets continued to turn truckers and individual sellers away from the Cass City Michigan Livestock Exchange auction yard Tuesday in a continuing attempt throughout the State and nation to bring meat prices up.

Pickets were also active at Caro and Marlette markets during the week and are meeting with little or no opposition from the sellers.

The impact of the holding action has begun to show in local markets and meat counters with prices continuing to skyrocket as meat supplies diminish.

Although demonstrations at the Cass City and Caro yards have been without incident, considerable friction between NFO members and local buyers at the Marlette auction Monday was reported.

Richard Erla, of Erla Meat Packing Company in Cass City, reports that hog prices were up about \$5.00 per cwt. going from the regular \$17.50 price to about \$22.00. At the Marlette Auction Monday prices went as high as \$23.75 per cwt.

Erla estimated that the action was holding off "a good 80 per cent of the market. It has gotten to the point where there may not be a drop of meat on the counter after the next week."

At Cass City Tuesday, the holding action was even more suc-

cessful with about 95 per cent of the usual livestock count missing. On hand Tuesday were: one veal, one cow, four hogs and about 25 head of cattle.

Selling was a little stronger in Caro with a larger number of livestock being sold than in Cass City.

Local meat dealers are in a quandary as to what the NFO wants. Erla commented, "I don't know what they want... I haven't been contacted yet."

James Gross of Gross & Maier Meat Market reported that he had not been approached by the union. "I don't know what to say," he remarked, "It's so new."

"We won't be getting anything in until it's settled," he concluded.

Beef prices were up about 10

cents a pound wholesale and the national outlook is for prices to go up 25 per cent above regular.

Harry Lenda, IGA manager, reported that "so far, we're just beginning the price increase. Right now it's pretty hard to determine where it's going."

He reported that during the first week, beef prices jumped four cents a pound.

At the stockyards, officials were declining to comment on the action or its results. NFO officials were also reluctant to comment on the local action, referring all inquiries to the national office at Corning, Iowa.

Erla reported that the holding action "doesn't seem to be covering the whole state with selling continuing as regular in the northern part and western section."

In Detroit 1,700 head were auctioned Monday, a regular sale for this time of year, and in Chicago a reported 13,500 head of livestock were sold, a good strong sale.

## Voters Have Wide Choice in Tuesday's Primary Election

Local voters will pick their national, state and county candidates for the Nov. 3 General Election in Tuesday's, Sept. 1, Primary Election following one of the most hectic and generally confusing campaigns in recent years.

Congressional and legislative redistricting, new offices and a new constitution have all helped to confuse the area voter, necessitating considerable study to be well-informed.

Balloting in Elkland township will take place from 7:00 a.m. to 8:00 p.m. with both precincts voting at the township hall in Cass City.

Jockeying for positions on the Republican ticket's representative in Congress, 8th district, are James Harvey and Donald Wismer. The winner will be pitted against Democrat Sanford A. Brown, running unopposed, in the General election.

**Legislative**  
Redistricting of the legislative districts has senator Arthur A. Dehmel, Unionville, and Frank D. Readle, St. Clair, against each other on the Republican ticket in the race for the State Senator, 28th district. The winner will take on David J. Wright Jr., Democrat, in the general election.

In the race for State Senator, 35th district, which includes the eastern half of the county, Republican candidates are: Lester Begick, Walter G. Nakkula, David E. Repphug Jr., and Robert L. Richardson Jr. Democratic candidate is John R. Ireland.

**State Representative**  
Orville Hubbard, Kingston, and Roy L. Spencer, Attica, are vying for positions in the Republican race for Representative in State Legislature, 78th district. On the Democratic ticket, running unopposed for the post, is Wilma Dillon.

In the race for the 84th District Representative in State Legislature, six Republican candidates are seeking the ballot position. They are: William H. M. Gould, Carl Honaman, Shuford Kirk, William O'Grady, Harry E. Rohlfis and Carl A. Satow. On the Democratic ticket for the office, Elmer A. Beyer and Robert Russell are battling for the post.

**County Offices**  
A split in the county Democratic Party has formed competition in all county offices on the Democratic ticket, except prosecuting attorney and surveyor, for which no candidates were named.

M. J. Hill, Quincasssee, and Fenton S. Loss, Vassar, are pitted against each other in the race for sheriff. Helen A. Thompson and Beulah I. Whybark are battling for the county clerk position on the General ballot and Robert Buchinger and Duane R. Farnum are contesting for the treasurer's post.

Bernice L. Elliott and Melvin P. Otto are opposing each other for register of deeds on the Democratic ticket and Charles F. Becker and Leon VanSteenhouse are both after the drain commissioner spot.

Lee E. Blackmer and Alex Kennedy are seeking the two county coroner spots on the Democratic ticket.

**Republican State**  
With competition in just one race, all other incumbent Republicans are seeking re-election to their respective posts unopposed.

Incumbent Arthur M. Willis, Caro, and Robert H. Kreger, Caro, in the race for treasurer, are presenting the only opposition on the Republican ticket.

Other incumbents are: James J. Epskamp, prosecutor; Hugh Marr, sheriff; Archie Hicks, county clerk; William J. Profit, register of deeds; Freeland Sugden, drain commissioner; Roscoe J. Black, surveyor, and George W. Clark Jr. and J. Benson Col-

lon, both seeking the two coroner positions.

**State Ticket**  
The state ticket has two Georges seeking the top office of governor on the Republican ticket, Gov. George Romney and George N. Higgins. Winner of this race will face Democrat Neil Staeber in the General Election.

Three persons are battling for the Republican ballot position for the office of United States Senator. They are: Edward A. Meany Jr., James F. O'Neil and Elly M. Peterson. Seeking the office on the Democratic ticket is Philip A. Hart, unopposed.

**Judicial Ballot**  
One of the most controversial races in the county is the one for Judge of Probate on the non-partisan judicial ballot.

Incumbent Judge of Probate Henderson Graham is seeking re-election to the \$9,500 a year post despite a restraining order brought against him two years ago by the State Supreme Court restricting him from performing his duties.

Seeking to oust him from the post are Richard F. Kern and C. Bates Wills, both Caro attorneys.

On the same ballot is the largest slate of candidates in the primary election. Fourteen persons are running for the newly formed office of Judge of the Court of Appeals, 2nd district, which covers a major portion of the eastern half of the state with the exception of Wayne County.

Seeking the post are: Timothy C. Quinn, Howard R. Carroll, Louis D. McGregor, Donald R. Freeman, Jack Hanna, Thomas Giles Kavanagh, Earl E. McDonald, Charles N. Murphy, Francis L. O'Brien, Frederick J. Plotts, Farrell E. Roberts, William Ross, Donald W. Sargent and William L. Taft.

**Jail Levy**  
Whether or not the county gets its new jail in the near future will depend on how county voters receive the tax rate limitation increase of one and a quarter mills.

The levy which will cost voters \$1.25 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation, as equalized, would run for two years.

**Driver Fined in Justice Court**

Driving with his license suspended proved expensive Monday for a Unionville driver when he was brought before Justice Reva Little by Bad Axe State Police.

Frederick C. New, 24, Unionville, pleaded guilty to driving an automobile August 7 while his operator's license was suspended.

He was brought into court Monday by state police after he failed to answer a ticket issued to him on Aug. 7.

His license was under suspension because of an unsatisfactory driving record.

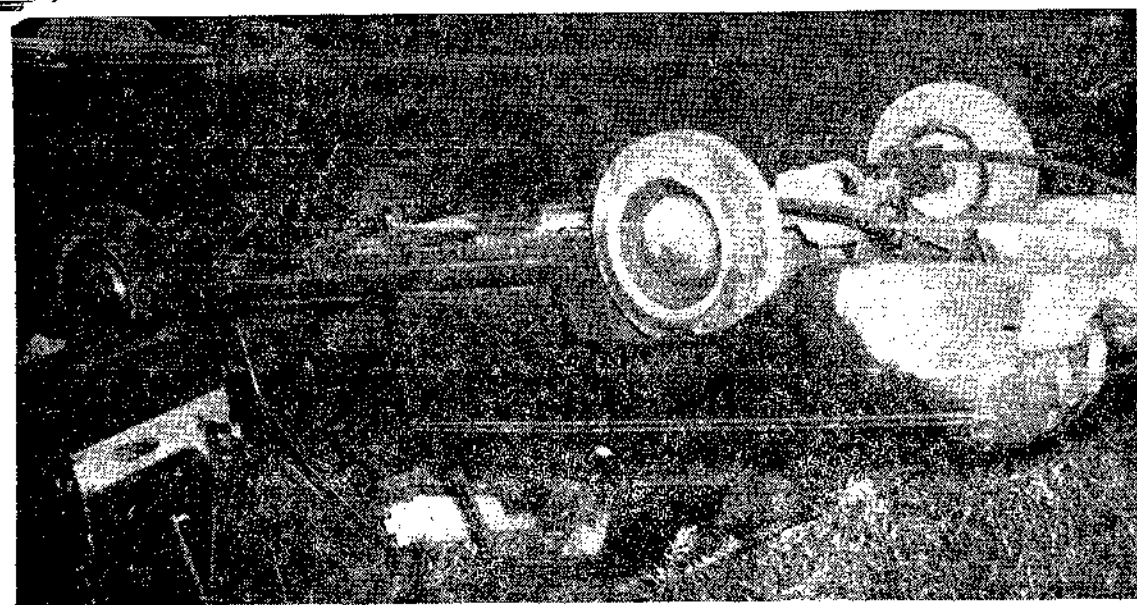
A former Cass City man is in Tuscola County Jail pending payment of a fine following his arrest Tuesday in Fremont township on a disorderly charge.

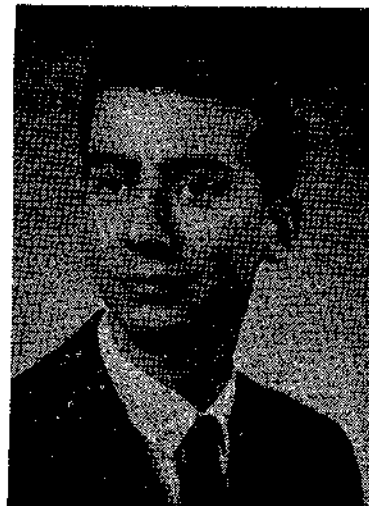

Gagetown-Grant-Fraser won the church league play-offs with easy victories over Shabbona, 18-1, and the Cass City Catholics, 18-2.

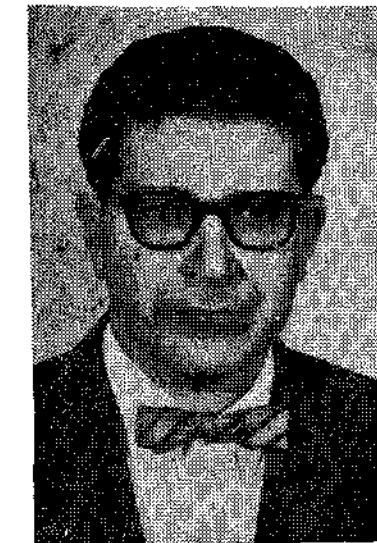
An all-star game was played Monday night with Gagetown-Grant-Fraser pitted against the top players from the other six teams. The champions edged the all-stars 9-8.

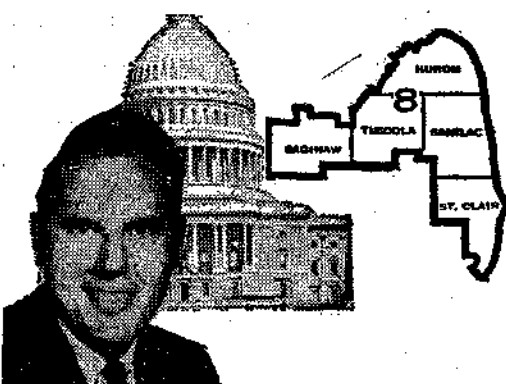

## VILLAGE OF CASS CITY COUNCIL MEETING

A special meeting of the Village Council was held on Wednesday, August 19, 1964, at 7:00 o'clock a.m.

The meeting was called to order by President Rabideau. Trustees present were Althaver, Auten, Freiburger and Rawson. Auten was appointed acting secretary.

The recommendations of the Planning Commission of August 5, 1964, regarding the street program for the Village, as follows, were discussed:

### To the Village Council

Special meeting of the Planning Commission. Members present were James Bauer, B. A. Calka, Willis Campbell, Herb Ludlow, Jerome Root Jr., Lee Rabideau.

Subject: Review of Street Program. 1. Collector or secondary thoroughfare street - this discussion covered width and we arrived at a 42 foot width for all such streets.

The following recommendations are made: Leach Street from Main north to Church one block.

1. 5 1/2' sidewalk for the full block each side

2. 1/2' curb

3. This will allow angle parking and still leave a 4' sidewalk

4. 55' street properly drained

5. Angle parking from Main St. properly marked

6. One way entrance from Main only with the proper signs.

7. Two hours parking only

Leach Street from Main south one-half block to alley

1. Same Dimensions as North Leach

2. One way, entrance from Main only for the full block

3. Two hours parking only

Leach St. is your most difficult street to properly move traffic.

What we are doing is creating a parking lot, movement of traffic secondary.

West Street one block north of Main to Church.

1. Width 42'

2. Replacing sidewalk with proper grade.

3. Parallel parking only

4. This street is being treated as a secondary thoroughfare entering into a residential area, angle parking would create a definite hazard if the street was a full width.

West Street one block south from Main to Pine Street.

1. 5 1/2' sidewalk for the full block each side

2. 1/2' curb

3. 55' street properly drained

4. Two hour parking only

5. Angle parking properly marked

6. This street has developed into a natural secondary thoroughfare to Garfield and should be treated as such, but we feel it would create a problem for present businessmen and future businessmen. Angle parking will create a problem, but it is necessary here.

The Commission must come up with a secondary thoroughfare to Garfield on some other street.

The discussion of this problem was covered from all angles, the effect of the hospital and future building in Hills and Dales relative to West Street.

The recommendations of the Master Plan as to closing some streets for parking only as per Leach Street.

We feel that this will cut these streets to the best possible use as to properly moving traffic and parking.

We submit this for your deliberation.

Motion by Althaver seconded by Freiburger that the plan be adopted as submitted. Yea-4. Nay-0. Motion carried.

It was agreed that immediate steps be taken to complete the plan as soon as possible and that Rabideau and Root act as a committee to negotiate the terms of the curb and gutter.

**It Could Happen Only - in America**

The Methodists of our state have a new bishop, who, until his election was President of Methodism's greatest seminary. That is a snide way of saying that I graduated therefrom. (The Rev. James Braid, my local colleague, made the 'error' of attending another seminary.) Bishop Loder is certainly well qualified and no doubt will eventually have an opportunity to get acquainted with our fair community and we with him.  
When your stand on some issue is supported by a minister in his pulpit, you feel that this pastor is doing nothing more than spreading the truth. But if he is critical of something which you hold dear, why is it that you say the minister has no right to use his pulpits for politics? Senator J. Strom Thurmond (Dem. S. C.) is the most recent politician to step forward to object to "politics in the pulpit." The Senator, of course, is well-known for his views on Civil Rights -- a view diametrically opposed by most Christian bodies.  
One more step in what admittedly is a long, long road, has been taken by the Roman Catholic Church. Pope Paul has begun preparations to establish a new secretariat for non-Christian conversions to Catholicism, it will establish contacts with such groups as Buddhism, Islam and other faiths. This plan while not a 'giant step' between the Roman Catholic Church and the non-Christian faiths in today's world, has possibilities that literally take one's breath away -- or, so it seems to me.  
While we ordinarily do not hail the demise of magazines or committees, we congratulate the publishers of "The Methodist Layman" for their good sense in ceasing publication (the June issue was the final one). A Methodist interested in the work of his Church beyond the local level is able to subscribe to too many journals and magazines. A few years ago, Methodist legislation was passed which, we were told, would end the publication of most magazines by the many Boards and Agencies of the Methodist Church. But it seems that every man likes to put out a magazine and the number mushroomed in a very short time. We salute the dead magazine, and hope others will follow in the way! Or, so it seems to me.

### 50 County 4-H's To Show at Fair

Michigan's State 4-H Show has become more than an agricultural fair for youth. It's an educational event covering many areas that extend beyond the farmer's line fence and into the urban areas of cities.

Nearly 3000 young people -- the cream of Michigan's 4-H crop -- will visit Michigan State University for the 48th annual State 4-H Show, Aug. 31 to Sept. 3. Tuscola county will have about 50 members with entries in the state-wide exhibit.

Judge Freeman's fight not only was successful, but the voters were given a sudden windfall — the refund of more than two million dollars after the court victory.

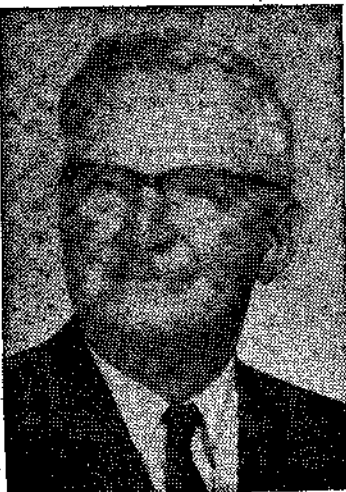
Judge Freeman's entire career has been marked by his fighting for the rights of the average consumer and voter.

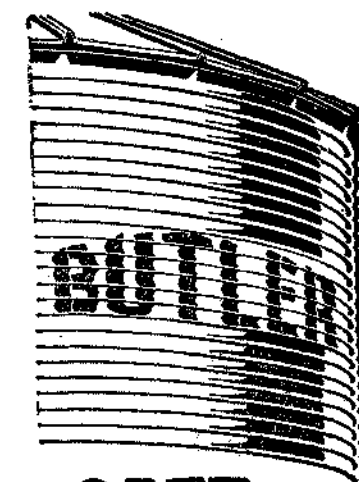

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## Gaines Wheat Not Good for Michigan

The Michigan State University Crop Science Department and the Michigan Millers Association strongly recommend that Michigan wheat growers avoid planting Gaines wheat this fall, said Alfred Ballweg, county extension director.

This new Pacific Coast variety has attracted the attention of wheat growers on account of the widely publicized short-strawed characteristic it possesses and the high-yield record in Washington. Gaines is a semi-hard white wheat developed at Washington Agricultural Experiment Station. It is 7-10 days later in maturity than Genesee or Avon. The soft wheat quality is satisfactory when grown in the Pacific Northwest where it is adapted.

However, when grown in Michigan the Gaines has undesirable characteristics that may seriously damage the reputation of Michigan's soft, white wheat. Gaines has been tested for several years in MSU trials and found to

be poorly adapted to Michigan.

In variety comparisons made this year by farmers in several Michigan counties, Gaines yielded 75 to 80 per cent as much as Genesee or Avon, the recommended varieties in Michigan. The samples of Gaines collected from these tests had a high percentage of badly shrunken grain.

Limited milling tests made by Michigan millers of Michigan grown Gaines show a low yield of flour and poor bran clean-up. In laboratory and baking tests the flour had a higher protein content than that from Avon or Genesee and was deficient in the cooky-spread factor. The premium pastry quality of recommended Michigan varieties is due in part to the low protein content of the flour and to the high cooky-spread factor. In Michigan trials it has proved to be very susceptible to mildew, stem and leaf rust.

## Mental Illness is One of the State's Biggest Problems

One of Michigan's most pressing problems, the mental health picture, poses some statistics well worth pondering.

Approximately one-sixth of Michigan's general fund is spent for direct care and treatment of mentally ill and retarded patients. In the current fiscal year this will amount to more than \$100 million.

Additional funds will be spent this year for new expanded mental health facilities, but experts in the field say much more could and should be done.

Indirect costs of mental illness are also great when computed in terms of work absenteeism, welfare costs due to homes broken by this problem, and legal costs arising from behavioral irregularities.

Perhaps even more staggering are the personal figures involved in records of mental and emotional illness.

The Michigan Society for Mental Health estimates 180,000 school age children are in need of psychological attention, while only about 30,000 are actually receiving such help.

There are about 800,000 persons all told in Michigan with some form of mental illness, but only 37,000 of these are in state institutions, according to Society officials.

Some relief for the imbalance between need and existing care is being provided through the relatively new community mental health facilities, but the Society says there is considerable room for improvement.

Recent figures indicated slightly over 17,000 persons in the state are being served in community psychiatric out-patient clinics. Each is hard pressed to meet the demands for service at this time.

The chief sources of relief for this problem lie, according to Society spokesmen, in future community action and greatly expanded and improved programs for children needing institutional care.

Michigan's contributions to world progress, primarily through industry and education, will be in the spotlight next May when the 12th annual Michigan Week is observed.

More than one billion dollars in industrial and agricultural products are being exported from Michigan annually, one of the factors considered in deciding on the theme, Michigan: Dynamic in World Progress for the May 16-22 event.

Woodward C. Smith, vice-president of Central Michigan University who has served in various capacities for several previous Michigan Weeks, heads the 1965 promotion.

Continuing the tradition, the Governor formally announced the theme for 1965. Smith and his

major planning committee were busy with Michigan Week activity for some time before this, however.

Research by the Greater Michigan Foundation, the sponsoring agency, shows about 1,000 Michigan industries and businesses are engaged in foreign trade and investments.

This volume of activity means that eight out of 10 manufacturing workers in the state are employed by companies involved in foreign trade.

Another major contribution to world progress is being made by Michigan's colleges and universities, which are involved in assisting educational institutions in many nations and in training students from all over the world on state campuses.

## Measures Interest

Some indication of the continuing growth of tourist interest in Michigan is evidenced in the requests for maps and information reaching state officials.

One aspect of Michigan's varied information services which is a good measure of the total picture is the at-the-scene highway tourist centers.

Highway officials note that the number of tourists stopping at these information centers in the month of July alone was up by nearly 10,000 over last year.

Strategically located at Ironwood, Menominee, Sault Ste. Marie, Port Huron, Monroe, New Buffalo and Mackinaw City, the roadside centers are easily accessible to most travelers either at their point of entry or the very popular stopping places.

The Mackinaw City station, for example, gave good indication of the popularity of that region during July. Of 89,741 requests for information at the seven stations in July, some 40,753 were made

to the Mackinaw City station.

Information activity during the first seven months this year has led highway officials to predict they will serve about 300,000 visitors in 1964 as compared to 280,000 last year.
